4 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Good afternoon,
5 ladies and gentlemen. And welcome to the Board of
6 Police Commissioners Meeting. It is good to be here
7 this afternoon at St. Paul Church of God in Christ. I
8 certainly want to thank Pastor Harris for his
9 outstanding generosity to welcoming us here in this
10 facility. We are going to hear from him in a minute.

11 My name is Jerome Warfield, Chairman of the
12 Board of Police Commissioners. Serving with me tonight
13 is the Vice Chairperson of the Board, Commissioner
14 Jessica Taylor. Also, Commissioner Donnell White.
15 Chief Chester Logan is here, as well, representing the
16 Department. And from our office, we have our Board
17 Attorney, attorney Celia Banks Washington. And I am
18 going to ask if she could introduce the rest of our
19 staff that's present.

20 MS. CELIA WASHINGTON: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
21 We have from the Office of the Chief Investigator,
22 Chief Investigator Pamela Davis-Drake. We have Loletha
23 Porter, Director the Police Personnel. We have
24 Mr. Robert Brown, Office Manager; Officer Kent Cooper.
25 And for our reporter today, Rhonda Foster. Glad to

1 have you with us. And I believe that concludes the
2 introductions, sir.

3 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, ma'am. At
4 this time, I am going to ask if Pastor Harris could
5 come. Pastor Harris, could you come and just greet us
6 and give us the invocation? Come to the mic right
7 there in the middle of the room, please, sir.

8 PASTOR HARRIS: Since you are the
9 Commissioner, I will obey you, but since I am the
10 pastor, I ought to be wherever I want to be.

11 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: I just want everybody
12 to hear you.

13 PASTOR HARRIS: I think they can hear me.

14 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: You can grab the mic,
15 and you go for it.

16 PASTOR HARRIS: Bow your heads.

17 Father, we thank you for your goodness and
18 your kindness, and your morality that thou has extended
19 to us even on tonight.

20 Thank you for the Commissioners and thank you
21 for the Chief of Police and all of the officers and
22 their families that have gathered, as well as the
23 community.

24 Bless this meeting tonight, in your name, let
25 peace abide, cover us with your precious blood, in the

1 name of Jesus Christ we pray.

2 Amen.

3 AUDIENCE: Amen.

4 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, Pastor
5 Harris. And again, thank you so very much, sir, for
6 just opening up your doors to us. And certainly we
7 want to thank the Northwest District for arranging this
8 community meeting tonight.

9 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Northeast.

10 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Northeast, I'm sorry,
11 Northeast. Yes, ma'am, I see. Yes, ma'am.

12 At this time, we are going to ask if the Vice
13 Chairperson of the Board, Commissioner Jessica Taylor,
14 just could read the duties and responsibilities for
15 those who are maybe here for the first time.

16 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: City Charter, July 1,
17 1974, the composition. Five members appointed by the
18 mayor, confirmed by city council. Commissioners serve
19 five-year terms and may not serve more than five years
20 consecutively. Meets once a week, 52 weeks out of the
21 year. All meetings are open to the public.

22 The duties: Establish policies, rules and
23 regulations, in consultation with the chief and
24 approval of the mayor.

25 Review and approve department budgets; review

1 and approve department promotions.

2 Receive and resolve complaints concerning the
3 operations of the Police Department. Final authority
4 to impose and/or review discipline of Police Department
5 employees.

6 Appoint civilian personnel director.
7 Prepares an annual budget of department activities for
8 the public, mayor and city council.

9 Staff, executive secretary who serves as
10 Secretary to the Board and attends all Board meetings.
11 Chief investigator and additional investigators, other
12 staff as necessary to provide support to the Board.

13 The Police Commission considers itself a
14 liaison between the citizens of the City of Detroit and
15 the Police Department.

16 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you. Thank
17 you, Commissioner Taylor.

18 At this time, we will entertain a motion to
19 approve tonight's agenda.

20 COMMISSIONER WHITE: So moved.

21 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Second.

22 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: It has been properly
23 moved and supported. All those in favor?

24 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

25 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: All those opposed,

1 you have the same rights and privilege.

2 We will also entertain a motion to approve
3 the minutes from Thursday, October the 4th meeting,
4 2012.

5 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: So moved.

6 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Support.

7 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: It has been properly
8 moved and supported. All those is in favor?

9 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

10 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: All those opposed,
11 you have the same right and privilege.

12 Under the Chairperson's report, certainly
13 have a few things that we want to update and inform the
14 community on.

15 Certainly, as you all are well aware, there
16 are the events in the press recently regarding
17 incidents within the members of the Detroit Police
18 Department. We want to say this to those of you who
19 are here in the audience, that this Board is confirmed.
20 This Board will exercise its authority. And we will do
21 a full and thorough investigation and review of our
22 policies, starting immediately. We have already honed
23 into the areas where we believe our policies need to be
24 reviewed.

25 Now, let me be very clear on this. We are

1 not interested in salaciousness. We are not interested
2 in getting in people's personal affairs.

3 What we are interested as a policymaking
4 board, we are interested in making sure that we have
5 the policies for this department that allow our men and
6 women in blue to do the very best they can every day,
7 and to make sure not only they are protected, but they
8 are -- but they are working in an environment that
9 gives them the opportunity to do the very best they can
10 every day without hindrance and without special favors.

11 Therefore, I will not go into tonight, nor
12 will the Board go into tonight, the specifics of the
13 policies that we are looking into. Only because we do
14 not want to taint or influence the results of the
15 investigations.

16 However, I do want you to know that our
17 Office of Chief Investigator, headed by Chief
18 Investigator Davis-Drake and investigators, will be
19 opening up a full investigation and a review of
20 policies that we believe were directly either impacted,
21 influenced, or could have been, in the recent events.

22 Again, I want to say that we are not
23 interested in salaciousness, but we are interested in
24 doing the right thing.

25 I go on to say that in that review and that

1 investigation, if it comes to our attention that we
2 need to invite other agencies in, we will certainly
3 reserve that right to do that, and we will do that if
4 it is necessary.

5 I also want to point out to the members who
6 are here tonight, members of the community, that this
7 Board has resolved, and we thank you for your support
8 that you have shown this Board, and we want the members
9 of our department to know that we are proud of the men
10 and women who go out there every day and do their work.
11 And we want you to know that we are going to support
12 you in the way that we believe is best, and that is to
13 make sure that we bridge any gaps that may have allowed
14 the events to occur; that they will not happen in the
15 future.

16 Having said that, in the same spirit, I do
17 want to talk just a little bit about the search update,
18 just to give the public an understanding of where we
19 are and how we will process from here.

20 We started last Thursday looking into the
21 possibility that we may have to employ a search
22 company. We officially put out bids after the mayor's
23 press conference. We have just started to receive bids
24 come in. We will review those bids. And we will pick
25 what we feel is the very best company to conduct a

1 search of police.

2 One of the things we want to do differently,
3 Commissioner Jessica Taylor will be holding a meeting,
4 a very special meeting for the public. We want to hear
5 from the public what characteristics, what traits you
6 want in a new police chief. And that's going to be
7 very valuable information for us. And we want to take
8 that information and we want to make it part of the
9 search criteria process. And Commissioner Taylor will
10 give you more information and more details concerning
11 that.

