4 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Good evening,
5 ladies and gentlemen, and welcome to the Board of
6 Police Commissioners' meeting. My name is Jerome
7 Warfield, chairman of the Board of Police
8 Commissioners.

9 It is an honor and privilege to be here
10 to what is home for me in the Brightmoor Section
11 of the city of Detroit. And certainly we want
12 to thank Pastor Cecil Poe and his congregation
13 for his commitment to this community. We know
14 those of you who are familiar with this community
15 know that a great deal of community meetings take
16 place here in this hall, and so we thank God for
17 just his dedication and his support of this
18 community.

19 We certainly want to thank the men and
20 women of the Northwest District who are out
21 tonight. Again, my name is Jerome Warfield,
22 Chairman of the Board. Serving with me tonight
23 is the Vice-Chairman of the Board of Police
24 Commissioners, Commissioner Adela Rivera.

25 Chief of Police, probably one of the

1 best Chiefs literally in the country is here with
2 us tonight, Chief Ralph Godbee.

3 (APPLAUSE.)

4 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Chief Ralph
5 Godbee. We also have our staff here. I'm going
6 to ask if our Board Secretary, Mr. George
7 Anthony, will introduce our staff.

8 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you,
9 Mr. Chair. For the record, George Anthony,
10 Secretary to the Board. As I introduce our staff
11 members, I would like for them to stand so that
12 the audience can see who they are.

13 We have representing the Office of the
14 Chief Investigator we have Senior Investigator
15 Abdula Nelson, our Attorney and Supervising
16 Investigator Ms. Celia Banks Washington,
17 representing Ms. Dalph Watson who is Director of
18 Police Personnel is Lt. Rodney Sizemore.

19 One of our staff members, Officer Kent
20 Cooper, he's floating around; Ms. Yolonda Caudle
21 who is our Community Affairs coordinator and
22 does a great job.

23 Our recorders for the evening is
24 Mr. Robert Brown who is our Office Manager,
25 Officer Terrance Bell who is recording our

1 proceeding, Sgt. Allen Quinn who's videotaping
2 and recording and Mr. Dale Rose from Hanson Court
3 Reporting Service. That completes the reading.

4 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, sir.
5 Is Pastor Poe available here tonight? Pastor
6 Poe? And if Pastor Poe is not here, is one of
7 his representatives here to come and provide the
8 invocation? Pastor Poe or one of the associate
9 ministers of Leland Missionary Baptist?

10 All right. Do I have any chaplains in
11 the house, any police chaplains in the house?
12 All right.

13 Let us just bow for a quick moment of
14 prayer, please.

15 (INVOCATION WAS GIVEN.)

16 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Until we have a
17 quorum when Commissioner White gets in, we will
18 be meeting as a Committee of the Whole, and
19 seeing as the temperature here tonight is a
20 little bit more elevated, we are going to start
21 at the end of our agenda and we're going to start
22 with public comments.

23 And so those of you wishing to address
24 the Board of Police Commissioners, we ask that
25 you come to the podium right here in the center,

1 state your name for the record and we ask that
2 you will spell it as well to make sure that we
3 get it correctly, and then we ask that you give
4 us two minutes, just two minutes for your
5 comments for tonight, please.

6 You may come at this time.

7 MS. HATCHER: Good evening, Yvonna
8 Segan (sp) to the Board, our Chief. My name is
9 Evangelist Dora Hatcher. I'm from your
10 Northeastern District. I have something to say
11 to my Chief tonight publically.

12 I love you, I respect you. You're
13 younger than any of my children, but I respect
14 you as my Chief and as a man of God, a minister
15 and all that goes with it. You question my
16 Christianity as a minister. I have never said
17 that I would not go along with the transition of
18 our new Commander.

19 I love Debra, she's from our Northeast
20 District as yourself and all I ask is -- and the
21 others of Northeastern -- is that you give us an
22 answer. I ask you do we matter in Northeastern
23 District?

24 CHIEF GODBEE: You absolutely do.

25 MS. HATCHER: We have a very strong

1 community. We have a very strong Executive Board
2 and I know you're the Chief and I don't deny
3 that. You didn't have to remind me. I know who
4 you are and I respect you, but I don't back down
5 neither.

6 I want to know why -- we want to know
7 why. I asked for a meeting. You said you didn't
8 have a problem with it. Our president has asked
9 you, but you have not answered her, but I want
10 you to know, Commander Ralph Godbee, I love you,
11 boy, and I think you're one of the best Chiefs
12 there is, even when you were my Commander in
13 Northeastern with Dunlap, okay.

14 So I'm still waiting on that meeting.

15 CHIEF GODBEE: Yes, ma'am. Through the
16 Chair. First of all, Evangelist Hatcher, I would
17 never question anybody's Christianity. That is
18 not mine to give. Christianity is a matter of a
19 walk of faith.

20 But what I do ask is that people of
21 faith and leadership positions pray for me and
22 pray for my strength. It is difficult to make
23 the leadership decisions that you have to make
24 sometimes, but my dad told me that you have not
25 reached a leadership moment until you make a

1 decision that everybody doesn't agree with.

2 And I do understand the consternation
3 because of the tremendous leadership that Frankie
4 Lewis (sp) provides the Northeastern District.
5 It is a difficult pill to swallow, but it was a
6 difficult pill to swallow when Ron Haddad (sp)
7 had left Number 11.

8 It was a difficult pill to swallow when
9 Chester Logan left the Northeastern District. It
10 was a difficult pill to swallow, I guess, when
11 Ralph Godbee left Eastern Operations Bureau. It
12 might have been not as difficult a pill to
13 swallow because I don't remember that same uproar
14 when I left.

15 But I say all that to say that in
16 leadership you make decisions and my dad said
17 three people can ride a horse, but only one
18 person can sit up front and at this point in my
19 leadership I'm the one that sits at the front of
20 the horse, and I take great, great, great -- and
21 the Assistant Chief will tell you, I don't make a
22 personnel decision lightly, and when I do I try
23 to weigh everything and I can -- as much as I
24 love a district or a particular district -- and I
25 have an affinity towards Number 9 because that's

1 where I really learned how to be the police --
2 but when I make decisions I have to make them for
3 what's best for the whole of the city of Detroit
4 and the whole of the Police Department.

5 To the extent that we did not
6 communicate it in a manner that the Northeastern
7 District leadership is satisfied with, I will
8 publically apologize to you for that. But what I
9 ask you to do is please embrace Commander Debra
10 Fair. She is a tremendous Commander as is
11 Commander Lewis, but in this time and this point
12 of history given what I have to deal with and
13 when we elevated -- Commander Morris Wells, can
14 you raise your hand -- Commander Morris Wells is
15 the officer in charge and I will state this
16 publically, he will be my designee for the
17 appointment to the rank of Deputy Chief to run
18 the Western Operations Bureau which causes a gap
19 and then I have to shuffle personnel from that
20 point.

21 But with that being said, the Northwest
22 District has a number of crime challenges. It is
23 the largest district in the city of Detroit. By
24 population, it would be, I think, the third
25 largest city in the state of Michigan if it were

1 a stand-alone city. So this is a tremendous
2 compliment to Commander Frankie Lewis because if
3 he was able to leave that legacy of leadership at
4 the Northeastern District, I'm hoping that he
5 will have the same influence over the
6 Northwestern District because I don't, quite
7 frankly, know how soon Commander Davis will be
8 back and ready to lead his troops and I have a --
9 that is a huge -- this is a huge area with a lot
10 of responsibility, two great Lieutenants there in
11 Inspector positions, but I really need a
12 Commander to mentor them until they're ready to
13 be ascended to the rank of Inspector.

14 So any error I made, charge it to my
15 head and not my heart. I love you too,
16 Evangelist, but I do ask people of faith that if
17 we all show a level of spiritual maturity, let's
18 move beyond this point, let's rally around
19 Commander Fair and give her every opportunity to
20 be successful at the Northeastern District.

21 Thank you ma'am.

22 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Yes, sir.

23 MR. ECTOR: Good evening. For the
24 record, my name is Rick Ector. Just want to
25 commend Detroit Police Department for reaching

1 out to the open-carry community. A couple of
2 days ago word got to me that members of the
3 Detroit Police Department, particularly I believe
4 -- don't quote me -- but I believe Deputy Chief
5 Tolbert reached out to Michigan Open Carry and
6 stated that the legality of open-carry has been
7 effectively communicated throughout your staff
8 and that with the individuals who are going to be
9 participating in mass this weekend at the Hoedown
10 Downtown should not experience any issues with
11 the Detroit Police Department. I did hear about,
12 Chief Godbee, your comments on WXYZ. I didn't
13 see it today, but I was told that you welcomingly
14 embraced and acknowledged the legality of
15 open-carry, not only for the Hoedown, but any
16 other period of time.

