5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Good evening.

6 AUDIENCE: Good evening.

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I am going to call the
8 meeting to order. It is after 3:00. I know you are
9 here on time, so we are going to start within that
10 timeframe.

11 I am your Chair, Willie Bell, from District
12 4. I am serving as your Chair for one year. And I
13 just wanted to welcome you to this meeting here at
14 3:00. And I see some faces I am familiar with, and I
15 see some faces I am not familiar with. But I want to
16 extend a warm welcome to all of you for coming out, for
17 attending this meeting this evening. And I just want
18 to acknowledge that we appreciate you taking your time
19 out from your busy schedule.

20 At this time, I would like to ask our Board
21 Secretary, Mr. George Anthony, to introduce the Board
22 members.

23 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
24 For the record, George Anthony, Secretary to the Board.

25 This is a rollcall for Board members.

1 Commissioner Lisa Carter has contacted us and
2 she will be late for the meeting, but she is on route.

3 Commissioner Willie E. Burton?

4 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Present.

5 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner Wendell L.
6 Byrd has asked to be excused.

7 Commissioner Reginald Crawford has asked to
8 be excused.

9 Commissioner Ricardo R. Moore?

10 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Present.

11 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner Richard
12 Shelby?

13 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Present.

14 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner Jessica
15 Taylor has asked to be excused.

16 Commissioner Donnell R. White?

17 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Present.

18 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Mr. Chair, you have a
19 quorum of five commissioners.

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, sir.

21 We can move on to item 4, for the
22 introduction of the staff of the Board of Commissioners
23 at this time. We have someone from the Chief's staff
24 here present, so we move to item 4.

25 SECRETARY ANTHONY: We have present

1 Ms. Aliyah Sabree, our attorney to the Board. She is
2 seated to the right. Seated in front is Ms. Pamela
3 Davis-Drake, our Chief Investigator. Our recorders
4 today are Sergeant Alan Quinn, and Ms. Rhonda Foster
5 from Hanson Court Reporting Service. And that
6 completes the introductions, sir.

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, sir.

8 Before we move to agenda, I would appreciate
9 it if Commissioner Donnell R. White would render a
10 prayer for this meeting here.

11 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Certainly. Thank you.

12 If we could bow our heads, please.

13 Dear Heavenly Father, we ask that you bless
14 the gathering of this meeting, that you put this body
15 on one like mind, that we may serve not only this
16 Department, but your people in the City of Detroit. We
17 ask for a special hedge of protection around the men
18 and women who serve this great city, daily. Bless
19 those who are in route and bless those as we leave this
20 place. We ask all these things, in your mighty name do
21 we pray. Amen.

22 AUDIENCE: Amen.

23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, sir. I see
24 moving towards the table, we have Chief Craig's
25 Assistant Chief James White.

1 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: Good afternoon.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you for your
3 attendance.

4 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: Thank you.

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: At this time, would you
6 like to introduce any of your other staff or DPD
7 members?

8 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: Yes, starting over
9 here, I have got -- why is it, when you have to
10 introduce people, you forget people's you know name
11 immediately.

12 Captain Allen, Director Flemming from
13 Communications, Crystal Watkins from Communications.
14 And who did I miss? Well, we share her, Pamela Drake,
15 and I think I got everybody.

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, sir.
17 Appreciate that.

18 Moving right along, the next order of
19 business will be approving the agenda for this meeting
20 here on Thursday, October 2nd.

21 What is your pleasure?

22 COMMISSIONER WHITE: So moved.

23 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Second.

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Properly moved and
25 seconded.

1 Ready for the question, those in favor?

2 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those opposed?

4 Motion carried. The next item of business
5 will be approval of the minutes from Thursday,
6 September 25th, 2014.

7 What is your pleasure?

8 COMMISSIONER MOORE: So moved.

9 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Support.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Moved and supported, and
11 second.

12 Are you ready for the question? Those in
13 favor?

14 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Are we in favor? Those
16 opposed?

17 It is carried. Thank you. I had a little
18 pause there.

19 In my report, the next item will be the
20 Chairperson. I just want to make some brief remarks in
21 terms of what has transpired in the last two or
22 three days that you probably are aware. And we will
23 probably more likely elaborate a little bit more at a
24 later date and time in terms of really analyzing what
25 has transpired.

1 But I just want to say that Emergency Manager
2 Order 42, I am just going to -- the gist of it all, the
3 way that we look at it, we as a Board collectively have
4 a chance to weigh in on it, but it seems as though it
5 has taken away the authority of the Board of Police
6 Commission, and we are looking forward to -- in the
7 same manner that the Mayor has been in power and the
8 Council has been in power, and in our opinion, 42
9 ignores the Detroit City Charter in utilizing Emergency
10 Manager Order 11 as the foundation for the Detroit
11 Police Department. And when you look at it, this
12 agreement has continued down that line in terms of the
13 Order 11.

14 And, you know, what has transpired, Detroit
15 City Council had a private meeting with the Mayor, they
16 agreed to ignore the Detroit City Charter and continue
17 operating under the emergency management philosophy and
18 authority. And to me, this goes against everything
19 that Mayor Duggan initially stated in the past, if you
20 look at it. And Mayor Duggan's position on the
21 Emergency Manager, quoted by Darren Nichols in the
22 Detroit News on January 2nd stated, My goal is to move
23 this City back to elected leadership by October 1st.
24 Everything I will be doing with the City Council, with
25 the elected Police Commission, is going to be geared

1 towards returning to us to elected leadership by
2 October 1st. And it is past October 1st.

3 And once again, the Mayor and Council has
4 entered into a process where this Board was not
5 reinstated, but we lost power. It appears that the
6 Mayor has gained power in reference to that.

7 I just want to share that briefly. We are
8 going to have a press statement to be released in the
9 near, near future. And we want to state our position
10 clearly.

11 If you -- I would ask for some of you who are
12 aware of the facts, take a look at it, it is on the
13 Internet, it is in the news, and the debate is on in
14 that whole process of addressing that issue. And so
15 all power that was granted to the Chief of Police by
16 Order 11 continues, that was under 11 versus 42. If
17 you look at that, nothing is a drastic change, and --
18 but we pretty much feel as though that 42 appears to
19 violate the City Charter by vesting the Board authority
20 approved ordination change with the Department to the
21 Mayor, absent any provision for the Board involvement
22 or input.

23 There is nothing that this Board has done
24 that calls for a power to be restricted. The Chair
25 made a statement several weeks ago, I made a statement

1 in reference to that we were looking forward, we were
2 in anticipation, and we took the Mayor and Council at
3 their word. And so that did not take place. And we
4 would hope that we would draft the letter to the Mayor
5 and Council and expect some type of audience. And I am
6 not beyond protesting in front of Coleman A. Young
7 Municipal Building in terms of this issue to me is
8 quite serious. I would hope to ally and be supportive,
9 I mean, ask the support of the NAACP.

10 At this press conference about three weeks
11 ago, when the judge released us from under Consent
12 Decree, the Reverend Anthony, Wendell Anthony, was
13 quite firm that this Board should be reinstated. He
14 did not want to see it weakened, at all.

15 So I am going to reach out to NAACP in terms
16 of -- Mr. White is the Executive Director. I would
17 hope to publicly lobby him now in terms of contacting
18 the President and any other organization that was
19 concerned about this issue.

20 Mr. Orr was retained for the bankruptcy, but
21 its imprint, the Order 11 is all over the place, and
22 the Council and Mayor has agreed to that. And there
23 was no public discussion on that. Behind closed doors
24 for three days they met, and we was able to bring it to
25 the attention of the Eastern District Community

1 Meeting, attendance was over at least 60 people there,
2 and we was able to get a resolution to the effect that
3 we should be reinstated. So we already started that
4 process. And I am just not prepared to promptly
5 address it, but we will in the near, near future.

6 But I think that elected officials, we are
7 elected officials, we have been very, very patient
8 since January of this year in terms of the whole
9 process. And some of us have law enforcement
10 experience, and others have civil rights experience.
11 This issue has been before the public since the
12 Government initiated this, quite some time. And so
13 when you weigh in on this, we just really want to --
14 for the public to understand and put due pressure on
15 elected officials and other community organizations in
16 terms of responding to this.

17 I would like to pause. Any other Board
18 members like to respond at this time in terms of my
19 comments, please feel free to do.

