4 COMMISSIONER BELL: Good afternoon. I
5 want to welcome you to the weekly meeting of the
6 Board of Police Commissioners. I am your Chair
7 for 2014 and '15 Willie Bell and to my right is
8 the Vice-Chair Lisa Carter, and I just want to,
9 once again, welcome you and we're going to have a
10 good meeting and looking forward to the
11 interaction with the Commissioners and the public
12 and DPD.

13 At this time I'd like to have Executive
14 Director George Anthony to conduct a roll call
15 and it's been duly noted that we have some
16 excused absences, you have a record of that
17 already?

18 SECRETARY ANTHONY: I do, sir. For the
19 record, George Anthony, Secretary to the Board.

20 Commissioner Lisa Carter?

21 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Present.

22 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner Willie
23 E. Burton?

24 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Present.

25 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner

1 Wendell L. Byrd?

2 COMMISSIONER BYRD: Present.

3 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner
4 Reginald Crawford?

5 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Present.

6 SECRETARY ANTHONY: The following
7 Commissioners have been asked to be excused from
8 the meeting: Ricardo R. Moore, Richard Shelby,
9 Jessica Taylor, Donnell R. White.

10 Mr. Chair, you have five of nine seated
11 Commissioners, you have a quorum.

12 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you,
13 Mr. Anthony. And at this time I'd like to
14 introduce -- it's quite obvious Chief Craig is
15 not here, but to my left more than capable Deputy
16 Chief LeValley.

17 DEPUTY CHIEF LeVALLEY: Thank you.

18 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.
19 Mr. Anthony, would you introduce the staff of the
20 Commission?

21 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you,
22 Mr. Chair. To my right is our attorney Aliyah
23 Sabree. Seated on the front row is Ms. Pamela
24 Davis-Drake, our Chief Investigator.

25 Mr. Robert Brown is absent today, but

1 we have Sgt. Alan Quinn who is recording our
2 proceedings in the back and Mr. Dale Rose from
3 Hanson Court Reporting service. That completes
4 the introduction.

5 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, sir. At
6 this time Commissioners, we have the agenda
7 before us for Thursday, July 24, it's setting
8 before you. The Chair would entertain a motion
9 to approve the agenda.

10 COMMISSIONER CARTER: So moved.

11 COMMISSIONER BYRD: Second.

12 COMMISSIONER BELL: It's been properly
13 moved and seconded, those in favor, aye?

14 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: Those opposed?
16 Motion carried. Also, Commissioners, you have
17 the minutes from Thursday, July 17, 2014. What
18 is your pleasure? I can't hear you.

19 COMMISSIONER BYRD: I move to accept
20 the minutes.

21 COMMISSIONER BELL: Okay, do I hear a
22 second?

23 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Second.

24 COMMISSIONER BELL: Those in favor?

25 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

1 COMMISSIONER BELL: Those opposed?
2 Motion carries. At this time we will open with a
3 prayer. I'm going to ask the more than capable
4 Commissioner Wendell Byrd for opening prayer if
5 you don't mind.

6 COMMISSIONER BYRD: Let us pray.

7 (INVOCATION WAS GIVEN.)

8 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, sir.
9 Looking at the agenda, I just -- yes, sir.

10 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the
11 Chair, at last week's meeting we tabled the
12 minutes for July 10.

13 SECRETARY ANTHONY: I'll make a note of
14 that, sir.

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: We will respond to
16 that at the next meeting.

17 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Thank you.

18 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you for
19 bringing that to our attention. I think I need
20 to pause and allow the Deputy Chief LeValley to
21 introduce his staff or officers who are in
22 attendance.

23 DEPUTY CHIEF LeVALLEY: Yes, sir, thank
24 you. Seated in the front row is Capt. Debbie
25 Abdur Rasheed from Professional Standards.

1 Second row is Capt. Donna Jarvis, Training; Sgt.
2 Mike Ingle, Training; Officer Sean Wayrynen,
3 Training; Sgt. Charles Edwards, Training and Sgt.
4 Anthony Potts, Firearms Training.

5 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you,
6 appreciate that. I'd like to just pause to one
7 of the most active persons in terms of profession
8 and community and I know he was one of the -- I
9 mean, he was a keynote speaker when I was
10 promoted to the rank of lieutenant a couple of
11 years ago and that's Mr. Sol Green.

12 Would you introduce yourself, please,
13 and in what capacity are you serving? You have
14 worn many hats over the years.

15 MR. GREEN: I'm still working on some
16 public safety issues. There's an effort called
17 Cease Fire Detroit which is targeting gang and
18 group gun violence in Detroit and I'm director of
19 Cease Fire, and so that's the thing that probably
20 brings me into the building the most, so I'm just
21 very appreciative of being able to continue to
22 work on these kind of issues in the community, so
23 thank you.

24 COMMISSIONER BELL: So thank you, so
25 kind, so modest, appreciate it. As far as

1 reporting out as the Chair I just want to
2 celebrate like all of you are celebrating what
3 day is this? Can't hear you. Anniversary of the
4 great city of Detroit and it coincides with the
5 area code 313, isn't that a coincidence.

