4 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Good evening to
5 everyone.

6 AUDIENCE: Good evening.

7 COMMISSIONER WHITE: We're officially going
8 to call to order the Board of Police Commissioners
9 Meeting. On behalf of our Chair of the Board of Police
10 Commissioners Reverend Jerome Warfield, and our Vice
11 Chair Ms. Jessica Taylor, and Commissioner Toney
12 Stewart, I bring you greetings.

13 My name is Commissioner Donnell White, and I
14 will be facilitating our meeting. There is no quorum
15 present so we would handle -- General Announcements and
16 all voting matters will be referred to our next meeting
17 dated March 21, 2013.

18 At this time I would like to acknowledge
19 Deputy Chief Lee for being here representing the Office
20 of the Chief. Thank you for being here. And Executive
21 Secretary to the Board, Mr. George Anthony.
22 Mr. Secretary, will you please introduce our staff
23 present.

24 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
25 For the record, George Anthony, Secretary to the Board.

1 We have present Ms. Pamela Davis Drake who is our Chief
2 Investigator seated in the front. We have Ms. Loletha
3 Porter Coleman who is seated next to her in the front.
4 She is our Director of Police Personnel.

5 We also have Mr. Robert Brown who is our
6 Office Manager, Sergeant Alan Quinn who is recording
7 our proceedings. I do believe I saw Police Officer
8 Kent Cooper walk in. And there's Ms. Elizabeth Koller
9 from Hanson Court Reporting Service. That completes
10 the introductions.

11 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you,
12 Mr. Secretary. We do not have a Chaplain present. So
13 we will pause just for a moment for the invocation.

14 Dear Heavenly Father, we ask that you bless
15 this meeting. Bless those who have come to be a part
16 of the solution, not to only point out the things we
17 disagree on but the things that we can agree on for the
18 betterment of your community.

19 We ask that you bless the men and women who
20 have been called to serve this great City. Be a edge
21 of protection around them as they seek to serve the
22 least of thee. We ask that you do all these things,
23 that we may give you the honor and glory to your name.
24 And all the people said, Amen.

25 AUDIENCE: Amen.

1 of the Police Department, to serve as a final authority
2 to impose and/or review discipline of Police Department
3 employees, to appoint Civilian Personnel Director, and
4 they also prepare an annual report of Department
5 activities for the public, Mayor and City Council.

6 Its staff consists of an Executive Secretary
7 who serves as Secretary to the Board and attends all
8 Board meetings, a Chief Investigator, and additional
9 Investigators as required, and other staff as necessary
10 to provide support to the Board.

11 The Police Commission considers itself a
12 liaison between the citizens of the City of Detroit and
13 the Detroit Police Department. With that being said we
14 would as Ms. Boheman to come forward with a word for
15 the Boy Scouts of America.

16 MS. Boheman: I'm going to make this really
17 quick. I have a lot of work to do. I just want to
18 thank everyone --

19 COMMISSIONER WHITE: If you could,
20 Ms. Boheman, it's a public record.

21 MS. BOHEMAN: I want to thank everyone for
22 coming out to our facility, hope you enjoy it and have
23 a good meeting and get involved in scouting.

24 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you.

25 MS. BOHEMAN: We need all the volunteers we

1 get.

2 INSPECTOR KYRIACOU: Inspector Nick Kyriacou.
3 If I may Ms. Boheman indicated she was kind of busy, so
4 I want to take care of this. She had an opportunity to
5 a walk away. We have two certificates for her. In
6 appreciation for your hospitality and allowing us to
7 use this facilities on multiple occasions we have a
8 certificate, one from the Central District to the Boy
9 Scouts of America and another one specifically to you
10 expressing our appreciation for use of the facility.
11 Thank you, very much.

12 (Applause, and photo were taken.)

13 MS. BOHEMAN: Thank you, everyone.

14 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, again,
15 Ms. Boheman. Again, we'll table approval of the agenda
16 dated for Thursday, March 14th. We will also table
17 approval of the minutes dated Thursday, February 21,
18 February 28, and March 7. Clearly, there's no Chair
19 Person's report today. We will move for a presentation
20 from the Office of the Chief. Deputy Chief Lee.

21 D.C. LEE: Through the Chair, we do have a
22 presentation from the Central District and Inspector
23 Nick Kyriacou who is the Officer in charge of the
24 Central District and he's accompanied by Lieutenant
25 Shawn Gargalino.

1 INSPECTOR KYRIACOU: Board and Chief, welcome
2 everybody. Also somewhere around here is Officer
3 Dorsey. He's on the move. He tends to try to sneak
4 out the room. Inspector Kyriacou, recently assigned to
5 Central District as Commanding Officer. Lieutenant
6 Gargalino is my right hand at Central.

7 A lot of this is kind of repetitive things we
8 know, so I'll try to get through it kind of fast. As
9 everybody knows Central District is comprised of both
10 the 1st and the 13th Precinct which is located at 7310
11 Woodward.

12 Also coming under the Central District is
13 Gaming Operations and also Central Events located at 20
14 Atwater. Central District has a daytime population
15 that swells to approximately 100,000 citizens inclusive
16 of patrons coming to the downtown district for their
17 employment. With the resurgence of Greater Downtown
18 Detroit the District handles numerous concerts,
19 festivals, events, sporting events, games and parades.

20 We're also the home of all three casinos. An
21 estimated 100 to 150,000 people visit those casinos
22 weekly. In addition we have a vibrant residential area
23 that we also protect and serve. There are 23 schools,
24 seven charter schools, two colleges within the borders
25 of the District. A couple of things are ongoing

1 initiatives within the Central District, under
2 Community Relations, Community Relations Officers
3 distribute crime business bulletins within the Central
4 District, give safety reports and tips to block clubs,
5 do security surveys of homeowners and businesses, and
6 we administration the U-Turn Program, which is a youth
7 program which is designed to deter kids from criminal
8 activity.

