4 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Good afternoon and
5 welcome to the Board of Police Commissioners
6 meeting. My name is Commissioner Jessica Taylor
7 and I'm joined by Commissioner Donnell White
8 who's the Vice-Chair and also from the Chief's
9 officer the Deputy Chief Dave LeValley and
10 Secretary, would you please introduce the rest of
11 the staff.

12 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you, Madam
13 Chair. For the record, George Anthony, Secretary
14 to the Board. We have present tonight Ms. Pamela
15 Davis-Drake who is our Chief Investigator seated
16 in the front; Mr. Robert Brown, our office
17 manager; Sgt. Alan Quinn who's recording our
18 proceedings and Mr. Dale Rose from Hanson Court
19 Reporting Service.

20 That completes the introductions,
21 ma'am.

22 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Is there a
23 minister from Second Ebenezer here to do the
24 prayer? If not, I'm going to ask Minister
25 Anthony Jones if he would give us a prayer, lead

1 us in prayer.

2 (INVOCATION WAS GIVEN.).

3 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Thank you. Is
4 there a representative from the church just to
5 address -- say a few words? Okay. We're happy
6 to be here at Second Ebenezer and just want to
7 thank Bishop Van and Director Goodner for their
8 hospitality as we wait for someone, a
9 representative from Second Ebenezer.

10 Okay, at this time while we're waiting
11 I'll have -- ask Commissioner Donnell White if he
12 would do the duties and responsibilities.

13 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, Madam
14 Chair. Let me say good evening to everyone. It
15 is indeed a pleasure to be here on the near east
16 side of the city and the home of Bishop Van who
17 has served this body and the city well as a
18 previous police commissioner. We're excited to
19 be here today.

20 The body of the police commissioners as
21 created by City Charter of July 1, 1974 has
22 evolved from its previous composition of a
23 five-member board appointed by the Mayor and
24 approved by the City Council to a 11-member body,
25 seven of whom shall be elected from each

1 non-at-large district and four members to be
2 appointed by the Mayor subject to the approval of
3 the City Council.

4 Appointed commissioners serve five-year
5 terms and may not serve more than five years
6 consecutively. Commissioners meet once a year
7 and may recess during Thanksgiving, Christmas and
8 New Year holidays.

9 All meetings are public and subject to
10 the Open Meetings Act. The responsibility of the
11 Board of Police Commissioners are to have
12 supervisory control and oversight of the police
13 department as set in the 2012 City Charter
14 adopted by a vote of the people on November 8,
15 2011. The duties of the body are to establish
16 policy, rules and regulations in consultation
17 with the Chief and the approval of the Mayor, to
18 review and approve department budget, to review
19 and approve department promotions, to receive and
20 resolve complaints concerning the operation of
21 the police department and to act as the final
22 authority in imposing or reviewing discipline of
23 employees of the department.

24 Also, to prepare an annual report to
25 the Mayor, the City Council and the public of the

1 department's activities during the previous year.
2 Its staff consists of a Board Secretary who
3 attends all board meetings, Mr. Anthony, a Chief
4 Investigator, Chief Pamela Davis-Drake, and
5 additional investigators and other staff as
6 necessary to provide support to the Board.

7 The Police Commission considers itself
8 a liaison between the citizens of the city of
9 Detroit and the Detroit Police Department.

10 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Do you have a
11 representative from Second Ebenezer? All right,
12 thank you.

13 At this time I'm going to ask Deputy
14 Chief LeValley, do you have a presentation to
15 make?

16 DEPUTY CHIEF LeVALLEY: Yes. As many
17 of you are aware, Chief Craig recently made a
18 number of executive and command level
19 appointments within the department so I want to
20 take a minute to introduce some of those members
21 that are present today.

22 First off Assistant Chief James E.
23 White seated to my right, Office of
24 Administration. I'm Deputy chief David LeValley,
25 Criminal Investigation Bureau.

1 Deputy Chief Lashinda Houser, Support
2 Services Bureau. Commander Daryl Brown, Patrol -
3 East. Commander Rene Hall, Downtown Services.
4 Commander Elvin Barren, Organized Crime. Captain
5 Darwin Roche, Chief Neighborhood Liaison.
6 Captain Steven Dolunt, 1st Precinct. Captain
7 Todd Bettison, 2nd Precinct. Captain Shawn
8 Gargalino, 7th Precinct. Captain John Serda,
9 11th Precinct and Captain Mark Blitz, Training.

10 I hope I didn't miss anybody.

11 (APPLAUSE.)

12 DEPUTY CHIEF LeVALLEY: Also I want to
13 give an unofficial report of crime statistics
14 for this year, again this is unofficial as of
15 now.

16 To date we stand at 258 homicides. At
17 this date in 2012 we were at 296, so we're at a
18 12.8 percent decrease.

19 To date we're at 982 non-fatal
20 shootings. 2012 we were at 986 for a .4 of a
21 percent decrease. And carjackings which have
22 been a big issue with the Chief and with the
23 police department to date we're at 596. 2012 we
24 were 561. We had an increase of 35 carjackings
25 over the last year.

1 With that I'd turn the mic over to
2 Capt. Bettison for a presentation.

3 CAPTAIN BETTISON: Capt. Bettison.
4 Good evening, Board, Deputy Chief LeValley,
5 colleagues and also the residents. Definitely
6 appreciate the great attendance to this evening's
7 board meeting. It's good to see everybody out.

8 I'm going to give an overview of the
9 Northeastern District and the Northeastern
10 District is comprised of the 11th and 7th
11 Precincts. The Northeastern District's actual
12 physical location is located at 5100 East Nevada
13 which encompasses approximately 28 square miles.
14 As I said, it's comprised of the 7th and 11th
15 Precincts.

16 I have been recently transferred, I
17 will be going over to the 2nd Precinct. The new
18 captains of the 11th Precinct, the captain of the
19 11th Precinct is John Serda. The captain of the
20 7th Precinct is Shawn Gargalino. Both are
21 excellent crime fighters, community oriented and
22 will definitely -- with me leaving I'm leaving
23 you in great hands.

24 The 11th Precinct is commonly referred
25 to as the northern end of the district and the

1 7th Precinct is known at the south end. The
2 precincts are separated primarily by the
3 Hamtramck city border.

4 The boundaries of the 11th Precinct are
5 as follows. To the north East Eight Mile Road at
6 Woodward Avenue, to the east East Eight Mile Road
7 at Hoover, east border Hoover at East Eight Mile
8 Road to Conner Road to French. South border,
9 Lynch Road to Carpenter Avenue bordering the city
10 of Hamtramck, west I-75 Freeway to East McNichols
11 to Woodward at East Eight Mile Road.