6 I think that we have a great deal to
7 celebrate. I always look at the positive side,
8 as you know, in terms of the city of Detroit,
9 even though these are difficult times, but if you
10 look at the history of Detroit we have always
11 dealt with the occasion and we're still raising,
12 so we still have a song to be sung with reference
13 to all the issues.

14 I just want to say that notwithstanding
15 all the issues that we've been dealing with I was
16 pleased -- I'm not making a political speech --
17 but I just want to say I was pleased in terms of
18 the retirees in terms of voting, I think that
19 will move us forward in reference to getting out
20 from under the Emergency Manager Act and I think
21 that is a long ways in terms of contribution and
22 also the contribution of those officers and DPD
23 that's working under difficult times.

24 And I'm just pleased to see in terms of
25 the hiring process even though we are not at the

1 top scale of pay, but they are still coming on
2 board, so I think that's a blessing to this
3 department and to this citizens in terms of their
4 celebration.

5 And I was looking at The Free Press and
6 people were citing all the reasons why, so I just
7 want to commend that type of celebration. We
8 could have a great deal to celebrate, great deal
9 to be thankful for because we're truly blessed.

10 If you travel internationally you know
11 exactly what I mean. It's still the USA and we
12 just pray for those who are -- have lost their
13 lives in terms of airplanes. We pray for those
14 who are engaged in a war in Israel and Gaza, we
15 just pray that there would be a solution to all
16 of this as we go forward in terms of world peace.

17 But that would be my response to the
18 celebration and surely we have some issues, but
19 overall I think it's quite positive in terms of
20 what's happening in the city of Detroit.

21 I just wanted to thank you for coming
22 out and hopefully that -- if you can't say
23 nothing good, don't say anything in reference to
24 Detroit. I was out to Belle Ile just recently on
25 three different occasions and I see people from

1 all walks of life that I haven't witnessed before
2 and I stopped to interact and they was pleased in
3 terms of what's happening there. So as we move
4 forward that's a jewel and I just want to say
5 thank you for 2014 that we're standing here this
6 evening, so I just want to report that out.

7 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the
8 Chair, with all due respect, I wasn't pleased, I
9 voted no, so --

10 COMMISSIONER BELL: I understand. A
11 whole lot of people voted no, but the majority of
12 people didn't and that's how democracy works in
13 America. So we're going to move on to -- thank
14 you, Commissioner Crawford -- to the Chief of
15 Police in reference to the training process,
16 reporting out presentation.

17 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Mr. Chair, before
18 we do that, and I apologize to the Board, there
19 is a Secretary's report on citizen complaints and
20 that should have been something that was amended
21 on the agenda when the agenda was approved, I
22 apologize for that. If it is your pleasure, I
23 would like to give that report now.

24 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Anthony.

25 SECRETARY ANTHONY: This is the citizen

1 complaints that were received in June of 2014.
2 The monthly count of complaints for June was 124
3 compared to the same year in 2013, 113, and so
4 that represents for 2014 a 10 percent increase.

5 The year-to-date figure through June of
6 2014 is 710. For 2013 period 588, so it
7 represents a 21 percent increase.

8 At the end of June, 2014 the Office of
9 the Chief Investigator had open investigations of
10 295, cases filed 710, cases closed 689. Of the
11 124 cases filed in June of 2014 32 percent
12 involved unknown officers.

13 The alleged known units involved
14 leading in complaints filled in June of 2014 were
15 the 2nd and 8th Precincts at 6 percent, the 9th
16 and 11th Precincts at 6 percent, the 12th
17 Precinct and Communications at 6 percent.

18 The 124 cases filed in June of 2014
19 involve 211 allegations where the leading areas
20 of concern were procedure at 28 percent, demeanor
21 at 28 percent, force at 10 percent and service at
22 10 percent.

23 This next section deals with closed
24 complaints for the month of June of 2014. 104
25 cases were closed in June of 2014 and those cases

1 involved 229 allegations. Where the findings
2 were not sustained 41 percent, exonerated 19
3 percent, sustained 14 percent, unfounded 10
4 percent. The leading areas of concern in the 104
5 cases were procedure 35 percent, demeanor 25
6 percent, property at 10 percent and service at 10
7 percent.

8 And that concludes the report on
9 citizen complaints. There is a chart that notes
10 that information.

11 COMMISSIONER BELL: Commissioners, any
12 comments in reference to Mr. Anthony's report?
13 We will receive your report.

14 Mr. Anthony, since you have the floor,
15 would you respond to a memo that you received
16 dated July 22. I think we need to make that part
17 of the official record on the Board of Police
18 Commissioners at this time.

19 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you, sir. We
20 received this memo today, it's from the Second
21 Deputy Chief Celia Banks Washington who is the
22 legal advisor for the department, and it regards
23 the current list of suspensions without pay of
24 Detroit Police Department members.

25 I'll just read it, it's a two-paragraph

1 memo from Ms. Washington.