12 Here is what we want. We want to make sure
13 that the citizens of our city have a hand in picking
14 our next chief. We want to make sure that the
15 citizens' of this city voice is heard and that the
16 process is transparent.

17 So Commissioner Taylor will set that date,
18 and we will get that information to you while that
19 information will be available.

20 Again, I just want to thank those of you who
21 have supported this department, who have supported this
22 Board. And I want you to know that this Board is very
23 serious about the allegations that have been out there,
24 and we will not rest until we make sure that there
25 are -- all the gaps that led to this are plugged up,

1 that this cannot happen in the future.

2 Also I want to let you know that next week,
3 just for point of information, we will be meeting at
4 Police Headquarters, but the Board will be at the
5 National Civilian Oversight Convention. We will have a
6 member, of course, that will be here that will conduct
7 the meeting, but we will not have quorum at that
8 meeting. I just want you to know that up front, and so
9 voting will not take place at that meeting. But once
10 we get back the week after that, certainly we will vote
11 and do the things that we need to do. And I just
12 wanted you to mark your calendars accordingly, that we
13 will be away at the National Citizens and Oversight
14 Convention at that particular -- next week at this
15 time.

16 At this time, any questions or comments from
17 our fellow commissioners?

18 COMMISSIONER WHITE: No.

19 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: No.

20 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: At this time, we want
21 to move to the Chief's office and ask for a report
22 update. Chief Logan?

23 INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: Thank you, sir. The
24 presentation tonight is coming from the Northeast
25 District, and it is my understanding Inspector Danny

1 Allen will be coming forth with a presentation for you.

2 INSPECTOR ALLEN: Good evening. It is always
3 an honor to address this Board. And you, as well,
4 Chief.

5 We have got a long agenda, so I will
6 paraphrase and be brief, but I would like to make a few
7 introductions. My counterpart and partner, Inspector
8 Gary Sroka, through the 7th precinct under the
9 Northeast District umbrella. I am Inspector Dan Allen
10 of the 11th precinct under the Northeast District
11 umbrella. We also have Sergeant Charlie Spruce and
12 Officer Eric Hill here in attendance. They are our
13 community relations officers.

14 Northeast District is located at 5100 East
15 Nevada. It encompasses 28 square miles approximately.
16 The population for the district is 101,000 residents,
17 which it is a privilege to serve.

18 Commander Eric Ewing is the commanding
19 officer of the district. Unfortunately, Commander
20 Ewing had a death in the family, and is currently on
21 funeral leave, so he is unable to be here tonight.

22 As I have said before, Inspector Sroka and
23 myself are assigned to the 7th and 11th precincts,
24 respectively.

25 Our goals and initiatives, and these are only

1 a few, but in order to save time, first is to improve
2 response time for calls for service, increase community
3 partnerships, accelerate compliance with two federal
4 consent decrees, continue to develop and implement
5 plans to increase police visibility, and to continue to
6 improve our overall reductions in crime.

7 We have had some very exciting initiatives,
8 over the summer, and to date, our Harbormaster Summer
9 detail and the East Jefferson Avenue Quarter Traffic
10 Initiative was a great success. There were no reported
11 part 1 crimes on Belle Isle during the entirety of the
12 summer season. And it was staffed with officers from
13 throughout the city.

14 We had a Woodward Avenue Prostitution
15 Initiative, and we get regular complaints; that area is
16 very heavy for prostitution activity. So just
17 recently, last month, we did a sting down there, and it
18 netted us two handguns, 20 misdemeanor arrests, 20
19 vehicles impounded, and quite a high value target, an
20 individual who was responsible for several assaults,
21 serious assaults, was identified by one of the local
22 prostitutes, and he was arrested and charged with his
23 crimes.

24 Our community events programs, I will go back
25 to August. Our National Night Out was a rousing

1 success for those that were in attendance. We had a
2 taste fest up there, and many of the local restaurants
3 participated. We have reinstituted our BUOY program.
4 BUOY is an acronym for Business United With Officers
5 and Youth. It is a unique collaboration of business
6 owners, police officers, and community residents. It
7 is actually run by the business owners and the
8 community residents, but we participate in it, and it
9 is a fantastic collaboration.

10 We are looking forward to the upcoming
11 Halloween holidays. We will have our traditional
12 Nevada Street House of Horrors Haunted House, and we
13 will host many hundreds of children from the community
14 with games, prizes, candy, and the like.

15 And that concludes our presentation.

16 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, Inspector.
17 Any questions for Inspector Allen?

18 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: None.

19 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, Inspector
20 Allen, for a very fine report, and Officer Sroka, and
21 definitely under the leadership of Commander Ewing for
22 running a very fine district. At the last Compstat
23 meeting that I participated in, there was a concern
24 about gas station patrols, particularly within
25 Northeastern District. Has that increased? And also,

1 have you seen a reduction in crimes being perpetrated
2 at gas stations within the district?

3 INSPECTOR ALLEN: We continue to try to
4 monitor those gas stations as closely as possible.
5 Last night actually we did have several robberies in
6 gas stations that I am unfortunate to have to report.
7 But we do monitor the gas stations regularly. We have
8 sign-in sheets there. We have a list of the total
9 number of gas stations. We also have a list within
10 that list of the more problematic areas which we try to
11 concentrate on.

12 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, sir.

13 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: While you are there,
14 Inspector, I also want to recognize, if you don't mind,
15 the members of the Northeastern Citizens Council, who
16 have been so supportive, so if there are members of the
17 Northeastern Citizens Council, will you all stand up?

18 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: (Indecipherable).

19 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Well, you all know
20 what I am trying to say.

21 (Applause).

22 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Here is what I do
23 know. I do know that you have a very good group that
24 you work with, and some of their members, of course,
25 have come down to the precinct to beautify 1300 with

1 plants and gardening and grass, and so I just want to
2 thank just the Northeastern District for always being
3 there and always being so passionately involved in the
4 area, police and community, police in the city of
5 Detroit, so thank you, sir.

6 INSPECTOR ALLEN: And I couldn't agree more
7 with that.

8 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Absolutely.

9 INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: Through the Chair, at
10 one time, I don't know if it is still true, but what
11 was in the 7th precinct was considered probably the
12 best precinct in the city to work in and live in. Now
13 I, as Chief of Police, I can't say that. I can't say
14 that now, but I worked there for 10 years from '92 to
15 2002. And it was just a wonderful, wonderful place to
16 work. And it looks like through you and Commander
17 Ewing, Inspector Sroka, that that tradition has carried
18 on.

19 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, sir. Is
20 that it?

21 INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: Yes, sir.

22 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, Lieutenant
23 Allen. Appreciate it. Give him a hand.

24 (Applause).

25 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Through the Chair,

1 Chief, as we prepare for the Halloween weekend, are
2 there special plans in terms of what we can expect in
3 terms of making sure our streets are being covered?

4 INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: Yes, sir. In fact, we
5 just had a meeting today on our -- we are still trying
6 to get community volunteers to come out. As you might
7 recall, last year was probably the best year we have
8 had since we have been doing this initiative. We have
9 every reason to believe that we are going to beat last
10 year's figures by a large margin.