12 The boundaries for the 7th Precinct are
13 to the north Traverse and Miller Street are the
14 northern border. East border, McClellan Street
15 up to Conner Road, south Detroit River I-75 to
16 McClellan and west which is Chrysler Freeway
17 I-75. Van Dyke Road is the main thoroughfare
18 through both precincts from South Jefferson up to
19 Eight Mile Road.

20 The goals and initiatives, our goals in
21 the Northeastern District, increased community
22 partnerships, improve the response time, patrol
23 units to be more proactive, continue to develop
24 and implement plans to increase the patrol
25 visibility and reduce crime.

1 This summer we had our Harbormaster
2 summer detail and the East Jefferson Avenue
3 Corridor traffic initiatives. During weekend
4 nights large groups of youth and adults would
5 loiter at Belle Isle Park and other parks of the
6 -- local parks south of East Jefferson.

7 The streets sometimes would become
8 clogged causing a disruption to businesses in the
9 area primarily during the summer months. What we
10 did was initiate traffic details with the
11 assistance of other outside entities within the
12 department, Homeland Security, our Traffic
13 Enforcement units, to increase the visibility and
14 enforcement along the Jefferson corridor, so
15 that's when you would see the extra extra
16 beefed-up patrols along Jefferson Avenue which
17 also contributed to a decrease in our larcenies
18 in that area.

19 Along the Jefferson corridor area we
20 experienced larcenies from motor vehicles quite a
21 bit, but that has helped deter that in the area.

22 The 7th Precinct, I'm going to talk a
23 little bit about crime trends and I'm going to
24 break it down by precinct. The 7th Precinct's
25 homicides are up approximately 13.3 percent for

1 the year with a total of zero for the week and 17
2 total for the year.

3 Shootings are up 3.4 percent for the
4 year with a total of seven shootings for the week
5 and 60 for the year. Sexual assaults are down
6 11.9 percent from the previous years with one
7 assault in the last week and a total of 37 sexual
8 assaults year to date.

9 Robberies are up 7.1 percent for the
10 year with a total of five robberies for the week
11 and 270 for the year. Aggravated assaults are
12 down 5.2 percent with the total of 11 aggravated
13 assaults for the week and 402 for the year, and
14 assaults overall are down 11.1 percent with the
15 total of 17 assaults for the week and 792 for the
16 year.

17 Burglaries are down .6 percent with a
18 total of one burglary -- 21 burglaries for the
19 week and 469 for the year. Larcenies are up 5.3
20 percent. Arsons are down 40 percent with no
21 arsons for the week and a total of 22 for the
22 year. And weapon offenses in the 7th Precinct
23 are down 2.6 percent.

24 Overall crime in the 7th Precinct is
25 down 2 percent. The 11 Precinct, homicides are

1 down 50 percent for the year, zero for the week
2 and 17 for the year. Total shootings are down 3
3 percent. Sexual assaults in the 11 Precinct are
4 down 3.3 percent, robberies are up .9 percent, so
5 not 1 percent.

6 Aggravated assaults are down 11
7 percent, assaults are down 3.9 percent.
8 Burglaries are down 25 percent in the 11
9 Precinct. Larcenies are up 18.7 percent. Stolen
10 vehicles 6.9 percent. Arsons are down 8.7
11 percent. Weapons offenses are down 3.9 percent.
12 Overall crime is down 3.5 percent in the 11th
13 Precinct.

14 So we're trending in the right
15 direction. Are we there yet, absolutely not. Do
16 we have initiatives in place to reduce the crime
17 further, we absolutely do. Are we making
18 significant arrests, we absolutely are. And
19 right now we have two officers in the audience
20 from the Northeastern District that we want to
21 honor for the good work that they've done. Their
22 families are here as well.

23 And what I'll do at this particular
24 point in time is just read you some of the great
25 work that our officers are doing so that you

1 understand that we are doing great stuff out
2 there.

3 And they will receive commendations
4 from Deputy Chief LeValley as well on behalf of
5 Chief James E. Craig.

6 On September 9, 2013 at approximately 8
7 AM on-duty Wayne County Sheriff Deputy Harrison
8 Tolliver was working in his official capacity at
9 Frank Murphy Hall of Justice. Deputy Tolliver
10 was attempting to escort Wayne County inmate
11 Abraham Pierson to a courtroom for a hearing
12 when he was attacked by Inmate Pierson. Pierson
13 beat and stabbed Deputy Tolliver in the neck with
14 a comb that was sharpened and fashioned as a
15 knife. Inmate Pierson removed Deputy Tolliver's
16 Wayne County deputy uniform and put it on.

17 Mr. Pierson then exited the Frank
18 Murphy Hall of Justice and ran to Beaubien and
19 Macomb where he carjacked a citizen of her
20 vehicle, a white 2000 Plymouth minivan and fled
21 the area.

22 Abraham Pierson became involved in a
23 vehicle accident at Concord and Lafayette, then
24 exited the vehicle and fled the scene on foot.

25 A search of the area netted negative

1 results. On September 9, 2013 at approximately
2 10 PM Police Officers Derrick Keasley and Darius
3 Shepherd, both assigned as Scout 7-30 in uniform
4 and operating a marked patrol vehicle, responded
5 to a police run to I-94 and Mt. Elliott regarding
6 a man flagging down cars asking for a ride to the
7 west side.

8 Officers Keasley and Shepherd responded
9 to the above location and observed a black male
10 fitting the physical description of Abraham
11 Pierson. As the officers exited their patrol
12 unit to investigate the male took off running
13 eastbound on I-94 service drive. Officer Keasley
14 chased the subject, apprehended him. The
15 officers observed the male was in fact Abraham
16 Pierson and they placed him under arrest.

17 Abraham Pierson was conveyed to the
18 Wayne County Sheriff's Office without incident
19 for processing. Wayne County Sheriff submitted a
20 warrant to the Wayne County Prosecutor for
21 review. The warrant was signed and the following
22 charges were initiated.

23 Count 1, assault with intent to murder;
24 Count 2, obstruction of justice; Count 3, robbery
25 armed; Count 4, carjacking; Count 5 police

1 officer assaulting and resisting; Count 6 assault
2 of prison employee; Count 7 unlawful
3 imprisonment; Count 8, escape from jail through
4 violence; Count 9, impersonating peace officer to
5 commit a crime; Count 10, dangerous weapons
6 carried with unlawful intent, jail possession of
7 weapon in jail.

8 For their display of dedication,
9 courage, knowledge culminating in the
10 apprehension of an escaped fugitive from the
11 streets of the city of Detroit I recommend and
12 the Chief did approve Officer Keasley and
13 Shepherd to be recognized for their meritorious
14 actions.