9 We also work in partnership with the Youth
10 Alcohol Grant doing enforcement efforts on underground
11 rave parties and also try to prevent some underage
12 drinking activities.

13 There's also something we're about to restart
14 as the weather gets warm. It's call the Neighborhood
15 Walk. Ever Friday night during the spring and summer
16 we join together with our Community Relations Officers
17 in different areas of the district with residents in
18 that area in an effort to get them out of their homes
19 and be visible and try to take back their
20 neighborhoods.

21 In an effort to deal with some of the ongoing
22 problems in the downtown areas, downtown area, recently
23 in the fall there was a Campus Marius beat specifically
24 to deal with that area. We've also for a long time had
25 the Harmony Park, Capital Park, New Center and Greek

1 Town, and financial foot patrols that have been very
2 effective in keeping things under control in the
3 Downtown area.

4 The Central District has also had Central
5 District 92 which is a dedicated homeless car that is
6 used to support placement efforts with indigent
7 citizens in shelters and get them various types of
8 help, to try to deal with that crime problem in the
9 downtown area. We've established a corporate block
10 club. The intent is to create more police visibility
11 throughout the district by increasing cooperation from
12 the Police and business.

13 We've been a long time partner with Central
14 Business Neighborhood Watch. This is a block club,
15 corporate sponsored block club that meets biweekly.
16 Also partnered with the Midtown Neighborhood Watch. I
17 was at the meeting last night and that's a very vibrant
18 neighborhood block club group that meets to discuss
19 their interest in the midtown area.

20 As we all know there's a thriving sports and
21 entertainment -- a couple of venues Downtown.
22 Obviously the Tigers and the Red Wings. And also in
23 the Downtown area we have to make sure we staff our
24 Club detail down there because of all the clubs and
25 bars that are going on Downtown.

1 About the only new part of it, the spin that
2 I put on since I been at the Central District is that
3 we're going to establish a Central District Law
4 Enforcement private security partnership that's aimed
5 at creating a district-wide joint law enforcement
6 security collaborative partnership which is being
7 initiated within the confines of the District.

8 The idea of that is to work closer and more
9 comprehensively between law enforcement and the various
10 private security agencies and try to stretch beyond the
11 existing partnerships that are already in place within
12 the core downtown area.

13 But when you step back and look at the big
14 picture in Central District we also have the hospital
15 complex, and the sports entertainment complex, and
16 there's not necessarily as much overlap as I'd like to
17 see there. So that's something that's just getting
18 going in the Central District. But by the end of
19 summer we hope to have that up and running.

20 And I've had some productive conversations
21 with some of our partners in private security and
22 they're very positive towards that. And that ends my
23 presentation.

24 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, Inspector.
25 One question that I picked up on the Central Events and

1 Gaming is that currently under the umbrella of Central
2 or is that Cork Town?

3 INSPECTOR KYRIACOU: Yes, it's currently
4 under the umbrella of Central District. The Gaming
5 Unit is within 7310 Woodward, but they come under my
6 command. In addition, Special Events, 20 Atwater is
7 also under the command of me as Commanding Officer in
8 the District.

9 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Okay. They still
10 operate out of the Atwater location?

11 INSPECTOR KYRIACOU: Yes, 20 Atwater is still
12 in place with the same contingent of people of that
13 that have been there for quite awhile. At some point,
14 I wasn't there when it happened, but the contingent of
15 people that come under Gaming whenever they moved out
16 of the former facility were moved into 7310. So
17 they're upstairs where I'm at in the building at 7310.

18 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, very much. I
19 apologize if I did not ask if there's an official
20 report?

21 D.C. LEE: No.

22 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you very much.
23 There's no Standing Committee Reports. Under New
24 Business we do have a Resolution honoring Ms. Sonia
25 Moore. Ms. Moore, would you please come forward,

1 please. She's shaking her head no. Let us
2 congratulate Mrs. Moore.

3 (Applause.)

4 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Please join me. The
5 hometown hero never wants the spotlight. This is your
6 day. And also we have with us Mr. Dante Ladamore.
7 Let's give him a round of applause.

8 (Applause.)

9 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Okay. Who clearly does
10 not follow in grandma's footsteps with being shy, but we
11 thank him for his support of his grandmother today.
12 This is a Resolution honoring Mrs. Sonia Moore. We're
13 going to get it right. A Resolution honoring
14 Mrs. Sonia Moore.

15 Whereas Mrs. Sonia Moore has been a dedicated
16 resident of the Central District and an active member
17 of the Taylor Street Block Club for more than 34 years,
18 also serving as the Block Club President for the past
19 25 years; and

20 Whereas Mrs. Moore graduated from Chadsey
21 High School and began her career as a case worker for
22 the City of Detroit Neighborhood Service Department
23 where she worked for 30 years; and

24 Whereas as Mrs. Moore has been affiliated
25 with Vanguard Nonprofit Organization and is currently a

1 member the Sierra Club which focuses on environmental
2 issue. Mrs. Moore's commitment to community service
3 and leadership is exemplified throughout the community;
4 and

5 Whereas Mrs. Moore has been instrumental in
6 building bridges between the community and the Detroit
7 Police Department. Dating back to 1980 when she
8 organized the Taylor Street Block Club. Mrs. Moore has
9 always contributed efforts to improve neighborhood
10 safety and quality of life; and

11 Whereas Mrs. Moore's passion and
12 participation in community organizations has been a
13 positive force in effectively implementing the Safe
14 Streets security measures and initiative and other
15 activities to benefit her community; and

16 Whereas Mrs. Moore has proven through her
17 actions that she remains a dedicated and committed
18 supporter of the City of Detroit and the Central
19 District. She has volunteered for numerous activities
20 such as the Motor City Makeover, Central District's
21 Crime Walk, Angel's Night and other community events.