17 So with that -- there was one thing I
18 wanted clarification on. It was communicated to
19 me that it was stated that Deputy Chief Tolbert
20 would be on site and the point person for any
21 particular issues if they particularly arose and
22 I wanted to confirm that.

23 CHIEF GODBEE: Yes, sir, that's
24 correct. I do want to slightly correct your
25 characterization. I wouldn't say openly welcome,

1 but --

2 MR. ECTOR: But acknowledging that
3 it's legal.

4 CHIEF GODBEE: I acknowledged the
5 legality, but in my position as Chief of Police
6 our job is to enforce the law. We don't
7 interpret the law, so I don't have the luxury of
8 having an opinion about what should or should not
9 be. I have to do the law based on what is, what
10 the law says.

11 MR. ECTOR: And I warmly acknowledge
12 you.

13 CHIEF GODBEE: So thank you for that
14 acknowledgment. So any other issues we have
15 relative to that, that's something -- we're going
16 to actively engage the open-carry community in a
17 dialog at all times, but we honor the law and
18 that's what our job is to do.

19 MR. ECTOR: That's all we can ask,
20 thank you.

21 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, sir.

22 MS. BURRIS: Good evening. My name is
23 Valerie Burris (sp) and today I'm here
24 representing the (INDECIPHERABLE) Block Club.
25 I'm also here representing the mothers of the

1 city of Detroit and we're asking that the Police
2 Department have a full investigation to the death
3 of Darnell Perkins who was killed at the Kingdom
4 Club.

5 We also have a question to the police
6 Department. I don't know if this is your
7 purview, but what do the citizens have to do to
8 get a nuisance business in the community shut
9 down?

10 CHIEF GODBEE: Ma'am, to your first
11 point, first of all our sincere condolences on
12 your loss. Any person that dies in our city
13 under circumstances that are not natural, you can
14 guarantee there will be a full investigation and
15 what the investigation finds, it finds. We'll be
16 very honest as to what we find and to the extent
17 we can communicate that to the family without
18 compromising the investigation -- is Lt. Blackman
19 here from Homicide?

20 Ma'am, Lt. Duane Blackman is in charge
21 of our Homicide Section, so if you have any
22 specific questions relative to that case, Lt.
23 Blackman will be there for you.

24 Relative to nuisance abatement or
25 issues relative to nuisance buildings, your

1 Precinct Inspector or District Commander would be
2 able to help you via your Police Community
3 Relations officers. So depending on what the
4 abatement issue is or what the -- you know, if
5 it's an issue relative to zoning, if it's an
6 issue relative to a DPW issue relative to how
7 they upkeep, so just depending on what the issue
8 is, they will be able to point you in the right
9 direction.

10 What Precinct do you reside in, ma'am?

11 MS. BURRIS: Northwest.

12 CHIEF GODBEE: Northwest, Commander
13 Lewis, you're going to find out why these people
14 love Commander Lewis so much.

15 Commander Lewis, can you stand up,
16 please? Commander Frankie Lewis, if you would
17 just see -- I didn't get your name, ma'am.

18 MS. BURRIS: Ms. Burris.

19 CHIEF GODBEE: Ms. Burris immediately.

20 MS. BURRIS: I also have one more
21 question concerning the secondary employment.

22 CHIEF GODBEE: Yes, ma'am.

23 MS. BURRIS: I'm reading in the paper
24 -- I don't know if it's been approved fully --
25 but I do have a serious concern about secondary

1 employment. If our police officers are going to
2 be working at these clubs what are their
3 allegiance going to be when it comes to an issue
4 with the public? Are they going to protect the
5 public or protect the business owner? I really
6 have a concern about secondary employment.

7 I know our police officers need more
8 money, they should be paid more money, but I'm
9 really concerned about that.

10 CHIEF GODBEE: It's not about revenue
11 generation though, Number 1. This is about
12 above-baseline police service. And the key is
13 police service. On their primary duty or
14 secondary duty, every rule and regulation that's
15 applicable to a Detroit Police Officer relative
16 to their conduct is the same rule, whether it's a
17 Consent Judgment-related issue, Use of Force,
18 every issue relative to being a Detroit Police
19 Officer, the rules of engagement are the same.

20 What happens in a secondary employment
21 situation is that person is paid by another
22 employer, but the rules and regulations by which
23 they conduct their business are by the rules and
24 regulations of the Detroit Police Department.
25 The span of control is tighter in secondary

1 employment than it is in regular employment, so
2 there is no allegiance to a business. They
3 provide a service, but that service has to be
4 consistent with the rules and regulations and the
5 ordinances of the city of Detroit.

6 So that business has no dog in that
7 fight, and then another portion that stops or
8 minimizes the possibility of that is that through
9 a software program the opportunities to work are
10 rotated among the officers, so no one officer can
11 just continually work at the same business all
12 the time to build up that type of thing to where
13 their loyalty is to that business.

14 MS. BURRIS: Can we get like a PSA on
15 Channel 10 or something explaining that to the
16 public?

17 CHIEF GODBEE: Absolutely. I think
18 that's an excellent idea. We'll do that with
19 Sgt. Stevens.

20 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you.
21 Again, for those of you who have come in late, I
22 want to introduce Commissioner White who's joined
23 us. We now officially do have a quorum, but
24 those of you who are coming to make public
25 comments, again, we ask that you please state

1 your name and spell it for us and we ask that you
2 limit your comments to two minutes.

3 CHIEF GODBEE: As a point of
4 clarification, Ms. Burris, also if we have
5 regulatory authority over an industry, i.e. a bar
6 or a liquor license establishment, the officers
7 cannot work inside of the establishment.

8 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Yes, sir.

9 MR. MALACHI: My name is Belge (sp)
10 Malachi, M-a-l-a-c-h-i from the Southwest area.

11 We have a problem in the Southwest
12 area. If any of your officers are here from
13 there, they've heard me speak before about it.
14 And the last time I spoke, I was told to be quiet
15 about the statements that I have made.

16 We have drug houses out there. I've
17 been fighting for three years on two particular
18 houses, one in particular. I've gotten promises
19 from all different types of police officers,
20 Commanders, Lieutenants, "Hold on, Mr. Malachi,
21 we have a new system working. We're going to
22 take care of that and this is going to work."

23 I've been waiting and waiting and
24 waiting; nothing happens. When the police --
25 like what I said a couple of weeks ago -- when

1 the police do come and raid the house, they will
2 bring out seven or eight men handcuffed, sit them
3 on the curb and they're running back and forth in
4 and out of the house and -- like they're having a
5 good time.

6 After they come out and release all the
7 guys and let them go, then there's eight or nine
8 women that come out of the house. So if you're
9 going to raid a house, if a woman is in there
10 seems like she would be selling drugs also that
11 you bring her out and sit her on the curb.

12 But to me it seems like something else
13 is going on, and I can't get anywhere and it's
14 getting hot right now, and it's going to get bad.
15 My life has been threatened out there already.
16 These guys shoot up in the air, the bullets fall
17 down, they sit them on my porch, on my steps.

18 And I've been fighting this for a long
19 time. I'm at my wit's end, but something is
20 going to jump off, you know, and I was told at
21 the meeting last Tuesday in Southwest Detroit to
22 come out here and perhaps I could get some help
23 because I've been everywhere, City Council,
24 everywhere.

25 I've called -- I talked to Benny

1 Napoleon, Lt. Richards, Lt. Washington, people
2 from -- I've had people -- Commissioners calling
3 for me. I can't get nothing done and these
4 houses are still operating and it's getting worse
5 and I need some help.

6 CHIEF GODBEE: Sir, before you leave,
7 Commander Wells, can you raise your hand? I need
8 you to see Commander Wells and then Deputy Chief
9 Wells, I need you to see both of those gentlemen
10 and then, Board, if you would allow -- I
11 typically don't do this, but I think this is one
12 we should report back to you on with specificity
13 as to what enforcement action has been taken and
14 what we're going to do to mitigate that situation
15 if it's an ongoing situation.

16 So whatever it requires outside of
17 enforcement, we also need to take a look at
18 calling Building Safety and Engineering, take a
19 look at those houses, see if we can have them
20 declared uninhabitable, so there's some things
21 that we can do and some pressures we can apply,
22 sir.

23 So if you see those two gentlemen, but
24 what we want to do is report back publically so
25 you can hold us accountable because you said we

1 haven't done anything in the past.

2 I just want to make sure we do
3 something this time. Then also we may want to
4 take a look at some non-conventional things.