15 (APPLAUSE.)

16 CAPTAIN BETTISON: I want to also at
17 this particular point talk about some of the
18 crime prevention initiatives in the Northeastern
19 District and I promise to be brief.

20 Operation Safe Passage, we conduct that
21 in the Northeastern District, 7th Precinct, 11th
22 Precinct as well as throughout the city of
23 Detroit. Safe Passage is where we have officers
24 out early morning along school routes with
25 children as they traverse to school to ensure

1 that they're safe, our children are safe.

2 Our Community Relations officers are
3 out there, our Traffic officers are out there in
4 the early morning hours. Also, another thing
5 that we do that's a little unique at the
6 Northeastern District is our inside personnel,
7 the staffs. You've heard the Chief speak many
8 times about getting more officers out on the
9 street, doing more with less. We've heard about
10 the civilianization of the police department,
11 things that we're moving towards.

12 That takes time, but in the interim one
13 of the things that we do is my clerk, my staff,
14 the people that assist me on the inside -- and
15 let me give credit to Commander McKissic who
16 just recently retired. He came up with this
17 program. I've only been at the district for
18 approximately one month, but with this program we
19 actually take our officers from the inside
20 positions at least one day a week and put them
21 outside and they actually go out to the
22 neighborhoods and do enforcement actions.

23 Let me speak to some of the results
24 that my folks, my inside folks, are doing.
25 Within the past month they got one felony arrest,

1 50 tickets and I know that for the community one
2 of the Number 1 complaints that I hear from my
3 community is traffic, nobody is out there
4 enforcing the traffic laws.

5 So this is another enforcement effort
6 that we're doing on top of other things to
7 enforce that. 150 tickets and they actually
8 impounded 50 vehicles which is significant
9 because when the folks don't have a license,
10 we're not just going to give them a ticket, we're
11 going to take their cars as well.

12 Commander McKissic used to always say,
13 "Take the horse from the cowboy."

14 (APPLAUSE.)

15 CAPTAIN BETTISON: Also another thing
16 that is a department-wide initiative and I have
17 to thank my colleagues and everybody else is we
18 deploy resources within the department based off
19 data, based off of looking at maps. It has to be
20 data driven where is the hot spots within the
21 city.

22 So when we experience spikes in the
23 Northeastern District I'm able to reach out and
24 we're able to have colleagues send different
25 resources from all around the department to

1 address the crimes in the neighborhood at the
2 Northeastern District.

3 So just the past couple of weekends we
4 had the department-wide strike force come to the
5 Northeastern District and the strike force
6 statistics for October 4 which was Friday, the
7 crews actually seized four handguns and they
8 actually put four people in jail for carrying
9 those weapons. 5.8 grams of cocaine with a
10 street value of \$2,300 was taken. 101 grams of
11 marijuana was seized, \$167 forfeited along with
12 one vehicle and also as far as some of our
13 problem nightclubs or bars, etc, that are not in
14 full compliance with Michigan State liquor
15 control laws, we do inspections of those
16 establishments as well.

17 There were six inspections conducted on
18 Friday, this last Friday, with four write-ups for
19 various violations. On October 5, that Saturday,
20 there was 12 grams of cocaine seized along with
21 an arrest, 15 grams of heroin taken off the
22 street, 88 grams of marijuana and one MLCC
23 inspection was conducted and a write-up was done
24 there as well.

25 Another thing that we do to ensure the

1 safety of the community working along with MDOC
2 is home checks for the folks that are on
3 probation or parole, they have certain
4 conditions. So the DPD along the MDOC, Michigan
5 Department of Corrections, we're actually
6 conducting those home checks to make sure that
7 they are in compliance and that if they're not
8 supposed to be out past a certain period of time
9 they're violating their parole or probation that
10 we're actually locking them up.

11 Last month we conducted 83 home visits
12 and out of that three folks were violated for
13 probation and taken into custody. We also offer
14 home security surveys for our residents and our
15 business owners that have been victims of
16 burglaries.

17 That's something that our Community
18 Relations does. Sgt. Spruce which is over there
19 making sure that everybody had something nice to
20 eat, his crew actually does that, and as I close
21 out ensure that I introduce my Community
22 Relations staff.

23 Another thing that the Northeastern
24 District oversees at this particular point is the
25 Detroit Detention Center and we're consolidating

1 -- the City of Detroit is consolidating all their
2 jail functions so we won't be in the business of
3 having cell blocks at our precinct level, so that
4 will be taken over by the former Mound facility
5 which is now called the Detroit Detection
6 Facility.

7 That opened on August 5 and all
8 operations are going well thus far, and at the
9 end of the meeting if anybody has further
10 questions regarding that, I do have Lt. Lee here
11 and he will be prepared to answer any questions
12 about the DDC because he is the officer in charge
13 of that operation.

14 Business and development, the new
15 Gateway Shopping Complex located at Eight Mile
16 and Woodward within our district. When you visit
17 that site, that facility, you will always see a
18 Detroit marked scout car at that location. I
19 just want to let the residents in the community
20 know that that's manned or those officers are
21 being funded through our Secondary Employment
22 Program so it's not taking any resources from
23 your neighborhoods.

24 So when you see the officers there,
25 they're being paid by the actual business

1 establishment, not taken from your neighborhood.

2 I'm going to close with talking about
3 some of our upcoming community events and
4 programs. We're very community oriented and this
5 month we're going to have the Nevada House of
6 Horrors. It is housed and will be open each
7 weekend -- it will be open on the weekend from
8 October 25 through the 31st. Last year over 500
9 people attended our House of Horrors, so it helps
10 keep kids off the street, gives them something to
11 do during the Halloween weekend.

12 November we're going to have a
13 Veteran's Day luncheon which will be held on
14 November 11th. Last year over 250 people
15 participated. On November 24, 2013 we're going
16 to have our turkey bingo event. Seniors can play
17 bingo throughout the day for prizes and at the
18 end of the day everyone leaves with a turkey.

19 Last year approximately 200 seniors
20 attended at the Northeast District. That's going
21 to be November 24th.

22 In December we have our Goodfellow
23 packages that will be distributed throughout the
24 month of December. Last year the Northeast
25 District actually distributed 9,500 packages. In

1 February we're going to have our senior
2 Valentine's Day dance and luncheon. Last year
3 over 100 seniors attended. That date is to be
4 determined.