11 The key to this is community involvement.
12 Everything we do has involved the community, so we are
13 asking community volunteers to step up, patrol their
14 neighborhood, keep an eye out on abandoned houses, and
15 look out for their neighbors. And if we continue to do
16 that, we anticipate no problems.

17 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Just Chief, if you
18 could, with the new rotation of officers being on
19 12 hours, do you view that as something that will
20 enhance our visibility on the Angel's Night patrols?

21 INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: It is going to enhance
22 our visibility because those officers will be told
23 right then and there, the problem houses in their
24 location, so they are already -- they should already be
25 looking at them now, and they don't have to wait until

1 this initiative. Because they are out there patrolling
2 on two shifts. They should know those houses right
3 now. And that should give us a leg up on any potential
4 problems.

5 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Sure. And Chair, if I
6 could just take a point of special privilege, it has
7 been kind of understated, but I just publicly wanted to
8 share my vote of confidence in our Interim Chief in
9 that of Chester Logan. In my two years as Commissioner
10 on this body, I have found Commissioner -- I am sorry,
11 I have found Assistant Chief at the time, Logan, to be
12 an individual who is certainly committed to this
13 department; certainly one who exudes the leadership
14 qualities that is needed to continue to move this
15 department in a forward direction. And so Chief, as we
16 move this process in the interim basis, I just wanted
17 to publicly say thank you, not only for what you have
18 done previously, but what you continue to do as we move
19 through this transition period, and to publicly, again,
20 express my vote of confidence in your leadership as we
21 move through this process.

22 INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: Thank you so much.

23 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Chief, is there a
24 number or somewhere citizens can go to get more
25 information about Angel's Night, signing up as

1 volunteers?

2 INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: Certainly. You will
3 have that number in just a few minutes.

4 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Okay. Sure. We will
5 come back to that. I just want to make sure that those
6 that are interested are able to follow-up.

7 We have flyers.

8 INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: Yes, sir.

9 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Good. Thank you.

10 So for those who are interested, we want you
11 to please write this number down, and the website. The

16 At this time in our meeting, as we were just
17 talking about community involvement, it gives us a
18 great deal of pleasure to honor someone who has worked
19 extremely hard in this area, in this Northeast
20 District, and that is Ms. Ramona Chewning, and I am
21 going to ask if Commissioner White would prepare to
22 read and deliver the Resolution to Ms. Chewning.

23 Ms. Chewning, are you here? Can you come up,
24 stand up here?

25 MS. WASHINGTON: I am not her. I am her

1 niece. I am just here to represent her.

2 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Well, come on down
3 and represent her, niece. Give her a hand as she
4 comes.

5 (Applause).

6 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Okay. Accepting on
7 behalf of Ms. Ramona Chewning, here is a Resolution
8 honoring Ms. Chewning.

9 Whereas, Ms. Ramona Chewning has been a
10 dedicated --

11 Come on, I won't bite you. Come on over
12 here.

13 Whereas, Ms. Ramona Chewning has been a
14 dedicated life long resident of the City of Detroit's
15 Northeastern District for the past 25 years. Her
16 commitment to community service and leadership is
17 exemplified throughout the community; and

18 Whereas, Ms. Ramona Chewning is a product of
19 the Detroit Public Schools system. Graduating from
20 Southeastern High School, she continued her education
21 at the University of Detroit where she majored in
22 accounting. She also received computer training at
23 Unisys Corporation where she was employed from 1984
24 until 1998; and

25 Whereas, Ms. Chewning is the founding member

1 of the Packer Street Resident Organized Block Club,
2 P.R.O., where she currently serves as Secretary.
3 P.R.O. has been active in the "Motor City Make Over,"
4 "Angel'S Night," Neighborhood Watch organization and
5 other neighborhood beautification projects on Packer
6 Street and surrounding areas;

7 Whereas, Ms. Chewning utilizes her spare time
8 gardening, sewing, bike riding and working to
9 strengthen her community by mentoring third and fourth
10 graders, from Laws Academy;

11 Whereas, Ms. Chewning is currently a member
12 of the Perfecting Church under the pastorate of Bishop
13 Marvin L. Winans, and regularly volunteers hours
14 assisting with church events; and

15 Whereas, Ms. Chewning has proven through her
16 actions that she remains a dedicated and committed
17 supporter of the City of Detroit and the Northeastern
18 District. She has attended and completed the Detroit
19 Police Department's Citizens Academy, volunteered for
20 numerous activities such as the Northeastern District's
21 annual Easter Egg Hunt -- very important -- Police
22 Week, Back to School Rally, National Night Out, Haunted
23 House, Veterans Luncheon and the Annual Senior Turkey
24 Bingo.

25 Now therefore be it resolved, That the

1 Detroit Board of Police Commissioners, speaking on
2 behalf of the citizens of the City of Detroit and the
3 Detroit Police Department acknowledge the giving spirit
4 and community service of Ms. Ramona Chewning. Her
5 vision for Detroit and its citizens is unmatched and
6 highly respected.

7 We thank and congratulate Ms. Ramona
8 Chewning.

9 Signed, the Detroit Board of Police
10 Commissioners, this day, October 11, 2012.

11 Let us congratulate Ms. Chewning.

12 (Applause).

13 MS. WASHINGTON: Thank you.

14 INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: Ms. Washington?

15 MS. WASHINGTON: Yes.

16 INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: Council Person Spivey
17 is in the back, and I am hoping that since he is here
18 and he has signed this document, that we can come up
19 and -- I will get him to come up and participate in the
20 presentation.

21 In the interest of time, why don't we go
22 ahead and make the presentation. This is to Ms. Ramona
23 Chewning from the Detroit City Council, it is called
24 the Spirit of Detroit Award, and it is signed by all
25 nine city council members. It is in recognition of

1 exceptional achievement, outstanding leadership, and
2 dedication to improving the quality of life in the
3 City of Detroit.

4 Thank you.

5 MS. WASHINGTON: Thank you.

6 (Photo taken).

7 INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: Don't leave yet. This
8 is better than Christmas, isn't it?

9 And it is my pleasure as the Interim Chief of
10 Police in the City of Detroit to present you with a
11 Certificate of Recognition in appreciation for
12 Ms. Chewning's contributions, her involvement in the
13 community, and service to the City of Detroit; it
14 demonstrates a spirit of commitment that is certainly
15 worthy of recognition.

16 Thank you so much.

17 MS. WASHINGTON: Thank you.

18 PHOTOGRAPHER: One more for me too.

19 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Ms. Washington, would
20 you like to say something on behalf of your aunt?

21 MS. WASHINGTON: Just thank you.

22 (Applause).

23 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: We also will ask the
24 Chief to recognize -- and we are very proud tonight to
25 present this -- the Quarterly Awards for those men and

1 women of our department who have just done an
2 outstanding job. And I am going to ask that, Chief
3 Logan, if you can make that presentation at this time
4 too, sir.

5 INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: Certainly, sir.

6 P.O. CASSANDRA LEWIS: Good evening,
7 everyone. We would like to thank everyone for coming
8 tonight, and I just want to ask any of the recipients
9 that did not sign in at the entrance to please do so at
10 this time so that we know that you are here.