5 A lot of people may not agree with, but
6 Minister Malik Shabazz, they have no problem
7 marching on homes until something happens, so we
8 will go every route that is necessary between the
9 police and the community to make sure we get you
10 some relief, sir.

11 MR. MALACHI: See, because Southwest
12 Detroit is large senior citizens. They're afraid
13 and if something isn't done, they're even afraid
14 to come out with a lawn mower or anything and if
15 they're scared to mow their lawns, it's going to
16 be a mess out there.

17 CHIEF GODBEE: Yes, sir.

18 MR. MALACHI: Because they're afraid
19 theses guys will see them, they will break into
20 the garage and steal them.

21 CHIEF GODBEE: Well, sir, my two
22 highest ranking individuals will deal with both
23 situations, Commander Wells and Deputy Chief
24 Wells are going to meet with you and we're going
25 to come to some resolution.

1 MR. MALACHI: Thank you.

2 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you,
3 Mr. Malachi, thank you for coming.

4 MS. McCANTS: Good afternoon to this
5 Board. My name is Yolanda McCants and I'm from
6 the Northeastern District. On this coming
7 Wednesday as everybody knows and all the other
8 Districts, this is Police Week.

9 This coming Wednesday we're going to
10 work all week, we do Monday and Tuesday with the
11 children going in the schools and bringing the
12 kids to the District. On Wednesday we're having
13 what we call "Appreciation Day". The officers
14 have picked someone and the community has picked
15 someone to honor on that day. I am inviting this
16 Board to that affair starting around noon.

17 On Thursday is when the community is
18 going to feed the police officers of the
19 District, the good ones and bad ones, so we're
20 inviting this Board to that event also, so we're
21 going to feed all three shifts, so if you can't
22 make it for breakfast, maybe you can make it for
23 lunch. If you can't make it for lunch, we call
24 it dinner, you can make it for dinner, but we
25 will be in the district all day on Thursday.

1 And Friday is "Community Day". That is
2 the day that we're going to have vendors in there
3 doing a little bit of everything with the
4 community and the community can interact either
5 with the officers and our vendors that we have
6 coming in. So I would look forward to seeing
7 some of you if not all of you on those three
8 days.

9 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Sister McCants,
10 could you make sure Yolonda Caudle from our
11 office has all the dates and times and locations?

12 MC. McCANTS: Yes.

13 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you.

14 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: Through the
15 Chair, Ms. McCants, is this also the -- you're
16 having the award on Wednesday?

17 MS. McCANTS: On Wednesday.

18 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: I think I've
19 already RSVP'd to that, so we will be there.

20 MS. McCANTS: And if someone on this
21 Board would like to nominate one of our officers
22 at our District, what you can do is call the
23 Community Relations office and put your name on
24 the program.

25 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you,

1 Ms. McCants.

2 MS. McCANTS: Thank you.

3 MS. HINES: Good evening. My name is
4 Sandra Hines (sp). I'm with the Detroit
5 Coalition Against Police Brutality. I found out
6 from my relatives yesterday that live in the New
7 Center area which is now called Midtown, they
8 sent out a form saying that we should contact now
9 the Wayne State -- they should contact the Wayne
10 State University Police instead of contacting the
11 DPD. Is that true?

12 They're saying we should direct all our
13 concerns and problems to Wayne State. Are you
14 guys aware of that?

15 CHIEF GODBEE: No, ma'am, this is the
16 first I've heard of it.

17 MS. HINES: They literally have it in
18 writing with the phone number and saying direct
19 all problems that you have or concerns and what
20 have you to Wayne State University Police.

21 CHIEF GODBEE: Not aware of it. I
22 mean, we have a great working relationship with
23 Chief Holt (sp) at Wayne State, but the primary
24 responsibility for police services and the
25 delivery of that service, that's Detroit Police

1 Department.

2 MS. HINES: So can you have a talk
3 with him in regards to that?

4 CHIEF GODBEE: I'll have Deputy Chief
5 Tolbert reach out.

6 MS. HINES: Because the people are
7 concerned and confused.

8 CHIEF GODBEE: Yes, ma'am.

9 MS. HINES: And I notice they're now
10 patrolling in that area and pulling people over.

11 CHIEF GODBEE: Now, they are sworn
12 police officers, so they do have --

13 MS. HINES: But they never really have
14 gravitated towards the Boulevard to pull people
15 over and going now in the neighborhoods -- now
16 they're going in the neighborhoods. I'm not
17 saying they can't, but evidently some directive
18 have come down for them to feel like they can do
19 that.

20 CHIEF GODBEE: I don't think it's
21 necessarily a directive, but their housing is
22 starting to migrate further down the Midtown
23 area, so they have significant investments in
24 student population that goes now from what
25 traditionally was a smaller area of Wayne State,

1 they actually have Wayne State housing that goes
2 further down into the Midtown area, so that's
3 probably why you see an increased presence with
4 Wayne State University Police.

5 MS. HINES: And just one quick thing.
6 It's going to be some people coming in from 23
7 Mile Road. They're on their way now to make a
8 statement, so hopefully when they come, they can
9 make their statement if the public comments is
10 over. All right, thank you.

11 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you,
12 Ms. Hines. Are there any other comments for the
13 public comment section of our meeting? Any more?

14 Hearing or seeing none, we will close
15 this section of our meeting and we will go back
16 to the beginning.

17 And I'm going to ask, first of all, for
18 a motion to approve the minutes from Thursday --
19 well, first of all a motion to approve the agenda
20 for today.

21 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: So moved.

22 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Support.

23 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: It's been
24 properly moved and supported that we approve
25 today's agenda for Thursday, May 12, 2011. All

1 those in favor?

2 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

3 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: All those
4 opposed? Motion carries. We also ask for a
5 motion to approve the minutes of Thursday, April
6 28; Thursday, May 5 and Thursday, May 10 -- I'm
7 sorry, Tuesday, May 10.

8 COMMISSIONER WHITE: So moved.

9 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: Second.

10 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: It's been
11 properly moved and supported. All those in
12 favor?

13 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

14 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: At this time
15 I'm going to ask if Commissioner Vice-Chairperson
16 Adela Rivera will read the duties and
17 responsibilities of the Detroit Police
18 Commission.

19 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: The Detroit Board
20 of Police Commissioners was created under City
21 Charter in July, 1974. We are composed of five
22 members appointed by the Mayor and confirmed by
23 City Council. Commissioners serve a five-year
24 term and may not serve any more than five
25 consecutively.

1 We meet once a week 52 weeks out of the
2 year and all of our meetings are open to the
3 public. Our duties include establishing policy,
4 rules and regulations in consultation with the
5 Chief and approval of the Mayor. We review and
6 approve the Department Budget, we review and
7 approve Department promotions, we receive and
8 resolve complaints concerning the operation of
9 the Police Department and we are the final
10 authority to impose and/or review discipline of
11 Police Department employees.

12 We appoint the civilian Personnel
13 Director and we prepare an annual report of
14 department activities for the public, for the
15 Mayor and City Council.

16 Our staff includes an Executive
17 Secretary who serves as Secretary to us, to the
18 Board and attends all board meetings, the Chief
19 Investigator and additional investigators and
20 other staff as necessary to provide support to
21 the Board.

22 The Police Commission considers itself
23 a liaison between the citizens of the city of
24 Detroit and the Police Department.

25 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you,

1 ma'am. At this time I'm going to ask if the
2 Chief of Police will bring on his presentation.

3 CHIEF GODBEE: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
4 I'm not going to waste a lot of time. We have
5 Commander Frankie Lewis from the Northwest
6 District, if he would just introduce his staff
7 that is here and give remarks, after which we
8 have a presentation from our Gang Squad.

9 I'm going to ask Deputy Chief Paul
10 Wells if he would introduce the officers that are
11 going to be doing that presentation.

12 And as Commander Lewis comes forward, I
13 want to hopefully invoke a point of personal
14 privilege. This is my home church. This is the
15 church I was baptized in. The gentleman on the
16 back wall, Pastor Eugene Rose, the photo of the
17 late Eugene Rose, baptized me. I was married in
18 this church and my wedding reception was in this
19 area.

20 I have so much history with this place,
21 I had hair the last time I was here. That's how
22 much history I have.

23 Without further adieu, Commander
24 Frankie Lewis.

25 COMMANDER LEWIS: Thank you, sir. As

1 the Chief has said, I'm Commander Lewis over at
2 the Northwestern District. My staff is going to
3 be Lt. Vickie Yost who is over the 8th Precinct,
4 Lt. Johnnie Thomas who is over the 6th Precinct,
5 and Officer Sims and Officer Knox here from our
6 Community Relations, and Lt. Yost will be
7 presenting for us for the 8th Precinct.

