5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Good afternoon. I want to
6 extend a warm welcome to the weekly meeting of the Board
7 of Police Commissioners on Thursday at 3:00. It's good
8 to see your smiling faces in terms of attendance and
9 participation. We are looking forward to that. I'm
10 Willie Bell, your Chair. And to my immediate right is
11 the Vice Chair, Lisa Carter. And I'm going to ask the
12 Board secretary, George Anthony, to introduce the rest
13 of the commissioners.

14 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you, Mr. Chair. For
15 the record, George Anthony, Secretary to the Board.
16 You've already announced the attendance of Commissioner
17 Carter. Commissioner Willie E. Burton?

18 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Present.

19 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner Wendell L.
20 Byrd? Commissioner Reginald Crawford?

21 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Present.

22 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner Ricardo R.
23 Moore?

24 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Present.

25 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner Richard

1 Shelby?

2 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Present.

3 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner Jessica
4 Taylor and Commissioner Donnell R. White have asked to
5 be excused for today's meeting. Mr. Chair, you have a
6 quorum of six commissioners.

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, sir. And to my
8 extreme left sitting in for Chief James E. Craig is the
9 Assistant Chief White. Is that James White, right?

10 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: That's correct, sir.

11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. He is our assistant
12 chief. And, chief, good to see this afternoon.

13 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: You as well, happy to
14 be here.

15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Mr. Anthony, would you also
16 introduce the staff?

17 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you, sir. We have
18 present Miss Aliya Sabree who is our attorney to the
19 Board to my right. Miss Pamela Davis-Drake, our chief
20 investigator, seated in front. Sergeant Allen Quinn is
21 recording our proceedings, and Miss Wendy Boer is from
22 Hanson Court reporting Service. That completes the
23 introductions, sir.

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. At this point, the
25 first order of business would be approving the agenda

1 for this meeting here on October 30th at 3:00. You have
2 the agenda before you, Commissioners.

3 COMMISSIONER CARTER: So moved.

4 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Support.

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It's been properly moved
6 and supported. Ready for the question? Those in favor,
7 aye?

8 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those opposed? Motion
10 carried. And the next item of business would be the
11 approval of the minutes on Thursday, October 23rd.
12 Commissioners, what is your pleasure?

13 COMMISSIONER MOORE: So moved.

14 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Second.

15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It's been properly moved
16 and second. Ready for the question? Those in favor,
17 aye?

18 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Opposed? The motion
20 carried. At this time I'd like to pause for prayer. I
21 don't see our chaplain. Would I be in order to ask the
22 chief investigator to come forth to render a prayer? I
23 would appreciate it and the body would too.

24 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DAVIS-DRAKE: Let us bow
25 our heads. Father, we thank you dear God for this time

1 that you have set aside for us, oh God, to honor you
2 first and foremost. We are asking, oh God, that you
3 bless this meeting, that you're anointing beyond it that
4 your presence be felt oh God as we go forward on the
5 agenda of the Board, oh God. Give them wisdom, guidance
6 and direction. Remember the community, oh God, in which
7 we serve oh God. Remember the members that are out
8 there fighting crime every day, oh God. Create a hedge
9 of protection around about them, keep them safe and
10 protected. And we will continue to give you the praise,
11 the honor and glory in your name above all other names.
12 In the mighty and precious name of Jesus we pray, amen.

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Chief
14 Investigator Pamela Davis-Drake. You're on your way to
15 being an outstanding servant of the Lord. And, you
16 know, you're blessed and we are blessed. And thank you
17 for the prayer.

18 Next item would be the office report. I'm
19 just going to reserve some brief comments at a later
20 time, and I mean brief. But we can move on to the
21 Secretary's report.

22 SECRETARY ANTHONY: That was given last week.

23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. Thank you. I assume
24 there is an OCI monthly report by Chief Investigator
25 Pamela Davis-Drake.