11 We will now begin the Quarterly Awards
12 presentation for the first and second quarters of 2012.
13 Award recipients of the First Quarter Patrol Operations
14 East -- I am sorry, West -- would be Police Officer
15 Michael Bender.

16 (Applause).

17 P.O. CASSANDRA LEWIS: Officer Bender was
18 appointed to the Detroit Police Department on
19 October 10, 2008. During the first quarter, Officer
20 Bender's hard work resulted in 10 felony arrests, a
21 misdemeanor arrest, over 440 traffic tickets issued,
22 and responded to over 230 calls for service.

23 Officer Bender's dedication to duty and
24 attentiveness to detail and work ethic are the
25 qualities that make him a role model for others. He

1 possesses the highest degree of professionalism, and is
2 an asset to the Detroit Police Department.

3 Therefore, he has been nominated for this
4 well-deserved award.

5 Congratulations.

6 (Applause).

7 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: If we can have the
8 commanding officer come up, please, for a photo.

9 PHOTOGRAPHER: Thank you very much.

10 P.O. CASSANDRA LEWIS: For the Northwestern
11 District, 8th precinct, Police Officer Matthew
12 Fulgenzi.

13 (Applause).

14 P.O. CASSANDRA LEWIS: Police Officer Matthew
15 Fulgenzi was promoted to the Detroit Police Department
16 on January 17, 2008.

17 Officer Fulgenzi has a level of commitment
18 that is displayed daily as he interacts with residents
19 and guests visiting our city.

20 While working on Wednesday, March 28, 2012,
21 in an area that crime statistics revealed has a high
22 number of street robberies committed by young males, on
23 patrol he noticed four youths who suddenly began
24 running when they observed the officer. Officer
25 Fulgenzi pursued one of the suspects when he heard a

1 shot fired. He was not injured, so he continued to
2 pursue the subject. Officer Fulgenzi subsequently
3 arrested the subject. He and other officers recovered
4 a semiautomatic rifle and a 40-caliber Smith & Wesson
5 semiautomatic handgun. Due to this officer's bravery
6 and commitment to the citizens of Detroit, he is being
7 recognized tonight.

8 Congratulations.

9 (Applause).

10 P.O. CASSANDRA LEWIS: For the Western
11 District, 12th precinct, Police Officer Paul Warner.

12 (Applause).

13 P.O. CASSANDRA LEWIS: Police Officer Paul
14 Warner was appointed to the Detroit Police Department
15 on September 30, 1996. Officer Warner is reliable,
16 proficient, and knowledgeable.

17 During this quarter, he made 17 felony
18 arrests, 20 misdemeanor arrests, detained eight
19 juveniles, and issued over 620 ordinance complaints.

20 Officer Warner is a valuable component to the
21 12th precinct efforts to combat crime. His experience
22 has demonstrated the self-motivation and perseverance
23 typically associated with a skilled veteran patrol
24 officer.

25 Congratulations, sir.

1 (Applause).

2 P.O. CASSANDRA LEWIS: For the Southwestern
3 District, Police Officer Michael Choukourian.

4 (Applause).

5 P.O. CASSANDRA LEWIS: Officer Michael
6 Choukourian was appointed to the Detroit Police
7 Department on August 15, 1994.

8 During the First Quarter, Officer Choukourian
9 made six felony arrests, seven misdemeanor arrests,
10 issued 30 ordinance violations, and answered over 80
11 calls for service. More importantly, Officer
12 Choukourian's true value to the department is more
13 apparent than the above statistics have analyzed. To
14 show Officer Choukourian's -- he substituted as
15 Prisoner Detention Officer, Station Security, most of
16 these days, which really only left 24 days in which he
17 generated these statistics.

18 Officer Choukourian continues to demonstrate
19 a tremendous courage by arresting some of the most
20 fierce and dangerous individuals in the Southwest
21 community. Based on his outstanding performance and
22 professionalism, exemplary work ethic, Officer
23 Choukourian very well deserves this award.

24 Congratulations.

25 (Applause).

1 P.O. CASSANDRA LEWIS: For Tactical Mobile,
2 Police Officer Kevin Chubb.

3 (Applause).

4 P.O. CASSANDRA LEWIS: Police Officer Kevin
5 Chubb was appointed to the Detroit Police Department on
6 November 21, 2008. Officer Chubb was transferred to
7 Tactical Mobile with less than 60 days left in the
8 quarter. In his short tenure at Tactical Mobile,
9 Officer Chubb's attendance, enthusiasm, and willingness
10 to help his fellow officers makes him a well-respected
11 officer by both his peers and supervisor.

12 Officer Chubb has made 19 felony arrests for
13 narcotics and weapons, 40 misdemeanor arrests, and has
14 issued over 200 ordinance violations.

15 Due to his outstanding service and
16 dedication, Officer Chubb has been nominated for this
17 award.

18 Congratulations.

19 (Applause).

20 P.O. CASSANDRA LEWIS: We would also like to
21 mention other officers who received awards for the
22 first quarter who were unable to attend today.

23 Central District Police Officer Dewayne
24 Jones; Eastern District, Brandon Knobelsdorf;
25 Northeastern District's Matthew Lashbrook; 10th

1 precinct, Police Officer Mark Sievers; and Commercial
2 Auto Theft, Sergeant Robert Wellman.

3 Now we will go and present the award for
4 Officer of the Quarter for the second quarter.

5 For the Central District, Police Officer Amy
6 Matelic.

7 (Applause).

8 P.O. CASSANDRA LEWIS: Officer Amy Matelic
9 was appointed to Detroit Police Department on
10 February 17, 1997. During the Second Quarter, Officer
11 Matelic answered 50 police runs, made 32 felony
12 arrests, and three misdemeanor arrests; detained 15
13 juveniles, issued 78 ordinance violations, and
14 confiscated nine guns.

15 Officer Matelic has dedicated numerous hours
16 to gathering critical information needed in
17 infiltrating local gangs. Due to her hard work,
18 Central District was able to utilize information that
19 she gathered in assisting and identifying several gang
20 members. Those individuals were planning to target the
21 2012 International Fireworks Celebration by causing
22 havoc in the downtown area.

23 Officer Matelic is extremely reliable and
24 demonstrates the knowledge and skills typically
25 associated with that of a veteran officer. As an asset

1 to the Detroit Police Department, Officer Matelic is
2 well worthy of tonight's honor.

3 Congratulations.

4 (Applause).

5 P.O. CASSANDRA LEWIS: For the Northeastern
6 District, Police Officer Tyrone Gray.

7 (Applause).

8 P.O. CASSANDRA LEWIS: Officer Gray was
9 appointed to the Detroit Police Department on April 27,
10 1998. Officer Gray was assigned to the Northeastern
11 District in the Fall of 2009, where he has worked
12 Special Ops and is currently assigned to Platoon 3.
13 Officer Gray has established a reputation as a
14 hardworking and exemplary officer.

15 During the quarter, Officer Gray effected 22
16 felony and 41 misdemeanor arrests, 103 moving traffic
17 violations, 40 miscellaneous ordinance violations, and
18 answered 185 calls for service.