2 Article 7, Section 7-807 of the Detroit
3 City Charter states an employee charged with a
4 major offense shall not forfeit any pay or
5 seniority rights pending final action by the
6 Board of Police Commissioners except with the
7 concurrence of a two-thirds majority of the
8 members of the Board of Police Commissioners.
9 However, due to the egregious circumstances
10 together with Executive Order Number 11 which
11 authorizes the Chief under the direction of
12 Emergency Manager Kevyn Orr to make any other
13 related personnel decisions, the following
14 members are currently suspended without pay.

15 And we have several officers who are
16 suspended without pay: Officer David White,
17 Officer Vinson, Officer Dione Nonley, Officer
18 Dana Bond, Sgt. David Pomeroy, Officer Ryan
19 Caruthers, Officer Tambora Jackson and Officer
20 Luwanda Whitehead.

21 That completes the memo, sir.

22 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you,
23 Mr. Anthony. Commissioners, any comments in
24 reference to receiving this memo from Second
25 Deputy Chief Washington on behalf of the Chief?

1 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Our comment is
2 we're in violation of the Charter under the
3 emergency manager, Order Number 11.

4 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, sir,
5 appreciate it. Now we can move to Deputy Chief
6 LeValley in terms of the training.

7 DEPUTY CHIEF LeVALLEY: Yes, sir.
8 Before we get to that, I would start the Chief's
9 report with some crime statistics.

10 Year-to-date homicides were at 153,
11 last year at 176, that's a 13 percent reduction.
12 Armed robberies were at 913, last year we were at
13 1,450, 37 percent reduction.

14 Non-fatal shootings we're at 565, last
15 year at this date we were at 645 for a 12.4
16 percent reduction. And carjackings which
17 actually falls under the armed robbery category,
18 we're at 289, last year we were at 424 for a 32
19 percent reduction.

20 Total violent crimes, year to date
21 we're at a 8 percent reduction. Total property,
22 we're at a 22 percent reduction and our total
23 Part 1 offenses year to date are 19 percent down
24 from last year.

25 Again, these are unofficial statistics.

1 Crime categories can change as the investigation
2 takes place and investigators determine that a
3 different crime occurred than was initially
4 reported, but that's year to date.

5 With that, I will call up Capt. Donna
6 Jarvis, she's the officer in charge of Training
7 for the department and she's going to give a
8 presentation on her unit.

9 CAPT. JARVIS: Good afternoon. Okay,
10 here I am again at the Professional Education and
11 Training Division. I've been there a little over
12 a month. You just saw me present for the 8th
13 Precinct recently, so there's not two of me; I've
14 moved.

15 We fall under the Administrative
16 Operations arm of the department under Assistant
17 Chief James White and again under Support
18 Services Bureau under Deputy Chief David
19 LeValley.

20 Within my umbrella I have four units,
21 the Firearms Training Unit with Sgt. Anthony
22 Potts, Recruit and Physical Training and today to
23 represent Recruit and Physical Training is
24 Officer Sean Wayrynen, Compliance and In-Service
25 Training is officer newly transferred in Sgt.

1 Michael Ingle, and Field Training Unit under Sgt.
2 Charles Edwards.

3 Currently at the academy I have eight
4 sergeants and a total of 24 police officers
5 assigned to the various units, nine at the
6 Training Center, 10 at the Rogue Range, one at
7 Field Training and four officers assigned out
8 currently to assist other commands with their
9 needs.

10 We have 68 student police officers
11 currently in the academy. 24 are scheduled to
12 graduate on August 15 and they will be out on the
13 street very soon. I currently have 45
14 probationary police officers out in the precincts
15 and 29 field training officers who are training
16 them, and they fall under the Field Training
17 Officer Program.

18 The field training officers in the
19 precincts are actually assigned to the precincts
20 and once the officers get to the precincts
21 they're assigned with a senior officer, field
22 training officer, who continues to assist them
23 with their field training until they're
24 acclimated with the precinct and with the
25 procedures.

1 Under our Basic Recruit Training
2 Program, again right now we have 68 police
3 recruits in the academy. We have -- under the
4 Basic Recruit Training Program our requirements
5 include 594 hours of MCOLES-mandated curriculum,
6 Michigan Commission On Law Enforcement Standards
7 curriculum that they follow.

8 There's 120 hours of Detroit Police
9 Department curriculum after that before they
10 actually graduate from the academy. Their
11 training officer includes legal instruction,
12 physical fitness and defensive tactics, ethics,
13 accident investigations, first aid and CPR,
14 firearms proficiency training, precision driving
15 and police procedures and investigations.

16 Aside from my staff training we do have
17 some other instructors that do come in, subject
18 matter experts in addition to our legal staff
19 that assists us with our training.

20 In our In-Service Training all members
21 are required to attend mandatory in-service
22 training annually. It's 40 hours and includes
23 use of force, PR24 which is our secondary batons,
24 legal update training, firearms and bi-annual
25 qualifications, supervisory and leadership

1 training, active shooting and law enforcement
2 trends, mental health in law enforcement,
3 explosive -- I'm sorry, incendiary explosive
4 devices and bomb threat response and reporting
5 and emergency vehicle operations courses.