1 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DAVIS-DRAKE: Good
2 afternoon, Mr. Chair, to the Board. For the record,
3 Pamela Davis-Drake, Chief Investigator. The OCI Chief
4 Investigator's report for today, Thursday, October 30,
5 2014. We have a total of 219 cases. 19 cases have been
6 submitted to either the Chief Investigator or supervisor
7 for pending closure. And we have no cases over 90 days.

8 And a couple trends that I have noticed that I
9 wanted to bring to the Board's attention. I have
10 noticed a significant decrease in the number of cases
11 over the last three months that we have received in the
12 Office of the Chief Investigator. In July, there was a
13 15 percent decrease; in August, a 14 percent decrease;
14 and in September, a 27 percent decrease.

15 Additionally, while the overall numbers of the
16 complaints year to date continue to show an increase,
17 even that number is coming down percentage wise. In
18 July, there was a 14 percent increase; but in August, 10
19 percent; and in September, 5 percent. So, we are happy
20 to see that. That means certainly one of the reasons is
21 because the men and women in blue are out there
22 diligently working to provide a service with
23 professionalism and working diligently to be respectful.

24 So, that is really a great thing to see. Our
25 numbers are down overall significantly. As you know, a

1 few months back, probably in June, May, the spring
2 months, we were right up at 300. And we are down now to
3 219. So, it is manageable. It does certainly help that
4 we are down by one person. So, the fact that our
5 numbers are down really is helpful.

6 Just a move update, just very quickly, the
7 move date has not yet been scheduled. But the building
8 is supposed to be finished on November 17th. We are
9 still waiting to hear an actual move-in date. I know
10 there was an issue with one of the vendors. So, they
11 are trying to work that out now.

12 As far as our investigator staff, the vacancy,
13 we had 143 applicants. That was the highest -- I know
14 back in 2012, I think we had 40 applicants; 2013, we had
15 81, and this time 143. So, it's taken some time. But
16 I'll sift through all of those. Within the next couple
17 of weeks, we will be calling folks for interviews.
18 Certainly I know the personnel committee is going to be
19 involved in that process. And it is whatever their
20 pleasure is, to be involved at the onset, with the large
21 number that we are going to be interviewing or wait
22 until those second interviews. And that concludes my
23 report.

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioners, any
25 questions or concern? Seeing none, Assistant Chief, do

1 you have any questions or concerns?

2 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: No.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

4 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DAVIS-DRAKE: Thank you.

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: The next item would be Item
6 Number 9.

7 (Enter Commissioner Byrd)

8 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Mr. Chair, excuse me.
9 Commissioner Byrd has arrived.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I made a mental note of
11 that a minute ago and it got lost in transmission here.
12 Let the record reflect that Commissioner Wendell Byrd is
13 now seated and properly here with us. Thank you, sir.

14 COMMISSIONER BYRD: Thank you, sir.

15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: We are counting the days.
16 I want to take this opportunity to wish you the best of
17 success next week.

18 COMMISSIONER BYRD: Thank you.

19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: And Item Number 9 is the
20 Chief of Police, Assistant Chief James White, in terms
21 of do you have a report?

22 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: Good afternoon, Board.

23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: You have the floor.

24 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: Good afternoon.

25 Apologize. Long night last night. We are actively

1 engaged in our Angel's Night Task Force. Last night
2 went very well. The Emergency Operations Center has
3 stood up and is functioning effectively. It's over at
4 Linden. We did the build out over the past year. We've
5 completely remodeled the Emergency Operations Center to
6 the tune of approximately \$1.8 million dollars in grant
7 money.

8 So, if anyone gets an opportunity, I highly
9 recommend that you go by and take a look at it. Also,
10 we are completing our renovation at the 9th Precinct.
11 The 9th Precinct looks very good, very clean. The
12 officers deserve that. And we're very happy with the
13 outcome. Highly recommend if you get an opportunity to
14 swing by Number 9, that you do so as well.