20 Yes, sir?

21 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

22 First and foremost, I certainly appreciate
23 your fervor and your commitment to what the position
24 and posture of this body has always been, which is
25 being fully reinstated and empowered as duly chartered

1 through the Detroit City Charter, and the
2 responsibilities of our citizens who are looking to us,
3 to fight, for us to be fully empowered.

4 Again, I am in concert with the -- the NAACP
5 is certainly in concert, we had conversations just
6 prior to my arrival. And so I think we will find a
7 Mayors' office who is interested in listening. And I
8 think under your leadership, we can get that meeting
9 set in a short window. But certainly it is the
10 position of the NAACP that we stand for a fully
11 empowered body to be restored, under this new Emergency
12 Order, which, again, and I wholeheartedly agree with
13 you, does not speak directly to what we envision as a
14 fully empowered body.

15 Thank you.

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Mr. White.

17 Any other comments?

18 I just want to say that I welcome that news
19 in terms of you are already exercising that awareness
20 of how we should approach it. And we are soliciting
21 support from the community, and concerns. So the
22 Charter was clear back in 1973, in terms of being
23 activated in '74. The Commissioners from day one has
24 been very, very supportive of the Detroit Police
25 Department, and the Chief of Police. And as you well

1 know, from Chief Hart on down the line to Chief Craig,
2 this body has been accord to move this Department
3 forward, and no ifs, ands or buts about it in terms of
4 public safety primarily. And that was the theme of our
5 conference that we attended a couple of weeks ago. And
6 I reported back to you that there's a great deal of
7 concern about civilian oversight, and it's definite.
8 So we have to reach out on the National level. We went
9 through that because I think one small -- they
10 disbanded the Citizen Advisory Board.

11 MS. SMITH: Sure did. And I am on it.

12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: So we have to recognize--

13 MS. SMITH: Cleaning house.

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: -- that we are concerned.

15 And I think we need that input to balance those
16 concerns here in Detroit, and that's why we went under
17 Consent Decree, in terms of those issues that we have
18 resolved, the continuation of this Board duties and
19 responsibility.

20 So thank you for tolerating me in terms of
21 elaborating in terms of instance, but this is not the
22 end of it. This is just the beginning of it.

23 So we can move on to a report from the Chief
24 of Police in terms of Assistant Chief White.

25 COMMISSIONER WHITE: I'm sorry, Mr. Chair, if

1 I could add one more comment to cement your comments.
2 I would offer to this Board a motion that empowers the
3 Chair to reduce the sentiments that it has outlined to
4 writing to both the Mayor and the Police Chief, as well
5 as Judge Cohn, who rendered through his decision for
6 this body to be reinstated. So I would make a motion
7 that we, under the Chair's signature, communicate our
8 sentiments to all three of those individuals.

9 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Second.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It's been properly moved
11 and second.

12 What is your pleasure?

13 Those in favor?

14 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those opposed?

16 Motion carried.

17 Mr. Secretary, you have it?

18 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Got it.

19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

20 Now Assistant Chief White.

21 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: Good afternoon,
22 Board.

23 We were joined since introductions by
24 Director Oxendine and Deputy Chief Celia Washington, as
25 part of the introductions.

1 Crime continues to trend in the right
2 direction, down. We have seen a spike in the
3 9th precinct. We are planning an operation in the
4 9th precinct in the next couple weeks.

5 Also, we have taken on a project, Precinct
6 Beautification Project. The first precinct that will
7 be affected by that is the 9th precinct. We are trying
8 to get a building next to the 9th precinct torn down.
9 And we are going to be -- with the help of Motorola and
10 Home Depot, we are going to be going into the
11 9th precinct next Wednesday, painting, cleaning it up,
12 remodeling the kitchen, and remodeling the lobby. And
13 that's the first of many initiatives that we have
14 going. We are going to move from 9 to 11, and also
15 there are some buildings that are -- we are working on
16 right now with our Quality of Life dollars, that we
17 hope to have remedied very quickly.

18 The Academy is in horrible condition. We are
19 working on securing some dollars to get that repaired.
20 One of the big projects that we have going is a new
21 3rd precinct and a new 5th precinct. And as you are
22 aware, we are also looking at moving OCI, Office of
23 Chief Investigator, to Merrill Pleasants (phonetic).
24 And that project is on target, as well.

25 So a lot of buildings being renovated, and we

1 are just trying to apply the Quality of Life dollars as
2 they are made available.

3 And lastly, there is some questions that the
4 Board has with regards to issues that came up last week
5 on complaints. And I am prepared to answer those.

6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir. Thank you.

7 Any comments or --

8 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Any update on the
9 8th precinct?

10 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: Yeah, well, no real
11 movement yet. Initially when we talked to Meijer, they
12 were very interested in us coming on board on that
13 property. There is a building that they already have
14 standing there that they were interested in us
15 acquiring. Initially they offered a million dollars.
16 Something happened. I don't know exactly what. But
17 that offer has been reduced to 600,000. So there's a
18 \$400,000 gap. We have a meeting scheduled with them
19 early next week to see if we can get them to sharpen
20 their pencils a little bit, to get them to come back to
21 the table with more dollars.

22 We have got a plan B. I don't want to
23 discuss it right now, don't want to give up some
24 leverage, but we are very excited about the opportunity
25 of giving back into that area. As you know, that area,

1 you know, is a great area, and it is starving for
2 police presence. So...

3 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Through the Chair, in
4 records to Communications, Chief, why was there so many
5 complaints lodged at the Communications?

6 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: When you say
7 complaints, are we speaking of formal citizen
8 complaints, or are we talking about officer-related
9 complaints?

10 COMMISSIONER MOORE: We received last week
11 that the complaints had gone up.

12 Mr. Secretary, can you elaborate on that?

13 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Yeah, it represented
14 approximately I think it was 7 percent of the total
15 number of complaints that were received for the month
16 of September -- August, excuse me.

17 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: How do you know
18 offhand how they usually come in? Are they 1 percent
19 representative or what?

20 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DRAKE: Thank you.

21 Through the Chair, to the Board, Assistant
22 Chief, I think the question, if I am not mistaken, was
23 we have -- there are always four top precincts or
24 departments within the department that have the top
25 allegations. And that is the number of complaints that

1 are coming in through the citizen complaints, the CCR
2 process. I believe they were -- Communications this
3 time came in at 7 percent. I don't think -- I think it
4 was just an anomaly, quite frankly. I don't think
5 that -- I looked over the past few years. Very seldom
6 does Communications make the top four. This time, they
7 just did. I can't answer as to why. It could just
8 have been an anomaly. But we did see an increase in
9 the number of cases coming from that unit.

10 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Did you say last week it
11 was demeanor specifically?

12 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DRAKE: Demeanor is
13 normally what it is, yes. When we get a call, a
14 telephone call or a complaint, a complainant will give
15 us the information, it will be a call that comes in to
16 the operator. If the operator does not respond the way
17 that the citizen would have them to respond, we
18 consider that demeanor, yes.

19 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: So let me, if I may,
20 explain very briefly how our Dispatch works. It is a
21 little bit different than everyone else's, so to speak.
22 We have call takers, which are not the actual people
23 who dispatch the run. Most cities, that call taker is
24 the dispatcher. In Detroit, because of the volume and
25 the way the city is broken up, our call takers, they

1 take a call and they direct it to the particular
2 precinct that it goes.

3 We are in tremendous transition, and this is
4 not an excuse, this is an explanation. We have
5 hired -- how many?

6 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Thirty-one.

7 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: -- thirty-one new
8 call takers. We have also transitioned a lot of sworn
9 positions into civilian positions on the floor, on the
10 Dispatch floor. So some of it is probably due to
11 newness, understanding the frequency of the calls, the
12 volume, and really just learning how to communicate
13 with someone when they are in distress.

14 You know, the training that they receive is
15 very sterile training. I mean, you have to ask these
16 questions. Well, when someone is in crisis, and you
17 are asking them, okay, what's your address? and you are
18 calm, you know, a lot of times they want you to be as
19 animated as they are. So I have listened to a lot of
20 Dispatch tape, and I can tell you where we lose a lot
21 of people in terms of the connectivity, and I don't
22 mean hanging up on them, I mean as far as being able to
23 dialogue with them. And when they -- I want a cop at
24 my house right now. And we are asking the pertinent
25 questions, sometimes that's viewed as a delay, you

1 know, why am I answering, you know, where I have been
2 stabbed? You know, well, we need that for EMS, we need
3 it so we can treat you when we get there. A lot of
4 people don't understand that. Again, offered by way of
5 explanation, but not excuse.