8 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you,
9 sir.

10 DEPUTY CHIEF WELLS: Good evening,
11 Board. Deputy Chief Paul Wells from the Criminal
12 Investigations Bureau. I've got a large
13 contingent of officers here tonight from Gang
14 Enforcement, but for tonight Sgt. Paul Jones will
15 be putting on the presentation for Gang
16 Enforcement.

17 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, sir.

18 COMMANDER McKISSIC: I'm not Sgt. Paul
19 Jones, but he will be up here any second now.

20 Good evening, my name is Dwayne
21 McKissic. I'm the Commander of Tactical
22 Support. Gang Enforcement is one of the
23 operations that fall under my direction at this
24 time and they are headed by Sgt. Paul Jones, III
25 and he does a great job of directing those

1 personnel.

2 I'd like to look at Gang Squad as a
3 unit of problem solvers for the entire city of
4 Detroit, not just on the West Side or on the East
5 Side. We hang out here in the 6th Precinct and
6 the 8th Precinct and, you know, I'd just like to
7 add something extra. I'm normally very nervous
8 when I come up to the mic, but for some reason I
9 feel at home here.

10 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: You should feel
11 at home.

12 COMMANDER McKISSIC: Good people, very
13 good. Gang Squad, they make it happen
14 everywhere. They go anywhere and do things that
15 are unconventional. We normally aren't looking
16 for --

17 CHIEF GODBEE: Unconventional but within
18 policy.

19 COMMANDER McKISSIC: Absolutely within
20 policy. But, you know, it's not jaywalkers that
21 we are normally looking for. Although much of
22 our focus is to go after youth-related criminals
23 or violators, we go after murderers, we go after
24 robbers, we go after persons that make it
25 difficult for mom and pop to go to the gas

1 station, go to the grocery store, to go about
2 quality of life as citizens would like to do on a
3 daily basis.

4 We go there at various locations and
5 deal with sometimes the worst possible members or
6 citizens in the city of Detroit and we go there
7 and we make it safe for our citizens within
8 policy.

9 At this time I would like Sgt. Jones,
10 Paul Jones, III, to give some historical overview
11 of the operation as well as some mission-specific
12 details. Sgt. Jones?

13 SGT. JONES: Commission, Chief, ladies
14 and gentlemen, Sgt. Paul Jones. My assignment is
15 I run Gang Squad. I am in charge. And I'm going
16 to give you a brief overview of Gang Squad, how
17 the inception began and where we're at now and
18 where we hopefully will be heading for in the
19 future.

20 Gang Squad, better known as -- Gang
21 Enforcement, better known as Gang Squad, was
22 established in 1975 and was called the Youth
23 Crime Section. The Unit was responsible for
24 investigating crimes committed by perpetrators 17
25 and under. This unit was established due to the

1 sudden increase in gang activity throughout the
2 city of Detroit.

3 Gang Enforcement was utilized as a
4 plainclothes strike force unit. The mission at
5 that time was to suppress the escalating tide of
6 youth violence associated with criminal street
7 gangs, namely Black Killers, BKs, Errol Flynn,
8 Chain Gangs, and Young Boys Incorporated which
9 was known as YBI.

10 Through hard work for this new unit and
11 help from the public these violent gangs were
12 brought to justice. Gang Enforcement became
13 active in the Southwest District due to an
14 increase in organized gangs recruiting and
15 establishing territories.

16 Gang Enforcement began to concentrate
17 on intelligence gathering, gang suppression
18 eventually having the most extensive gang
19 intelligence file in the state of Michigan.

20 Right now everything is in the Fusion
21 Center, it's no longer everybody sitting on one
22 pie. Everybody is able to get information as
23 they need it.

24 Gang Enforcement became more involved
25 in Detroit Public Schools due to increase in

1 youth crime. Gang Enforcement has been
2 successful in curtailing recruitment efforts of
3 gang members with programs such as gang
4 resistance, education and training which is known
5 as GREAT and intelligence gathering.

6 Gang Enforcement has also partnered
7 with (INDECIPHERABLE) Aid Society, and assisting
8 families in need of various social programs.
9 These programs target disadvantaged families and
10 younger students before the age where they can be
11 pressured into joining a gang or committing
12 crimes. This gives them the tools to avoid
13 negative community behavior.

14 During these tight economic times the
15 staffing level of Gang Enforcement reflects that
16 of the Department. Gang Enforcement has
17 downsized considerably and emerged a leaner unit.
18 The same goals are being accomplished now with
19 less personnel where it would take twice the
20 personnel that we have. The leaner Gang
21 Enforcement can complete the same tasks with
22 better training and planning. Our purpose has
23 not changed. The unit mission remains to
24 investigate any gang youth-related crimes and to
25 monitor problem schools while assisting DPS when

1 needed.

2 Gang Enforcement personnel can be
3 utilized for numerous duties ranging from
4 dignitary protection, surveillance, patrolling
5 neighborhood problem areas, hot spots, and to
6 controlling and monitoring large crowds at
7 sporting events, concerts and demonstrations. We
8 did have all the principals at the Final 4.

9 Currently Gang Enforcement personnel
10 are being re-trained for raid entry and building
11 searches. This training is designed for Gang
12 Enforcement to take an active role in
13 apprehension of perpetrators of crimes in the
14 city of Detroit as well as Detroit Public School
15 System.

16 If the safety and well being of the
17 students are threatened, Gang Enforcement will be
18 trained and prepared to provide an immediate
19 response to any threatening situation. Gang
20 Enforcement is a flexible unit able to adjust
21 hours of operation quickly to deal and resolve
22 any situations that may arise.

23 Our functionality is tailored to deal
24 with the quality of life problems that arise
25 throughout the neighborhoods. Gang Enforcement

1 has truly evolved into problem solvers and has
2 been called upon by various precincts to augment
3 their patrol in any initiative that they have.

4 This unit was created to combat violent
5 street gangs that terrorized the city. The unit
6 has evolved into a smaller multi-tasking unit
7 that can and has and will continue to operate in
8 multiple capacities.

9 Our overall mission has remained the
10 same, to assist in making the city of Detroit a
11 safer place for its citizens.

12 Any questions?

13 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: I have just a
14 few, Sergeant. I want to talk about the
15 terminology "Gang Squad" because at some point it
16 was stated -- and this may pre-date this Chief --
17 that the unit "Gang Squad" was going to take on a
18 different name, so did that name come back or did
19 it not go away at all or -- do you know
20 approximately what I'm talking about when the
21 amount of people who were in Gang Squad were
22 decreased?

23 SGT. JONES: Well, we became Gang
24 Enforcement.

25 CHIEF GODBEE: I can tackle that one,

1 through the Chair. When I took over as Chief of
2 Police there was a Mobile Strike Force which Gang
3 Squad was a part of. I had an issue with the
4 term "strike force", so we immediately changed
5 the nomenclature relative to it being a mobile
6 strike force. I mean, to me the term "strike
7 force" evokes that we are at war against our
8 citizens, so that is the reason why we changed
9 the nomenclature.

10 I believe we utilized the term crime
11 response teams as opposed to a Mobile Strike
12 Force, but the term "Gang Squad" -- and actually
13 it's -- well, it used to be Narcotics Special
14 Enforcement Unit, Unit Crimes, it's been called a
15 number of different things, but the functional
16 reality is they are the Gang Squad unit.

17 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, and
18 also one of the things we hear a number -- well,
19 we hear some complaints from citizens who say,
20 "Gang Squad came and pulled me over," and they're
21 not sure according to the uniform.

22 Is there something that distinguishes
23 the Gang Squad from other units within the
24 Department?

25 SGT. JONES: Yes, I will be glad to

1 answer that. Our shirts, we have lettering
2 that's probably about 12 inches high, it goes
3 from letter to letter, it says "Gang
4 Enforcement". It does not say "Gang Squad".

5 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Is that uniform
6 present tonight, do you know?

7 SGT. JONES: No, sir. Due to this
8 meeting with the Commission we dressed in our
9 Class A's and came down here shaven and polished.

10 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: It would be
11 helpful at some point -- I know the Chief had
12 talked about this -- that we can get maybe a
13 visual of the various uniforms, especially now
14 when we look on the TV and see that there are
15 people who are out there pretending to be
16 officers and are not, and if so we can get a
17 visual of the various types of uniforms that the
18 divisions wear.

19 CHIEF GODBEE: Through the Chair, Sgt.
20 Jones, thank you for wearing Class A today. They
21 did that for presentation purposes.