15 This is the second day of the Angel's Night
16 Task Force. And we are hoping for the same success we
17 had last night. And I have a presentation from Captain
18 Solano and I apologize. The deputy warden is here, and
19 I cannot remember your name.

20 DEPUTY TELLEZ: Terry Tellez.

21 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: Terry Tellez will be
22 doing a presentation for the Downtown Detention Center
23 or Detroit Detention Center. That's my report.

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: So we can move forward with
25 the captain?

1 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: Yes.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: First of all, I want to
3 thank you for the due diligence last night, all boots on
4 the ground. And I'll be stopping by the 9th Precinct to
5 see the operation for Angel's Night and also the other
6 precincts to overlook. So, I appreciate your report.

7 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: Very good. Thank you.

8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir?

9 CAPTAIN SOLANO: Good evening, Chair, board
10 members and AC White. My name is Captain Russell
11 Solano. I'm currently the officer in charge of the
12 Detroit Detention Center. And I put this Power Point
13 together just to give you some information on the
14 processes and staff and general information. So, let me
15 try to begin. Here we go. Okay.

16 With the cooperation between the Detroit
17 Police Department, Michigan Department of Corrections
18 and State of Michigan, on August the 1st, 2013, the
19 Detroit Detention Center officially opened as the first
20 single processing and housing center facility for the
21 Detroit Police Department. We are currently located at
22 -- well, we are located at 17601 Mound on the site of
23 the old Ryan Corrections facility.

24 And on our anniversary, August 1st, 2014, we
25 had processed 18,761 arrests. And that number as of

1 today's date is over 24,000 arrests processed at the
2 DDC. Actually, the DDC is comprised of two buildings,
3 Building 100 and Building 500. Building 100, the
4 initial processing occurs there. Building 500, the
5 final booking and housing occurs at that location in
6 that building.

7 We process of course arrests for DPD, Michigan
8 State Police, Wayne State Police, the DNR, Detroit
9 Public Schools as well as entities that make arrests
10 inside Detroit, either working with Detroit Police or a
11 warrants emanating from the City of Detroit.

12 Building 100 is separated in three main areas.
13 We have area one which as I mentioned before is the
14 initial processing area. Area two is what we call our
15 bubble area or our final processing area. And area
16 three, also available to the officers, is a breathalyzer
17 room with two breathalyzer machines. We have five
18 interview rooms that were recently remodeled to enhance
19 both video and audio quality. We also have a lineup
20 room with an adjacent observation room for the
21 witnesses.

22 We have two attorney visit booths as well as
23 admin offices for both MDOC and DPD staff in Building
24 100. I think I covered that. Let me just say that
25 Building 100 is staffed and operated by DPD personnel.

1 And our current permanent staff is comprised of 25
2 police officers, ten sergeants, one lieutenant and as of
3 September 29th, we have 14 civilian detention facility
4 officers. We just recently on that date received eight
5 new DFO's. I'm sorry, six.

6 So, this is area one, our initial processing
7 area. In this area, the officers will present their
8 completed detainee input sheet to the front desk
9 supervisor. At that time, the supervisor will do a
10 probable cause review. A file folder for the arrested
11 individual will be created by the front desk personnel.
12 Information on that arrested person will be entered into
13 our arrest book. A lien check will be done on that
14 individual to make sure there's no other wants or
15 warrants.

16 Once the officer is completed in that area, he
17 will proceed to area two. This is our bubble area or
18 area two. In this area, this is our final processing
19 area in Building 100. The individual will be thoroughly
20 searched by our DDC personnel. Any money over \$10 will
21 be placed in one of those three kiosk machines you see
22 against the wall, anything over \$10. After the money is
23 placed into that machine, a card, debit card, will be
24 created. And that amount minus any fees, that debit
25 card will then be put into the property of the detainee.