6 I will also ask at this time if Director
7 Flemming and his team can approach and give a little
8 bit more in depth.

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, thank you.

10 DIRECTOR FLEMMING: I would like to say good
11 afternoon to the Board and the audience. Thank you.

12 COMMISSIONERS: Good afternoon.

13 DIRECTOR FLEMMING: In regards to --

14 MS. SMITH: State your name.

15 DIRECTOR FLEMMING: James Flemming. Sorry
16 about that.

17 In regard to the complaints, allegations
18 against Communications, they are being considered by
19 the Department as 7 percent, divided by all the
20 entities. And we received just last week 18,112 calls,
21 just for the one week. So our average for complaints
22 might be four to five a month. So if you took the four
23 to five a month or just make it ten a month, by the
24 18,222, that is 0.055, not even 1 percent, in regards
25 to complaints. We deal with more citizens

1 telephonically than any other person combined, all the
2 precincts and all the entities except the Water Board.
3 And that's why it appears, when compared to other
4 Department entities, that our complaints are so high.
5 And in reference -- if I can use as a reference source,
6 that six sigma, which was instituted by Motorola as an
7 improvement program in 1986, it came up with a
8 coefficient that 99.999. -- 99.99966 of a product or
9 service, that an allowable error or complaint would be
10 3.14. So when last year when we generated 887,512, 911
11 calls, and, say, for instance, if we put 4,800
12 complaints on that, that will still only bring us to
13 0.54 percent, not a whole percent. So in the scheme of
14 things, compared to other departments, it looks high,
15 but as a separate entity, it is very low. So...

16 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thanks for the math
17 lesson, Director Flemming. What units come under
18 Communications?

19 DIRECTOR FLEMMING: I beg your pardon?

20 COMMISSIONER MOORE: What units come under
21 Communications?

22 DIRECTOR FLEMMING: 911, Dispatch, and
23 Telephone Crime Reporting Unit.

24 COMMISSIONER MOORE: So is it possible that
25 the complaints could have been filtered through TCRU or

1 one of the other units as opposed to 911 Dispatch?

2 DIRECTOR FLEMMING: Well --

3 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: I don't want to cut
4 you off, but that's a good point, that I don't know if
5 we considered. So I will take that and investigate it.

6 DIRECTOR FLEMMING: Well, all the complaints,
7 even the complaints that deal with the officers and
8 their interactions with the public gets blamed on 911
9 because 911 is more readily to be identified versus
10 officers or the precincts they live in.

11 COMMISSIONER MOORE: The reason why I ask
12 that specifically is because I have received complaints
13 where citizens have been on a line 20, 30, 40 minutes
14 holding to make a crime report. And that goes into the
15 crime stats that the AC just read off, if citizens
16 cannot call the TCRU to make crime reports, that might
17 be part of the dark figure crime that we never see.

18 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: And you know, if I
19 may, through the Chair, Board, I would like if we can
20 to look into that and report out --

21 COMMISSIONER MOORE: That's fair.

22 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: -- more effectively
23 next week on this issue, because we have had a
24 significant staffing reduction at TCRU through
25 promotions and transfers to other units and

1 resignations. And we have a sick time issue at TCRU,
2 as well, so you have got a complement of people that
3 are extremely overworked and understaffed, and it
4 certainly can cause tensions to rise. So let's take a
5 look at specifically what the complaints are that cost
6 us 7 percent, and then we can report out next week.

7 DIRECTOR FLEMMING: Thank you. Are we going
8 to be informed of the specifics?

9 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: You are going to be
10 doing it.

11 DIRECTOR FLEMMING: I am saying, they say
12 they have complaints from --

13 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: No, I need you to
14 reach out to Chief Drake and get the information and
15 analyze it.

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Director Flemming, one
17 more question, I have one more question.

18 224-Dope, is that in your ballpark or scheme
19 of things, 224-Dope, or is that directly -- how does
20 that function? We had a discussion at the Eastern
21 District Community Meeting last night about trying to
22 manage 224-Dope.

23 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: It does, but I can't
24 tell you how it is staffed. I will tell you next week
25 when we follow up.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay.

2 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: And you can put that
3 in your notes.

4 DIRECTOR FLEMMING: Sure.

5 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: I would like to add
6 one other thing and close this out. When I -- when
7 Communications came under my control, I was very
8 critical of the operation. Having learned the
9 operation and what goes into it, I will tell you that I
10 don't know if there is a harder working group of people
11 assigned to supervision. Particularly Ms. Crystal
12 Watkins, who is here, and I would like her to stand up.

13 DIRECTOR FLEMMING: Okay.

14 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: She is in charge of
15 the ESOs, very engaged, outstanding manager. And she
16 has been working as a --

17 DIRECTOR FLEMMING: Acting administrator.

18 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: -- Acting
19 Administrator -- for how long now?

20 DIRECTOR FLEMMING: Almost a year.

21 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: Yeah. And I am going
22 to do everything in my power to shore that up because
23 she has acted quite well in that position, and she
24 deserves that position. But I just wanted to -- you
25 know, they really get almost like dumped on, I am going

1 to say dumped on a lot, and there is a tremendous
2 amount of work going into that shop over there, and it
3 is under the direction of people like her. So I just
4 want to take a moment to acknowledge her.

5 ACTING ADMINISTRATOR WATKINS: Thank you.

6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Appreciate that. Does she
7 want to come forward? Any comments, we can solicit
8 that.

9 ACTING ADMINISTRATOR WATKINS: My name is
10 Crystal Watkins. Hi. Thank you, AC White. I don't
11 speak well in front of groups. So thank you.

12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Well --

13 ACTING ADMINISTRATOR WATKINS: And thank you,
14 Director.

15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: And thank you for doing a
16 great job.

17 ACTING ADMINISTRATOR WATKINS: Thank you.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: So anything else?

19 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: No, that concludes --

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I would like to have one
21 comment, not in reference to that subject, but in terms
22 of how do we handle the Detroit Free Press Marathon as
23 far as the residents in terms of being able to get to
24 and from? That's been brought to my attention. I
25 spoke to Commissioner Burton in reference to it.

1 Several members have approached in terms of the
2 demeanor of officers in terms of to and from, in fact,
3 one of the judges live in the Village, trying to get to
4 church and get them to return home and, in fact, she
5 has more or less identified herself and neighbors to
6 somewhat to go through the barricade after they waved
7 her through. But how do we handle that? What's the
8 process for residents?

9 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: In the past, we have
10 credentialed the residents. That didn't work out too
11 well.

12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay.

13 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: So what we are asking
14 the officers to do is use common sense, if a person's
15 on a street that's barricaded, and they have got a
16 license that says they live on the street, you know, be
17 reasonable, I mean -- and that's pretty much what we
18 are doing. If there is a problem, we have asked the
19 officers to contact their supervisors. And we do
20 operate with a span of control during the Marathon. We
21 haven't really seen a lot of major problems, but I will
22 make sure that -- after this we can talk about the name
23 of the judge.

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Just not in that area, but
25 people live in Larned, Lafayette, you know, just in

1 terms of --

2 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: Well, if it is not in
3 the parade route, then they will have to follow the
4 redirection of the traffic, they will have to go -- so
5 we keep -- all the main thoroughfares will be blocked
6 off, but we have an alternate route for every
7 subdivision, apartment complex, you know, that come off
8 of the main vein. So we should be okay. We just
9 haven't had a problem with that. What we have had in
10 the past is people want to take the parade route to
11 their home. And obviously we can't do that.

12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Right, okay. I would just
13 hope that you perhaps just remind officers, you know,
14 to try to communicate with the residents in that area
15 to inform them. I didn't know about identifying
16 yourself or whatever that is. It is probably not -- I
17 know it is not a major problem, but it is something
18 that people are concerned in terms of -- now they know
19 you serve in that capacity, well, let me tell you about
20 this, that type of thing. Thank you.

21 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: And you are more than
22 welcome -- we will bring that up at the rollcall for
23 the marathon. And if you would like to attend the
24 rollcall, you are more than welcome to do so, as well,
25 I can get you that information. It is very early.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It is very early, and it
2 is very troublesome to try to get in place. I have
3 been down there before with my daughters.

4 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: But we will make sure
5 that we bring that up.

6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. As long as you
7 share that with me. I understand, you know, it is a
8 long tradition, it is outstanding, just that minor
9 concern. It might not be a major problem, just one or
10 two individuals, but we just want to get back to them
11 and say, you know --

12 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: No problem.