22 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: I'm sorry,
23 Chief, one second. If we can just keep the side
24 conversation down and if you have to talk, if you
25 take them out. It echoes in here quite a bit and

1 we can hear the conversations and I'm sure some
2 of you can't hear the responses.

3 Thank you, Chief.

4 CHIEF GODBEE: We are going to be --
5 and I want to commend Deputy Chief Tolbert on his
6 leadership on the Uniform Committee, actually I
7 have on one of the new uniforms now that we will
8 be previewing soon and we will be able to tell
9 you what units will be wearing what and we will
10 go through a public relations campaign to show
11 the community what they can expect their
12 uniformed officers and semi-marked officers to
13 look like.

14 I think one thing that's significant
15 about this uniform is that the name is
16 embroidered so you can't take the name tag off.
17 The badge number will be embroidered so there
18 won't be a question as to the person's badge
19 number, and then our special -- a lot of times
20 Gang Squad just gets a bad rap because our 30
21 Series officers which are semi-marked
22 plainclothes units, a lot of times people
23 perceive them to be Gang Squad and they just
24 blanketly call everything Gang Squad.

25 But we will have more clarity to what

1 each entity will be wearing and once we have that
2 fully -- we've already made the acquisition. All
3 the uniforms just have not been distributed yet.

4 Once they are, we will plan a
5 presentation for the Board and have a full
6 pictorial so everybody will know what to expect
7 our officers to be wearing, and we hope to cut
8 down on the allegations of -- or at least make it
9 very clear who the police are and who the police
10 are not, so when you encounter somebody that's
11 representing themselves as the police, the
12 community will have a better understanding of
13 what the uniform of the day is.

14 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, sir.
15 Commissioner White?

16 COMMISSIONER WHITE: I had another
17 question in regard to the Gang Squad unit,
18 particularly as it relates to its presence in
19 Detroit Public Schools. Is that a permanent
20 presence or is that only a presence once
21 requested by an individual school?

22 SGT. JONES: Well, it's a request
23 requested by DPS. We are there on an as-need
24 basis, but we do still actively patrol the
25 neighborhoods where kids walk to and from school

1 and around the school, but in the interior it has
2 to be requested by DPS because they do have an
3 active police force.

4 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you.

5 COMMISSIONER McKISSIC: Commander
6 McKissic again. We coordinate with the Detroit
7 Public Schools. As soon as we came on board
8 under the control of the Tactical Support we met
9 with DPS and we coordinated efforts in a way that
10 -- they're not as large as they would like to be.
11 We're not as large as we would like to be, but we
12 work together in a cohesive operation in order to
13 try and address school-related issues and as
14 Sgt. Jones as stated, the interior of the school
15 is mostly their purview. And I'd just like to
16 thank Sgt. Jones for his presentation.

17 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: We're not done
18 with the questions yet.

19 COMMANDER McKISSIC: Okay, but I'd
20 also like to point something out. Sgt. Jones,
21 what were you doing this morning?

22 SGT. JONES: I was at a career day at
23 Coleman A. Young Elementary School and I had all
24 of the first grade, all of the kindergartners and
25 all of the preschoolers.

1 CHIEF GODBEE: Good job.

2 SGT. JONES: Monumental task, but I
3 survived.

4 COMMANDER McKISSIC: Sir, although we
5 go after the hardest of the hardest criminals, we
6 also have a community relations side to us. We
7 interact with the public in a friendlier basis.

8 The reputation of Gang Squad -- you
9 know, sometimes that reputation doesn't
10 necessarily hurt you, but it's not always true.
11 We go and do hard work, work that others may
12 frown upon because we go towards the gunfire. We
13 go towards the most chaotic of situations.
14 That's what we get paid to do.

15 But we're all family members, we're all
16 vested into the city of Detroit. We live here,
17 we work here, we feel the citizens' needs and
18 concerns. My kids, they go to Detroit Public
19 Schools also. Hey?

20 And they mostly do what's right and
21 when they don't, the Gang Squad. Could I get the
22 Gang Squad people to stand up just for a second,
23 sir, just so they could be recognized? Some of
24 the hardest workers, all of our Gang Squad
25 officers.

1 (APPLAUSE.)

2 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Two questions
3 that I have. One is are there cameras working --
4 are there working cameras and microphones in the
5 cars or vehicles that Gang Squad use?

6 COMMANDER McKISSIC: We have working
7 cameras and microphones. Do all of them work all
8 of the time, unfortunately we're working on those
9 issues. Any time that they're not working, those
10 vehicles are sent to the facility to get those
11 vehicles repaired and there is a new fleet of
12 vehicles that should be coming in the very very
13 near future.

14 Matter of fact, we interact with our
15 vehicle maintenance officers on a daily basis.
16 They probably are tired of seeing my face, but we
17 must do so to keep our fleet up to speed.

18 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Just so I'm
19 clear, I want to make sure we're clear on this.
20 Those members who are working Gang Enforcement
21 and their vehicles should have working cameras --
22 and we understand equipment malfunctions, I'm not
23 talking about that -- but they should have
24 working cameras and microphones?

25 COMMANDER McKISSIC: They should.

1 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Okay, great.

2 Secondly -- I'm sorry, Chief?

3 CHIEF GODBEE: Yes, sir. They do and
4 our capture rate for the department is around 75
5 to 80 percent. We are acquiring new technology
6 relative to audio and video capture, so we expect
7 to be compliant at the 94 percent capture rate
8 which will make us compliant from a Consent
9 Judgment standpoint, but we literally went from,
10 I think in July of '09, capturing maybe 10 or 15
11 percent through the leadership of Deputy Chief
12 Simenauer and his staff in the entire city,
13 our capture rate is about 75 to 80 percent now.

14 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, sir.
15 And then I have one more and then Commissioner
16 Rivera and Commissioner White. Since you
17 mentioned about the Gang Enforcement group being
18 involved in community efforts, how would someone
19 or someone in the community contact you in an
20 effort to have you or someone else come back and
21 talk to the community in various areas?

22 COMMANDER McKISSIC: They can call
23 Tactical Support base at 596-6135, 596-6135 and
24 we have a 24-hour number manned at Gang
25 Enforcement at 237-2555, 237-2555.

1 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you.
2 Commissioner Rivera?

3 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: Commander
4 McKissic, I noticed when your officers stood up,
5 I didn't recall seeing any females or any
6 Hispanics in your unit. I know in Southwest
7 Detroit we will have a big gang problems.

8 COMMANDER McKISSIC: One of our best
9 intelligence officers happens to be Hispanic and
10 he's one of our -- and he happens to have
11 mastered -- but mastered, but he's our gang
12 expert as far as Southwest Detroit goes.

13 We do not have a female officer in the
14 operation at this time, but we'll welcome
15 applicants, we will take them all, big, fat,
16 small or tall. We want anyone in our Gang
17 Enforcement unit and we'll train them to get them
18 in the way that they need to be done.

19 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: Well, I recall
20 when I went in to visit the Southwest Precinct
21 they had quite an extensive chart of gang members
22 and I noticed that there was a female gang and
23 I'm surprised you wouldn't have -- a large female
24 gang, and I was surprised you wouldn't have women
25 and how many bilingual officers do you have?

1 CHIEF GODBEE: And if I can, actually
2 the Commander doesn't decide who he gets, I do,
3 so I'm not going to put the Commander on the
4 spot, so that's not fair to him, and I'm not
5 going to sit and let him kind of wiggle on my
6 deployment and my personnel deployments.

7 To the extent that there are qualified
8 officers, we do not discriminate based on race,
9 sex or gender or any other issue. That would be
10 an EEO issue. If they are a qualified person or
11 individual that contractually put in for Gang
12 Enforcement and we have an opportunity to move
13 them there, we will do so, but we cannot do so
14 outside of the parameters of the contract.

15 So to the extent that that opportunity
16 presents itself, we will be glad to do so. In
17 the future if we have openings at Gang
18 Enforcement we will make sure that we actively
19 make sure that all members get an opportunity to
20 make application too.

21 Is Gang Squad a blue slip or seniority?

22 COMMANDER McKISSIC: Seniority.

23 CHIEF GODBEE: And when it's a
24 seniority-based position by transfer we have to
25 go by the senior member that's qualified.

1 COMMANDER McKISSIC: You put that so
2 much more eloquently than I ever could.

3 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Commissioner
4 White has a question.

5 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Commander, I just
6 wanted to touch back to the police presence in
7 public schools and not just from a Detroit
8 perspective, but I look at it as a national
9 issue, where particularly young students of color
10 find themselves in the criminalization process
11 for acting out in school if you will.