22 Now therefore be it resolved that the Detroit
23 Board of Police Commissioners, speaking on behalf of
24 the citizen of the City of Detroit and the Detroit
25 Police Department recognize the life's work and

1 dedication to service of Mrs. Sonia Moore. Her
2 commitment to community, mission outreach and her
3 giving spirit is felt and shared throughout the Central
4 District and the entire City of Detroit. We thank and
5 congratulate you, Mrs. Sonia Moore. Signed: Detroit
6 Board of Police Commissioners. Adopted this day,
7 March 14th, 2013. Congratulations.

8 (Applause and photos were taken.)

9 D.C. LEE: Mrs. Sonia Moore, on behalf of
10 Interim Chief Chester Logan, I present to you the
11 Detroit Police Department Certificate of Recognition
12 Resident of the City of Detroit in appreciation of your
13 contributions, your involvement in the community and
14 service to the City of Detroit demonstrate the spirit
15 and commitment that is worthy of recognition. Signed:
16 Chester L. Logan, March 14th, 2013. Congratulations.

17 (Applause and photos were taken.)

18 INSPECTOR KYRIACOU: Wait, there's more.
19 Last but certainly not least, the Spirit of Detroit
20 Award is presented herewith as an expression of
21 gratitude and esteem of the citizens of Detroit to
22 Ms. Sonia Janette Moore in recognition of exceptional
23 achievement, outstanding leadership and dedication in
24 improving the quality of life and signed on today's
25 date by all the members of the Detroit City Council.

1 Congratulations.

2 (Applause, and pictures were taken.)

3 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Mrs. Moore, if you
4 would, a word?

5 MS. MOORE: No. Thank you all.

6 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Certainly, Mrs. Moore,
7 we certainly appreciate your kindred spirit and service
8 and dedication to this City and the great department
9 known as the Central District. Thank you.

10 Chief, under Written Directives, do you have
11 anyone for Written Directives?

12 D.C. LEE: Commander Romeo.

13 COMMANDER ROMEO: Good evening,
14 Commissioners. Commander Jeff Romeo, from the Office
15 of Civil Rights. I'm here for four different
16 Directives. I'll go through them real briefly a
17 summary of some of the changes that were made. The
18 first Directive is 201.2 Patrol Related Reports. And
19 we incorporated a lot of detail related to the Chrisnet
20 report features which is the online reporting feature
21 the Police Officers use, digital reporting feature.

22 It has a lot of different tabs for
23 documenting collection of evidence, routing of the
24 reports to different entities as opposed to sending
25 hard copies. We have a lot of documents. A lot of the

1 policies prior to this provision indicated you had to
2 send a hard copy in addition to specialized commands so
3 they were apprised of different crimes. Now it's just
4 a routing feature. You route it to them and they'll be
5 able to pull it up right on their desktop.

6 A lot of that was revised in the policy as
7 well as active logs is also the patrol-related reports.
8 We have always reinforced the steps in Chrisnet
9 documenting the reasonable suspicion for any stops. We
10 had it in the guidelines for our activity log. We just
11 incorporated it into policy to make it more clear to
12 make sure it's reinforced in the policy.

13 The next Directive is 204.8 which is
14 Environmental Ordinances which we incorporated light
15 ordinances in there for procedures for obtaining them
16 as far issuing them and also a misdemeanor complaint
17 violations which we internally call V-Tickets.

18 We've had those type of tickets around for at
19 least a few decades. My whole career. We never really
20 had it in policy so we met with 36th District Court and
21 obtained information on how those tickets are
22 processed. And those cover misdemeanor type violations
23 like sign lighting, display ordinances, animal control
24 ordinances, and certain licenses.

25 We've have Officers that are specially

1 trained to issue those type of tickets. They can't
2 give those tickets unless they're specially trained.

3 The next policy is 302.1 Detroit Police
4 Reserves. There were a lot of, not a lot of changes to
5 this policy. But one procedure that was implemented in
6 this policy is when a Reservist discontinues their duty
7 what procedures are in place for that. Now there's
8 procedures for that as well as getting a retirement
9 badge and ID if you do retire. It's sort of called a
10 retirement. They aren't getting a pension obviously
11 from the City but they're going to get a document that
12 shows an identification and a badge that shows that
13 they did serve the Department as a Reservist, and
14 they'll be able to show that to anybody. And if
15 there's any misuse of those badges or IDs, the Chief
16 has a right to revoke those at anytime.

17 And then in there also we incorporated a
18 policy even though it's already in DPD Policy regarding
19 firearms from vehicles. It's the same language we
20 incorporated in our Detroit Police Department Manual
21 regarding firearms. We just wanted to make to sure it
22 was clear to Reservist Officers the procedure for that.

23 And then the last policy is 302.3 Licenses
24 and Permits. And some policy changes in there were
25 regarding the protocols for revocation and suspension

1 of city licenses. And there's also a procedure in
2 there for processing of block party events,
3 registration requirements for precious metal and gem
4 dealers.

5 Some of these things are already being done.
6 We just have specialized commands or commands that
7 normally do this process give us procedures to update
8 the policy. And some of these actually weren't in
9 policy. So once we found out about the information we
10 incorporated it into the policy. Like the precious
11 metal and gems procedures for registration, it's a city
12 ordinance. And a couple years ago we realized that it
13 wasn't in the policy and put out a special order and we
14 now incorporated it into policy.

15 Also, we updated the procedure for concealed
16 pistol license and how you basically refer people to
17 the county clerk's office to obtain that application
18 for obtaining the CPL license.

19 And that was extent of a summary of the
20 changes that were made. And we also posted the
21 policies according with Department procedure on the
22 Internet or the Intranet for public comment. They're
23 also on the City of Detroit website, the Police
24 Department's website. And citizens can go online and
25 view the policies, take a look at them, review them and

1 send any questions they have or any comments they have,
2 and we'll take those into consideration and we'll bring
3 that to your attention the next time we come to the
4 Board to discuss the policies because we know they're
5 going to be under review for a period of time.

6 COMMISSIONER WHITE: How long have been
7 posted online?

8 COMMANDER ROMEO: They've been posted online
9 for a few days now and we plan on keeping them posted
10 until conclusion of the Board's review which we
11 anticipate to be another two to three weeks.