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, sir.

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair --

15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.

16 COMMISSIONER BURTON: -- I would like to add
17 to that a little bit. There have also been complaints
18 from business leaders in that community as well as the
19 residents in that area of Lafayette and Chene and
20 Rivard, and so forth, about a group of bikers that are
21 taking up the whole street, not just riding in the bike
22 lanes, but they are taking up the whole street, about
23 3,800 bikers, and they would like to, you know, they
24 would like to know, are the police departments aware of
25 it?

1 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: 3,800 bikers?

2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes, I think the group
3 is called Slow Roll.

4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Slow Rollers.

5 COMMISSIONER BURTON: And I actually have a
6 video I would like to show you after the Board meeting.

7 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: I would like to take
8 a look at it.

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It's good in a way, but
10 they are rolling, blocking everything.

11 COMMISSIONER BURTON: It is hard for the
12 residents to get into their units, hard for business
13 leaders, you know, who is expecting, you know, people
14 to visit their businesses and stuff. But they are
15 taking up the whole street.

16 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: Okay.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, sir.

18 Any other comments?

19 If not, we can move right into Standing
20 Committee Reports.

21 And Commissioner Moore, you have a report in
22 reference to Personnel Committee?

23 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Yes, Mr. Chairman. The
24 Office of the Chief Investigator gave us a proposal a
25 few months ago in regards to restructuring that

1 particular office. And at this time, I am going to
2 call Chief Investigator Pamela Davis-Drake to
3 elaborate.

4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, sir.

5 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DRAKE: Good afternoon.
6 Once again, for the record, Pamela Davis-Drake, Chief
7 Investigator.

8 We did pose a proposal to the Personnel
9 Committee, probably back in I believe it was earlier in
10 the year, about March, I think originally. We
11 currently have two full-time investigators or full
12 status investigators at OCI on the books. And we have
13 one acting Supervising Investigator. The latter, the
14 Supervising Investigator that is currently in an acting
15 position, has been working in that capacity now for
16 over two-and-a-half years.

17 According to HR, we only have the two
18 supervisors on the books at this time. I am,
19 therefore, requesting from the Board to create another
20 supervising investigative position to move the acting
21 Supervising Investigator into that position.

22 Also, as you are aware, within the last I
23 guess 18 months, we have lost our sworn members. One
24 of those sworn was Lieutenant Timothy Leach who was
25 actually promoted to Captain recently. That left a

1 huge void in case processing. The duties of Captain
2 Leach when he was a Lieutenant at OCI included but are
3 not limited to reviewing the citizen complaints for
4 compliance and quality assurance, handling Legal, Civil
5 Rights, FOIA, and other types of requests from various
6 entities, approving investigations for closure in the
7 absence of the Chief Investigator, and representing the
8 OCI as directed by the Chief Investigator.

9 For this position, occasionally I would give
10 him additional duties. And those would include
11 scheduling and implementing employee orientation
12 training protocols and other type training curriculum,
13 supervising and evaluating the support staff, and
14 researching Federal, State and local laws and
15 ordinances.

16 If he is replaced, those would be the duties
17 that I would be looking for. This position would also
18 be another Supervising Investigator position. However,
19 the duties of this position would differ from the
20 current Supervising Investigators.

21 After consulting with HR and Director
22 Oxendine, who has been wonderful through this
23 process --

24 Thank you, Pam.

25 -- she suggested that we take a look at the

1 current position that we have, and instead of creating
2 a brand new position, we take that position and we
3 bifurcate it or subclass it into two types of
4 Supervising Investigators. One would be a Supervising
5 Investigator of citizen complaints, which is what we
6 would currently have the current supervisors would do.
7 The other would be a Supervising Investigator of
8 Quality Assurance, because that person's duties would
9 be different from a regular supervisor.

10 I am, therefore, seeking the Board's approval
11 as follows:

12 For the Human Resource Department to create
13 the Supervising Investigator subclasses, and the two
14 positions, one position of citizen complaints, which
15 would follow the job description of our current
16 supervisors, and one subclass of Supervising
17 Investigator, Quality Assurance, which would
18 accommodate the new supervising position that covers
19 Captain Leach's former duties at OCI.

20 Thank you for your consideration, Board. I
21 would certainly be welcome -- welcome any questions.

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Any questions? Concerns?

23 I just want to say, Chief Investigator, you
24 were really expanding the duties and responsibilities
25 of the administration of Lieutenant while he was there.

1 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DRAKE: I miss him dearly.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I am familiar with that
3 job, and you -- I don't think I could have worked in
4 that capacity because you really expanding it. And --
5 but I guess he did an excellent job, he got promoted.

6 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DRAKE: He did. We shared
7 it. We shared the duties, but he was fantastic.

8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. But he got
9 promoted. But I am on board to be supportive. I
10 assume that the Chair of the Personnel Committee,
11 Commissioner Moore, is going to move to a motion to
12 some effect and address this issue.

13 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Yes, Mr. Chair. I would
14 like to put a motion on the table to accept the
15 proposal offered by Chief Investigator Drake.

16 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Support.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It's been properly moved
18 and second.

19 Those in favor?

20 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those opposed?

22 I assume there was no discussion. Are we
23 okay?

24 Thank you. Motion passed.

25 Thank you, Chief Investigator Drake.

1 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DRAKE: Thank you.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Any other committee
3 reports at this time?

4 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Mr. Chair, just to offer
5 that the Policy Subcommittee will meet following
6 today's meeting.

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, sir.

8 Any new business before this Board?

9 Any unfinished business before this Board?

10 Announcement: On Thursday, October the 9th,
11 2014, at 6:30 p.m., the 7th precinct, Sacred Heart
12 Activity Building, 3451 Rivard, will be hosting our
13 Community Meeting next week. And all of you are
14 invited.

15 And I attended their forum last Friday, along
16 with Mr. Welborne, and Commissioner Moore, they had in
17 attendance, they are just reorganizing from a District
18 concept, and pretty close to 400 people were in
19 attendance, I would say 3 to 4, and from 6 to 8 -- I
20 think they was still -- so it was like a social
21 greeting and a business part of it. Captain Hope was
22 doing an excellent job, Assistant Chief --

23 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: Yes, I know she is.

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: -- in terms of the
25 community bringing them back together after a long

1 period of not participating. And I indicated I started
2 my career, I know that used to be a very active
3 organization over there. I know that former Chief
4 Logan expanded, he was there many years, so it is good
5 to see they are willing to come out and be supportive
6 and be -- so I just want to make sure that they are
7 expecting us. She already gave them the charge, so we
8 just need you and you and you in terms of attendance,
9 and that's next week, October the 9th.

10 Now, getting to the good part. You have an
11 opportunity to come before this Board. Give your name.
12 And we ask you to try to abide by the two minutes. And
13 be respectful, because we are respectful to you. And
14 we appreciate you coming out and speaking to us and
15 interacting with us.

16 I just want to say for the record, that Chief
17 Craig is not here today. Okay. So he is not here. So
18 Assistant Chief James White is here. That's not for
19 you, sir. That's just for some people who know what I
20 am talking about. Okay. He is more than capable. And
21 his staff is here. So I don't want to have that
22 dialogue. I will cut you off. I am tired of hearing
23 it. I am just joking. You have a right to speak. You
24 have to right to speak in terms of --

25 Yes, sir?

1 MR. JOHNSON: My name is Don Johnson,
2 President of 12th Precinct Community Relations.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.

4 MR. JOHNSON: And I think I would like to say
5 hello to this wonderful body. I take my hat off to the
6 tough job that you have in place that you are working
7 with, and it gets tougher all the time.

8 However, I hate my 911 folks over there
9 simply because I know when Ella Bully-Cummings was
10 Chief and we had our Chief Advisory Board, one of the
11 things we kept continuously working on is to come up
12 with a pamphlet --

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Well, their boss is still
14 here.

15 MR. JOHNSON: Okay. -- to talk about how to
16 call 911 and the things to call 911 for. And
17 unfortunately, the citizenry in the city of Detroit
18 don't know what those rules are, you know, but we get
19 calls for a pizza man being late.

20 But the other thing is, is that what we are
21 getting complaints about, from a police standpoint, and
22 from a 911 standpoint, all over the city, is the way
23 police and the people at 911 on the phone respond to
24 people and the way they talk to them. Well, we ain't
25 sending nobody, so, well, you know, what do you want me

1 to do? And I haven't heard that, it's just hearsay,
2 okay.