5 And in conclusion it is my hope that
6 this report gives the Board of Police
7 Commissioners and the citizens of the
8 Northeastern District a brief synopsis of the
9 mission and directives as mandated by Chief James
10 E. Craig. The members assigned to the
11 Northeastern District are dedicated and committed
12 to providing safety and stability to the
13 community. Thank you.

14 (APPLAUSE.)

15 COMMISSIONER WHITE: No specific
16 questions, Commander, only to say thank you for
17 your service to the Northeastern District as you
18 transition on and thank you to all the men and
19 women who do an outstanding job there.

20 CAPTAIN BETTISON: Thank you, sir.

21 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: For the record I
22 just want to let you know that we don't have a
23 quorum so we won't be approving any agendas or
24 minutes. And I understand that there's someone
25 -- I'm sorry, sir?

1 CAPT. BETTISON: Any questions?

2 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: No questions.

3 CAPT. BETTISON: Not a problem, ma'am,
4 thank you.

5 DEPUTY CHIEF LeVALLEY: I have one more
6 thing just for the Chief's report. I just want
7 to take a moment to acknowledge -- I know it's on
8 the agenda later on, but I want to take a moment
9 to acknowledge Deputy Chief James Tolbert who's
10 in the room as well.

11 (APPLAUSE.)

12 DEPUTY CHIEF LeVALLEY: That concludes
13 the Chief's report.

14 COMMISSIONER WHITE: DC LeValley, I did
15 have one question. As relates to the NIPIT
16 program and the Burglary Task Force, are both of
17 those operations still in effect?

18 DEPUTY CHIEF LeVALLEY: NIPIT is not in
19 effect. We have an operation that followed that
20 up when we stopped the NIPIT earlier this year.
21 That would be this weekend strike force that
22 Capt. Bettison referred to that spent some time
23 in Northeast District over the last few weekends.
24 We replaced NIPIT with that.

25 Burglary Task Force, that is a constant

1 ongoing operation.

2 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you.

3 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: I understood
4 there's someone in the room from Second Ebenezer
5 that wanted to -- oh, yes, ma'am, come on up.

6 MS. GOODNER: Good evening, everyone.
7 I just wanted to greet everyone and just say
8 welcome. Our home is your home and our bishop is
9 away at this time. He had a preaching engagement
10 in Kalamazoo, but he wanted to definitely extend
11 his heart-felt welcome as well as to let you know
12 anything you need from the Second Ebenezer Church
13 or him, he has served as commissioner in the
14 past, he wanted you to know his heart is still
15 with the embodiment of your mission and so
16 anything that you need from this house, let us
17 know. This was built for you, this was built for
18 this type of event. This was built to help the
19 community. Whatever we can do to assist you, so
20 we thank you.

21 I want to applaud and thank everyone
22 who serves daily for our protection and our
23 safety. We thank you for what you do, not just
24 personally but collectively as a body of people
25 in the community of Detroit.

1 So thank you so much, bless you.

2 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Thank you.

3 MS. GOODNER: My name for the record
4 is ambassador for Bishop Edgar Van, but Tabitha
5 Goodner, birth name.

6 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: We have two
7 resolutions tonight, one honoring retiring Deputy
8 Chief James Tolbert and also one honoring
9 Mr. Jim green.

10 Commissioner.

11 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Our first
12 resolution will be honoring Mr. Jim Green, Jr.
13 Is Mr. Green present? Please join us.

14 (APPLAUSE.)

15 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Commissioners,
16 before me is a resolution honoring Mr. Jim Green,
17 Jr.

18 WHEREAS, Mr. Jim Green, Jr has worked
19 in the Northeastern District for the past 28
20 years and was born in the city of Detroit.
21 Mr. Green is a stand up citizen and active member
22 in his community and

23 WHEREAS, Mr. Green is currently
24 employed by the Milton Manufacturing Company as
25 the president and CEO after taking over the

1 business from his father in 2003. The Milton
2 Manufacturing Company is located on E. Grixdale
3 Avenue in the Northeastern District. Milton
4 Manufacturing Company encompasses more than
5 300,000 square feet and is a state-of-the-art
6 manufacturing, engineering and assembly facility
7 after renovations in 2012.

8 The company provides products and
9 solutions to the defense, automotive, aerospace,
10 heavy truck, rail, agricultural and energy
11 industries and

12 WHEREAS, Milton Manufacturing through
13 the State of Michigan's Adopt-A-Highway Program
14 recently adopted a portion of I-75 on Detroit's
15 northeast side to beautify and maintain and

16 WHEREAS, Mr. Green serves in many
17 capacities. He is an Eagle Scout and a Boy Scout
18 leader. His community involvement includes the
19 John R. Community Group, the Emmanuel Church, the
20 Northeastern District Adopt-A-Family Program,
21 supporter of the Belle Isle Greenhouse, the 4H
22 Club of America, Detroit Public School Partner,
23 Golightly School Agriculture and Welding Program
24 and Northeastern District's B.U.O.Y.
25 organization.

1 Mr. Green is also an active member of
2 First Presbyterian Church when he volunteers his
3 time and talents and

4 WHEREAS, as a member of the
5 Northeastern District community Mr. Green has
6 participated in community service activities such
7 at the National Night Out, the Annual Easter Egg
8 Hunt, very important, and Senior Turkey Bingo.
9 Together with his family and the Milton
10 Manufacturing employees and other volunteers
11 Mr. Green helps maintain several community
12 gardens in the neighborhood. The produce from
13 these gardens is free to the community and

14 WHEREAS, Mr. Green has proven through
15 his actions that he remains a dedicated and
16 committed supporter of the city of Detroit and
17 the Northeastern District. His commitment to
18 business, service and leadership is exemplified
19 through the entire district.

20 NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the
21 Detroit Board of Police Commissioners speaking on
22 behalf of the Detroit Police Department and the
23 citizens of Detroit recognize and honor the
24 community spirit of Mr. Jim Green, Jr. His
25 highly displayed commitment to community service

1 merits our highest regard.

2 We thank and congratulate you, Mr. Jim
3 Green, Jr, signed the Detroit Board of Police
4 Commissioners, adopted this day October 10, 2013.

5 Let us congratulate Mr. Jim Green, Jr.
6 (APPLAUSE.)

7 DEPUTY CHIEF LeVALLEY: Again for
8 Mr. Jim Green, Jr. This is a Certificate of
9 Recognition from the Detroit Police Department.

10 In appreciation of the following
11 outstanding service and cooperation. For your
12 years of community involvement and service to the
13 city of Detroit supporting our efforts in the
14 community demonstrates spirit and commitment that
15 is truly worthy of recognition.