6 In addition at the academy we have the
7 oversight and development and the approval of all
8 lesson plans, instructors, attendance and
9 curriculums. We do semi-annual courses and
10 instructor evaluations and regular assessment
11 needs through the department to see what our
12 training needs are.

13 Who do also offer specialized training
14 aside from the regular training courses that we
15 have in our 40-hour and these are additional
16 courses throughout the year that are offered to
17 the officers, which include first aid and CPR for
18 the professional rescuer, Law Enforcement
19 Information Network LEIN training, officer
20 survival courses, emotional survival for law
21 enforcement officers, fitness for duty, felony
22 traffic stops, urban street survival, knife
23 retention and several other courses.

24 We also have many training partnerships
25 with our other local law enforcement agencies.

1 We train the Detroit Public Schools Police in
2 many of their courses. The DDOT and Transit
3 Police comes through our academy. Federal
4 Reserve Police, we've done training for them, for
5 Highland Park Police Department, Romulus and
6 Wayne State University.

7 Wayne State is actually now sending
8 some of their officers through our 40-hour
9 training course so that they can continue with
10 their skills and their excellence in training.

11 At the academy we are charged with
12 compliance with Michigan Commission On Law
13 Enforcement Standards and Consent Judgment
14 training compliance and recordkeeping and we do
15 maintain all of the highest standards as required
16 by Michigan Commission On Law Enforcement
17 Standards and the U.S. Department of Justice.

18 With regard to our compliance progress
19 there are a total of 24 training paragraphs
20 originally in the Consent Judgments with both of
21 them and we remain in compliance, 100 percent in
22 compliance, with all paragraphs. There are 18
23 paragraphs under the Use of Force Consent
24 Judgment and six paragraphs under the Conditions
25 of Confinement which ended January, 2014 after

1 they were closed out by the judge due to the fact
2 that all the holding facilities were closed down
3 and turned over to the DDC.

4 We continue with Use of Force Consent
5 Judgment which contains 18 paragraphs that
6 pertain to training. Five of those paragraphs,
7 U106 through U-110 are not actual training but
8 rather they involve curriculum, review of lesson
9 plans, needs assessments, records and quarterly
10 meeting with Law Department and CRIB for risk
11 assessments with regard to our conduct.

12 U111 is a one-time training of all
13 employees in the city of Detroit affected by the
14 Consent Judgment and this training is conducted
15 by Civil Rights Department that we maintain all
16 records for that training as well.

17 And finally U123 is the development and
18 approval of the FTO program which is completed
19 and up and running. And again that's under Sgt.
20 Charles Edwards and he oversees that entire
21 program.

22 And that leaves 11 additional
23 paragraphs that we train out annually
24 department-wide with the rest of our staff which
25 includes use of force, firearms, arrest and

1 citizen interaction, custodial detention,
2 material witness, prompt judicial review, etc.

3 Supervisory training and investigator
4 training and every one of the training paragraphs
5 have multiple variables and components to each
6 paragraph which we make sure that are all adhered
7 to under the Consent Judgment.

8 Our 40-Hour In-Service Training
9 Program, our compliance for last year again, we
10 do remain at 100 percent under all of the
11 paragraphs. And, again, if you have specific
12 questions with regard to a particular area of
13 training, my staff is here and we welcome any
14 questions that you have regarding our training.

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: Questions,
16 concerns?

17 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Through the
18 Chair, where is the academy now?

19 CAPT. JARVIS: We're at 6050 Linwood
20 which is two blocks -- it's right at the corner
21 of McGraw and Linwood which is about two blocks
22 north of I-94 on Linwood.

23 COMMISSIONER BELL: Any other questions
24 or concerns? Commissioner Crawford, I know you
25 have a couple of comments you want to make.

1 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the
2 Chair, yes, ma'am, captain. Maybe one of your
3 sergeants or officers can answer but in terms of
4 your defensive training tactics and I know for a
5 fact that this was never -- well, maybe years ago
6 probably when Commissioner Bell and I -- but when
7 I came on the job even and I know a lot of the
8 cities teach any type of -- or weren't taught any
9 type of choke holds, but I know recently in the
10 media it's been -- particularly what happened in
11 New York and even recently here a few months ago
12 in Northland Mall for an individual -- well,
13 Northland Mall was different, it was pepper spray
14 and what happened recently in New York as of last
15 week, a young man was choked by the New York PD.

16 And many years ago -- I did a lot of
17 research on that -- they used to call it the
18 California Choke Hold because they used to teach
19 it in the LA Police Academy.

20 I can't even imagine any police academy
21 in America today I mean in the last 20 years even
22 teaching that and I know it's not being taught
23 here, but I just want to emphasize that because
24 in both cases -- and I know this is important
25 with pepper spray too -- is when an individual

1 says he can't breathe, he can't breathe, often
2 times officers may believe that they're just
3 saying that.