3 But I was a part of a -- not a part of but a
4 witness to a shooting on Seven Mile and Greenfield.
5 Then we had a carjacking right down the street. And
6 people are calling. And I know everything is done by
7 priorities, okay, but all I am saying is if we teach
8 people how to use 911, we would get a better response,
9 and not that they do a good job, the people who call,
10 use the respect that she should use, but it is
11 something that has got to be done from a standpoint of
12 how we teach people to use 911 and the services that
13 are available to us.

14 And last but not least, I hear what the Mayor
15 is saying about a lot of things. And you are right, I
16 don't know why the citizenry is not more involved in
17 what they should be, and we support you 100 percent
18 about the Board of Police Commissioners, but also, when
19 we talk about doing business in Detroit, we have got
20 people that do wonderful jobs in Detroit. We are
21 trying to get our legs back up under us.

22 And I would hope that when we have got a
23 company that's doing a great job for us, like
24 retrofitting our police cars and all these other things
25 like ABS and the other folks, that they will get good

1 consideration to continue to do their job.

2 Now, I know you just can't give a person a
3 job. Because you have got to bid and you have got to
4 do all these other things. But Detroit is on the fast
5 track, and everybody is going to have their hand out.
6 So those who are doing a good job, I think they need to
7 be rewarded for the good job that they do, and if they
8 are not doing a good job, then they need to be rewarded
9 for that too.

10 So I just wanted to let you know that we
11 support you a hundred percent. We know that you have
12 got a big job ahead of you. There is a lot of stuff
13 going on.

14 I apologize for the people of Detroit with
15 911, because I know what you are going through. I have
16 toured that building, and what those folks are going
17 through, and we have got to do something to train
18 people to make sure that they know what to do.

19 Thank you.

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. Pause, Mr. Johnson.
21 Stay right there.

22 Any questions or comments, please?

23 Okay.

24 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: I like the pamphlet
25 idea. We will talk about that. I still have your

1 number.

2 And I will say that you are absolutely
3 correct. We have a lot of people that abuse the 911
4 system.

5 MR. JOHNSON: Yes, they do.

6 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: You know, it is to
7 take people to the doctor. I can't tell you how many
8 runs police have gone on where, you know, someone has
9 got a head cold or a stomachache, and I am sure when
10 you were making runs, you saw the same thing. And you
11 get to the house, and there's two or three cars in the
12 driveway. So it is a cultural mindset that you need
13 EMS.

14 But if it is a potential injury to a child,
15 or a potential crime, police has to come with EMS, so,
16 you know, you are now tying up two resources, and then
17 you can't get those resource over to an area that
18 really needs them. So there needs to be some public
19 education on that issue.

20 MR. JOHNSON: We need the public education in
21 addition to -- and I say that because I sit on the
22 Board of Sinai-Grace.

23 And everybody says, you need your personal
24 doctor.

25 Well, I have a personal doctor.

1 Well, who is your personal doctor?

2 Receiving Emergency. 67 years old, and every
3 time we needed a doctor, where do we go to? Emergency
4 at Receiving. We ain't had no personal doctor.

5 That's how they look at 911. Every time
6 something is wrong, you call 911. And you call 911,
7 you are supposed to fix all ills, because police are
8 not policemen anymore. They are police officers,
9 protect and serve, and social workers. So we have got
10 to make sure that the public is educated. Because if
11 not, it is going to get worse.

12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Mr. Johnson, I have one
13 brief question, please.

14 MR. JOHNSON: Yes, sir.

15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: How long have you served
16 in your capacity in the 12th precinct in terms of --

17 MR. JOHNSON: Oh, sure. Oh, as Chairman,
18 over 20 years. And as a member of the organization,
19 over 30 years. And I joined the Police Department in
20 1969, over on 14th and The Boulevard, right. But my
21 wife left me, so I was in love, I had to get off to get
22 her back. Went back to Ford Motor Company. And that
23 was almost 48 years ago, so -- but I do volunteer work
24 because I believe, I believe in what you do. I believe
25 in trying to help somebody.

1 And folks, we have got a great opportunity.
2 We have got to jump on it.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: The reason why I posed
4 that question, as you well know, we in transition
5 from -- I give you an example, I attended a meeting,
6 Eastern District.

7 MR. JOHNSON: Yes, sir.

8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Mr. Welborne was there.
9 And I don't think that the powers that be over there
10 understand, and the two captains are trying to explain
11 that we are not -- no longer a district.

12 MR. JOHNSON: Yes, sir.

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: We are now a separate
14 precinct, the 7th precinct. And I mean, I'm sorry,
15 number 5 and number 9.

16 MR. JOHNSON: Number 9, right.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Number 7 has already
18 started separation from the 11th precinct, Police
19 Community Relations, so I would like to talk with you
20 briefly afterwards in terms of how can we help expedite
21 that process of them understanding that they need to
22 really -- because everything is driven by the precinct,
23 not by a combined effort, and they need that -- that
24 whole process because they have been accustomed to that
25 for a short period of time. So I would like to meet

1 with you after.

2 MR. JOHNSON: Well, I was the President of
3 Citywide at the time, and we went to districts.

4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.

5 MR. JOHNSON: And we came all together, put
6 the districts together, and our number one comment was,
7 don't let them making us districts separate us.
8 Because as soon as -- we knew as soon as anybody came
9 back, they knew what was going on about police work, we
10 were going to be precincts again. But, you know, we
11 get an idea, the Chief put it in place, whoever the
12 Chief is, it is our job to help make the Chief make it
13 work.

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Exactly.

15 MR. JOHNSON: But we also let the Chief know
16 we didn't think it was going to work.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Right.

18 MR. JOHNSON: But I have got all that
19 information, anything you need, if you want me to go
20 and speak to him and --

21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I will speak to you
22 afterwards.

23 MR. JOHNSON: Yes, sir.

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, sir.

25 Mr. Welborne?

1 MR. JOHNSON: We just need to really talk
2 about that issue because --

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, sir.

4 Any other comments from the Commissioners?

5 If not, we will continue on with audience
6 participation.

7 MR. WELBORNE: Bill Welborne, Citywide.

8 I am going to reiterate what Mr. Johnson
9 shared about ABS. Like I said, we need jobs in
10 Detroit. And we have toured the ABS factory, and they
11 do an excellent job. They service several cities
12 around the Detroit area, Mount Clemens, Taylor,
13 St. Clair Shores, Romulus, and a few more. And, you
14 know, they have got -- they need skilled workers there,
15 and these guys working there are all skilled, because
16 it takes a skilled worker to put a radar set in a car
17 and a radio, and things like that, to make it work
18 properly.

19 And if this leaves the City, that means we
20 are going to lose workers. And these guys live in
21 Detroit. The workers live in Detroit, which makes it
22 even better. And folks are complaining about workers
23 live in Detroit. Well, here is a company that's doing
24 this. And I think we should think twice about sending
25 something across Eight Mile when we have got it right

1 here. We have got experts right here, that's got
2 people trained already. That's our problem now. A lot
3 of people are untrained. And if we can get together
4 and help train some of these people, and keep them
5 here, it will take a while to train them, yeah, but if
6 they learn how to do skilled jobs like this, nothing
7 can stop us. And I am all for keeping the work done
8 here within the City myself.

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, sir.

10 Yes, sir?

11 MR. DIMOVSKI: Good afternoon, Board. My
12 name is Sam Dimovski. I just want to clarify a little
13 bit what Mr. Bill Welborne was discussing. Our company
14 is ABS. We are located at 8100 West McNichols. We
15 have been providing the City of Detroit on their police
16 cars since 19 -- excuse me, 2008, all their electronics
17 and all their equipment. And we turn the keys -- cars
18 over turnkey ready.

19 And the City right now, our last project was
20 the Penske deal. We delivered the City a hundred cars,
21 all turnkey solution. And we got the wind that the
22 City is ordering new cars, approximately 110 Chargers.
23 And we have bid on that project, and our bid is very
24 aggressive, and somehow, some way, we got the wind that
25 these cars are going to be going outside the City for

1 outfitting. And we cannot tolerate that because we are
2 a Detroit-based company. We employ within the City.
3 And we also provide a great source to the City as a
4 solution, if there is any issues on their cars, it is
5 an open-door policy to come in and get these cars done.

6 The reason I am here for is to let you know
7 that we are here. We would like for each and every one
8 of you guys to tour our facility.