16 Signed by Chief Craig.
17 (APPLAUSE.)

18 DEPUTY CHIEF LeVALLEY: Also for
19 Mr. Jim Green, a Spirit of Detroit Award. In
20 recognition of exceptional achievement,
21 outstanding leadership and dedication to
22 improving the quality of life by the City Council
23 of Detroit, Michigan signed by all council
24 members dated October 10, 2013.

25 (APPLAUSE).

1 MR. GREEN: This part wasn't planned,
2 but certainly all of us when we leave this area,
3 we're from Farmington, we're from Troy, we're
4 from Southfield, we're from Detroit. When we go
5 anywhere, we're all from Detroit, so that's the
6 cool part. I think the city is at a critical
7 juncture where it's whatever we want to make it.

8 We're at that point where the people
9 that want to make it something can make it
10 something, so that's to me the most important
11 part about what's happening right now, so thank
12 you very much for recognizing. Come and pick
13 some tomatoes. The weeds kind of took over this
14 year, but the cows are still there and the
15 chickens, so come and help yourself and check us
16 out. We're at Seven Mile and I-75 southwest
17 corner, right?

18 Very good, Galactic Headquarters.
19 Thank you very much.

20 (APPLAUSE.)

21 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Again, we thank
22 Mr. Green for his dedicated service and at this
23 time we have the pleasure of a resolution to
24 honor Deputy Chief James Tolbert.

25 (APPLAUSE.)

1 COMMISSIONER WHITE: And while we know
2 the official cake and coffee day isn't until
3 tomorrow and you know that is a big deal to get a
4 coffee and cake day at DPD, we did want to read
5 this in the community, Brother Tolbert, and I'm
6 going a little off script, but since my
7 involvement with the police department in 2010
8 there has been a recurrent theme throughout not
9 only the department, but the community and that
10 is of your character, your professionalism has
11 definitely held the bar of what it means to be a
12 Detroit Police Department command staff and
13 officer and we appreciate you for your leadership
14 in that capacity, and he's a good CAPPa man.
15 Doesn't say that in this here, but I'll go on the
16 record with that one.

17 Resolution honoring Deputy Chief James
18 W. Tolbert.

19 WHEREAS, James W. Tolbert was appointed
20 to the Detroit Police Department on January 6,
21 1986. Upon graduating from the Detroit
22 Metropolitan Police Academy he was assigned to
23 the 2nd Precinct. Additional assignments for
24 Officer Tolbert included the Narcotics Section
25 and 10th Precinct and

1 WHEREAS, Officer Tolbert showed
2 tremendous knowledge and dedication and was
3 appointed to the rank of sergeant on January 22,
4 1999. In this role Sgt. Tolbert was assigned as
5 the commanding officer of the Organized Crime
6 Unit. Tolbert was assigned as commanding officer
7 of the Organized Crime Unit on September 17,
8 2003. Sgt. Tolbert was promoted to the rank of
9 lieutenant where his assignments included the 9th
10 Precinct as officer in charge of the Special
11 Operations Unit and Homicide Section and

12 WHEREAS, Lt. Tolbert continued to
13 progress in his career and was promoted to the
14 rank of commander on September 1, 2005 where his
15 assignments included commanding officer of Major
16 Crimes as well as Organized Crimes and

17 WHEREAS, Commander Tolbert was
18 appointed to the rank of Deputy Chief on February
19 9, 2009 and was assigned to the Patrol Operations
20 Bureau where he remained until his retirement on
21 October 11, 2013, so we're not done with you yet.
22 You still got one more day.

23 WHEREAS, Deputy Chief Tolbert dutifully
24 served the citizens of Detroit for more than 27
25 years. During this time he was the deserving

1 recipient of one Medal and Citation of Valor,
2 Wound Metal and Citation Lifesaving Medal and
3 Citation, three Chief's Unit Awards, three
4 Chief's Merit Award, one Investigator of the
5 Month Award, one Departmental Citation, two
6 Department Commendations, six Perfect Attendance
7 Awards, Patrol Officer of the Month Award and
8 numerous letters of commendations from citizens
9 and superiors and

10 WHEREAS, Deputy Chief Tolbert has made
11 public service his life's mission and has
12 devotedly served the citizens of Detroit with
13 loyalty, professionalism and integrity. He is
14 highly respected throughout the law enforcement
15 community as the consummate professional.

16 NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the
17 Detroit Board of Police Commissioners speaking on
18 behalf of the citizens of the city of Detroit and
19 the Detroit Police Department recognize the
20 commitment and life's work of Deputy Chief James
21 W. Tolbert. Your commitment to public service
22 and improving the quality of life for the
23 citizens of the city of Detroit merits our
24 highest regards. His tireless efforts and
25 faithful public service merit our highest regards

1 and best wishes for continued success.

2 We thank you for your leadership and
3 congratulate you, Deputy Chief James W. Tolbert,
4 signed the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners
5 adopted this day October 10, 2013.

6 (APPLAUSE).

7 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Commissioner
8 White, did we mention that he is the new chief of
9 Flint?

10 DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: Good evening,
11 obviously I've just been told I better introduce
12 my wife, my beautiful wife Natasha.

13 (APPLAUSE.)

14 DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: She found out I
15 was leaving and she kicked me so hard she broke
16 her foot so -- but in 27 years I have to say it's
17 been a pleasure. They say if you love what you
18 do you never work a day in your life and I need
19 to tell you I never worked a day in my life. I
20 love what I did here in the city of Detroit.

21 (APPLAUSE.)

22 DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: Throughout my
23 27-year career I have learned the importance of
24 being a good supervisor, knowing your people, but
25 more importantly knowing the community.

1 In my new job -- for those who don't
2 know Monday I will be taking the job as the Chief
3 of Police for the City of Flint.

4 (APPLAUSE.)

5 DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: If you been
6 reading the paper you know Flint has got a little
7 problem. However, if the community in Flint is
8 half as engaged, business community, the actual
9 community, is half as engaged as you are here in
10 the city of Detroit my job is going to be easy,
11 my job is going to be easy.

12 I think over the past few years what
13 I've done in listening to you and talking to you
14 I've learned that all you have to do is have the
15 community behind you. All you have to do is get
16 some information. All you have to do is listen,
17 be an active listener and know what the problems
18 are and address those issues and if you can
19 address those issues the community will be behind
20 you, you'll be one with the community and you can
21 address the issues of the community and lower
22 crime.

23 I thank you for the experience you've
24 given me. I'm humbled to have served with you,
25 I'm humbled to serve with these fine officers.

1 These fine officers and many of these officers
2 here, the people that have been promoted, they
3 have a new breed of executive officers. I've
4 worked with many of them and most of them and I
5 can tell you that you have a great executive team
6 going forward, and I look for great things from
7 Detroit.

