4 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Good afternoon,
5 ladies and gentlemen. Welcome to the Board of Police
6 Commissioners. My name is Jerome Warfield. It's a
7 pleasure to be here. My mouth feels funny so I may
8 talk and drool a little bit. I just came from the
9 dentist.

10 Serving with me today is the Vice Chair
11 Person Commissioner Adela Rivera, as well as
12 Commissioner Donnell White. The Chief has sitting in
13 for him right now Assistant Chief Chester Logan. Sir,
14 good to have you.

15 A.C. LOGAN: Good to be here.

16 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: I'm going to ask if
17 our Board Secretary, Mr. George Anthony, will introduce
18 our staff?

19 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you, Mr. Chair, for
20 the record, Secretary George Anthony. We have present
21 Ms. Dalph Watson who is our Personnel Director,
22 Ms. Celia Washington who is our Attorney Supervising
23 Investigator. We also have Ms. Yolonda Caudle who is
24 our Community Relations Coordinator, she is seated in
25 the back, Mr. Robert Brown who is our Office Manager

1 standing in the back, Officer Terrance Bell is our
2 recorder here up front, and Ms. Elizabeth Koller who is
3 from Hanson Court Reporting Service is recording our
4 meeting today. I think that completes an introduction
5 of staff.

6 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, we
7 appreciate that. At this time is Pastor James Powell
8 present? I don't see him. Pastor Powell? So Elder
9 Davis, could you come to the mic, sir, and give our
10 invocation? Thank you, sir.

11 ELDER DAVIS: Let's bow our heads. Lord
12 Jesus, we thank you for your goodness. Lord, we thank
13 you for your mercy. Lord, we ask you to bless our
14 people here, Lord, bless the Police Commissioners,
15 bless our Chief, in his absence bless our Assistant
16 Chief, bless everyone that's in attendance. Give us
17 favor, Lord. Bless any enemy. Lord, there might be
18 some here that aren't feeling so well in their body,
19 but Lord, touch them right now. In the name of Jesus
20 we give you all the praise and honor shall be on you.
21 In Jesus name, we pray, thank God. Amen.

22 AUDIENCE: Amen.

23 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, Elder
24 David, we certainly appreciate that, sir. At this time
25 we move for approval of today's agenda.

1 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: Motion to approve the
2 agenda.

3 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Second.

4 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: It's been properly
5 moved and supported to approve today's agenda. All
6 those in favor?

7 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

8 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: All those opposed?
9 Motion carries. I also will entertain a motion to
10 approve the minutes from April the 21st meeting.

11 COMMISSIONER WHITE: So moved.

12 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: Second.

13 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: All those in favor?

14 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

15 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: All those opposed?
16 Motion carries. I do want to announce to those who are
17 here that Commissioner Stewart desperately wanted to be
18 here today, but due to an unfortunate circumstance in
19 his family. His brother made his transition due
20 unfortunately to a break-in at his house, and so he's
21 in the process of making arrangements for his brother's
22 home-going services.

23 But he wanted me to share that with you. And
24 I will ask that you all keep him and his family in your
25 prayers. Unfortunately he has suffered more than one

1 loss this year in his family, and certainly our hearts
2 and our prayers go out to him.

3 At this time I'm going to ask if there's a
4 report from the Chief of Police, Assistant Chief?

5 A.C. LOGAN: There's no report from the Chief
6 of Police as such today, sir.

7 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Okay. Thank you,
8 sir. No standing committee reports as well. There is
9 a resolution for us to consider. Commissioner White,
10 could you please read that into the record for us?

11 COMMISSIONER WHITE: The resolution honoring
12 Ms. Leslie Ann Johnson. Whereas, Ms. Leslie Ann
13 Johnson retired from the Detroit Police Department on
14 April 29th, 2011, after forty-five years of exemplary
15 and dedicated service. And, whereas, Ms. Johnson began
16 her employment with the City of Detroit on
17 September 6th, 1966 and worked for seven years as a
18 typist at Traffic Court.

19 She was appointed to the Detroit Police
20 Department on March 5th, 1973 as an Emergency Service
21 Operator under the Communications Operations Section.
22 During her career with the DPD her additional
23 assignment commands included the Eighth Precinct,
24 Medical Section, Western Operations Bureau, and Civil
25 Rights Integrity Bureau where she remained until her

1 retirement.

2 And, whereas, Ms. Johnson was the deserving
3 recipient of numerous awards including one Chief's Unit
4 Award and numerous Perfect Attendance Awards during her
5 tenure with DPD. Ms. Johnson received several
6 certifications that included Executive Business Report
7 Writing One, "Your Professional Image", Public Contacts,
8 and Stress Management Certificates.

