
In April, 40% of community meeting members left the neighborhood daily to buy goods/services

Retail Demand



- Completed in February of 2018
- Looked at the Retail Demand in
 13 corridors in Detroit
- **2 focus groups** in 2017

Major Recommendations

- Address blighted buildings along Dexter Street
- Pursue an infill development strategy along Dexter Street
- Permit street (curbside) parking along West Davison Street











The Program

- Surveillance by Detroit Police
 - Real time, officers visit area routinely

The Findings

- Carjackings have declined by
 - 40%
- Crime around businesses reduced by
 - 23%
- Participants across the city 323
- Locations in neighborhood area


REQUIREMENTS

- At least 5 businesses to sign up within 4 block radius
- Monthly cost not more than \$250
- Contact service provider for your area

- 2. To explore ways to incorporate arts and heritage on retail corridors






CURRENTLY HAS UNPROTECTED BIKE LANES:

Do you want to increase public safety through protected bike lanes?












Fullerton Avenue - Existing Condition




Fullerton Avenue - Proposed Condition




Opportunities









Intersection at Davison/ Broadstreet/Livernois




Intersection near Zussman Park saw 39 crashes in 2016