12 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, Commander.

13 COMMANDER ROMEO: Thank you.

14 COMMISSIONER WHITE: There's no Old Business
15 before us. Please be mindful under Announcements, our
16 next meeting will be held Thursday, March 21, 2013, at
17 3:00 p.m. at Police Headquarters, 1300 Beaubien,
18 Room 328, and that's Downtown Detroit.

19 At this time we'll have oral communications
20 of the audience. If anyone wishes to address the Board
21 of Police Commissioners we would ask that you come
22 forward to the microphone, please state and spell your
23 first and last name for the record, and also be mindful
24 of our two minute allotted time by Mr. Brown to my
25 right and your left. Good evening.

1 MS. PANNELL: Good evening. Sharon Pannell.
2 You know how to spell it, P-A-N-N-E-L-L. My reason for
3 being here today is from the Detroit Police Citizens
4 Academy. They wanted to make you aware of the
5 importance of the Community Relations Department that
6 you're disbanding. And I gave Secretary Anthony a copy
7 of the letter. I'm not going to read it.

8 It's just they wanted you to know the
9 importance and what the things that we do, you know,
10 for the community and stuff, and that's why. I don't
11 want to read it. But it's different things we do. We
12 do courtesy greeters, crime prevention seminars. We
13 served at the picnics and the holiday celebrations and
14 different things. We have all types of walks. And
15 they just wanted me to come down and bring the letter
16 and let you know that it's important that we keep it.

17 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, Ms. Pannell.
18 I've been given a copy of your communication and
19 certainly we will ensure that all Commissioners receive
20 a copy of this communication, that they may have it as
21 we may review the reorganization presented by the
22 Office of the Chief.

23 MS. PANNELL: Okay. I put the president's
24 phone number on there because I won't be here next
25 month to the meeting to get to this to them.

1 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Yes, ma'am.

2 MS. PANNELL: So if you have anything to tell
3 them her number's on there.

4 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Yes, ma'am, thank you
5 very much.

6 MS. PANNELL: Thank you.

7 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Good evening.

8 MS. CAMPBELL: My name is Shay Campbell.

9 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Shay Campbell?

10 MS. CAMPBELL: That's right, that's me. I
11 have a complaint that I need the Police Board of
12 Commissions to address. I have been complaining
13 through telephone crime report as well as different
14 Officers that are at Motor City Casino. I work part
15 time periodically as a cab driver. I have seen two
16 gentleman that work for Checker Cab where they have
17 been illegally soliciting.

18 And what I mean by, illegally soliciting,
19 Motor City Casino has one of the biggest cabs stands
20 that is. When cab drivers are on the stand these two
21 gentlemen will ride along the side and offer to take
22 that person for beyond half of the meter fare.

23 Now I have no problem if somebody wants to go
24 a little lower because that's your choice if you choose
25 to be lower than the meter, that's your personal

1 choice. I do have a problem when you start waiting
2 till I'm next up to try to steal a fare from me and
3 then threaten me on the stand with your gun.

4 On this past Saturday one of the drivers
5 punctured my vehicle's tire in retaliation of me
6 complaining about his behavior. This has me at fear
7 for my life considering this gentleman threatened me
8 with a gun. I did make a police report. I do have the
9 actual police report number. And nothing is being done
10 about it.

11 So I'm not trying to take up any time. I
12 spoke to George Anthony from Gary Brown's office. I
13 know you must recall about the same incident, am I
14 correct, Mr. George? I need you all's assistance
15 because that's illegal ordinance. You cannot illegally
16 solicit. So I've called, contacted City Council, the
17 Police Department. I've contacted the owners of
18 Checker Cab. And nothing is being done. It's still
19 being done right now as we speak.

20 And I'm asking you as a woman and as a
21 citizen of Detroit, can you please help me in stopping
22 these two gentlemen since obviously Checker Cab will
23 not do anything. The Officers that work at Motor City
24 Casino, I've seen them take money in payoffs from these
25 two drivers. And they'll sit there and watch them

1 either sell drugs, carry their guns in open view with
2 the cameras on them.

3 Now, when this tire was punctured last
4 Saturday night it was directly up under a camera. So
5 if somebody can help me in having that videotape pulled
6 where they can see this driver puncturing my tire I
7 would really appreciate it because I'd like to press
8 charges because that's a safety threat to me.

9 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Sure. Ms. Campbell, let
10 me first say thank you for having the courage to come
11 forward and deal with this matter. You made some very
12 serious allegations and I want to ask if Deputy Chief
13 could respond --

14 MS. CAMPBELL: Oh, I've sent letters.

15 COMMISSIONER WHITE: -- some individual to
16 work with you starting tonight.

17 D.C. LEE: Yes, thank you. Through the
18 Chair, thank you for bringing this to my attention. I
19 do have Inspector Nick Kyriacou here.

20 MS. CAMPBELL: Who?

21 D.C. LEE: Standing right next to you, he's
22 sitting there. He's in charge of Central District as
23 well as Gaming. He'll take the information. They have
24 an elaborate camera system there. And whatever it
25 takes to bring this to fruition for you he'll take care

1 of you. He'll take care of it.

2 MS. CAMPBELL: And I would just like to say
3 in enclosing here's what I really am ticked off by. I
4 been sick over the past couple months where my legs
5 have swollen beyond three times the size, was given
6 Peganone, put 70 pounds on me in less than a three
7 month period that healed my legs completely but
8 unfortunately now I'm going through the weight loss
9 process of taking medicated steroids to help me walk
10 better.

11 I find it kind of funny that it's an Officer
12 Atkins who works in the afternoons at Motor City Casino
13 along with another Officer, they can complain about how
14 long I go to a bathroom when I have to take medication.
15 Cannot control how many times I go because I take
16 Laciks(sic) which make you run back and forth. I've
17 foregone taking my Laciks and have messed up my body.
18 I've did have damage to my liver.