4 But with pepper spray I know you have
5 to have ventilation. When you pepper spray an
6 individual and if you put him in the back seat of
7 a police car or where he's laying face down with
8 the pepper spray --

9 CAPT. JARVIS: Yes, and with our
10 policy we do ventilate and we do also give the
11 prisoner an opportunity to wash. We provide
12 water for them within so many minutes of the
13 spraying incident.

14 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am.

15 CAPT. JARVIS: And with regard to the
16 incident in New York, we have studied that and we
17 are definitely addressing that with our officers
18 in training.

19 Do you want to speak on that? This is
20 Officer Sean Wayrynen from our defensive tactics
21 team.

22 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, sir.

23 OFFICER WAYRYNEN: Good afternoon,
24 guys. Mr. Anthony, always good to see you. I'm
25 not the defensive tactics expert, I'm filling in

1 for somebody, Sgt. James, but I know for a fact
2 we do not teach choke holds in the police
3 department.

4 The only way you can actually choke
5 anybody out in the police department is if your
6 life is in imminent danger and you have to take
7 somebody's life and you're justified in doing so.

8 If you're going to put anything on the
9 trachea, you have to justify deadly force. We
10 don't have any techniques involving that at all.
11 I know that for a fact on that.

12 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: I'm sure you
13 didn't. I just wanted to hear you say it.

14 OFFICER WAYRYNEN: Yep, absolutely,
15 absolutely, so --

16 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: For the record.

17 OFFICER WAYRYNEN: For the record, yes,
18 sir.

19 COMMISSIONER BELL: I have a question.
20 The 40-hour in-service training, is that
21 something annually?

22 CAPT. JARVIS: Yes. Every officer is
23 required to attend 40 hours every year annually.
24 In addition too they return to the -- the
25 firearms qualifications is twice a year.

1 So they qualify with firearms at least
2 once every six months and 40 hours annually. So
3 we start at the beginning July 1 is the beginning
4 of our fiscal year and we start the training then
5 and we go through the entire department prior to
6 the completion of June 30 of the following year.

7 COMMISSIONER BELL: Okay. How long has
8 that been in effect as far as in-service
9 training, just curious?

10 DEPUTY CHIEF LeVALLEY: 2008.

11 CAPT. JARVIS: 2008.

12 COMMISSIONER BELL: That's good. I
13 think they need in-service training ongoing. Any
14 other questions or concerns?

15 CAPT. JARVIS: Yeah and we do refresh
16 it and bring in new material and up-to-date legal
17 updates, etc. Our legal staff is bringing in new
18 decisions, etc all the time.

19 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Through the
20 Chair, what if any training do you provide to the
21 community? Is there any community training at
22 all?

23 CAPT. JARVIS: Well, particularly the
24 academy, the department does have some community
25 training and it depends -- there are several

1 areas. We do a citizens police academy, the
2 citizens business police academy is through the
3 department.

4 We do have a training coming up that is
5 going to involve our community partner citizens
6 groups, etc specifically that is going to be
7 involving human trafficking and recognizing it
8 within the community and what the signs and who
9 to notify and how to assist victims of human
10 trafficking, so that's going to be coming up.

11 As far as regular training, we don't at
12 the academy do a lot of regular training. The
13 department within -- you know, through its
14 community policing, etc does provide a lot of
15 training.

16 Brian Fountain, Investigator Brian
17 Fountain, goes out to a lot of the community
18 groups and does training on a regular basis to
19 all the community groups, so almost anyone in
20 here has probably been in some of his training
21 which is really good.

22 COMMISSIONER BELL: Chief Investigator
23 Drake?

24 CHIEF INV. DAVIS-DRAKE: Just wanted
25 to make a quick comment. Pamela Davis-Drake for

1 the record, Chief Investigator. We also go
2 through the 40-hour block of training and it is
3 an excellent training opportunity for us. It
4 keeps us abreast of all of the policies,
5 procedures, tactics and so forth that are used by
6 the police department and we're able to get right
7 in there with the officers and get down on the
8 ground and do what we got to do too, so -- but it
9 is an excellent opportunity for us and we very
10 much appreciate being included in that.

11 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you. I'm
12 glad to hear that because in my police career we
13 didn't have that opportunity of in-service
14 training, that was very limited. I can't speak
15 for overall, but as far as my own personal career
16 it was very limited as the department.

17 CAPT. JARVIS: Well, Commissioner, it's
18 never too late. We welcome you to come and
19 attend our 40-hour.

20 COMMISSIONER BELL: I'll keep that in
21 mind. That would be interesting because when I
22 was working OCI and I witnessed the academy and I
23 felt embarrassed for some of the candidates who
24 could not run around the block; I know that it's
25 changed.

1 CAPT. JARVIS: Yeah, we have standards.
2 We've sharpened the pencil.

3 COMMISSIONER BELL: I hope so. I look
4 at that and I say if you can't run a block while
5 in the academy what's going to happen when you
6 got out of the street, so I'm glad that has been
7 addressed.

8 Since we have you there, captain, and
9 the Chief Investigator, last week we posed a
10 question to the Chief in reference to having an
11 opportunity to visit the class before they
12 graduate and that graduation is August 14, so I'm
13 hoping that you can work with the Chief
14 Investigator and we work up a date and time
15 that's convenient for you and convenient for us
16 in terms of attending and interacting with that
17 class.