19 Officer Gray's prior experience at Narcotics
20 and Vice Enforcement makes him an invaluable resource
21 in the Northeastern District. Officer Gray is often
22 called upon by his supervisor to conduct inspections
23 and enforcement at licensed liquor establishments
24 throughout the district, most commonly when these
25 establishments are becoming nuisances to the community.

1 Officer Gray exhibits a high degree of professionalism
2 and devotion to his chosen profession. Officer Gray's
3 exemplary performance, enthusiasm, reliability, and
4 experience have made him highly respected by his peers
5 and supervisors.

6 Congratulations.

7 (Applause).

8 P.O. TYRONE GRAY: I know this is not
9 normally said, but I would have to acknowledge my
10 partner because without my partner, who is sitting
11 right there -- Officer Sharon Johnson, would you please
12 stand.

13 (Applause).

14 P.O. TYRONE GRAY: Without my partner, this
15 wouldn't be possible, so I thank you, partner.

16 P.O. CASSANDRA LEWIS: For the 12th precinct,
17 Police Officer Shannon Bullock.

18 (Applause).

19 P.O. CASSANDRA LEWIS: Office Shannon Bullock
20 was appointed to the Detroit Police Department on
21 April 24th, 2000. During the Second Quarter, Officer
22 Bullock demonstrated that he is reliable, skillful, he
23 never complains but embraces each task carefully.

24 Officer Bullock is dependable and always on
25 time, with his uniform and appearance intact. He

1 always displays a cheerful attitude; is courteous and
2 respectful towards everyone. When it comes to his
3 co-workers, Officer Bullock never hesitates to lend a
4 helping hand. He offers support to his co-workers on
5 high priority runs, investigations, and assists with
6 their paperwork, as well.

7 He has served in several assignments ranging
8 from prisoner processing, detention, or prisoner
9 transport. Officer Bullock is an exceptional officer
10 and gets the job done. Also, during this quarter,
11 Officer Bullock issued 88 citations, effected three
12 felony arrests, one misdemeanor arrest, and answered 88
13 police calls for service.

14 It is without hesitation that Officer Bullock
15 is awarded the Officer of the Second Quarter.

16 Congratulations.

17 (Applause).

18 P.O. CASSANDRA LEWIS: For the Southwestern
19 District, Police Officer Emina Biogradlija.

20 (Applause).

21 P.O. CASSANDRA LEWIS: Officer Emina
22 Biogradlija was appointed to the Detroit Police
23 Department on July 30th, 2004. She is very efficient
24 and dependable in handling patrol duties and
25 assignment. She is knowledgeable in department

1 policies and state laws. She also, by the way, speaks
2 five different languages fluently and is a great asset
3 to the Southwest District in assisting in translations.

4 Officer Biogradlija is extremely positive --
5 has an extremely positive attitude and has an
6 impeccable appearance. She has been instrumental in
7 the reduction of criminal activities in the Southwest
8 District.

9 During the second quarter, she produced 14
10 felony arrests, 17 misdemeanor arrests, she has issued
11 122 traffic citations, six parking violations, and
12 answered 268 calls for service.

13 She is committed to her work and the
14 community, and for this, this dedicated officer is
15 serving without any qualms at all. She is just
16 excellent. So she deserves to be recognized.

17 Congratulations.

18 (Applause).

19 P.O. CASSANDRA LEWIS: For Gang Squad, Police
20 Officer Charles Ruffin.

21 (Applause).

22 P.O. CASSANDRA LEWIS: Police Officer Charles
23 Ruffin was appointed to the Detroit Police Department
24 on September 19th, 1994. He was assigned to Gang
25 Enforcement on February 12th, 2007. Officer Ruffin

1 works with a diverse group of citizens every day. He
2 is dedicated to his job and works feverishly to combat
3 crime and keep the citizens and visitors safe within
4 the City of Detroit.

5 Officer Ruffin continues to encounter with
6 the youth in letting them know that their decisions in
7 life now will have a lasting effect on their future.
8 Officer Ruffin's experience aids him in the detention
9 of criminal activity while working the streets of
10 Detroit. He has effected 36 felony arrests, eight
11 misdemeanor arrests, and 31 juveniles detained.
12 Officer Ruffin also issued 31 traffic ordinances and 60
13 miscellaneous ordinance.

14 Officer Ruffin represents the finest
15 tradition of the Detroit Police Department. Therefore,
16 Officer Charles Ruffin should be recognized today for
17 this prestigious award.

18 Congratulations.

19 (Applause).

20 P.O. CASSANDRA LEWIS: For Criminal
21 Investigations Bureau, working Sex Crimes, Police
22 Officer Jose Ortiz.

23 (Applause).

24 P.O. CASSANDRA LEWIS: Officer Jose Ortiz was
25 appointed to the Detroit Police Department on

1 December 6, 1996. Officer Ortiz was assigned to the
2 Sex Crimes unit in April of 2006. He is dedicated to
3 the citizens and the Detroit Police Department.

4 Officer Ortiz currently investigates sexual
5 assault cases where the perpetrator is unknown to the
6 victim, as well as assisting with high profile cases.
7 Officer Ortiz received training in forensics from the
8 Wayne County Prosecutor's Office.

9 During the second quarter, Officer Ortiz was
10 the lead investigator and instrumental in the
11 identification and apprehension of a serial rapist who
12 resided in Detroit.

13 From June 25th, 2011, through January 2nd,
14 2012, Sex Crimes received five complaints of sexual
15 assaults by an unknown assailant utilizing the website
16 of MocoSpace to lure his victims. On April 7th, the
17 fifth victim came forward reporting that she had been
18 sexually assaulted by someone using the same modus
19 operandi.

20 Officer Ortiz, along with another officer,
21 canvassed the area of Detroit. They showed a
22 photograph of the possible suspect to citizens. One
23 citizen identified the suspect as her son. A search
24 warrant was executed and a computer was placed in
25 evidence. Later the suspect was arrested. On

1 April 8th, 2012, a live line-up was conducted. The
2 victim positively identified the suspect as the man she
3 met online, who sexually assaulted and robbed her.

4 On April 9th, 2012, a warrant was obtained
5 charging and arraigning the defendant with one count of
6 CSC first degree, one count of kidnapping, one count of
7 larceny from a person, and one count of CSC third
8 degree. Since the initial charge, the defendant has
9 been charged with four additional cases of criminal
10 sexual conduct. Officer Ortiz was instrumental in
11 piecing together information from the multiple cases
12 which led to the identification and arrest of a serial
13 rapist.

14 The quality of work clearly demonstrated by
15 Officer Ortiz was exemplary and characterized the
16 highest traditions of the Detroit Police Department.

17 For the aforementioned reasons and for his
18 unwavering dedication, we are proud to call him one of
19 Detroit's Finest.

20 Congratulation.

21 (Applause).

22 P.O. CASSANDRA LEWIS: And finally, we would
23 like to acknowledge the officer who received Officer of
24 the Quarter for the Second Quarter who was unable to
25 attend tonight, Eastern District, Police Officer Robert

1 Roby, Junior; 6th precinct, Police Officer Wade
2 Rayford; 8th precinct, Police Officer Chad Bristol; and
3 10th precinct, Officer Brent Rodak.

4 Thank you all. And congratulations to
5 everyone.

6 (Applause).