9 Whereas, Ms. Johnson diligently served the
10 department and the citizens of Detroit with integrity.
11 She received numerous letters of appreciation and
12 commendations making her the consummate professional.

13 Now, therefore, be it resolved that the
14 Detroit Board of Police Commissioners speaking on
15 behalf of the Detroit Police Department and the
16 citizens of the City of Detroit, we recognize the
17 loyalty and dedication of Leslie Ann Johnson, her
18 forty-five years of selfless service and outstanding
19 commitment merit our highest regard and best wishes for
20 the future. We thank and congratulate you, Ms. Leslie
21 Ann Johnson. Signed, Detroit Board of Police
22 Commissioners. Adopted April 28th, 2011.

23 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: Motion to approve the
24 resolution?

25 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Second. All those in

1 favor of the resolution for Leslie Ann Johnson?

2 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

3 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: All those opposed?

4 The motion carries. The resolution certainly will be
5 adopted. I also want to acknowledge the retirement of
6 other officers from the department. Lieutenant
7 Jevestine Colman-Morris, Sergeant Ingrid Smiley,
8 Sergeant Willie Coleman. Their coffee hour and cake
9 hour and reception I should say will be held tomorrow
10 from 12:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m., at 13131 Lyndon in
11 Conference Room D-182, again, the address is 13131.
12 Certainly, we want to congratulate them on their
13 successful careers with the Detroit Police Department,
14 as well.

15 Mr. Secretary, I failed to mention a
16 Secretary's report. Is there a Secretary's Report?

17 SECRETARY ANTHONY: There is no Secretary's
18 Report.

19 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, thank you
20 sir. At this time I'm going announce that our next
21 meeting will be held Thursday, May 5th, 3:00 p.m., here
22 at Beaubien Headquarters here in this room. At this
23 time I'm going to open the floor for oral
24 communications. If you wish to address the Board of
25 Police Commissioners you may come to the podium and

1 please state your name for the record, and if you can
2 spell it for us that would be very helpful, and then if
3 you can abide by our four-minute time rule, so that we
4 make sure that we can give everyone the opportunity to
5 speak.

6 MS. WATERS: Thank you, Commissioners. Good
7 afternoon. My name is Mary Waters. Thank you,
8 Chairman Warfield. I'm here today in support of Andrea
9 Perkins Clark. She's here on behalf of her son that
10 was brutally murdered a couple weeks ago. I'll yield
11 to her now. Thank you.

12 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you.

13 MS. CLARK: Commissioners, it's a pleasure to
14 stand before you. My name is Andrea Clark. I'm
15 standing before you because on April 16th -- well, let
16 me just tell you I'm active in my community. I'm a
17 part of the Detroit 300, and I often fight to prevent
18 crimes.

19 I was actually helping my girlfriend who's
20 son was found in a field and his car parked on Eastern
21 District's parking lot. And I was trying to help her
22 through her grief and get some answers when this
23 happened to me. It was only two weeks when it came
24 knocking at my door. So today I come for questions and
25 answers. I have questions and I need answers. The

1 killing in this city has to stop. Our young men are
2 dying in multitudes and it don't have to be.

3 My son was thirty years old, five days short
4 of his thirty-first birthday. He had three children,
5 small children and a wife. He was mister mom. He went
6 to recitals and he went to Girl Scouts. He combed hair
7 and he picked up clothes.

8 He didn't like to go to clubs and party. And
9 he always that over the years, you know, every time
10 something happened he'd say, mom, that's why I don't go
11 to clubs.

12 Well, he pursued his education in photography
13 and videography. And he got a passion for taking
14 pictures. So he found that useful in making money. So
15 he was hired to go to the Kingdom Nightclub on
16 April 16th to take pictures. He ended up dying that
17 night. He was shot at twenty-two times. He was
18 unarmed.

19 I called the homicide investigators on
20 several occasions and was not able to speak to anybody
21 in depth until five minutes ago. The investigator I
22 spoke with told me that there was compelling evidence
23 that he intended to run into the Kingdom Nightclub.
24 And what precipitated that is not important. But it's
25 important because he was not, from my understanding he

1 was not killed because he was going to kill someone.
2 He was killed because his vehicle was aimed toward the
3 Kingdom Nightclub.

4 Nobody checked to see if he was having a
5 medical condition before they opened fire on him. He
6 had been maced prior to getting in his truck. Mace
7 alters your thinking process. He was also I believe
8 having an allergic reaction because when I identified
9 his body two hours later his face was swollen.