19 So I don't have to go to the bathroom as
20 often as I should be to keep these Officers or from
21 telling security guards at Motor City Casino she's not
22 allowed to walk around the casino if she's on cab
23 stand. Yet they will let other drivers come in, go and
24 play on the slot machines, leave their vehicles out
25 there for period of eight to twelve hours.

1 I've addressed it with two of your Sergeants
2 and Lieutenant who are at this casino. But I find it
3 strange you can harass me about taking my medication of
4 which I have 15 doctors and 15 lawyers that can confirm
5 my medical condition, but you can't stop two gentlemen
6 who in your face will say, discount, discount,
7 discount.

8 Now, if you going from Downtown Detroit and
9 you going to West Eight Mile and Trinity that's about
10 \$30. If you going from Downtown Detroit to past
11 Chalmers that's going to be about \$25. So if somebody
12 is offering to do that for no more than a \$11 that's
13 out beating you all the way.

14 I'm already dealing with homelessness when I
15 have to sleep in a van as it's due to a lack of
16 finances. But in a summary I can't seem to get no
17 help.

18 COMMISSIONER WHITE: I don't mean to cut you
19 off, but I want to afford you an opportunity to speak
20 with Inspector Kyriacou before you leave.

21 MS. CAMPBELL: And what is he going to do
22 about these two particular drivers?

23 COMMISSIONER WHITE: You can speak with the
24 Inspector. And I'm here following the meeting as well,
25 and I'll be sure to give you my office information.

1 And if you don't feel as though your situation is being
2 addressed we will work with you to make sure your
3 situation is addressed. But you are certainly capable
4 of speaking with the Inspector at this time.

5 MS. CAMPBELL: I would like to definitely get
6 your number and I'll follow up with you --

7 COMMISSIONER WHITE: (Inaudible.)

8 MS. CAMPBELL: -- every week to let you know
9 the progression of it. I apologize to anymore if I've
10 taken up your time. I certainly didn't drive down here
11 to take up anybody's time. I'm trying to get this
12 matter addressed that it can stop.

13 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Yes, ma'am.

14 MS. CAMPBELL: So I do apologize to anyone if
15 they felt that I took up their time.

16 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you very much.

17 MS. CAMPBELL: Thank you.

18 MR. SCOTT: Good evening. How are you,
19 Commissioner White, Deputy Chief, and all the members
20 of the Department as well as citizens who are here. I
21 wanted to speak -- Ron Scott, is my name. I'm with the
22 Detroit Coalition Against Police Brutality. I wanted
23 to ask a couple things that I think are salient so I'll
24 try to combined them for time sake.

25 One, I wanted to at some point talk about the

1 high-speed chase which took place on I75 near Eight
2 Mile Road earlier this week where there were two
3 injuries and one death. I know the Department has
4 within the framework of the consent decree and others
5 certain provisions in how high-speed chases are
6 handled.

7 And I think that was MSP that was involved in
8 that. So I'd just like to know if you know anything
9 about it, how it took place and so forth, specifically
10 within the boundaries of the City of Detroit how those
11 chases are handled. Because I know we had gone to the
12 State Legislature to see about setting some guidelines.

13 And around the county various departments are
14 trying to deal with certain provisions in which the
15 chases were not either injured Officers and/or
16 citizens. And this seemed to be one of those
17 situations where but for the grace of God it could have
18 been worse. So I'm speaking to the framework.

19 But I want to finish -- thank you, with this,
20 last week I mentioned about the EFM, the possibility
21 that it was going to occur and how it would affect the
22 Commission, how it would affect the Department, the
23 largest department in the City. I think, Commissioner,
24 even though you don't have a quorum, it would be very
25 important to have a large meeting called with the

1 citizens to talk about how this EFM is going to affect
2 the Department, how it is going to interact with the
3 EFM and others, and how does it relate to the chain of
4 the command under the Police Department, and how our
5 tax dollars are being used for this.

6 Because I don't know about you but I'm quite
7 concerned given that we have a consent decree, given
8 that we have an oversight body that is authorized by
9 the State. There are a lot of questions and I think we
10 need to answer these questions. You can't just bring
11 somebody in and say do what I say do without having a
12 reasonable response from the citizens.

13 So if we could have a large meeting or
14 community meeting where some of these issues could be
15 presented I would appreciate it.

16 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, Mr. Scott.
17 To answer or not necessarily answer, but to work
18 backwards I do know that the ensuing emergency manager
19 there are conversations about Mr. Orr, I believe is his
20 name, having conversations with different departments
21 to understand what role he will play in that. And
22 certainly I'll will discuss with the Chair and other
23 members of this Body to see if that is a conversation
24 that we as of course meet within open session if we can
25 have that level of conversations and dialog.

1 MR. SCOTT: Right.

2 COMMISSIONER WHITE: It certainly will take
3 place in an open meeting format. So we'll be sure and
4 share that information with you.

5 As it relates to the car chases I'm not sure,
6 Mr. Scott, if this is covered under our consent decree
7 or not. But I do know we have policies as of recent
8 over the last year or two that spoke to car chases.
9 And it's MSP, but not DPD.

10 Assistant Chief, is there anything you might
11 want to add to that?

12 D.C. LEE: Yeah, through the Chair, I believe
13 that is a Michigan State Police pursuit, and our policy
14 does not apply, under the consent decree apply to the
15 Michigan State Police.

16 MR. SCOTT: I only ask it because it happened
17 within the boundaries of the City of Detroit and I
18 assume there would have been some interaction with the
19 DPD regarding what occurred. So within that context
20 even though it wasn't DPD, that there would have been
21 some interaction, that's the only reason I raised it.

22 D.C. LEE: Through the Chair, even if there
23 was some interaction with our Officers, they're bound
24 by our policies so they should have been following our
25 policy.