18 CAPT. JARVIS: Oh, absolutely, do.
19 Shall we state a date with Mr. Brown?

20 COMMISSIONER BELL: However you want to
21 work it out.

22 CAPT. JARVIS: Okay.

23 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, looking
24 forward to it. Not to run around the block, but
25 just interaction.

1 CAPT. JARVIS: But we can add that in
2 there. Fitness never hurts.

3 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.

4 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the
5 Chair, Commissioner Bell, I've had the 40-hour
6 block of training, so you somewhat dated yourself
7 because that makes me feel young again.

8 COMMISSIONER BELL: I have no problem.
9 I retired in 2004, I have no problem dating
10 myself because it's a blessing to be standing
11 here to witness this rebirth of young people like
12 yourself and others.

13 Deputy Chief, any other comments? Do
14 you want to recognize a couple other individuals
15 we have coming in the room on your staff, so --

16 DEPUTY CHIEF LeVALLEY: Yes, sir.
17 Deputy Chief Rene Hall, Patrol; Sgt. Ray Martin,
18 Sgt. Franklin Hayes -- I think that's everybody.

19 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you for
20 outstanding reporting on the training and your
21 report on behalf of the Chief.

22 DEPUTY CHIEF LeVALLEY: There's two
23 more quick things I'd like to add to the
24 presentation that I didn't see. One is that we
25 have a policy that requires every two years to do

1 a training needs assessment and it actually was
2 born from one of the Consent Decree paragraphs
3 that's continued on, so that's how the curriculum
4 in that 40-hour block is adjusted.

5 So a lot of the results that come out
6 of citizen complaints, that's one of the pieces
7 that goes into that needs assessment, so we may
8 have a series of complaints where the individual
9 complaint is not sustained, but we start to see a
10 pattern or a trend of certain behaviors that are
11 taking place throughout the department, and
12 again, we might not be able to substantiate the
13 individual complaint, but as a whole it's
14 something we need to address through training and
15 that's how that information gets into the
16 training curriculum each year.

17 And then the other piece is partnering
18 with universities and schools in the area and in
19 the last year or two officers lost tuition
20 reimbursement and part of the benefit package
21 that was reduced, so training and then other
22 areas of the department are actively seeking out
23 partnerships with universities to try to get
24 reduced tuition rates.

25 One thing that just came out in the

1 last two days is the chief scholar program, so we
2 met with Wayne State University with regard to
3 grad-level education. They now have an online
4 program for master's degree in criminal justice.

5 And when we met with them they offered
6 us two scholarships, so right now there was a
7 notice that came out a couple of days ago
8 announcing a competitive process for two
9 supervisors from sergeant and above to receive
10 full scholarships for master's program online.

11 So we're going to continue to seek more
12 opportunities like that to push education.

13 COMMISSIONER BELL: That's definitely
14 good news in terms of addressing that particular
15 need for further education.

16 DEPUTY CHIEF LeVALLEY: That concludes
17 the Chief's report.

18 COMMISSIONER BELL: Since you have the
19 floor you perhaps need to make an announcement in
20 reference to promotion class graduation next
21 week.

22 DEPUTY CHIEF LeVALLEY: Yes, next
23 Friday.

24 CAPT. JARVIS: Friday morning at 10 AM.

25 DEPUTY CHIEF LeVALLEY: Friday morning

1 at 10 AM, a promotion for nine lieutenants and 20
2 sergeants at Greater Grace.

3 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you. Before
4 we move on to standing committee reports, I'd
5 like to acknowledge a young lady. I haven't
6 witnessed her in this room in quite some time, I
7 don't know why, but that's the Second Deputy
8 Chief Washington, so I just want to say it's good
9 to see you again. I thought you had deserted us.

10 2nd DEP. CHIEF WASHINGTON: No, sir.

11 COMMISSIONER BELL: That's not the
12 case? We got your memo.

13 2nd DEP. CHIEF WASHINGTON: Yes, sir.

14 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.
15 Commissioners. Any standing committee reports at
16 this time? Any new business, Commissioners? Any
17 old or unfinished business?

18 If not, we can move to announcement. I
19 just want to once again announce that the Board
20 of Police Commissioners community meeting will
21 take place next month on August 14, 2014 at 6:30
22 at UAW Local 7 at 2600 Connor Street so I just
23 want to highlight that and also our next meeting
24 is going to be here on Thursday, July 31 at 3 PM
25 at headquarters in the same room, the same time

1 frame.

2 And we move right along into oral
3 communication from the audience. So we do not
4 have Mr. Brown here, but I guess we're going to
5 address the time frame and I ask you to be
6 respectful and we try to give you those two
7 minutes plus, so come forward and state your name
8 for the recorder and we recognize you at this
9 time and thank you for coming out and
10 participating.

11 MS. WELLS: Good evening, everyone. My
12 name is Investigator Tonya Wells. I'm here with
13 a two-fold purpose. First and foremost I want to
14 thank the police department for catching the
15 killer of Decaria McKinney. Decaria is the 20
16 year old track star who was shot 18 times in
17 June.