7 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Chief Logan,
8 certainly it is refreshing to see us honor our men and
9 women. We had talked about this for a while, and
10 certainly congratulations go out to all of you that
11 were honored, and as one officer said, we know that it
12 is a partnership, that you are not out there by
13 yourself, and we thank God for the effort that you put
14 in, for the courage that you have to do your job every
15 day. And so our hats are off to you.

16 (Applause).

17 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: I want to back up
18 just on a couple of issues. Earlier I announced that
19 the Vice Chairperson of our Board, Commissioner Jessica
20 Taylor, will be hosting a meeting of those individuals
21 who are interested in helping to look at the type of
22 qualification -- well, not qualification --
23 characteristics that we want in our next Chief of
24 Police. That meeting will be held on Friday,
25 October the 19th, at 3:00 p.m., in our regular meeting

1 room, room 328 at 1300 Beaubien. We will put out
2 flyers and more information; it will be on our website,
3 as well. But again, that meeting will take place on
4 Friday, October the 19th, 3:00 p.m., 1300 Beaubien.
5 Again, we want to make sure that the citizens of the
6 City of Detroit get an opportunity to express their
7 views as relates to the type of characteristics that
8 they believe are critical in the personality of
9 selecting our next chief.

10 I want to also back up to our Resolution for
11 Ms. Ramona Chewning. We did not vote on that
12 Resolution. I want to do that at this time. And so
13 therefore, I would entertain a motion to receive that
14 Resolution.

15 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: So moved.

16 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Support.

17 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: It has been properly
18 moved and supported that we will receive the Resolution
19 honoring Mrs. Ramona Chewning, and that Resolution will
20 be a part of our public -- our records. All those in
21 favor?

22 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

23 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: All those opposed?
24 Motion carries.

25 There is no old business at this time.

1 Our next meeting, the next meeting of the
2 Board of Police Commissioners, will be Thursday,
3 October the 18th, 2012, 3:00 p.m., at Police
4 Headquarters, 1300 Beaubien, Room 328-A.

5 At this time, the agenda calls for oral
6 communications. If you wish to address the Board, you
7 may come to the mic, that's right here in the center of
8 the aisle. We ask that you would stick with a
9 two-minute timeframe so that we can hear from as many
10 citizens as possible.

11 Our administrative guy, Rob Brown, will
12 remind you of our time, when you are getting close to
13 the end.

14 Again, if you wish to address the Board, you
15 may come at this time.

16 MS. HARDING: Good evening. My name is
17 Barbara Harding, and my precinct is the 6th precinct,
18 out of Northwest Detroit.

19 And I need to ask you, and you might
20 have -- the Chair, he might have answered this, but I
21 am going to ask it anyway because I was asked to ask
22 it. Is it -- how can I say this? Is it -- what --
23 that you -- a person is mentally ill, and do you -- is
24 this the way to do, maybe give them their weapons back
25 and put them in a position where they have got to make

1 decisions on, you know, other people and like that,
2 without -- is this -- is this the -- what the police
3 people usually do? I was asked to ask this.

4 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: No problem.
5 Ms. Harding, first of all, thank you for coming to the
6 meeting tonight, and your question is not only timely
7 but is also appropriate. We certainly have policies.
8 That is one of the areas that we will investigate as
9 relates to the situation, and I don't want to go too
10 much further there because an investigation will take
11 place regarding that.

12 MS. HARDING: Okay.

13 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: But that is
14 definitely one of the areas we will look in; that if
15 any of our members of our department is in trouble, how
16 do we facilitate them in a way that's best for
17 themselves as well as the members of the department?
18 We will definitely look into that.

19 MS. HARDING: Okay. Well, I am a member of
20 the DCP AA alumni group.

21 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, ma'am.
22 Thank you, Ms. Harding.

23 MS. MORRIS: Good evening. My name is
24 Tijuanna Morris. And I am with the Detroit Coalition
25 Against Police Brutality. I am not speaking for them.

1 I am a licensed investigator, retired police officer,
2 26 years. I am representing myself, the fight for your
3 rights investigations.

4 And I have a troubling situation, as a
5 retired police officer, about the situation that has
6 happened, and everybody knows about Godbee. I don't
7 feel Godbee have a right to ride out on a carpet, and
8 that's what it seems like he is doing. He has left us,
9 the City of Detroit, in a turmoil. Not only him, the
10 women don't get away. They are members of the Detroit
11 Police Department. They should be conducting
12 themselves professionally.

13 The situation, we are paying \$2 million a
14 year to the consent decree for things to get better.
15 And for us to be slapped in the face, it is time for
16 somebody to be going down. It is time for some answers
17 to be answered, and some charges to be charged.
18 Because we keep paying this money. And smiling in the
19 face ain't going to help. We need some answers.

20 I went to the City Council. They are police
21 officers, they can't speak, but I can. And I am going
22 to let this stay in the public as long as I can. I am
23 going to go to the City Council. I am going to go to
24 the legislature. This has got to stop. And somebody
25 needs to be answering questions, and some kind of check

1 and balance system needs to be put in place. Somebody
2 needs to go down and have some charges. Somebody need
3 to be demoted.

4 I came on in '85. In '85, you were not
5 allowed to wear earrings. You were not allowed to have
6 your hair down on your shoulder. And your I.D. was
7 checked monthly. We need some kind of accountability
8 and some professionalism standing up in our city.

9 Can I get some answers from somebody?

10 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: First of all,
11 Ms. Morris, it's always good to see you. And we thank
12 you for your diligence that you do, that you have in
13 our meetings, you have been very consistent --

14 MS. MORRIS: Yes, thank you.

15 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: -- in supporting the
16 police when we have been right. And also making sure
17 that we understand where there's areas we need to
18 improve. And so, again, we thank you for your
19 consistency, and that this is not one issue that you
20 just popped up on --

21 MS. MORRIS: No.

22 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: -- but you have been
23 consistent. I thank you.

24 MS. MORRIS: Oh, yes, and the Commission and
25 Board too; accountability.

1 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Absolutely. So what
2 I have said earlier is that we have, the Board of
3 Police Commissioners, have initiated an investigation.
4 I do not want to give all of the areas that we are
5 looking into, because I don't want to tip anything off.
6 But we are looking fully into it, and if we feel that
7 there are areas where we need to invite other agencies
8 in, to look further into some things that go beyond our
9 scope, we are more than willing to do that. And that's
10 what will be done.

11 MS. MORRIS: Okay. One more question. Is
12 the investigation going to start now?

13 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Yes, ma'am. Thank
14 you.

15 MS. MOORE: Thank you.

16 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, ma'am.

17 MR. MOORE: Good evening to the Board, to our
18 Chief, and to Detroit's Finest, and also the family.
19 My name is Edward Moore, and I am the liaison of the
20 Honorable Kwame Kenyatta, our Detroit City Councilman.

21 I want to say to the officers who got the
22 award today, the Office of Kwame Kenyatta say
23 congratulations, continue the good work that you have
24 been doing, and for the officers who did receive, we
25 would like for them, the next quarter or second

1 quarter, deliver to what I heard tonight, of what the
2 officers had did in continuing for our city.