1 MR. SCOTT: You mean MSP is?

2 D.C. LEE: DPD Officers if they were part of
3 that, they follow our polices.

4 MR. SCOTT: Okay. Just in conclusion,
5 Commissioner White, I hope that Mr. Orr would come
6 before this Body and just to be, to raise something
7 that's with a little humor not so much, I hope that he
8 can come and have the courtesy, he's a fellow
9 University of Michigan grad like myself, and I hope
10 that he would come and -- no, no, face the
11 interrogation of Bernice Smith, I think that he would
12 get a real "dis" of what the community really feels.

13 COMMISSIONER WHITE: We appreciate your
14 gesture. Good evening.

15 MS. PELTIER: Good evening. My name is
16 Christina Peltier, P-E-L-T-I-E-R. I'm representing
17 Cass Park. We've created an informal neighborhood
18 group to deal with some of the issues down in Cass Park
19 that have been recurring for a long time. Officer
20 Dorsey's been extensively working with us on those
21 issues.

22 One of them is the park's closed because of
23 budget reasons. The neighborhoods and businesses and
24 social organizations are working right now on pulling
25 together to find out how we can adopt the park, take it

1 over.

2 One of the challenges we face is we have
3 groups coming down from the suburbs outside the area.
4 They're feeding the homeless in the center of the park.
5 We don't have a problem with that if it's done
6 appropriately.

7 We have a lot of at-risk population that's
8 going through treatment and we don't want them to
9 slide. And what we're finding is it's very -- it's
10 also collecting drug dealers to the area because
11 they're feeding high use population. A lot of the
12 neighborhood organizations have said come feed the
13 homeless at our place, treat them like humane people,
14 bathroom facilities. And the church groups aren't
15 interested in that.

16 We asked them to stop driving in the park.
17 They're destroying it. They're not interested in that.
18 Officer Dorsey is putting some signs up for us through
19 DPW. We've had in the past comments made about cease
20 and desist Police Officers who have been trying to help
21 us enforce the situation of not driving in the park.

22 We'd like to get your support as the Board to
23 say we support Central District and help us start
24 addressing this issue. And want the homeless in the
25 area to be treated like humans and not fed in the park

1 without bathroom facilities.

2 So we're just asking for support to help
3 Central District enforce the rules with the park and
4 not -- everyone in the neighborhood can use it, and
5 reduce some of the problems we have with the drug
6 dealers in area.

7 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, Ms. Peltier
8 for coming. Just a point of clarification, was it the
9 Officers driving in the park or was it --

10 MS. PELTIER: It's the groups coming down to
11 feed the homeless. So they're driving buses in the
12 summer.

13 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Into the park?

14 MS. PELTIER: Yes.

15 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Deputy Chief, is that
16 under our enforcement individuals serving of food
17 without proper licenses?

18 D.C. LEE: Probably not, through the Chair,
19 but I'm sure Officer Dorsey has worked with this
20 particular group. Whatever ordinances they may be in
21 violation he's apprised. I know that they have some
22 signage as well. That's probably what's going to help.

23 Because where that park's located people have
24 a tendency to just pull up. It's somewhat a large
25 park. They just want to pull in, not knowing that

1 they're not supposed to do that. Because I think the
2 signage may help that.

3 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Ms. Peltier, we
4 certainly appreciate you and your efforts throughout
5 the Cass Corridor working with that group of
6 individuals. And certainly if there's anything the
7 Board that we can do to be supportive we certainly
8 would make our voice -- sounds like Sergeant Dorsey,
9 Officer Dorsey has a handle on it.

10 MS. PELTIER: He's been a wonderful help.

11 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Absolutely. And if
12 there's something that we can do in addition please let
13 us know. We'll be happy to work with you.

14 MS. PELTIER: Thanks. We really want to
15 protect Mariners and some of the other groups that are
16 helping people in the neighborhood, so, thank you.

17 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you for coming.
18 Good evening.

19 MR. STEEPNIAK: Good evening. My name is
20 Michael Steepniak, S-T-E-E-P-N-I-A-K. And I live on
21 Cass Park and just a few concerns about reiterating
22 what Christina was saying. It makes me really mad when
23 people do this. Because wherever they live you'd never
24 be allowed to do this. You know, they're coming from
25 Southfield or Royal Oak or something. You'd never be

1 able to drive a car up in there. They'd nail you to
2 the wall. You know, it's just disrespectful. Like she
3 says, not providing bathroom facilities. I mean, the
4 park smells bad when the weather gets warm.

5 Other than that I live on the fourth floor
6 facing downtown and I hear gunshots all time. And like
7 I said, like Christina said, Officer Dorsey's been a
8 wonderful help. But I'm not entirely certain what to
9 do about it because we never know where they're coming
10 from. They're coming from Third. They're coming from
11 down Henry. They're coming from Peterboro. But you
12 can never actually see it.

13 But, I mean, like the most frequent stuff I'd
14 probably say like where the trouble is over at Stadium
15 Liquor, and we wanted to talk a little bit about that.
16 It's a reoccurring issue where there's trouble at
17 Stadium Liquor.

18 I mean, the other night I saw flashes when
19 the gunshot were fired it was from windows. And
20 there's two liquor stores over there. There's one and
21 they close down early and they're like really nice
22 people. They serve, you know, food, and you never have
23 trouble. There's always trouble over at Stadium Liquor
24 over on Cass and Henry.

25 And we were just looking for some support on

1 that issue alone and the park, as well.

2 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Sure. Mr. Steepniak,
3 you definitely have it. Thank you for bringing it to
4 our attention. Again, we'll make sure that we work
5 with Officer Dorsey if there's something we can do.

6 MR. STEEPNIAK: And Officer Dorsey has been a
7 wonderful help. We have a great relationship with him.

8 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you.

9 MR. STEEPNIAK: Thank you. Good evening.

10 MR. FORSYTHE: Hi. Peter Forsythe,
11 F-O-R-S-Y-T-H-E. I'm here to represent the Woodbridge
12 neighborhood. I want to thank Officer Dorsey. He's
13 been a big help in communicating to us, encouraging us
14 to keep up our efforts in this crime I'm about to
15 describe.