9 We do multiple communities, like Bill
10 mentioned, and also Mr. Johnson, we do Macomb County
11 Sheriffs, Washtenaw County Sheriffs, Roseville,
12 Farmington, all them other cities, Romulus, Taylor,
13 Royal Oak, and there is a reason why they come to us,
14 because they have full confidence when we do their
15 cars, they are full turnkey ready cars, and they will
16 never have to come back to our facility.

17 We have been providing the City an excellent
18 job, and an open-door policy, if they ever have any
19 issues, a car comes in, even if it is not under
20 warranty, we take care of it, and we never bill the
21 City anything back as far as our work.

22 So long story short is, by you guys being the
23 Board of Commissioners, we just want to make sure you
24 guys are aware there is a value company within this
25 city that provides great, I mean great production on

1 all these cars.

2 And after this meeting, I would like to talk
3 to James White regarding that.

4 We are located, one more time, 8100 West
5 McNichols. Each and every one of you guys are invited
6 just to stop in. We are next to Lou's Deli right on
7 the same side of the street across the street from
8 Marygrove. We have another facility where we warehouse
9 all our vehicles. All the vehicles are stored inside,
10 and all of the vehicles basically go through a very
11 rigorous test before the vehicles leave. We also
12 engineer a great product for all the electronics on the
13 vehicles and skid plates for the undercarriage of these
14 vehicles.

15 So long story short is we have a great
16 company. It is a family-owned company, and we are here
17 for the City of Detroit because that's our bread and
18 butter and that keeps us employed. And also we give
19 back to the community. And if there is anything the
20 community needs, we give back to it. Whatever the case
21 may be. We have did the car -- the first initial car
22 for the new Chief, and we have not billed him zero. We
23 never even charged for that car because we strongly
24 believe that, hey, ABS can do this as a courtesy as a
25 no charge, and it was easily about \$3,000.

1 Thank you, each and every one of you guys. I
2 would love to give you a guys a card. And please, any
3 time you are in the area, stop by and visit. The doors
4 are always open, as long as the weather is permitting.
5 Just take a glance at all the great stuff we provide on
6 these cars. It is a lot of technology that goes into
7 these cars and a lot of engineering that is involved in
8 the cars.

9 Once again, my name is Sam Dimovski. And we
10 are located 8100 West McNichols. Thanks.

11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, sir. We
12 appreciate that.

13 Commissioner, you want to respond?

14 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Just a point of
15 clarification.

16 You say that you give free services?

17 MR. DIMOVSKI: No, we give services like on
18 their cars. If there is an issue, say, for example, a
19 radar detector doesn't work or there is a wire that's
20 pinched in the vehicle, we would provide that to the
21 City at a no charge. Even if the car is not of a
22 project that we have did or if the car is out of
23 warranty.

24 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Is that in hopes of
25 maintaining business or gaining business?

1 MR. DIMOVSKI: No, that's a way to say thank
2 you. Thank you for basically giving us business, and
3 being part of their team. And they have trust upon us,
4 once we deliver the cars, it is a turnkey solution car,
5 meaning that the cars are performing excellent and they
6 do not have to come back to our facility, period.

7 But if it is something of an older vehicle
8 that's been out there in the field and it has got
9 issues, we will take care of it, it is no problem.

10 And the cars are really -- the officer pulls
11 in, a 20-minute wait or so, they take care of it
12 immediately, we get a technician on it, and it is on
13 its way back in the field. Where back in the days --

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Sir, I think you responded
15 appropriately.

16 MR. DIMOVSKI: I'm sorry. I apologize. I
17 was focused on him.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: My understanding, you
19 wanted to meet Assistant Chief White afterwards.

20 MR. DIMOVSKI: Absolutely.

21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: He wanted to meet with you
22 after.

23 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: Yeah, I want to
24 respond.

25 I am very aware of ABS.

1 MR. DIMOVSKI: Thank you, sir.

2 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: I am also involved in
3 the vehicle purchasing and the selection of a company
4 to make the installs. And certainly the fact that you
5 are a City vendor is important. And I don't want to
6 minimize that. That's very important for our citizens
7 to have gainful employment in our community.

8 MR. DIMOVSKI: Thank you.

9 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: But when I look at
10 what's best for the City, what's best for the officers,
11 I tend to look at it with a blindfold a little bit in
12 certain areas. I look at the best quality product that
13 the City can get for its money. Okay. And I base that
14 not where business is located. If you are a vendor,
15 you are a vendor. And I don't make the rule on
16 vendors. So whether you are -- I think you get a
17 couple points in the City of Detroit, and you don't get
18 those points if you are an outside vendor. But bottom
19 line is you are a vendor.

20 Blindly I say which one of these vendors is
21 giving us the best service for the City dollar?
22 Because in the past I suspect what led to this
23 bankruptcy is a lot of bad decisions. Okay. Products
24 that didn't work, didn't hold up. And that's what we
25 saw. That's exactly what we saw with ABS. We looked

1 at it. We looked at the installs. We looked at the
2 officers' comfort level.

3 And we simply did this. We took the Penske
4 car, same model, okay. And we drove it into the
5 garage. And this is what I asked the Director to do,
6 and I wish he was here --

7 DIRECTOR HAYES: Sir.

8 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: Oh, Director Hayes is
9 here.

10 DIRECTOR HAYES: Yes, sir.

11 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: Stand by.

12 DIRECTOR HAYES: Sure.

13 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: We took the Penske
14 car, the same make, model. We took another installed
15 car, same make, model. We pulled them side by side.
16 And I asked, don't tell me, don't tell me who did what,
17 let me go through the cars. And I am telling you, the
18 other vendor provided a better service for the City
19 dollar. And the officers' comfort level was better.
20 The equipment was better. The placement. Simple
21 things like turning on the lights on the car.

22 In the other vendor, we were able to
23 simply -- in a chase or in an emergency situation, it
24 has got to be quick, so you -- there it is, you flip
25 the switch. In the ABS vehicle, we had to go under a

1 computer, put your fingers in, force them in, and flip
2 the switch. And if the fingers aren't long enough, you
3 have got to keep doing it while you are driving, so now
4 you are doing this.

5 MR. DIMOVSKI: Okay.

6 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: So there are a lot of
7 problems. I don't want to tit for tat. This is not
8 the forum for it. But I just want to make sure that we
9 present all the facts so the Board can make an informed
10 decision.

11 I would love to meet with you, but moreover,
12 I would love for the Board to do the same test I did.
13 Bring the two vehicles into the garage. I won't tell
14 you which one is which. You look at the vehicles, and
15 you tell me, if you were a police officer, which car
16 you would like to drive.

17 MR. DIMOVSKI: That would be great.

18 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: And I will invite you
19 to that too.

20 MR. DIMOVSKI: Yes. And getting back to
21 answer a couple of your questions, the equipment and
22 everything else was basically provided by Mr. Penske.
23 They chose the equipment. And also Scott Hayes.
24 Basically all we did was install the equipment. We
25 cannot displace switches anywhere in a car but where it

1 needs to go. We also have engineered product for the
2 cars for Mr. Penske, which is skid plates that protect
3 the undercarriage of our vehicles -- I mean your
4 vehicles actually. We have also engineered trunk trays
5 for the vehicles. We have had Mr. Penske's cars to do.
6 And meanwhile there was 50 Chargers that was designated
7 to ABS --

8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Sir, sir, I don't think
9 this is the forum.

10 MR. DIMOVSKI: Well, I was going to answer
11 his question.

12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: No, you stated -- and
13 Assistant Chief responded. You can meet one on one.
14 And the offer the Board will have opportunity if we
15 care to, we would entertain that.

16 MR. DIMOVSKI: Please do.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: We would entertain that.

18 MR. DIMOVSKI: Please do. Because it is very
19 important because we value the City a great deal --

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: We heard you. Yes, sir.
21 We have it. And thank you for coming out --

22 MR. DIMOVSKI: Oh, absolutely.

23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: -- and put the challenge
24 before us, but it is really not in our ballpark, but we
25 can entertain looking at it for what it is worth. Like

1 you say, you are a business, but we don't all -- the
2 inner workings with that, that's not our role, but we
3 appreciate that.

4 MR. DIMOVSKI: No, I understand.

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, sir.

6 Any other comments?

7 Yes, sir.

8 MR. RHOADES: Good afternoon. My name is
9 Peter Rhoades. I am a resident of Detroit. Been
10 before the Board many times, and finally I get to say
11 thank you.