10 There are a lot of unanswered questions. I
11 was told that this case was complete by Homicide and
12 turned over to the Prosecutor's Office. I'm not
13 understanding why it's complete when no one has talked
14 to my family or our friends and to see what we know to
15 ask us what type of person he is. He would never
16 intentionally put his life on the line and leave his
17 children for no reason.

18 He was just blessed with a son fifteen months
19 ago after three daughters. His fifteen-month-old
20 daughter preceded him in death less than two years
21 ago. They need to know who he is and do this
22 investigation slowly. Don't just jump to conclusions.
23 Twenty-two shots is overkill.

24 I want them prosecuted. I'm not sure, but
25 this is just from my heart, I don't know if the

1 gentleman that ran up in the Police Department was shot
2 at twenty-two times and he had an assault rifle. I
3 just need this to be thoroughly investigated. I don't
4 want no friends of friends of who you know or what you
5 know to hinder this investigation. Thank you for
6 hearing me.

7 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Ms. Clark, first of
8 all, thank you for the strength and for the courage
9 that you display coming here on behalf of your son and
10 his family. Certainly our hearts go out to you and
11 more importantly our prayers are with you. Certainly
12 this is a difficult time, and only God knows the pain
13 that you're feeling right now.

14 And so we will do everything within our power
15 to make sure that justice is for your son and that
16 correct procedures are followed as relate to this
17 department. Certainly I know the Chief's office will
18 want to assist in anyway they can as well and so will
19 we.

20 Chief, is there any direction?

21 A.C. LOGAN: Through the chair, if I could
22 I'd like to ask Deputy Chief Paul Welles to come
23 forward.

24 MS. CLARK: His name is Darnel Stevens
25 Perkins, for the record.

1 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you.

2 A.C. LOGAN: This is Deputy Chief Paul Welles
3 who's in charge of Criminal Investigation Bureau which
4 also encompasses Homicide. D.C. Welles, I would ask
5 that you not talk about specifics, but I'd like to
6 ensure to Ms. Perkins that we will, in fact, follow up
7 with her.

8 D.C. WELLES: Good afternoon, Board. Deputy
9 Chief Paul Welles. I'm familiar with the Kingdom
10 shooting. And as I've indicated in the past it's
11 common that myself and the Commanding Officer Dwane
12 Blackman sit down with families of deceased persons and
13 talk to them and go over their case in depth as far as
14 we can.

15 This case in particular I know that has been
16 sent to the Prosecutor's Office. I do not know that we
17 have an official ruling back, but I will personally sit
18 down and exchange information, and I'll have Ms. Clark
19 come to my office and we'll sit down and we'll discuss
20 this in detail and make sure she understands exactly
21 what our investigation, what it revealed and how we
22 proceeded.

23 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: I do have one
24 question and I don't want to go too far into the
25 investigation because I don't want to taint anything.

1 But was Darnel, did he take on fire from members of the
2 Detroit Police Department who were working in private
3 security or working secondary employment?

4 D.C. WELLES: There were no members of the
5 Detroit Police Department that fired. He was fired on
6 by security.

7 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: From the nightclub?

8 D.C. WELLES: From the nightclub.

9 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Okay. Great. Thank
10 you, sir. If you can share with Ms. Clark that would
11 be greatly appreciated.

12 D.C. WELLES: We certainly will. I'll meet
13 with Ms. Clark next week and we'll go over the facts of
14 the case.

15 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Any comments or
16 questions? Okay. Thank you, ma'am.

17 MS. CLARK: Thank you, sir. Just one other
18 point. I just wanted to make another point that the
19 Kingdom Nightclub has had previous shootings there and
20 that that really needs to be investigated, and that it
21 has to stop. What I have a question for you guys, what
22 deems a business or nightclub a nuisance?

23 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: That's a good
24 question. I don't know the answer to that question.
25 Assistant Chief?

1 A.C. LOGAN: Through the Chair, Assistant
2 Chief Logan. We take a look at a number of things. To
3 be perfectly honest with you, Kingdom is on our radar.
4 That's all I can say right now, but it is, in fact, on
5 our radar.

6 MS. CLARK: Good. Thank you.

7 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you. Thank
8 you. Again, our prayers are with you.

9 MS. PANNELL: Good afternoon, Commissioners.
10 My name is Sharon Pannell, P-A-N-N-E-L-L.

11 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you.

12 MS. PANNELL: I got two things. Do you still
13 give out neighborhood watch signs for the neighborhood?
14 I've asked my community service person over on Fort
15 Street.

16 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Assistant Chief?

17 D.C. TURNER: Deputy Chief Melvin Turner. As
18 I left office to come to this meeting we were just
19 putting in our order for sixty signs.