16 As a matter of fact, I live over in the
17 corner right here one block away. I've lived here for
18 about 30 years. But I'm actually -- I'm going to
19 introduce the main speaker who is Chris O'Brien sitting
20 right here. He's the one against whom -- he's one of
21 the people against whom this crime was carried out.

22 But I just want to talk about the importance
23 of this crime to this neighborhood that you're sitting
24 in right now. This crime involved a murder. And it
25 was a very random violent kind of murder that could

1 have taken down -- one person was killed, and many more
2 people could have been killed. But it involved bullets
3 being shot into a house four blocks down this way.

4 My wife was taking a yoga class three houses
5 away from where the bullets went into and if the
6 perpetrator had done this -- oops, had done this
7 instead of doing this there would have been eight,
8 nine, ten people in that yoga class taken out like
9 that.

10 And as a neighborhood we feel like we
11 understand the difficulty of the Detroit Police and the
12 job that you have to do and the stack of cases on your
13 desk. But we feel like it's a good place to live.
14 We've always felt that it's a good place to live.

15 But we've been shaken by this crime. And I'm
16 scared. And we're scared because of the violence, the
17 violent random nature of this crime. And we're trying
18 to get a dangerous criminal off the street, get a
19 dangerous weapon off the street.

20 And we're trying to reassure all the about
21 2,000 people who live in this neighborhood that this is
22 still a good neighborhood and that we can have a
23 partnership with Detroit Police Department that we can
24 all count on. Thank you.

25 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, Mr. Forsythe.

1 Good evening.

2 MR. O'BRIEN: My name is Chris O'Brien,
3 O-B-R-I-E-N. I just want to reiterate what Pete
4 Forsythe just said, you know, Chris was murdered
5 January 21st in front of my house. My house was shot
6 twelve times with an AK47. Myself and my roommate were
7 almost murdered also. And it just seems we've had a
8 hard time dealing with the homicide detectives.

9 Just for starters when the homicide guys were
10 there that night they gave me a phone number and said
11 call this Detective in the morning, first thing in the
12 morning, she'll be your lead, assigned, you know, to
13 your case.

14 I called day after day after day after day
15 after day. And on the fourth day somebody picked up
16 the phone and said, Homicide. And I said, can I speak
17 to Detective Little? They said she works midnights.
18 And I thought -- well. So, I waited up. Four or five
19 more days went by. And I finally got ahold of her at
20 one o'clock the morning. Then as I -- and told me
21 don't patch up, you know, there's thirty holes in my
22 house. They said, kind of don't patch them up. She
23 might want to come out here and reinterview and see the
24 crime scene.

25 I just saw her last week. It's going on

1 eight weeks, you know. So I know they're busy. Maybe
2 they already got the -- I don't know, you know. I'm
3 not the detectives. But I just feel that it's been
4 slow. It's been -- I found a bullet in the first week
5 lodged in my bookshelf next to my fireplace. And I
6 called her and left a message I found one of the
7 bullets. I had it for almost six weeks. She just
8 picked it up. I had it in a little envelope. I saved
9 it, you know.

10 So that's why I just want to reiterate what
11 Pete Forsythe was saying is we're very concerned about
12 this and we would like to let the Police know that the
13 neighbors around here are not going to give up on this.

14 We are going to stick with it until these
15 guys are caught. These are bad guys. Murderer. Not
16 robbers. Murderers. And that's all I'm going to say.
17 I'm not here to complain. I just wanted to tell you
18 how I feel as a victim and a long-time resident here.

19 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Sure. Mr. O'Brien, let
20 me first say, I'm sorry for your loss of your friend,
21 and for you going through this ordeal. Just for some
22 clarity, did you have crime scene techs come out to
23 your location?

24 MR. O'BRIEN: They were there that night.

25 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Okay.

1 MR. O'BRIEN: They didn't find it because it
2 was stuck and there was a lot of debris. She asked me
3 why didn't they find it? And I told her, I said there
4 was a lot of debris, plaster broken, you know. I found
5 it while I was cleaning up.

6 COMMISSIONER WHITE: I'm going to ask if
7 Deputy Chief may address some of the concerns you may
8 have. But also I would like to afford you an
9 opportunity to speak with our Chief Investigator for
10 the Board of Police Commissioners. You may have a
11 issue with service.

12 We want to make sure that you know all the
13 opportunities that are available to you to make sure
14 that you receive proper service from the men and women
15 of the Detroit Police Department, as well. She's right
16 here to your immediate left. And she can speak with
17 you following the meeting this evening.

18 MR. O'BRIEN: Okay. Thank you.

19 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Deputy Chief?

20 D.C. LEE: Through the Chair, sorry for the
21 loss of your friend. We do have Deputy Chief Morris
22 Wells who is present and he can take your information
23 and report back to you, have someone report back to
24 you.

25 MR. O'BRIEN: Okay. Thank you.

1 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you for being
2 here. Good evening.

3 MS. SMITH: Good evening to the Commission
4 and to you Chief, good to see you. Bernice Smith,
5 Political Activist. This week has been a torrid week
6 for us with all the publicity about our former Mayor
7 which I know you have a lot of comments about which I'm
8 not even going to go into it because I got tired of
9 listening and hearing.

10 But my main concern of an incident that
11 happened. And since I'm in Central and I live in
12 Midtown, so I think it would be appropriate for me to
13 find out from the Commander who is I imagine he's here
14 tonight, the Commander for Central? All right.

15 I would like to find out why there was six
16 squad cars sent to the Kilpatrick residence? We all
17 know there's a shortage of Police in the District. And
18 what happens in the District and they call the Police
19 and they don't answer right away. And most of you know
20 I am in support of Police Department so they don't say
21 I can't criticize them when they do wrong.