8 And understand this. The things I
9 learned here, guess where I'm taking them. So
10 when you hear they doing something up in Flint,
11 you're going to probably say, "Oh, we do that
12 already." Well, I got it from you guys.

13 So I thank you very much. I love you
14 all. If you ever up and around in Flint, ever
15 need anything, still the same. My number is
16 going to be the same, just give me a call.

17 But thank you, God bless you and keep
18 you all safe.

19 (APPLAUSE.)

20 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: I'd like to
21 acknowledge Wayne County Commissioner Jewell
22 Ware, is she still here?

23 (APPLAUSE.)

24 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: And also some
25 good friends of mine from the Chance at Life

1 Organization.

2 (APPLAUSE.)

3 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Our next meeting
4 will be Thursday, October 17 at 3 o'clock at
5 Detroit Public Safety Headquarters and that's at
6 1301 Third Avenue in the Media Room and now we'll
7 move to the oral communications from the
8 audience.

9 I'll ask you to abide by the two-minute
10 rule and come forward with any communications
11 that you have. State your name.

12 MR. COLEMAN: Thank you, Madam
13 Chairwoman, Commissioner White, Administrative
14 staff, brass and community. I'm Ken Coleman,
15 pleasure to be with you again, former Charter
16 Revision Commission member.

17 And I have at the table and certainly
18 have provided to Mr. Anthony to each of the Board
19 members, Commission members, an invitation to
20 attend a candidate forum. As Commissioner White,
21 you pointed out in the opening the composition of
22 the police commission will change dramatically
23 beginning in January.

24 The membership will expand to include
25 seven members elected by district. We believe --

1 several people in the community believe that
2 there needs to be an opportunity for the
3 community to hear from prospective members,
4 candidates, commission members, and that
5 opportunity is on Wednesday, October 23 at 7 PM,
6 from 7 to 8 PM exactly at Historic Little Rock
7 Baptist Church. Of course that is the church led
8 by the Reverend Jim Holly, it is located at 9000
9 Woodward Avenue in Detroit.

10 Again, a candidate forum for police
11 commission candidates, not mayoral or City
12 Council candidates. We believe that those
13 offices are important, but we really believe that
14 the Police Commission is important too. We
15 wanted to provide a forum for community people to
16 hear from them. Flyers are at the table. I
17 wanted to lift it up for the record today and
18 certainly invite each of the members to be in
19 attendance if your schedule permits.

20 Thank you so much.

21 (APPLAUSE.)

22 MS. BURCH: Good afternoon, Board. My
23 name is Shirley Burch. First of all, I'm a
24 resident of Detroit for over 50 years. I have
25 resided in Number 11 for those years. Most of

1 the officers that you see -- that I see in this
2 room I know personally.

3 We, when -- while I'm speaking to you I
4 want you to understand that I represent this
5 great city. I represent it because I know there
6 is hope and we have built a relationship with
7 businesses. The only way Detroit is going to
8 come back is through your neighborhood, your
9 churches, your schools, your businesses, most of
10 all God.

11 I want you to understand that I
12 represent the Belmont Shopping Center, Imperial
13 Supermarket and other independent stores. We
14 adopted a park called Dad Butler together, so we
15 have built a relationship with Number 11 by
16 Mr. Petsold taking the courage and the love he
17 has for this city, he put up a police mini
18 station. That mini station is for the community,
19 Board of Commissioners. It is not for us -- for
20 police officers to sit, which they don't. They
21 know I love them. When I call them, they answer
22 but that should be for everybody because all of
23 us are important.

24 I'm here because I have a flyer from
25 Officer Black and now I've spoken first to our

1 new Chief of Police. He seemed to be the kind of
2 man with no nonsense. It's time for Detroiters
3 to say enough is enough. We are a part of the
4 group that's going to go speak to gas station
5 owners that raise your standards like they're all
6 over the city out of Detroit that they clean up,
7 so when you go to a gas station that's well lit,
8 beautifully clean, don't you feel better?

9 So I'm asking you that question. Why
10 shouldn't that happen in Detroit. So when I give
11 you this flyer tomorrow will be our first day of
12 residents going out into the Northeast District
13 and we're going to share friendly with these
14 owners that you're here, we want you to treat us
15 with love like we treat you.

16 We are not going there as bold and
17 intimidating them, but just let them know we want
18 you to bring your standards up to make our city
19 beautiful and make it safe for our women and men
20 to pump gas without being threatened. So I want
21 to thank you, but I'm only here for the people in
22 this room to get together, unite together. We
23 can do nothing separate. There's nothing, no big
24 I, no little you.

25 So Captain Roche is here. We now have

1 a new Captain Serda and, Commissioners, I want
2 you to know sometimes we've had so many changes
3 of command we don't know from day to day who's
4 the next person to talk to.

5 But remember this. We stay in our
6 homes and we're not going to get up and move as
7 you all change commands every other month. Do
8 you understand what I'm saying? So please I want
9 you to look at this, everybody in this room, I
10 want you to join it. It is not by Mrs. Burge, it
11 is about your own spirit; thank you.

12 (APPLAUSE.)

13 MS. McCANTS: Good afternoon to the
14 Board. My name for the record is Yolanda McCants
15 and I'm a community person from the Northeastern
16 District. I'm here this afternoon or this
17 evening inviting everyone in this room to bring
18 your kids, your grandkids, bring yourself mainly
19 over to our House of Horrors that we have every
20 year. I have some young ladies that worked with
21 me who are in the community who are very shy so
22 they don't come to our meetings, so -- but they
23 do help me with the Haunted House so I'm asking
24 for all of the participation of everyone in this
25 room. Some of you have visited, you come early

1 so you won't be scared and we take them through
2 so we're asking everyone to -- if you could just
3 come by and visit us on that evening. We do it
4 two weekends.

5 Capt. Bettison is now leaving us and
6 it's just, you know, we just -- I guess it's in
7 an uproar because we start and then we got to
8 kind of groom the other person of exactly what
9 we're doing over there. So I'm just asking that
10 the people in this room, the price for the
11 Haunted House is \$3 and we use the funds for that
12 to help out with events throughout the year all
13 the different events that we have.

14 So we're asking everyone to come out
15 and see us and what we do as the community and us
16 trying to work together. Sometimes it's a little
17 rough, but we manage, so I'm looking for all of
18 you in this room to pay us a visit; thank you.

19 (APPLAUSE.)

20 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Thank you.