20 MS. PANNELL: Can I have one, too?

21 D.C. TURNER: Yes.

22 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: And make sure you get
23 Deputy Chief Turner's number so that when they come in.

24 MS. PANNELL: My friend that I worked with
25 for forty years at Bell, her name is Carol Vaughn, but

1 her neighbor is a nuisance. He takes the speaker and
2 puts it in the window, and the police come out and they
3 don't do nothing to him. And she wanted me to address
4 that with you guys today. Because they have called the
5 police and they're not doing anything. It's

6 . And I guess his mother is down south
7 visiting --

8 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: If you can refrain
9 from putting the addresses on the record.

10 MS. PANSELL: Yes, sir, sorry.

11 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Because we can get it
12 to one of the folks in the department and someone can
13 come look at it.

14 MS. PANSELL: Okay. That's all I needed
15 today, and thank you.

16 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Can we strike that
17 from the record, please. Thank you, appreciate it.

18 MS. PANSELL: Thank you, very much.

19 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Deputy Chief, who
20 should she get with for that?

21 A.C. LOGAN: I'm going to ask Sergeant Sims
22 to record the information for us and we'll get it to
23 the appropriate district.

24 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Sergeant Sims, could
25 you raise your hand? So if you could just see her.

1 Thank you.

2 ELDER DAVIS: Good evening, my name is Elder
3 Anthony Davis, Senior, E-L-D-E-R A-N-T-H-O-N-Y
4 D-A-V-I-S, Senior. Good afternoon to the Board, to the
5 Chief, to everyone in the house. Our prayers go to the
6 young lady with her son.

7 I have one complaint. It's still an ongoing
8 process. I do my 131s, you know, the car's on the
9 yard, and I turn them into to my ABAN Officer and then
10 my ABAN Officer sends them back and said it's not in
11 the system. Resource Management said we're supposed to
12 call the precinct and fax what we have.

13 And it seems like when officers turn in the
14 run sheets to the Chief then the supervisor supposed to
15 check the run sheets and see what's on the run sheets
16 and if they recover cars or take cars from citizens
17 shouldn't they check to see if they're in the system or
18 something? Because when the people come to me and they
19 said their car's not in the system my heart goes out to
20 them. I can't charge them. I don't charge them the
21 storage. I charge them the day that they come to get
22 their vehicle.

23 But it's a ongoing thing. I'm constantly
24 putting cars, writing them up, trying to get to ABAN to
25 have an auction to get rid of the junk, and they coming

1 back that it's not in system. You know, it keep going
2 on and on and on. They said they have a system but
3 seems it's not working. I don't know if it's TCRU or
4 if it's the officer or what. I had to take \$1,500.00
5 off storage. This is my fourth time putting it in the
6 system. I finally got it in and I charged them \$195.00
7 to get the car. I'm not mad at that, but I'm upset
8 about it's not being in the system. I could have had
9 that car off the yard. I been had that car since last
10 year.

11 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Assistant Chief, do
12 you want to ask Deputy Chief?

13 A.C. LOGAN: Through the chair, I'd like to
14 ask D.C. Lee if he could come to the mic and comment
15 on this?

16 D.C. LEE: Deputy Chief Benjamin F. Lee,
17 Management Services Bureau. Through the Chair, that is
18 one of the problems that we do have and we don't have
19 control over that. We try to issue teletypes reminding
20 the officers that when those cars are confiscated when
21 they're towed that they should be entered into the
22 system.

23 The new tow program that we've looked at and
24 we're considering for towing will solve that problem
25 for us down the road. The way we may be able to do

1 that now is there's a list that they should be faxing
2 to our office at least every seven days or within
3 thirty days, cars that are on their lot for more than
4 thirty days or seven days.

5 I think the new rules say seven days, and it
6 may be under the old rules thirty days. And we can
7 alleviate that problem. They can always call Roland's
8 office. If a car, especially if there is a new vehicle
9 that has the appearance that it actually belongs to
10 somebody and that car has been on their lot for too
11 long, get ahold of Roland and then we can start the
12 ball rolling. Get ahold of TCRU. Get ahold of the
13 District to see who, in fact, impounded that car and
14 where the snafu was in terms of how to enter it into
15 the LEIN system.

16 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Now, from my
17 understanding according to state law there is a time
18 restriction as relates to how long those cars are
19 supposed to stay there, correct?

20 D.C. LEE: I don't think there's -- I'm not
21 aware of it. There may be. I'm not aware.

22 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Because when we were
23 doing the rules one of the things that came up was that
24 I think there was a seven or fourteen day period where
25 cars had to be removed, and I don't know if that was

1 after they had gone through the auction process.