18 They caught Timothy Johnson and he was
19 arraigned on Friday. I think that team needs to
20 be recognized by this department because the city
21 saw what happened and the response time for the
22 turnover, how much time it took, was 30 days. I
23 am completely again astonished and impressed. I
24 know it's really hard to get to that place in my
25 heart, but the police department deserves the

1 praise and the honor for what they did, and now
2 the criminal justice process begins.

3 So first and foremost, thank you from
4 the bottom of my heart.

5 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you for
6 bringing that to our attention.

7 MS. WELLS: My second situation I was
8 robbed the day of Decaria's funeral and I had to
9 step out to do the composite drawing because as a
10 professional driving over 28 years I add to the
11 police department's knowledge of how to handle
12 commercial drivers in the city of Detroit.

13 I have a burning image in my mind what
14 this white boy looked like -- excuse me. I have
15 a burning image in my mind. I'm going to say it
16 again, y'all want to catch him before I do for
17 real. I'd like to apply to get my own license to
18 have an open weapon and a concealed weapon and
19 I'd like someone to help me to get to that point.

20 I'm looking into getting out of the cab
21 and finding work in the criminal justice field.
22 That's where I got my degrees and certifications
23 in. I'm going to go back to the Wayne County
24 Prosecutor's Office and continue to volunteer my
25 time, the Eastern District of Michigan, and even

1 possibly the Wayne County Jail, but I want a gun
2 now, first time in my life.

3 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you. Any
4 other comments?

5 DEPUTY CHIEF LeVALLEY: Thank you for
6 recognizing us for closing that homicide case.
7 With regards to the CPL permit, that's not
8 something that is done here at police
9 headquarters, it's something that's done at the
10 Wayne County Sheriff's Department and I know
11 applications are available at the Wayne County
12 Sheriff and they accept applications there.

13 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, sir.

14 DEPUTY CHIEF LeVALLEY: With regards to
15 the robbery, I'm sure you're working with the
16 detective on the case. You said you made a
17 composite sketch, so hopefully that will be
18 closed soon.

19 MS. WELLS: Thank you, sir.

20 COMMISSIONER BELL: The mic is still
21 open for any other comments from the general
22 body. Yes, ma'am.

23 CONNIE: My name is Connie, I'm the
24 general manager at the Hawthorn Suites in Detroit
25 on Ford Road and Southfield.

1 Lately the crime has been getting more
2 and more. I have a CD where I had called the
3 officers to come to our hotel.

4 COMMISSIONER BELL: Just give it to --
5 thank you.

6 CONNIE: We asked the officer to help
7 us because the lady had jumped over the counter,
8 it was like six or seven of them that came over
9 the counter, tried to attack us. We called 9-1-1
10 several times. Once the officers came there they
11 acted like we were the perpetrators and let them
12 go, did not ask them for their ID. He asked me
13 for their ID. He let them leave.

14 They pulled their pants down, mooned us
15 while the officer was standing right there; he
16 did nothing. And I just find it unacceptable
17 that we have to live in such fear when we right
18 now so far this year I've already paid \$60,000 in
19 taxes. And I find that we don't get any -- I
20 won't say ever because there's been a lot of
21 officers that do come there and I believe you've
22 been there a couple of times -- no, the lady
23 behind you -- Hawthorn Suites.

24 A lady looks just like her -- but she's
25 very good. She looks just like her, I thought it

1 was her, I'm sorry. But they come there, some of
2 them are very good, but these particular officers
3 did not behave in a manner that we are accepting.

4 And I've already filed a citizen's
5 complaint. When you see the videos and I ask you
6 to please review them, the guy had clearly not
7 done his job and I feel our security is not being
8 taken care of as a business.

9 COMMISSIONER BELL: So you have already
10 filed a citizen's complaint?

11 CONNIE: Yes.

12 COMMISSIONER BELL: And is there any
13 need to talk to the Chief Investigator at this
14 time or it's already been processed?

15 CONNIE: I just now filed a complaint.
16 I haven't had any contact with her yet. She's
17 supposed to come and we're supposed to have a
18 meeting together, but the tape definitely needs
19 to be reviewed.

20 I had a friend of mine who's an officer
21 that reviewed it and said he was astonished by
22 the behavior of the officers, and this is not the
23 first time these particular officers came to my
24 hotel and did nothing.

25 The one guy says I threw him out of the

1 hotel because we have a no-party policy there, so
2 if you're going to have a party, you're going to
3 have to get out.

4 He actually was thrown out of my hotel
5 at one point because he had a party and he tried
6 to fight with me because of it and I called the
7 police on him. So now when he responds to my
8 hotel he does nothing. He acts like we are the
9 criminals.

10 COMMISSIONER BELL: Ma'am, we have the
11 CD and Chief Investigator Drake who is sitting
12 right there perhaps can talk to you.