21 MS. JACKSON: Good evening, Board. Kim
22 Jackson, president of Northeastern District
23 Police Community Relations and I just want to say
24 I wish you the best, Capt. Bettison. Thank you.
25 You only were there a month, but you made a big

1 difference. I mean I've gotten e-mails saying
2 how people are just grateful the information you
3 guys give us, I thank you for that.

4 I thank retired Commander McKissic
5 for the information and the dedication that he
6 has also given to the Northeastern District. I
7 just want to say welcome to everybody this
8 evening. Thank you for coming out. We
9 appreciate you. We're going to stick together as
10 a group, as a community, and we're going to try
11 the best and do the best we can to keep moving
12 forward.

13 But we just need a little bit of
14 stability and I'm hoping that's what the Chief
15 will give us is some stability so that once we
16 try to get things going up and running, we don't
17 have to go through the same jumping the hoops all
18 over again.

19 So I just want to say thank you, thank
20 you and I wish you the best.

21 (APPLAUSE.)

22 MR. SCOTT: I want to thank Ms. Pannell
23 for letting me go first.

24 Ron Scott, Coalition Against Police
25 Brutality, Peace Zones for Life. I want to say

1 this is a very significant time in the history of
2 the Police Commission and also city of Detroit.

3 Yesterday I turned my eyes on the
4 computer to Executive Order Number 10 which
5 essentially codifies under the Emergency Manager
6 the diminishment of many of the functions that
7 the Police Commission has.

8 We've had one hearing on that. I think
9 we should have some more. As one who has lived
10 in Detroit all my life, I'm very concerned about
11 the resurrection of democracy and also
12 transparency so I raise this question and I'm
13 just as positive as anyone else about the
14 potential for changes in the department, but in
15 the past we had an opportunity to glean the
16 reasons and the criteria for promotions,
17 demotions, transfers and so on.

18 I would be very comfortable if you
19 would provide -- saying to you -- provide to us
20 some of the reasoning behind the changes in the
21 department. That is the banner of democracy is
22 transparency. And so therefore I would
23 appreciate it both for this Board as it goes
24 forward and we as citizens.

25 And then finally I just want to say to

1 all of the people in this room, be vigilant about
2 the prospect of changes that occur in our Charter
3 and in our city. Once we relinquish it if we
4 don't fight for it we don't deserve it, so we
5 should fight to retain it.

6 (APPLAUSE.)

7 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Before you take
8 your seat, Mr. Scott, I first of all want to tell
9 you I appreciate the comments that you made. I
10 share a lot of the sentiments that you echoed. I
11 do think you will have some further conversations
12 going forward. I agree, the purpose of this body
13 being established was not only to be the voice of
14 the community, but to address some of those very
15 concerns that you have articulated.

16 Historically this body has been a voice
17 as relates to promotions, departmental changes in
18 policy and structure and I think as we move back
19 to our quorum at an upcoming meeting you'll hear
20 some motions that are being made to be
21 communicative of that with our new Chief's Office
22 and I do believe for the record it's Executive
23 Order 11.

24 MR. SCOTT: 11, I'm sorry, I said 10.

25 COMMISSIONER WHITE: And I'm glad to

1 see a Charter Commissioner here Ken Coleman
2 because I do believe with the voice of the
3 citizens of the city of Detroit through the
4 revision of our recent Charter not diminishing
5 the powers of this body, but in essence cementing
6 those powers of this body that the voice was
7 clear, so absent the Emergency Manager's role I
8 do believe that this department would be well
9 served in adhering to the Charter as relates to
10 the powers of this body, not for the benefit of
11 this body, but to ensure that the citizens have a
12 voice in the process.

13 And not to say that I disagree with any
14 of the promotions that have been made or any of
15 the restructuring that is occurring, but part of
16 the reason why we have an open meeting subject to
17 the Open Meetings Act is so that people of good
18 faith, concerned citizen, have a voice in that
19 process.

20 And I think again, back to your point,
21 is what we seek to address in some dialog with
22 collaboration with the Chief and so you'll hear
23 more about that going forward.

24 MR. SCOTT: And if I may add in
25 conclusion I think for the officers and the

1 personnel of this department the officers and
2 command staff, this body is also important in
3 their lives in relationship to the administrative
4 law functions where they feel above and beyond
5 union membership and all that they have a need to
6 come before this body to ameliorate if you choose
7 -- and Commissioner Taylor would know what I mean
8 -- to engage in conflict resolution and mediation
9 that they have in the past had the ability to do
10 that.

11 And currently that does not exist and I
12 think that you can have a promotion, but you also
13 need -- if you need to come in and talk about
14 some difficulties you need to actually have an
15 objective body where you can bring that.

16 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Thank you.

17 MS. PANSELL: Good evening, Sharon
18 Pannell from 2nd Precinct. I'm also with the
19 Detroit Police Citizens Academy. My problem is
20 when they implement different programs in the
21 city like NIPIT and mini stations, the west side
22 always get left out.

23 By the time it get to the west side
24 they done changed it up to something else. That
25 was the thing I had with the Chief Saturday at

1 the call to action meeting because when they
2 started the NIPIT program I asked the former
3 Chief, he said, "It's over, the schools just
4 started, we're not having that no more."

5 Well, it's always on the east side, but
6 we don't never come across Woodward over to the
7 west side. I don't think it's fair because we
8 are citizens and taxpayers too.

9 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Hold on. Deputy
10 Chief?

11 DEPUTY CHIEF LeVALLEY: Yes. Those
12 operations, we move those throughout the city --
13 I won't say equally, but they focus on hot spot
14 area and areas where there's crimes that need to
15 be addressed, but the 2nd Precinct was part of
16 that Operation NIPIT for several different
17 weekends throughout the operation, throughout the
18 entire summer. It moved to various areas
19 throughout the city. Each precinct had weekends
20 that were dedicated to those precincts.

21 MS. PANNELL: I questioned him about
22 the mini station, okay. Butzel is horrible.
23 Take a drive by over there. The doors don't
24 open, they have not opened the mini station over
25 there. They wanted us to volunteer. Can't

1 volunteer if nothing is open.

2 DEPUTY CHIEF LeVALLEY: Right, I agree.

3 MS. PANSELL: But then when we don't
4 try to do things to help out, you know, we're the
5 ones that are trying to help bring the city back.

6 DEPUTY CHIEF LeVALLEY: Right, I agree.
7 The issue with the mini stations, we can't --
8 we're not in a position where we can have a
9 police officer sitting in the mini station all
10 day.

11 MS. PANSELL: I understand that.

12 DEPUTY CHIEF LeVALLEY: The physical
13 condition of the mini station, I'll have to look
14 at that and get you an answer.