1 Once completed in this area, the officer will then take
2 his arrest to Building 500.

3 Once completed in 500, the officer then
4 returns to the report room area and completes his arrest
5 report at any of the multiple stations you see there.
6 To the rear of this area, this area here is our call
7 center area/warrant office. Building 500 is staffed and
8 operated by the Michigan Department of Corrections. The
9 current staff includes 44 detention officers and seven
10 supervisors. Building 500 as I mentioned before is the
11 final housing and booking location. To assist with that
12 booking, they have six live scan machines. We have --
13 the building is separated to female, male holding areas.
14 On the male side, you have eight holding areas, capacity
15 of 150 male prisoners. You have 41 additional
16 individual holding cells.

17 On the female side, we have two female holding
18 areas, maximum capacity of 50 female detainees with an
19 additional 22 individual holding cells. There's also
20 three female and five male video arraignment rooms
21 available. Three arraignments are conducted daily in
22 Building 500, roughly 8:30, 10:30 and 2:30, 2:30 being
23 the felony arraignments. There's also a health care
24 nurse on duty 24 hours a day in Building 500 along with
25 a doctor that visits I believe it's one hour a day; yes,

1 one hour a day.

2 This is a picture of Building 500. As you
3 approach from Building 100, there's a walkway from
4 Building 100, I don't know, maybe a hundred yards or so.
5 Female holding facility on your left-hand side with the
6 male on the right-hand side. Some of the features of
7 course as I mentioned before, we are located on the Ryan
8 Correctional Facility grounds, which is a completely
9 secure location. Visitors are buzzed in through the
10 front door in Building 100. Once inside the door, they
11 have to be passed through a metal detector.

12 Okay. Sally port gates. Sally port gates are
13 monitored and operated by our desk staff personnel.
14 Once the officer pulls into the Sally port, he cannot
15 take that prisoner out of his car until that Sally port
16 gate is closed. Once closed, then he can bring his
17 prisoner out of the vehicle and into the building.
18 Building 100 and 500, there is a state of the art camera
19 system that monitors all areas of both buildings as well
20 as the exterior of the building.

21 We have what I call our -- and an effort to --
22 there's been complaints that people can't get through to
23 get information on their loved ones that are arrested.
24 So, we have tried to -- what we did was create a -- what
25 I call the call center. I have that staffed 24 hours a

1 day. Right now it's only one individual. Calls are
2 still overpowering these one individuals. Hopefully,
3 you know, I'd like to have two there. But right now we
4 only have one.

5 Not only can they get detainee information,
6 but I have also made available bail bonds information,
7 phone numbers to the state police, to DPS, to Wayne
8 State Police, to the Third Circuit Court, 36th District
9 Court as well as the detective units.

10 So, any questions coming in, the person
11 answering the phone can give to the individuals. Some
12 of the things that are currently in the works, we are
13 trying to get an ATM machine and a web-based bond paying
14 system that would allow us to -- right now, if you don't
15 have cash, then you can't bond anybody out. And the
16 individuals we make those cards for can't bond
17 themselves out because they cannot -- they don't have
18 access to that cash. So, therefore, with an ATM machine
19 in our lobby, those folks should be able to bond
20 themselves out if they can, if they have the money.

21 And Lieutenant Yoseman (phonetic), admin
22 lieutenant is very tech savvy. And we've been talking
23 about trying to get an online type of system or
24 information system that you might have for County or
25 MDOC where you hit something and it tells you, okay, my

1 loved one is here, you know, what their status is
2 because right now all they can do is call us. And we
3 get -- I'm telling you we get tons of calls. I have sat
4 in that room, and it's pretty bad.

5 But those are some of the things that we're
6 working on. Some of the impacts. I think the first
7 impact that the DDC has has since it's opened is the
8 fact that we are now operating with about 45 to
9 50 percent less -- fewer staff than we did when we had
10 the five district detention holding cells available.
11 That allows of course more manpower, more boots on the
12 street.