13 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, sir,
14 through the chair, for the sake of transparency
15 and truth I received a call about your complaint
16 and talked to an individual and I guess through
17 communicating through you tried to resolve the
18 issue and it wasn't resolved.

19 CONNIE: Not at all.

20 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: And gave the
21 number to the Chief Investigator's office for you
22 to file a complaint and I hope that everything is
23 handled correctly and appropriately and I can
24 assure you it will be, Chief Drake sitting right
25 there to your left.

1 CONNIE: Thank you.

2 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, ma'am.

3 Any others?

4 MS. SMITH: They say we look alike
5 anyway, so -- Bernice Smith, Human Resources
6 Commissioner. I'm going to be very brief since
7 we don't have Brown here.

8 First of all, I was so glad that you
9 brought up -- Chief, hi. I was so glad that you
10 brought up the subject in regards to the
11 gentleman that was killed in New York because,
12 you know, I always brag on my police department
13 anyway, and like I told the Chief last week about
14 Chicago and all this crime that's being
15 perpetrated there.

16 Now, I think I have a suggestion to
17 send our trainees to New York or give them some
18 kind of idea how we're doing here in Detroit
19 because as I sit here, I listen to the decrease
20 in crime from the previous year and I'm very
21 proud of it.

22 And this young lady has been the
23 captain. You keep up the good work because, you
24 know, a lot of men don't want to take orders from
25 us, so you just keep up the good work, don't give

1 in.

2 In other words -- I know it from
3 experience being in the roofing business, but
4 anyway I'm very glad and proud again of our
5 police department. And I hope we will maintain
6 that courtesy is far as -- I thought Brown wasn't
7 here -- anyway, I'm very proud of the police
8 department and as most of you know I always give
9 them kudos when they do good and I give them hell
10 when they do bad.

11 So, again, I am very happy that we
12 don't have to compare ourselves, not only with
13 New York, but there was another occasion in
14 California, a 81-year-old woman that was
15 assaulted by the police department, and she's in
16 the hospital right now.

17 So, again, I want your trainees to keep
18 up the good work and when somebody says, "I can't
19 breathe" let them up or whatever, let them
20 breathe and don't keep and continue to choke them
21 the way that they did, and we saw it on the video
22 and it was horrible. It was all on the news
23 today, Rev. Sharpton, he mentioned the fact that
24 the funeral was held yesterday.

25 And I was very very upset at the fact

1 that these are policemen, they're supposed to
2 protect the citizens in the cities and they're
3 not doing what they should do.

4 One more last thing. I understand you
5 had 68 graduates, but yet and still you gave
6 another number of the ones that are graduating.

7 I want to know what happened to the
8 remaining officers that -- or trainees that
9 didn't pass the test.

10 I thank you so much for your time.

11 COMMISSIONER BELL: The Deputy Chief is
12 going to respond to that last inquiry.

13 DEPUTY CHIEF LeVALLEY: That number of
14 68 was the total number of recruits that we have
15 and they're in multiple classes. Most classes
16 are usually 20 to 30 students, so there will be a
17 number of graduations coming up in the near
18 future. They're at different stages of their
19 training.

20 MS. SMITH: Oh, all right, so none
21 flunked?

22 DEPUTY CHIEF LeVALLEY: We occasionally
23 get some, one here and there.

24 MS. SMITH: Drugs?

25 DEPUTY CHIEF LeVALLEY: No drugs.

1 COMMISSIONER BELL: Any other comments?

2 MR. MAYFIELD: Good afternoon to the
3 Board, I'm Roscoe Mayfield. I just want to make
4 a comment that glad to see the department is
5 doing something with the crime. I'd like to see
6 you keep it up and don't be lax about it.

7 I see things with businesses leaving
8 the city because the department is not doing
9 things to help like the lady with the hotel or
10 they see things like this and the department
11 doesn't step up and do its job. People, they
12 give up their business, move out and that's
13 causing the City to lose its tax base, so just
14 keep up the good work.

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you. Any
16 other comments? Thank you for the oral
17 participation. I want to thank the Commissioners
18 for their attendance this evening and Deputy
19 Chief LeValley and the rest of the department.

20 DEPUTY CHIEF LeVALLEY: Yes, sir.
21 Before you close, sir, Chief Craig wanted to make
22 sure you were aware that he was tied up
23 testifying at the bankruptcy hearings and he
24 didn't skip your board meeting for something that
25 wasn't very important.

1 COMMISSIONER BELL: I appreciate that.
2 So I would like to, once again, acknowledge the
3 Commissioners for their attendance and Deputy
4 Chief and other department executives and rank
5 and file and also you, the citizens, because
6 without you we would not be the Board of Police
7 Commissioners for your attendance and the
8 recording and the staff.

9 So once again, we meet next week
10 Thursday, July 31, a 3 PM right here at
11 headquarters. Keep that in mind.

12 If there's no other business,
13 Commissioners, what is your pleasure for
14 adjournment?

15 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Move.

16 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Second.

17 COMMISSIONER BELL: It's been properly
18 moved and seconded, those in favor?

19 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

20 COMMISSIONER BELL: Opposed? Motion
21 carried. Thank you once again.