22 Now that I am very concerned. And when I
23 looked and saw it on TV I couldn't imagine. I said, I
24 know Carolyn called all them Police there to their
25 residence. I know there were lot of TV people there

1 and so forth.

2 But it didn't take six squad cars to go to
3 her residence. She even talked to me about it when I
4 called her later on that -- two days latter. But the
5 fact is we must be more diligent in using our squad
6 cars in various incidents. And I feel as though it was
7 something more important than going to her residence
8 for six squad cars.

9 Also, I would like to know what happened to
10 our Technical Squad and our Gang Squad? Where are they
11 and what are they doing? Is there an answer for me
12 because I'm going to report about it tomorrow on the
13 air?

14 COMMISSIONER WHITE: We'll try to capture all
15 your questions and give our response, Miss Bernice.

16 MS. SMITH: Oh, I won't be able to know about
17 it tonight?

18 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Was that it?

19 MS. SMITH: Oh, yeah. I'm going to wrap it
20 up. As far as what Mr. Ron said, I do intend on
21 meeting with the EM, Mr. Orr, as soon as possible.
22 Because I think I got a right to see him because of the
23 Mayor using my initials last week by saying he's tired
24 of the BS. And I'm tired, too. So we're both tired.
25 So I haven't got a chance to correct him on that.

1 Don't be using my name in vain, you know.

2 But anyway, seriously speaking I do hope that
3 the City comes to an end with all -- that we have and
4 all the problems that we're having. And I hope this
5 gentleman will come in and do a good job. I'm looking
6 forward to meeting him. I do hope that he will come
7 and visit us and see what the Commission is doing and
8 what Police Chiefs are doing here and see how he
9 figures in with them.

10 And don't give them a cut on their salary.
11 Please don't. Because I know you going to be cutting
12 things. So I just hope they don't cut you anymore than
13 what they have been doing. And your hours, I wish they
14 would bring you back to your eight hours because morale
15 is horrible. And I think you deserve to get back on
16 your regular schedule.

17 And I'm through, Mr. Brown. Thank you.

18 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, Ms. Smith.
19 As it relates to your question in regards to Tactical
20 Operations and Gang Squad those position have currently
21 been reassigned as of March 4th. And I won't say
22 anything other than that, other than there are some
23 ongoing conversations and hopefully we can have more
24 information to share with this Body within the next
25 week or two.

1 As it relates to squad cars in response to
2 the number of cars or protocol, Deputy Chief if you
3 care to speak to that?

4 D.C. LEE: Yes, through the Chair.

5 SERGEANT STEPHENS: Yes, sir. Sergeant
6 Stephens from the Office of Public Information. We had
7 media inquiries also why six cars were at the residence
8 of Cheeks/Kilpatrick. I did some investigation and
9 found out that we dispatched one scout car and a backup
10 car and a supervisor. And in the past -- so there were
11 three cars that were dispatched to that location.

12 Whenever there's a disturbance you're going
13 to have Officers who are concerned for their fellow
14 Officers and will just drive by to make sure that
15 everyone's okay.

16 We have no record of the other three cars.
17 But chances are they were just patrolling and wanted to
18 make sure the Officers were okay when you have a
19 disturbance to make sure no one's hurt. So we do have
20 record of one scout car, a backup car, and supervisor
21 who went to monitor the incident. Which it was no
22 problem. Everything was okay. Just the media.

23 COMMISSIONER WHITE: And the other cars
24 driving by in the area?

25 SERGEANT STEPHENS: Yes, just making sure

1 everybody was okay.

2 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, Sergeant.

3 Are there any other communications? Good
4 evening.

5 OFFICER MCCOMES: Officer McComes, formerly
6 from Tactical Mobile, M-C-C-O-M-E-S. I'm currently
7 assigned with Eastern District. I'm here, someone
8 asked me to speak on their behalf, the voice of a
9 citizen who called the former Gang Squad base looking
10 for their assistance.

11 It was a mother who wanted help from Gang
12 Squad because boys in neighborhood that were in a gang
13 were harassing and trying to force her child into the
14 gang. They were advised there's no longer a Gang
15 Squad. It occurred in the Eastern District so they
16 were advised to call Eastern District. A few minutes
17 later an Officer called from Eastern District and said,
18 did you tell someone to call over here? Why are you
19 telling people to call over here for Gang Squad? And
20 they said they didn't know Gang Squad had been shut
21 down.

22 So I'm not sure what advice they were given
23 from that Officer for that mother, but. So I just
24 wanted to share that voice of the public still
25 requesting their need. Thank you.

1 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, Officer.
2 Before you leave, Deputy Chief, what is the protocol
3 for individuals who are looking for that type of
4 service or response where they had been accustomed to
5 calling and relaying intelligence and information to
6 the Gang Squad? Who should we refer individuals to?

7 D.C. LEE: They should probably be referred
8 to that particular district. Because all of the Gang
9 Squad members and Tact Mobile people have been
10 transferred to various districts. So there are people
11 within the Precincts who can take that information, as
12 well as persons on the desk and take that information
13 and filter it through the command to the right person
14 at that particular district.

15 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Deputy Chief, is it
16 accurate to say that members of the Gang Squad and Tact
17 Mobile have been distributed and reassigned in a manner
18 every shift would have a representative from each of
19 those units?

20 D.C. LEE: That part I don't know. I don't
21 know if that's how it panned out when they went to the
22 Districts. But certainly there should be some people
23 from in each district that are familiar with Gang and
24 how Tact Mobile functions.

25 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you. Thank you,

1 Officer.

2 Any other communications? Any other
3 communications? Any other communications? Any other
4 communications? Seeing none. Also please be reminded
5 the next Board of Police Commissioners Meeting will be
6 held Thursday, March 21, at 3:00 p.m., at
7 1300 Beaubien, Police Headquarters Downtown Detroit.

8 Again, thank you for being here with us this
9 evening and for continued involvement with the Detroit
10 Police Department in the Great City of Detroit. Have a
11 good evening.

12 (The meeting concluded at 7:36 p.m.)