12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I hear you loud and clear.

13 MR. RHOADES: There was a meeting on Monday,
14 that was September 29th, and it was announced that the
15 Detroit Police Department would no longer issue
16 criminal misdemeanor tickets for operating without a
17 valid business license. And that policy was presented
18 by Commander Bettison at a meeting with the Mayor's
19 Chief of Staff, Alexis Wiley. And whenever an officer
20 sees a business that is not operating with a valid
21 license, they will simply refer that matter to the City
22 of Detroit Buildings, Safety Engineering and
23 Environmental Department. They have all the paperwork
24 and all the records concerning business licenses. And
25 they will take appropriate action and do the

1 investigation. And that way, the Police Department
2 will be out of issuing those tickets. They won't have
3 to figure out who is the owner or the manager or who is
4 simply a minimum wage employee behind the counter. And
5 that addresses my concerns. And so I want to thank
6 you. I also want to thank Assistant Chief of Police
7 Dolunt, Second Deputy Chief Washington, and Commander
8 Bettison for working on the issue. And I think we
9 finally have a workable solution. And I want to thank
10 the Board for listening to me for the last 11 months.

11 And I have a letter for Mr. Anthony.

12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: You can share that. Thank
13 you for being persistent. And thank the Department for
14 resolving this. Now we can just see you as we see you
15 in terms of a happy note. And thank you for the thank
16 you.

17 COMMANDER BETTISON: Commander Bettison.

18 I just wanted to let the Board know that
19 myself, along with Attorney Washington, we are working
20 on a document to be able to distribute to the Board and
21 also present to the Chief that will further clarify the
22 particulars of it. There is some things that the
23 Police Department, we issue licenses for, and that we
24 regulate. In those particular cases, we will still
25 regulate that aspect of it, if it came down to scrap

1 metal processes or rickshaws and sexually oriented
2 businesses, so there's some things that we issue
3 licenses for that we regulate, that we will still do
4 it. But things that are not our core business, per se,
5 that the business licensing department issues those
6 licenses for, their inspectors will be doing the
7 enforcement aspect of that.

8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, sir, for your
9 due diligence in terms of trying to resolve this.

10 COMMANDER BETTISON: Thank you, sir.

11 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Commander Bettison, some
12 props, I was flipping the channels yesterday and I saw
13 him on the City Council, and it is always good whenever
14 a person go out in public and you just hear compliment
15 after compliment. I think it was Councilman
16 Cushingberry that said when you arrive, things happen.
17 And I feel the same way because Commander Bettison
18 takes care of a lot of complaints I have from the 7th
19 District, so I am glad to hear Mr. Rhoades mention his
20 name, as well. So I just want to give you kudos. And
21 thanks again to --

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: This commander sitting
23 right here?

24 COMMISSIONER MOORE: That one right there.
25 That's Bettison right there.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Outstanding. Outstanding.
2 (Applause).

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It's good to have a
4 resolution for a long-standing problem that we
5 resolved. And you have been patient. Thank you, once
6 again, from the Department of terms of leadership on
7 this.

8 Yes, ma'am.

9 MS. WELLS: Good afternoon. Tonya Wells. It
10 appears that the vehicle for hire commission is going
11 to go forward. There was information given out at
12 budget and financing yesterday. I think you would do
13 well to send a representative of some sort to the
14 budget and finance committee, and also to the committee
15 of the whole so they can take notes for the Commission
16 because to have it delivered any other way is just not
17 right, it is wrong. It is the wrong reporting
18 practice.

19 And the second thing is, the Chief has said
20 he is going to meet with the vehicle for hire people,
21 other subcontractors, and they are going to try and
22 hash out some of the problems. They are presenting the
23 information such that they want the rate increase to go
24 up to two-fifty a mile. That's ridiculous. And I will
25 stop that everywhere I can. Things that are not

1 appropriate, and within the code, are being stopped.
2 So I just wanted you to know that I attended these
3 meetings too. And my report is a little different
4 because I don't have any interest invested in it at
5 all. So I am coming from a perspective of my
6 professionalism, the areas of where I am expert at, and
7 the things that I have done in terms of interpretation
8 and presentation.

9 Senate Bill 748 is an item, and what that is,
10 is the presentation of how many populace people are in
11 the City, currently at 7,000 -- 700,000. They are
12 trying to get it down to 5. So some of the language is
13 kind of obscure, but Councilman Cushingberry, Leland
14 and I believe Lopez are trying to put together
15 something really fast.

16 And just so you guys know, the recall
17 petitions did go out and a recall hearing is on the 6th
18 of October at 3:00. So just wanted you to know.

19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, ma'am.
20 Appreciate it.

21 Any other comments from the audience?

22 Please step up, please. Time is --

23 MS. PANELL: Good evening. Sharon Panell.

24 I requested about that car last week. It is
25 still not moved. The girl called me this morning on

1 Thatcher between Archdale and Fenmore. She said it is
2 still sitting on stilts. It has been there almost two
3 years.

4 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: You sure, two years?

5 MS. PANELL: Yeah, that's what she told me.

6 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: On Thatcher, on the
7 street?

8 MS. PANELL: Yes, sir.

9 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: Would you have an NPO
10 take care of that, get the location?

11 Who did you share the information with?

12 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: That information was
13 passed on. The Chief passed it on. We will take care
14 of it.

15 MS. PANELL: Thank you.

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

17 MS. PANELL: I will be back next week.

18 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: And reporting that it
19 is moved next week, if we don't move that car today, if
20 it is on stilts in the street.

21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am. Take your
22 time.

23 MS. CLARK: I am Alma Clark, a resident of
24 Detroit. With the resale shop, I have a problem with
25 just vendors setting up anywhere on the street. I am

1 going to give you one street -- two streets, Grand
2 River, running from Lahser down to Oakland. And
3 Plymouth Road and Burt -- Plymouth and Wyoming. I have
4 addresses, and they are constantly -- I constantly
5 complain to the precinct, and I call in every so often,
6 I go there, and I still haven't gotten a result. They
7 still come set up any lot, three or four U-Haul trucks
8 set up on empty lots at the same time. And I would
9 like to see something done about that. Because I pay
10 taxes, and I think they should pay taxes.

11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. Assistant Chief?

12 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: I will have Commander
13 Bettison look at that.

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Sir?

15 MR. REED: Good afternoon, Commission.

16 Through the Chair, my name is Kenneth Reed.
17 I am a citizen of the City of Detroit.

18 Speaking of vehicles, and it just occurred to
19 me, I was here -- I knew I was going to be here for
20 some reason. And this particular vehicle, and it was
21 on a report, Fox 2 News probably about four weeks ago,
22 at least, on the corner -- on the northwest corner of
23 Gladstone and Linwood. I just rolled past there
24 yesterday, and there is a vehicle that is silver, I
25 don't know the model, it was smashed up so bad that it

1 was crashed into a building, and it has been there
2 since at least August. And we are in October now, it
3 is October the 2nd.

4 And I hear stories and I hear proclamations
5 of the City making a comeback. That we are coming
6 back. But in our communities, we are suffering. And
7 for children to have to walk past that or observe that
8 on the City buses every day, to see this vehicle just
9 sit at the corner of Gladstone and Linwood, for almost
10 two months, that's horrible.

11 You know, we are at the turnaround, man. I
12 am talking about our Mayor now. He is the turnaround
13 man. He said he is going to have things turn around
14 within his first six months. I am not trying to be
15 critical, but this is what he stated. And I don't know
16 if the officers knew about this vehicle being there,
17 but it looks terrible.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Have you brought this to
19 the Department attention before prior to this?

20 MR. REED: Like I said, Commissioner Bell, I
21 saw the story on the news. I didn't believe it. And
22 while I was here and I heard you all talk about another
23 vehicle, these other vehicles sitting on stilts, but
24 this one is in my community. So I would like to see it
25 removed.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. So this is your
2 first effort to bring it to Department attention?

3 MR. REED: Yes.

4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: So we have the location?

5 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: Yeah.

6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, sir.

7 Any other comments?

8 MS. SMITH: Good afternoon.

9 COMMISSIONERS: Good afternoon.

10 MS. SMITH: Commissioners, Chief, glad to see
11 you here.

12 Moore, I am so happy that you watch the
13 programs that I watch, because I was going to give
14 kudos to -- did he go? He is right there. He did a
15 wonderful job. And my girl, she did a wonderful job
16 before the City Council. It was Tuesday on their
17 morning session. They are going to get after --
18 Cushingberry was the Chairperson. They are going to
19 get on the problems that were presented to them in
20 regards to the cab drivers and what they have said when
21 they come before us.