3 And through our Chief, chief, as far as the
4 Office Kwame Kenyatta, whatever he can sit in, let him
5 sit in, you are the Chief, you are the quarterback;
6 that he is just a team player.

7 Thank you.

8 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you,
9 Mr. Morris. Always good to see you, as well.

10 MS. JEFFRIES: Hi, my name is Janet Jeffries,
11 and I might be at the wrong place because I have a
12 complaint for -- about the Detroit Police Department
13 actually.

14 This is all I have left from my son. And
15 this is the monies that was in his pocket that I just
16 got today. He was murdered January the 5th. I called
17 the 9th precinct, and I just want to know, is this the
18 protocol? I called the 9th precinct looking for my son
19 thinking that he had been arrested, and just for them
20 to tell me, call the hospitals, ma'am, that's where he
21 is.

22 I called back the next morning, and talked to
23 the 9th precinct again. They said, ma'am, you need to
24 call the hospital. Why do you keep calling us and
25 playing games?

1 I started to drive to the 9th precinct the
2 next day. On the way there, I called and asked them,
3 did anything happen on Joann Street? And that's when
4 they said to me, why are you asking us? I said,
5 because my son's coat, clothes, and keys is in his
6 house, but he is not there. They said, well, ma'am,
7 hold on. They come back to the phone and they said,
8 ma'am, we are going to connect you to Homicide. And I
9 got my grandkids in the car, and I'm driving, I'm
10 thinking something is wrong, they are crazy. They come
11 back on the phone, say, ma'am, you need to call this
12 number. I said, what number is this? And they said
13 the number that can help you. The man said, hello,
14 Wayne County Medical Examiner's Office.

15 Is this the protocol of the Detroit Police
16 Department?

17 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Ms. Jeffries, first
18 of all, let me first of all say that our hearts go out
19 to you in the transition of your son. Certainly. And
20 we applaud your courage for coming here. And we
21 certainly do not believe that that is the proper
22 protocol, but I am going to ask if Chief Logan will
23 address this, and we will get you some answers tonight.

24 MS. JEFFRIES: Thank you.

25 INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: Chair, Interim Chief

1 Logan, I would ask that Commander Frankie Lewis come
2 forward. Commander Lewis. The procedure that you
3 talked about is improper. But Commander Lewis is one
4 of the commanding officers over at Homicide. And he
5 will help you through the process.

6 I also, too, would like to apologize for what
7 happened to you. That should not have happened. And
8 you will be hearing more from us.

9 MS. JEFFRIES: Thank you.

10 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you,
11 Ms. Jeffries.

12 MR. CHRISTIANSEN: Good evening. My name is
13 Leif Christiansen. I am the new manager over at
14 St. Andrews Music Hall down on 431 East Congress. And
15 my question is very simple. Next door, we have the
16 Pandemonium Nightclub which has been the source of
17 numerous, numerous violent incidents. And I was just
18 wondering what is being done about it? From my
19 understanding of it, if they wish, they can open their
20 doors this weekend after having multiple fatalities and
21 violent incidents. And I just don't understand how a
22 business can remain open when it is operating with no
23 concern to the health of the general public.

24 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you,
25 Mr. Christensen.

1 INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: Through the Chair,
2 Interim Chief Logan. Sir, the only thing I can tell
3 you right now is that there are a number of fronts that
4 are going on with regard to Pandemonium. That is all I
5 can say. But just be patient. Okay.

6 MR. CHRISTENSEN: How can my business help to
7 ensure that nobody else gets hurt from that property?

8 INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: I think the steps we
9 are taking will help alleviate the problems that you
10 are talking about. But I just need your patience. We
11 are aware of the problems; we are working on the
12 problems through a number of fronts.

13 MR. CHRISTENSEN: How can I follow up on my
14 own end so I can be satisfied with what's being done
15 towards that property?

16 INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: Is Lucinda back there?
17 Inspector Hauser is in the back, sir.

18 MR. CHRISTENSEN: Thank you.

19 MS. HATCHER: Good evening. I am Evangelist
20 Dora Hatcher. I don't have a complaint or a question.
21 I have a comment.

22 I have heard good things tonight about our
23 officers. And I do stand, as most of you know, firm
24 for our police officers. And I want to say to all of
25 us here tonight, you know, we have the good and the bad

1 and everything, starting with the church. So what we
2 need to really do, people, is pray and ask God for
3 guidance. We need to be praying for our city. I need
4 to pray for myself, and I need y'all to pray for me. I
5 am not perfect; nobody is.

6 And we need to quit putting preachers and
7 police offices and everybody else up on a pedestal.
8 One thing we fail to remember, we are all human. We
9 all make mistakes. And when the prostitute was brought
10 to Jesus, he said, you without a fault, cast the first
11 stone. So let's try to pull together, be and doing
12 what we have, and ask God to lead you and guide us in
13 the way that we should go. And let's not criticize one
14 another all the time. Let's try to get to the bottom
15 of things and help one another. I need y'all help
16 myself. Thank you.

17 MS. McCANTS: Good afternoon to this Board.
18 My name is Yolanda McCants, and I am from
19 out of the Northeastern District. I guess I have a
20 question. Hopefully you have got an answer for me. It
21 is whether or not this Board will allow us, the
22 taxpayers, to have to pay for another chief to come in
23 for two months or three months.

24 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Well, let me answer
25 the question this way. As far as how long the next

1 chief will be here, that's completely up to the mayor
2 and the next election. So our job under the Charter is
3 to -- when there is a vacancy, to conduct a search, as
4 it is mandated by the Charter, to conduct a search, a
5 thorough search; present the names to the mayor, and
6 the mayor will make the selection, and the City Council
7 will do the confirmation, or not, of that selection.
8 And so we are mandated by City Charter to do what we
9 must do, and that is to conduct a search.

10 MS. McCANTS: Okay. I guess the second part
11 to that is, well, the estimated time on when that has
12 to be done? Like 30 days, 60 days, 90 days? Because I
13 think it is just a waste of our money. We have
14 somebody that's here, as opposed to looking for
15 somebody. We have already had somebody from another
16 state to come in and fall by the wayside. We should be
17 trying to see if there's somebody within the department
18 that can be pulled up, as opposed to bringing somebody
19 into our city that has no clue of how it is ran.

20 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Well, as you know,
21 Ms. McCants, the process will be open. So members
22 within the department as members or former members of
23 the department and those who are in state and outside
24 the state will be able to apply. So it is an open
25 process. And certainly, we welcome all of those who

1 feel they can come in and make a significant change to
2 the department, including those who are part of the
3 force right now.

4 As it relates it to a timeline, ma'am, we
5 will be better able to give you a timeline once we have
6 secured the firm that will do -- the company. We
7 should have that secured at our next meeting where
8 there is a quorum.

9 MS. McCANTS: Thank you.

10 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Good to see you.

11 MS. SMITH: Good evening. Bernice Smith,
12 political activist.

13 First of all, I want to apologize to you,
14 Chief Logan, from the incident two weeks ago, and to
15 the police officers that didn't like what I said to
16 them. I apologize to them. But I want you to know, I
17 am in your corner, whether you know it or not.