15 MS. PANSELL: I even talked to the guy
16 from the rec center program, he was there
17 Saturday and I told him the situation over there,
18 but we just want to help out, you know.

19 DEPUTY CHIEF LeVALLEY: Correct and we
20 appreciate that and I'll get with you right after
21 the meeting and we'll talk about that mini
22 station.

23 MS. PANSELL: Thank you.

24 MR. WELBORN: Good evening to the
25 Board, Assistant Chief, officers from 7 and 11.

1 My name is Bill Welborn, president of Detroit
2 Citywide Police Community Relations Council.

3 What I would like to know is about a
4 year and a half ago under the tutorship of
5 Officer Evans we had a program instituted a safe
6 program for schools. We started with the Cody
7 complex and we had a safe zone program for the
8 school assistants inside this because the kids
9 were having problems going to school. They were
10 getting in fights, beat up or anything, whatever
11 it may be.

12 And I want to know if that program plus
13 the other program that the Chief was running, the
14 truancy program and the curfew program is still
15 in effect. She's been transferred now to another
16 section and I haven't heard anything about it
17 since and I'd like to know if that program is
18 still in effect.

19 DEPUTY CHIEF LeVALLEY: Which program?
20 Go ahead.

21 CAPT. ROCHE: Hi, good afternoon.
22 Capt. Roche, Community Liaison Office on behalf
23 of Chief Craig. The truancy program is in
24 effect. We plan on doing a sweep in the next
25 couple of weeks. We're working with the Eastern

1 District and other districts. We want to
2 identify some areas that we should be doing that
3 within the next couple of weeks.

4 Insofar as the Cody Rouge, that program
5 is also in place too. We're working on that and
6 we're addressing those issues that you stated.

7 MR. WELBORN: The reason I was asking
8 this, I was one of the guys on that board that
9 worked with the principal from Cody but I haven't
10 gotten any messages on that lately. People been
11 asking me about it, but I don't have anything to
12 tell them.

13 CAPT. ROCHE: Monica Evans works for me
14 right now, so I do know for a fact that she is
15 working on those programs. Cody Rouge is still
16 working in progress and also the truancy sweeps
17 are being conducted within the next couple of
18 weeks.

19 MR. WELBORN: Okay, thank you.

20 CAPT. ROCHE: You're welcome.

21 MS. SMITH: Good evening to the
22 Chairpersons and you, young man, I'm not familiar
23 with you. I don't even know who you are. What
24 is your name?

25 DEPUTY CHIEF LeVALLEY: My name is

1 David LeValley. I was a lieutenant on the
2 Detroit Police Department. I'm a 18-year
3 veteran. I was promoted last week to Deputy
4 Chief.

5 MS. SMITH: Oh, you were among the
6 table then, right?

7 DEPUTY CHIEF LeVALLEY: Right.

8 MS. SMITH: Well, congratulations.
9 Now, I'm sorry, Bernice Smith, political
10 activist. I was disappointed when I read in the
11 paper the other day about the Deputy Chief
12 leaving us. I was quite upset and I said when I
13 see him, I'm going to let him know that he
14 belonged to us and he should not be going to any
15 other city other than to Detroit because we need
16 all the good men that we can find.

17 But I think he has made up his mind and
18 if it's for him and his Mrs -- hi, baby, how are
19 you? I met her so I know her.

20 I'm going to miss him, I'm really and
21 truly going to miss him. I have been depending
22 on him sitting right here behind me on my right
23 every time I come to the podium and whatever
24 problems I had I would discuss it with him and I
25 either support him or I blame him for whatever

1 happens, so I'm going to miss him terribly and I
2 don't know how far Flint is, but if I got enough
3 gas in my car I'll come up and see how you doing.

4 In the meantime, congratulations to all
5 of my police officers. I am so proud of you I
6 don't know what to do.

7 (APPLAUSE).

8 MS. SMITH: That's why eventually I'm
9 going to sit at that table so I can help you out.
10 Especially I started praying for your hours so
11 you do -- you're going to get them down soon.
12 Next I'm going to pray for your increase in your
13 salary and get that back up both with the police
14 and the fire department. I talked with
15 Commissioner Austin about that already, so he
16 agrees with me.

17 But in the meantime your medical plans
18 should be also taken care of, so that's going to
19 be my fervent wish whenever I sit at that seat.
20 I'm going to fight for you because, you know, I
21 believe in what you're doing, I trust you, I have
22 a good relationship with all of you because I
23 tell you each time I see you be careful out there
24 in that street because I don't want nothing to
25 happen to none of you, but I want you to know you

1 are well loved, the public loves you and what
2 you're doing out here, putting your life on the
3 line, we do appreciate it -- at least I do.

4 I live in Midtown, so I'm pretty safe
5 down there, but the fact is a lot of you don't
6 live in the neighborhood where I am, so I do wish
7 to thank you for your efforts and for your
8 dedication to the city of Detroit because we
9 certainly appreciate it.

10 We had a day today that was very
11 unpleasant for all of us, but it had to happen.
12 I was down there and I listened to some of the
13 things that were going on and I did cry a little
14 bit because young men should not be in the
15 position that they're in when they have a little
16 power and they should take it with stride and not
17 let their ego overcome them.

18 And that means everybody that's here,
19 all you young policemen. Be good, stay out of
20 the cookie jar. Don't let nobody entice you to
21 do wrong. I mean that sincerely, I mean that.
22 I've been here a long time, so I can tell who's
23 going to do what and you, my dear Deputy Chief
24 former, you take care of yourself, be in good
25 health and spirit there and show those people

1 there in Flint what kind of policeman you are
2 going to be and a leader to them.
3 Congratulations.

4 I thank you so much for your time.
5 (APPLAUSE.)

6 MR. MUNIZ: Hello, Board and good
7 evening, ladies and gentlemen. I would like to
8 just -- my name is Rene Muniz. I'm the director
9 of the tournament of Greater Metropolitan Golden
10 Gloves. It is my pleasure to help amateur boxing
11 clubs all over the South Michigan and all over
12 Michigan and Ohio and Detroit and Canada.

13 It is my pleasure to help them and they
14 take the coaches and they take their time and
15 their resources to take the young people off the
16 streets which causes us all problems sometimes,
17 but that's what we do.

18 But I want to say that I could not do
19 what I do without the help of Mr. Jim Green, him
20 and Evans, they help us a lot. So I know, I
21 really know what he does. He does these things
22 but he also helps young men and women all over
23 the Southwestern Michigan and we appreciate that,
24 so I just want to thank him and I want to thank
25 everybody for your attention; thank you.

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(APPLAUSE.)

COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Are there any more communications, any more communication? If not, thank you and we'll see you next week.