22 Now, what I have a problem with, they did
23 mention the fact that they are getting tickets in
24 regards to no place for them to park, and wait for a
25 fare. Now, I feel as though that we should make

1 preparations for them to get a site where they can sit
2 and get a fare without being ticketed. One police I
3 understand is angry with one of the cab drivers, and
4 gave him 27 tickets. Now, you know, this is
5 ridiculous. The man is trying to make a living. I
6 have all of the joy in the world when I see the police
7 doing the right thing. But when they are doing the
8 wrong thing, I am going to have to come before you and
9 tell you about it.

10 Now, let's see that these cab drivers get an
11 area where they can have -- without being ticketed,
12 and get a spot so they can sit and get a fare instead
13 of going all the way around the block, and then come
14 back and try to get a fare. This is not right for
15 them. When you do have those shallow buses that come
16 from out of town and nowhere -- probably other places,
17 they have spots and they are sitting there all day
18 long. Now, see, I live in Midtown now. I see this.
19 So nobody just telling me. I see it.

20 And also, this new driving company that's
21 come into the City, Urban -- Urban or something, would
22 you believe my son is one of the drivers? He told me
23 about it two weeks ago. He said, you ought to get on
24 it. I wouldn't even give him two minutes of having a
25 customer in my car, since I know what they are doing.

1 And it is not fair. It really isn't. And if they
2 don't have a license, I think we should check into it
3 and see how they are making their monies and not taking
4 away completely from the cab drivers.

5 Again, the good Lord answered my prayer. You
6 got your raise, and I am glad, I prayed for it. And I
7 hope that you get the 15 percent. The 8 percent, that
8 will probably do for the time being, but 15, it sounds
9 good. Maybe you will go up a little further, but I am
10 very proud that you finally -- whoever okayed it.

11 And also, Mr. Orr, he got rid of our City
12 Citizen, and I was Secretary and was the former
13 President in Midtown. So I can't understand why in the
14 world he would get rid of the City Citizen Commission.
15 So I will find out about it because I will see him
16 Friday. And then I will see the Mayor Saturday at the
17 picnic.

18 And as far as -- I made a note on it, tell
19 the churches, your churches, in regards to helping out
20 in the voting, because this is very serious. And we do
21 need all the citizens to come out and vote. So I
22 suggest that you go and tell your citizens and also the
23 churches, so they will tell their congregation about
24 it. And especially you at Fellowship.

25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Mother Bernice.

1 MS. SMITH: You are welcome.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

3 MS. SMITH: Thank you for listening to me.

4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Mr. Scott?

5 MR. SCOTT: I am only appearing because
6 Mother Bernice asked me to.

7 Commission and Chief, I had the opportunity
8 to go to the Congressional Black Caucus Weekend,
9 Commissioner White and I were there, and two things
10 came up. And I thought about it, and I was debating
11 whether or not I was going to make a comment today, but
12 I think I should. I have been in attendance at the
13 Joseph Weekley trial, and many issues have come up
14 about SRT, and whether or not SRT did surveillance
15 which was reasonable under the circumstances.

16 In the last incarnation of this body, there
17 was a discussion that was going to be had about Special
18 Response Team.

19 Following the Aiyana Jones situation, I did
20 have occasion to work with SRT, in the Marion Dombolgo
21 (phonetic) deescalation. And in many cases, they do a
22 good job in terms of resolving conflict without
23 violence.

24 But one of the things I want to know is go
25 back and get a history to see when fugitive

1 apprehension teams and other things, and I think it was
2 concurrent with some of the monies that came from the
3 Federal Government to actually go out and do. And I
4 was concerned when I heard in the trial that these
5 responses to locations were predicated on some myths,
6 some bias, and some things that were just downright --
7 I won't call them racist, but they appeared to be, in
8 terms of suggesting that in the ghetto, people put
9 blankets in their windows, and this is a reflection of
10 a dope house. I mean, that's -- that's -- that's in
11 the transcript. That's beyond the pale.

12 But I think that we really need to look at
13 when we talk about missions, and when we talk about
14 when it was in Homicide, that people would wait for a
15 person to come out so that they can apprehend them away
16 from citizens, as well as protecting police officers,
17 when did police work, investigative work, become
18 missions? And this is the ranking question today in
19 terms of militarization. And I think we need to look
20 at that and evaluate where we are, and where we are
21 going, and just do an objective look at the whole
22 question of SRT and other specialized units. I would
23 appreciate that in an objective, reasonable fashion.
24 Not, you know, with acrimony or pointing fingers, but
25 just to see. And when you have, as I know from the

1 military, it's esprit de corps, that over a period of
2 time, people have been in seven, eight, nine years,
3 they begin to identify with each other, sometime more
4 strongly than they do with their service orientation.

5 And then secondly, if we could look at also
6 the corporate entities who have specialized police
7 authorities or other things, like Mr. Gilbert, and what
8 their relationship is to sworn officers and police
9 departments, I would be very interested in that.
10 Because this is becoming more common, and I don't think
11 we are really clear, the citizens aren't, in terms of
12 who does what and how, especially for individuals who
13 are in the Downtown area like myself. Those are my two
14 concerns that I hope Chief White and others and the
15 Commission, that you will consider those for future
16 reference.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Any comments from
18 Commissioners?

19 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: No, I think, you
20 know, I am in agreement with much of what was said. We
21 certainly have to consider lessons learned from the
22 tragedy of Aiyana. You know, it is just a horrible
23 situation for all involved.

24 I will tell you that we have already began
25 looking at our entry protocols. The Chief was very

1 serious about how we respond to situations. In fact,
2 he has implemented something he brought from L.A. where
3 we look at the homes that we are going to enter, and
4 their proximity or likelihood to be near children. And
5 if -- one case in particular, where we had a bad guy
6 that we were going to take down, but it was across the
7 street from a school that was in session. He said,
8 absolutely not, you know, we will wait in case the bad
9 guy wants to run or have gunplay. But then there are
10 other considerations like active shooters, as we see
11 around the country, you know, we have to prepare. And
12 that does mirror, you know, military look, you know,
13 you have to be prepared and armed to save lives.

14 So, you know, I certainly understand your
15 concerns, and we will make those considerations. And I
16 think the discussion to be had may be, is it time to
17 have a forum or a committee forum with police and, you
18 know, the Downtown people, the community groups, and
19 talk through these issues so everybody understands
20 what's going on.

21 MR. SCOTT: Right. Right. I understand. So
22 I won't belabor the time, so thank you.

23 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: Thank you.

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Mr. Scott.

25 And thank you, Assistant Chief, for his

1 response.

2 Any other comments from the audience?

3 MS. ROMANO: Anna Romano, and I was just
4 responding to the comment that was made. The Special
5 Response Team is a very highly trained unit of the
6 Police Department. And they are a great asset to the
7 Department. These men have integrity. And they are
8 highly skilled. They go into the most serious missions
9 that they call missions. The Department may use
10 missions, they may use it as a detail, they may use
11 different words towards it, but basically it is going
12 in and making sure that -- every situation they have is
13 a high risk situation. So we have to at least give
14 these men respect for the job that they do do, and the
15 Department. Because the Department has invested a lot
16 into them, making sure that they are keeping not only
17 the residents of the City of Detroit safe, but also
18 those who work and visit this great city. And they are
19 the ones that go into the most high risk situations of
20 barricaded gunmen, they go into situations where there
21 are also high risk homicide cases, for murder suspects,
22 to get them off the streets so we can all be safe. So
23 I truly appreciate the Special Response Team and the
24 Detroit police officers as a whole entity.

25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

1 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: Thank you.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Any other comments from
3 the audience?

4 If not, I assume we have reached the point of
5 adjourning this meeting.

6 I want to thank you for coming out, and look
7 forward to you attending our next meeting, which is
8 October the 9th, on Thursday, at the Sacred Heart
9 Activity Building at 6:30 p.m. So feel free to join
10 us, and I think it will be a great experience in terms
11 of the 7th precinct reconvene their community.

12 So once again, I thank you, and be safe.

13 I ask for a motion for adjournment.

14 COMMISSIONER MOORE: So moved.

15 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Second.

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Properly moved and second.

17 Those in favor?

18 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those opposed?

20 Motion carried.

21 Thank you.

22 (Proceedings concluded at 4:24 p.m.)