18 I have been a former police commissioner
19 before most of you were even on the Board. That was in
20 '74 under Coleman Young. So I have been always in
21 favor of what the Police Department has done.
22 Sometimes I get after you, just like any mother would
23 chastise her child. But still, whatever you do, I do
24 come to your defense. I see the police out in the
25 street, and I tell them all the time, be careful, take

1 care of yourself, so you will be able to go back home
2 to your family.

3 Today, I attended a ministers breakfast.
4 They were all ministers from just about all over to
5 Detroit, and it was at -- down on Fort Street,
6 DoubleTree hotel.

7 Now, while I was there at the table, who
8 comes in but your mayor? Naturally I couldn't let him
9 walk by me without saying something. So while I hugged
10 him, I told him, what are you going to do about the
11 police hours and their monies? They need their money.

12 He looked at me and he grinned. He said, Bernice --

13 (Applause).

14 MS. SMITH: I didn't say that to get
15 applause, but I did tell him because, see, I go way
16 back to '83 with him when I used to service him when I
17 had a bakery. So I had a feeling that I could tell him
18 whatever I want to tell him and it won't make no
19 difference, I guess, but I did tell him today, why
20 don't you take care of the police officers and the
21 firemen and let them have their hours back and the
22 monies?

23 While he didn't give me no direct answer, he
24 said, I am going to work on it. So that's why I come
25 tonight so I can tell up guys and the ladies also,

1 because I feel as though that you are out there giving
2 your lives, I have seen it over and over again. When I
3 was on the 300, we were out there along with you, so
4 therefore -- Brown, already? We were out there with
5 you, and so I know what you have done, in the
6 neighborhoods, so I want you to keep up the good work
7 at what you are doing and don't be discouraged because
8 I am going to fight as long as I have got breath in my
9 body for you, as long as you do the right thing and
10 keep this city clean and crime prevention.

11 But I do want to ask one thing. I saw about
12 four squad cars in one block downtown when I came from
13 there going by the Federal Building. I wanted to stay
14 out there and look for Kwame but I didn't. But anyway,
15 I have something for him too. But anyway, I just want
16 to know, why was so many police down there? Were they
17 towing the cars? I did see a car being towed there by
18 the Chase Bank. So I was just wondering. And then I
19 did have them raise their windows down and told them, I
20 am with you, a hundred percent. Just keep up the good
21 work.

22 So that's what I wanted to tell you tonight.
23 I apologize for my actions the other day, the other
24 week, but I was upset because I didn't get a chance to
25 tell the mayor what I wanted to say. And that was to

1 get out in the neighborhood and see what we are all
2 about. And not stay up on the Coleman Young Building
3 and other things.

4 So I will stop, Brown, now. Thank you so
5 much.

6 (Applause).

7 MR. SCOTT: I am going to make my remarks
8 short. I am Ron Scott, Detroit Coalition Against
9 Police Brutality. I want to address my comments to
10 Commissioner Jerome Warfield, Chairman of Commission,
11 and all the Commissioners, and to Interim Chief Logan.
12 Let me say this, and I am going to reiterate what I
13 said last week. Our office is located in a law office.
14 We believe in the sanctity of law. We believe in an
15 administrative function that allows people to be
16 evaluated, especially public officials. Not in the
17 courtyard, not in the street, not in the alley, but in
18 the reasonable deliberations of bodies that have been
19 set up by the people like the City Charter, voted on,
20 to evaluate and investigate charges of impropriety.
21 That's what we should do. And the reason why I say
22 that is because if I were in that position, I would not
23 want anybody to throw innuendoes or salacious gossip
24 about me. If I do something, then you find the facts
25 and you speak about the facts. Not about the innuendo

1 and suggestion and salacious statements. So I commend
2 the Commission for taking the responsible position as
3 levied by the Charter to engage in an investigation of
4 the previous activities related to the former Chief.

5 I am going to leave it there because I don't
6 care, it is not about what you think about me or I
7 think about me. It is what we as the people in a
8 democratic system exercise as our responsibility. And
9 I say to the officers and individuals here, we deal
10 with policemen's conduct, and we also deal with Peace
11 Zones for Life. The officers come to this place when
12 they can't come anywhere else to try to get a fair
13 resolution of their issues. The citizens come here to
14 try to get a fair resolution of their issues. If there
15 is one place in Detroit, not the 11th floor, not the
16 13th floor, but right on this floor, this is where you
17 can come and actually seek something that's
18 realistically just.

19 And I thank you for stepping up and being
20 statesmen above and beyond partisan politics or
21 innuendo or news reports or anything. I thank you for
22 being the men and women who try to do something right
23 for a change in the city of Detroit.

24 And Chester Logan, I just want to say to you,
25 we have known each other how long? Twenty some years

1 or whatever?

2 INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: Yes, sir.

3 MR. SCOTT: I remember those cold nights when
4 Calvin Porter was killed over on Mack Avenue and
5 Gratiot. And it was Chester Logan who helped; he did
6 not attempt to stop the community from demonstrating,
7 but he made sure that there would not be any conflict,
8 and at the same time, allowing people to express their
9 outrage. That is the kind of person that the Interim
10 Chief is. And I hope that -- and I thank you for
11 setting up the 19th to discuss the kind of Chief we
12 should have. I hope that the next Chief has some of
13 those qualities.

14 (Applause).

15 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Let me say this
16 before you leave the mic, and thank you for the words
17 that you spoke.

18 Someone once said to me recently that there
19 are a lot of ideas out there and we could change the
20 world if we all gave our ideas out. But the issue is
21 everybody wants to claim the credit. And I want to say
22 publicly, I thank you for calling me this week and
23 giving me the idea and sharing it with me as relates to
24 including the citizens for this type of forum, and I
25 just want anybody to know that that came from you, and

1 it immediately resonated with me that we want to give
2 the citizens the power that they have in this Board
3 back to make sure that they are part of the process and
4 not being subjected by this process. So thank you,
5 sir.

6 MR. SCOTT: Thank you. If I could say one
7 final thing. I don't know whether Kim is still here,
8 but I was really motivated, highly motivated when she
9 cried last week. She is a loyal community person, and
10 she comes to these meetings, and it really touched me
11 when she cried, because she was crying for the City of
12 Detroit. She was crying for the opportunity for us to
13 come together, for us not to be seen as individuals who
14 can't take care of our business, and so I spoke as much
15 for her as I am speaking for you and for us and all,
16 and Detroit -- and by the way, Detroit will get better.
17 I don't want to hear anything else negative. It is
18 going to get better, and it is because we can find a
19 way to come together as opposed to turn against each
20 other.

21 (Applause).

22 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Are there others
23 wishing to address the Board of Police Commissioners
24 tonight? Are there others wishing to address the Board
25 tonight? Hearing, seeing none, we will close this

1 section of our meeting.

2 I do want to recognize State Senator Coleman
3 Young, Jr. here.

4 (Applause).

5 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: As I said earlier,
6 Councilman Spivey was here, as well, and we believe he
7 had to step out, but it was good to see him, as well.

8 That is all that we have tonight as relates
9 to our meeting.

10 At this time, we will accept a motion for
11 adjournment.

12 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Motion for adjournment.

13 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Second.

14 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: All those in favor.

15 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

16 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: We are out of here.

17 Bless you.