12 I'm not talking about those who need to
13 be criminalized, they should be, but particularly
14 those who could be taking a different corrective
15 action, are there statistics taken in terms of
16 how many instances where we arrest someone from
17 our Detroit Public Schools from the Department's
18 perspective?

19 COMMANDER McKISSIC: I do not have
20 these statistics at this point. That's something
21 that we can look into. I know we have partnered
22 with the project Safe Passage with Monica Evans,
23 she's partnered with the ATF and we do have a
24 project at this time targeted mostly at Henry
25 Ford High School, and we did a very good

1 operation about a month ago and all the students
2 that we came in contact with were referred to
3 various other agencies.

4 We're not looking to kick the kids out
5 of school. We're looking to keep them in school
6 and mentor them and direct them and problem solve
7 with them in any way, shape or form that we're
8 able to.

9 So I know we don't have statistics at
10 this time except that we will look into it and it
11 may be housed on the other side of the house.

12 COMMISSIONER WHITE: And no fault to
13 the Department, but I really think as a whole our
14 urban public school systems can do a lot better
15 to remediate individuals' actions versus calling
16 the police as a first call of action.

17 I just think that's something we can
18 look at and I would be interested if we have
19 statistics or could gather data as it relates to
20 Detroit Police Department's arrest record over
21 the past two or three years.

22 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Any other
23 questions? Thank you, sir, thank you for your
24 presentation.

25 COMMANDER McKISSIC: Thank you all and

1 thank you, Chief, for helping your brother out.

2 DEPUTY CHIEF WELLS: We have one more
3 presentation from Lt. Vickie Yost, commanding
4 officer of the 8th Precinct and she will do a
5 very brief presentation.

6 LT. YOST: Good evening to the Board.
7 Good evening, Chief. I will make it short as I
8 know it's a late hour and it's hot.

9 The 8th Precinct encompasses 15.25
10 square miles and it is bounded on the west by
11 Westpoint -- or Five Points, on the north by
12 Eight Mile Road, on the south by Fenkell and on
13 the east by the John C. Lodge until it connects
14 up with Schaefer, then we follow Schaefer south
15 to Fenkell.

16 Our current population is approximately
17 117,000. It's also the home to six elementary
18 schools, three middle schools and three high
19 schools. Other community assets are 200
20 churches, 400 businesses and seven nursing and
21 senior citizen homes.

22 Our Community Relations office offers
23 several programs to the community, one of which I
24 think you've heard before is Eddy the Evil Gun
25 safety program. We actually have our guys

1 dressed up as mascots. They go into the
2 elementary schools and talk to kids about gun
3 safety and if they see a gun, not to touch it,
4 but to tell a responsible adult and to stay clear
5 of the area until a responsible adult takes
6 possession of that weapon.

7 We also have Project Sentry which is
8 gun violence prevention program in the 5th and
9 8th grades. It's more of a middle school aged
10 program where you actually try to deter kids from
11 becoming involved in youth violence.

12 Other youth programs are Cops Read to
13 Kids which is a pre-K and elementary school
14 program and it is the warm and fuzzy side of the
15 DPD where we go in and we read stories to kids
16 not police related, but safety related just so
17 they see us as their friend and approachable.

18 We also have a program Reality Check
19 which is a disciplinary program or boot camp.
20 It's run by one of our Community Relations
21 officers, Officer Townsend, for youths from 9 to
22 13 years of age.

23 That is for kids who are having trouble
24 in school, either discipline with their parents,
25 disciplinary issues at school or minor criminal

1 offenses. We also have the Post 808 Law
2 Enforcement Explorers Program which is a
3 career-oriented program for kids who are on the
4 right path. Those kids are doing well in school,
5 those kids who are looking towards a career in
6 law enforcement and we want to encourage that and
7 develop that with our community.

8 We also have Operation Safe Passage
9 which I'm sure the Board is also familiar with
10 where we go in there in the mornings and
11 afternoons to provide special attention to the
12 bus routes, the bus stops and the schools as the
13 kids make their way to and from school.

14 We also have a Senior Awareness Program
15 which is a crime prevention program which informs
16 seniors about staying safe and alert. We also
17 educate them about cons and scans that are going
18 on with the senior community.

19 We have approximately 45 active and
20 organized community-based organizations and block
21 clubs. Our Community Relations officers interact
22 with them regarding neighborhood issues which are
23 often seen as quality of life issues.

24 Our BUWOAY, Business United With
25 Officers and Youth has been in existence since

1 1994. We're currently revamping that and looking
2 for more businesses to join, so anybody here from
3 the business community, we welcome your
4 participation in that program.

5 We also have a B&E Follow-Up that we do
6 with people who are victims of home invasion
7 where we go to their home. We provide a security
8 survey at no cost. Things that they can do to
9 target harden their home that are low cost to
10 them if not no cost at all, but the survey from
11 the Police Department is free of charge.

12 We're also working on a false alarm
13 reduction program which is a comprehensive
14 program to reduce the number of false alarms
15 received. 99.1 percent of alarm runs in the city
16 of Detroit are false and this program aims at our
17 worst offenders who are chronic offenders and we
18 met with them, we reached out with them and met
19 with them in the business community to tell them
20 and give them tips on how not to activate their
21 alarm or trigger their alarm falsely.

22 Some statistical data we have is from
23 January 1, 2011 through April 30th, basically the
24 first quarter. Our arrest totals for the 8th
25 Precinct are 378 felony arrests, 280 misdemeanors

1 and 31 juveniles detained for felony crimes.

2 In that same first quarter we seized
3 101 handguns, 22 long guns for a total of 123
4 guns which is about a gun a day or a little bit
5 more.

6 This should not surprise you being the
7 more populous district in the city. Our calls for
8 service in the first quarter of this year are
9 10,945. That's a lot.

10 Our future endeavors -- and I know I'm
11 going fast, but I'm trying to respect your time
12 -- future endeavors, we are working on
13 reorganizing our Community Relations Department.
14 We want to assign a specific officer to a
15 specific geographic community so that people
16 don't have to call and ask for a Community
17 Relations Officer, they can ask for their
18 Community Relations officer and we want to
19 install that team concept where that officer can
20 work with a Traffic Officer from our Precinct and
21 they can work with a Special Operations car from
22 our Precinct so we can immediately address the
23 concerns that the community brings forward.

24 The important part of that is going to
25 be that we go back and we tell the community what

1 we've done with their complaint and their
2 information. A lot of times the community has
3 great intelligence that has led to some really
4 wonderful work, wonderful arrests from the Police
5 Department and we want to make sure that we
6 encourage that and make it a more efficient
7 process for the citizens, and I think I will end
8 it on that.

9 CHIEF GODBEE: Great job.

10 (APPLAUSE.)

11 LT. YOST: Any questions?

12 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Any questions?

13 No, ma'am.

14 LT. YOST: I do have a community award
15 to present.

16 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: We will be --

17 LT. YOST: You're going to be doing
18 that? Okay.

19 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Yes, ma'am, so
20 we'll call you up a little bit later. Chief,
21 anything else?

22 CHIEF GODBEE: No, sir. Thank you,
23 Mr. Chair.

24 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, sir.
25 At this time we are going to move to grants and

1 I'm going to ask if Commissioner White will read
2 a grant that's been submitted for approval.

3 COMMISSIONER WHITE: As it relates to
4 the request to apply for a COPS Hiring Program,
5 CHP Grant, for the United States Department of
6 Justice's Office of Community-Oriented Policing
7 Services.

8 The United States Department of
9 Justice's Office of Community-Oriented Policing
10 Services has announced that they are accepting
11 applications for their COPS Hiring Program, CHP.
12 This program provides funding directly to law
13 enforcement agencies to hire and/or re-hire
14 career law enforcement officers in an effort to
15 create and preserve jobs and to increase their
16 community policing capacity and crime prevention
17 efforts.

18 This CHP Grant provides funding for
19 three years, 36 months, for each position
20 awarded. At the conclusion of the federal
21 funding, CHP grantees are required to retain all
22 officer positions awarded for at least 12 months
23 from the time that the 36 months of grant funding
24 for each CHP position expires.

25 There is no local match or cap on the

1 amount of funding that can be requested. The
2 number of officers to be hired and federal
3 funding to be requested is still being determined
4 at this time.

5 Currently a program is being developed
6 that will be in compliance with the guidelines of
7 the grant. In the event that approval is granted
8 to apply and the award is received, Lt. Pastella
9 Williams of Recruiting would serve as the
10 Project Director.

11 The deadline for this application is
12 May 25, 2011. Upon his body's approval, the
13 Detroit City Council would be requested to adopt
14 a resolution supporting this grant.

15 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: Motion to
16 approve.

17 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Support.