2 D.C. LEE: That's the auction process, yes.

3 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: So in the meantime
4 for Elder Davis and other towers who are having issues
5 with the 131s and with the TCRU issue should they call
6 Sergeant Clark first or I mean if they're having this
7 issue about it not being in the system?

8 D.C. LEE: Yes, and that way I'll know that
9 there's a problem and they'll be a central spot that
10 that complaint comes to and we can attempt to remedy
11 it.

12 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Commissioner?

13 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: Through the Chair,
14 whose responsibility is it to put it into the system?
15 Is it the LEIN operator or?

16 D.C. LEE: Through the Chair, yes, or it
17 depends if they call TCRU during certain hours when
18 they recover the car TCRU has a responsibility also.

19 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Okay. Thank you,
20 sir.

21 D.C. LEE: You're welcome.

22 ELDER DAVIS: I have a suggestion. Since
23 we're losing out the money, them that don't put it in
24 system they should pay the storage fee because we
25 losing out. It don't make sense for us to keep losing

1 and if the officer or TCRU don't put it in we should
2 get our money, we should redeem our money from them.

3 Seem like we get slapped upside the head if
4 we don't do something right. They just get a little
5 tap. Say, don't do it again. But it constantly going
6 on. I got a car that's '04. I think it's a Saturn.
7 Constantly putting it in. When I call there they say
8 well, call TCRU. Call TCRU. They say, well, we can't
9 give you the information if it's in the system or not.
10 When we fax them to the Precinct it just goes and sits
11 on the desk. They don't, they really don't -- some
12 people just have a job.

13 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Right.

14 ELDER DAVIS: And some don't believe in
15 having careers.

16 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Well, Commissioner
17 White has another question. As relates to the ABAN
18 policy and this issue is that --

19 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Is this particular
20 issue, D.C. Lee addressed in the new ABAN rules?

21 D.C. LEE: No, it's not in the ABAN rules.
22 But it was part of the old contract where if there are
23 mistakes on the side of the city the city doesn't have
24 to pay for those mistakes. That was just one of the
25 things that was in the contract that they have to

1 accept.

2 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: So in the meantime,
3 though, again, in an effort to not penalize the towers
4 again if after they have entered or did their due
5 diligence and the vehicles are still not in the system
6 they'll go straight through your office to us?

7 D.C. LEE: Yes, through the Chair, and we
8 will log that complaint so we'll be able to keep track
9 of it and know especially if there's a particular
10 precinct where the ABAN Officer or TCRU person's
11 involved.

12 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: Through the Chair,
13 would it be possible, Deputy Chief, to put out
14 teletypes and remind officers that they are responsible
15 for calling those in and getting those put into the
16 system, those cars?

17 D.C. LEE: Yes, through the Chair, we'll
18 re-fax that teletype.

19 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Any other questions,
20 Commissioners? Thank you, sir.

21 D.C. LEE: You're welcome.

22 ELDER DAVIS: Thank you for your patients.

23 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, Elder
24 Davis.

25 MR. DELDIN: Good afternoon, Marc Deldin,

1 Boulevard and Trumble Towing. I just have a few
2 questions.

3 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Could you spell your
4 last name for our record, please?

5 MR. DELDIN: D-E-L-D-I-N. What is the
6 process if I had a complaint to make about a towing
7 company?

8 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: What's the process to
9 make a complaint?

10 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: About another towing
11 company?

12 MR. DELDIN: Yes. I'd like to complain to
13 the Board. Where do I go?

14 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: You can bring it to
15 our office, absolutely.

16 MR. DELDIN: Is there a point of contact in
17 the office?

18 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: You can talk to
19 Brother Brown, Robert Brown, and he will take
20 information, and we'll process it from there.

21 MR. DELDIN: Would it be appropriate to
22 contact the Commissioner directly?

23 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: You certainly can.
24 But we're going to turn it over to Robert Brown so he
25 can process it correctly.

1 MR. DELDIN: So there is a process?

2 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: The process, yes,
3 just contact the office, absolutely.

4 MR. DELDIN: Okay. Just one more question,
5 is Commissioner Rivera still recused from towing
6 matters?

7 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: She doesn't vote on
8 towing matters.

9 MR. DELDIN: Thank you.

10 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: You're welcome, sir.
11 Any other comments? No other comments or questions?
12 All right. Thank you ladies and gentlemen very much
13 for coming and sharing with us today. I will entertain
14 a motion -- oh, I'm sorry, a few announcements.

15 Again, we want to remind you that on Friday,
16 April 29th, 2011 which is tomorrow our Chaplain Corp