18 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: It's been
19 properly moved and supported to approve the
20 Department to apply for this grant. Any
21 questions?

22 Hearing and seeing none, all those in
23 favor?

24 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

25 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: All those

1 opposed? Motion carries.

2 At this time we want to honor one of
3 the citizens from this community who has done
4 some just outstanding work and we're going to ask
5 if Ms. Finese Roberts is here, so could you come
6 to the podium, Ms. Roberts, and Commissioner
7 White has a -- actually we have several
8 presentations for you, but Commissioner White
9 will read first for us. Thank you, sir.

10 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Ms. Finese
11 Roberts, a resolution honoring.

12 WHEREAS, Ms. Roberts has been a
13 lifetime resident of the city of Detroit, she is
14 a stand-up citizen and an active member in her
15 community. Ms. Roberts has helped to assure safe
16 passage to school for children and residents of
17 the 8th Precinct, and

18 WHEREAS Ms. Roberts has been committed to the
19 growth and stability of her community. She's an
20 active member of the Coyle Street Block Club and
21 serves as president.

22 In addition to her current community
23 involvement Ms. Roberts has served in various
24 leadership positions that led her to mentoring
25 mothers and children to enhance their qualities

1 of becoming productive citizens.

2 Moreover, her community involvement has
3 extended to serving as the EEO, Equal Employment
4 Opportunity Coordinator with the U.S. Postal
5 Service and

6 WHEREAS, Ms. Roberts is active in her
7 neighborhood and the qualities displayed by her
8 not only rival her sincerity and devotion, but
9 also emphasize her loyalty in assisting the
10 Detroit Police Department.

11 An example of this is her participation
12 as an active member of the 8th Precinct Community
13 Council which she has served as organization
14 President, Vice-President and current
15 Vice-Community Chairperson. This Organization
16 provides a valuable service by coordinating
17 efforts of appreciation for our law enforcement
18 officers and

19 WHEREAS, Mr. Roberts serves in many capacities.
20 She has participated in community service
21 activities such as Angel's Night and Police
22 Week's National Night Out. She consistently goes
23 above and beyond the call of duty.

24 Now, therefore be it resolved that the
25 Detroit Board of Police Commissioners speaking on

1 behalf of the Detroit Police Department and the
2 citizens of Detroit recognize and honor the
3 community spirit of Ms. Finesse F. Roberts, her
4 commitment to volunteerism and improving the
5 quality of life for the citizens of the 8th
6 Precinct and the entire city of Detroit merit our
7 highest regard.

8 We thank and congratulate you,
9 Ms. Finesse F. Roberts, signed the Detroit Board
10 of Police Commissioners and adopted by the Board
11 of Police Commissioners May 11, 2011.
12 Congratulations.

13 (APPLAUSE.)

14 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: We also have a
15 presentation from the Chief, Ms. Roberts.

16 CHIEF GODBEE: And Lt. Yost, if you
17 want to join me also so immediately following we
18 can make another presentation.

19 Ms. Roberts, thank you so much for your
20 service in your community. You are a shining
21 example -- yes, ma'am -- and they love you too
22 and they love you and they love what you do for
23 us.

24 Community policing is -- we are trying
25 to make it a hallmark of our leadership as a

1 leadership team and you are the perfect example
2 of what community policing means, so thank you so
3 much.

4 And the Detroit Police Department
5 presents this Certificate of Recognition to you,
6 Ms. Roberts, resident of the city of Detroit in
7 appreciation of your contribution. Your
8 involvement in the community and service to the
9 City of Detroit demonstrate a spirit and
10 commitment that is worthy of recognition. This
11 is presented to you dated May 12, 2001 signed by
12 myself.

13 Thank you so much, ma'am.

14 (APPLAUSE.)

15 CHIEF GODBEE: Lt. Vicky Yost,
16 Commanding Officer of the 8th Precinct has a
17 presentation for you also.

18 LT. YOST: Thank you. I want to bring
19 up Commander Lewis, Officer Childrey Sims and
20 Officer Knox. They're our Community Relations
21 because these are who work with her. I'm going
22 to read the award.

23 Spirit of Detroit Award from City
24 Council. It is presented herewith as an
25 expression of the gratitude and esteem of the

1 citizens of Detroit to Ms. Finesse F. Roberts in
2 recognition of exceptional achievement,
3 outstanding leadership and dedication to
4 improving the quality of life.

5 It's signed by all nine Council
6 Members. We truly do appreciate all your efforts
7 and all your hard work.

8 (APPLAUSE.)

9 LT. YOST: Would you like to have some
10 remarks?

11 MS. ROBERTS: I feel kind of guilty
12 accepting this because it's a pleasure to do what
13 I do for the officers. I love the officers.
14 I've served as Chairperson for the police
15 officers' luncheon for a little over 15 years.

16 We have a luncheon where we honor you
17 at the Northwestern 6th and 8th District. In
18 fact, this Friday the 20th we'll start feeding
19 our officers around 11 AM and we will not stop
20 feeding them until about 2 AM.

21 I would like for -- I have part of my
22 committee here. Would my committee please stand
23 up? Come on, ladies.

24 (APPLAUSE.)

25 MS. ROBERTS: We have a grill in the

1 back where they will be grilling chicken. We
2 have fish frying, they will be frying fish. We
3 have the roll call room set up where we have a
4 buffet luncheon that consists of -- well, we'll
5 say fried chicken, baked chicken, macaroni and
6 cheese, greens, green beans, salad, tossed salad,
7 fruit salad and all types of good things.

8 This is how we love our officers and
9 this is what we do for them.

10 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Amen.

11 MS. ROBERTS: This is what we do. We
12 love you, we appreciate you. You don't get your
13 rightful dues often enough and we try just one
14 day -- it's not enough -- but this is how we try
15 to serve you one day because you serve us 365
16 days a year. We appreciate you, we love you, we
17 love what you do.

18 (APPLAUSE.)

19 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you,
20 Ms. Roberts. This is absolutely one of the
21 favorite parts of the meetings for us that we get
22 the chance to recognize those who labor hard and
23 diligently within the community on behalf of the
24 Detroit Police Department and we want to thank
25 you, ladies, and the Northwest District for all

1 the work that you do, kudos for all of you and
2 certainly we salute you tonight and God bless you
3 again.

4 At this time -- give them a hand, amen.

5 (APPLAUSE.)

6 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: At this time I
7 will entertain a motion to receive in our
8 archives the resolution for Ms. Roberts as well
9 as for those who are retiring from the Detroit
10 Police Department, Ret. Lt. Jevestine
11 Coleman-Morris, Ret. Sgt. Ingrid Smiley, Ret. DC
12 Gail Wilson-Turner and Ret. Sgt. Roy Jopes.

13 COMMISSIONER WHITE: So moved.

14 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: Second.

15 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: It's been
16 properly moved and supported. All those in
17 favor?

18 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

19 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: All those
20 opposed? Motion carried. And, again, we want to
21 congratulate those officers who have retired.
22 It's an honor for us to be able to give these
23 resolutions because for us it's a testament to
24 God's favor on your life and your hard work and
25 your training that you can retire with good

1 faculty and good health and enjoy the rest of
2 your life, so we salute you tonight as well.

3 Absolutely, give them a hand.

4 (APPLAUSE.)

5 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Lt. Bliss, are
6 you here? You can come at this time to give an
7 overview. Thank you, sir.

8 LT. BLISS: Good evening,
9 Commissioners, Chief Godbee. I'm Lt. Mark Bliss
10 from Planning & Accreditation.

11 Our job is to make policy for the
12 Police Department. Today I'm presenting to you
13 for your review and approval Directive 403.5,
14 Drug and Alcohol Abuse. There's only been a
15 minor change to it. We just included the Medical
16 Marijuana Act into our policy. Other than that,
17 everything else -- there's other just minor
18 grammatical corrections.

19 The policy will be posted on the City's
20 website under the Civil Rights Integrity Bureau
21 page and also will be posted at each
22 District/Precinct for two weeks for approval and
23 comments.

24 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, sir.
25 In addition to that -- any questions first of all

1 for Lt. Bliss? Any questions from the
2 Commissioners? Yes, sir.

3 COMMISSIONER WHITE: I would ask a
4 question. As it relates to individuals who may
5 fall under this particular act, the Medical
6 Marijuana Act, what provisions do we have in
7 place in terms of an individual's ability -- and
8 maybe not just medical marijuana, but other drugs
9 that might impact their ability to serve, is
10 there a firewall, if you will, in place?

11 LT. BLISS: Yes. For something like
12 medical marijuana, they have to -- first they
13 have to have the requirements through the State.
14 They have to bring that card to Police Medical
15 and then they will be guided by Police Medical.

16 In certain cases they will have a
17 fitness for duty and it will be up to Police
18 Medical on how they want to handle that situation
19 for that member.

20 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, sir.
21 At this time, I want to entertain a motion
22 because there are other policy directives that we
23 need to act on, Directive 101.9 regarding special
24 purpose committees, Directive 102.5 regarding
25 awards, Directive 304.6 regarding training, these

1 have been posted on the police website for the
2 past 30 days and so the public has had an
3 opportunity to review these policies as well and
4 I would entertain a motion to approve all four
5 directives.

6 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: So moved.

7 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Support.

8 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: It's been
9 properly moved and -- I will withdraw, let me
10 withdraw that and we will do Directive 101.9 just
11 for the record, make sure we're clear. We will
12 consider Directive 101.9, Directive 102.5 and
13 Directive 304.6.

14 Is there a motion to adopt those?

15 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: Motion to adopt.

16 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Support.

17 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: It's been
18 properly moved and supported. Any questions?
19 All those in favor?

20 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

21 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: The motion
22 carries. Also lastly at last Thursday's meeting
23 we read into the record a grant request to accept
24 an increase in the Safe Communities Grant as
25 relates to underage drinking for the fiscal year

1 of 2010/2011. Since we did not have a quorum, we
2 do need to vote, officially vote on that.

3 Is there a motion to approve?

4 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Mr. Chair, I don't
5 think we read it into the record last week.

6 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: While we are
7 looking for that grant I do want to announce that
8 our next meeting will be Thursday, May 19, 2011,
9 3 PM, 1300 Beaubien, Police Headquarters.

10 We will read that grant at our next
11 meeting next Thursday, okay? All right, any
12 questions or comments from the Commissioners.

13 All right, ladies and gentlemen, that
14 concludes our meeting for tonight. I will -- I'm
15 sorry.

16 FROM THE AUDIENCE: Our people are here
17 from 23 Mile Road. Would it be possible for them
18 to come up at this time?

19 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: If it's the
20 pleasure of the Board, we can allow two minutes
21 for those -- we will extend it for two minutes,
22 so you may come up at this time.

23 Is that at the pleasure of the Board,
24 without objection? Okay, you can come at the
25 time.

1 MS. McCANTS: I'm sorry, I did have my
2 turn. My name is Yolanda McCants, but what I
3 forgot to mention is that one of our community
4 comrades passed away this past week, Marvin
5 Petty, who originally was from the 7th Precinct
6 which is the south end of our district. Also he
7 was the president of the Field Street Block Club
8 and he will be funeralized on tomorrow at Swanson
9 Funeral Home at 11:30.

10 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Which location?

11 MS. McCANTS: At the East Grand
12 Boulevard location, so I'm not sure -- I happened
13 to be downtown at the city county meeting and
14 found out, so I've been trying to pass the word
15 along.

16 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: And could you
17 make sure that Yolonda Caudle has any
18 information. Thank you.

19 Yes, ma'am, thank you, you may come at
20 this time. First of all, thank you for your
21 journey.

22 MS. THOMPKINS: I just want to let you
23 know I'm a lifetime resident of the city of
24 Detroit. I have an 18-year-old --

25 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: I'm sorry, I

1 need you to say your name.

2 MS. THOMPKINS: I'm sorry. My name is
3 Angelina Thompkins, lifetime resident of the city
4 of Detroit. I love Detroit's finest. I respect,
5 honor and appreciate everything you do for us,
6 but in certain situations such as last night, 1
7 o'clock this morning, I have an 18-year-old son
8 that I always advise not to walk the street
9 because of the things I think may happen.

10 He walked the street unfortunately
11 going to the gas station. One of your officers
12 pulled him over, they abused him and beat him.
13 They patted him down, they asked him where was
14 the guns and the drugs at. My son doesn't have
15 drugs, guns or anything.

16 They patted him down, proceeded to beat
17 on him. My son is sitting back here. His eyes
18 is closed shut. His jaw was shut, you know. The
19 officer after he beat him and let him know that
20 he was a martial arts artist, he put him in the
21 car, took him a few blocks over from where he got
22 patted down at and let him out and told him to go
23 about his way, you know. No ticket, no arrest,
24 no anything.

25 So I don't know who to believe. I

1 don't know if my son was doing anything wrong or
2 not because you didn't write him up, you didn't
3 take him in, but he does come home abused and
4 beat like this. I have moved my son to Harrison
5 Township to prevent things like that, whether it
6 be the police or the next door neighbor that's
7 selling drugs.

8 I don't want him in this kind of
9 situation and I thought I was trying to do a
10 better thing. Not to say Detroit is the worst,
11 but at the same time we know what's going on.
12 Until we can get a handle on our city and do some
13 things better for our young males and let them be
14 able to walk the streets, I don't want him
15 walking the streets down here.

16 But this was like my worst nightmare to
17 have an officer, someone that was supposed to
18 protect and serve him, beat and abuse him and
19 drop him off as though he was a piece of meat.

20 I'm very furious, you know. I took him
21 to the hospital to get him seen. Thank God,
22 praise God that he's all right, you know, no
23 permanent damage, but we just can't have these
24 kind of things. Emotionally it's hard for him to
25 sit in here with a room full of police officers

1 because he doesn't know who's going to come after
2 him, who knows what's going on.

3 It's scary to walk the city of Detroit
4 and know that the drug dealer or the person next
5 to you may hurt you, but the officer, this is a
6 crying shame and I'm pleading to you guys,
7 anybody, to hear my story and watch out for my
8 son and the next young man that is walking the
9 street.

10 I don't know what to tell you. I'm
11 shaking, I'm just infuriated [sic]. So with that
12 being said, I just ask you guys to look into it.

13 I have contacted Internal Affairs, as
14 many people as I can to hear my story. I don't
15 think we need to blast Detroit in the news any
16 more. We see it every day. We see the hard work
17 the officers do.

18 I cry when the officer is getting shot
19 by some senseless crime, but also crying for my
20 son when he's getting beat for something
21 senseless that he didn't do or, you know, he
22 can't even get accused of, so I don't know what
23 he did.

24 I'm just pleading with you guys, please
25 just talk to our officers. We're all not

1 criminals just because we're black, young, we're
2 not criminals. We're trying to live a day.

3 I go to work every day. I try to get
4 him to do the right thing, so I don't want this
5 kind of situation. He could have been dead.

6 So I'm pleading with you, please look
7 into this and look into your officers and just
8 warn them. You're all here to do a job and we
9 want to help you do that job. I don't want to be
10 treated as criminals.

11 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Ms. Thompkins,
12 two things. I have something to say and then the
13 Chief certainly has something to say as well.

14 I'm going to ask if you would speak
15 with the person from our Office of Investigations
16 and they will talk to you immediately after the
17 meeting and get all the pertinent information and
18 we'll look into it from our side, and first of
19 all, let me say thank you again for making the
20 journey and we certainly understand your
21 nervousness just standing and speaking, but
22 again, speaking on behalf of your child.

23 And certainly our hearts go out to you
24 and to you, young man. Certainly we will look
25 into this and we will do everything that we can

1 to make sure that we get to the bottom of it.

2 And I'm going to ask that the Chief
3 will make a comment as well.

4 CHIEF GODBEE: Ms. Thompkins, first of
5 all, if things happened as you say they did, I
6 have no problem saying I'm sorry if our officers
7 did what you said they did. I do have a
8 question.

9 Was this a uniform unit, marked unit or
10 plainclothes?

11 MS. THOMPCKINS: Uniform and luckily he
12 had a friend that was able to take the license
13 plate of the police car so there's no other way
14 of identifying them but the license plate for the
15 car.

16 CHIEF GODBEE: Okay, Commander Stair,
17 are you here? Commander Brian Stair who is our
18 Internal Affairs Unit, he will speak with you
19 also, but actually he needs to speak with your
20 son. He's of age.

21 MS. THOMPCKINS: Yes, he is.

22 CHIEF GODBEE: And he needs to really
23 speak to this, so Commander Stair will be talking
24 to your son and we will investigate it fully.
25 And when I get preliminary information, I'll

1 report to the Board by next week.

2 MS. THOMPSON: Thank you.

3 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you,
4 Ms. Thompson. Again, thank you, ladies and
5 gentlemen, for coming to the meeting tonight. At
6 this time, I'll entertain a motion to adjourn the
7 meeting.

8 COMMISSIONER WHITE: So moved.

9 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: Second.

10 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: It's been
11 properly moved and supported. All those in
12 favor?

13 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

14 CHIEF GODBEE: Motion carries. Thank
15 you, ladies and gentlemen. We'll see you next
16 week.