13 The medical care costs, I do not have numbers.
14 But just from my own experience, medical care costs,
15 this probably has been -- this is enormous for both the
16 city as well as the county. Of the 13,859 detainees
17 that have been screened by DDC health care, only 1,289
18 of those detainees were actually sent to the ER. That
19 was as of September of this year.

20 In the past, we might send anywhere from five
21 to 700 detainees to the ER. That number today is
22 approximately 96 per month, which is -- that's such a
23 dramatic decrease in cost effectiveness. And what that
24 also does is officers now for the most part do not have
25 to -- are not stuck at the hospital waiting on their

1 prisoners, you know, where they could be on the street
2 doing their thing, answering runs or what have you.

3 Overcrowding. There's been many times when I
4 worked in communications in the summer months, we'd get
5 calls, you know, we are looking for housing you know.
6 Cell block might be down because it needed to be
7 cleaned. So, DDC has never had that problem at all. We
8 have a maximum capacity of 200, 50 females, 150 males.
9 We have never even been close to reaching that capacity
10 even in the summer months.

11 The summer months, we are processing close to
12 470 arrests per week. And we have never come close to
13 that. I think our average daily population at the DDC
14 is around 43 to 50 males and 9 to 10 females. So, that
15 overcrowding is not an issue there.

16 But I think the key benefit of the DDC was
17 that five percent, if I may, component that allowed the
18 Detroit Police Department to come into compliance with
19 all 65 paragraphs and requirements of the conditions of
20 confinement of the Consent Judgement. Have you got any
21 questions?

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I'm pretty sure they have
23 some questions for you. Commissioners?

24 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the Chair, for
25 incoming calls, you only have one person answering

1 incoming calls? Is it just a lack of personnel or do
2 you need more phones or --

3 CAPTAIN SOLANO: No. We have plenty of
4 phones. It's just we don't have personnel to staff two
5 people every day, 24 hours a day. That's just strictly
6 for those incoming calls relating to prisoner
7 information, loved ones willing.

8 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: So, it's pretty
9 conceivable that a person could call several times and
10 not get through if they are checking on their loved
11 ones?

12 CAPTAIN SOLANO: Absolutely.

13 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the Chair, to
14 follow up to Commissioner Shelby, you came before us I
15 guess it was back in April or something. It was the
16 same issue. But I raised the issue about the phones.
17 And I do understand there's only one person that is -- a
18 matter of fact, a couple nights ago -- and I work in
19 Wayne County jail as a deputy. I was in the jail for
20 16 hours. I just was there at 3:00 a.m. in the morning.
21 And I talked to an individual from the DDC who happened
22 to call in to the jail and that same information that
23 you just gave us conveyed in terms of, there's only one
24 person answering the phone.

25 The complaints are consistent there. When the

1 individuals call the jail trying to find someone -- and
2 I know the fact if they're in transit to the jail, see,
3 because we have got no information on them until they
4 actually are booked into the jail. So, there's nothing
5 on our computers. But their complaint is that, you
6 know, they called and called and called the DDC. And
7 also too, on the issue of bonding, I see this is pending
8 the ATM for citizens to use for bonding purposes, on
9 line bond payment and also on line information City of
10 Detroit website is pending. When is that going to go on
11 line or do you have any guesstimate?

12 CAPTAIN SOLANO: I have no guesstimate. The
13 ATM machine, right now that process is with finance.
14 The on line bond payment is -- we are still talking with
15 GTL and the City of Detroit finance department,
16 purchasing. I do not know. I cannot give you an
17 answer.

18 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: As a follow-up to that
19 too, that's another issue because individuals that do
20 call the jail, they were told they could bond someone
21 out at the DDC. They go to the DDC, and then they are
22 told they can't bond them out at the DDC, that that
23 person is -- the person that's incarcerated is on the
24 way to the Wayne County Jail. So, when they come in the
25 door, you know, we see them too and hear the

1 frustration.

2 CAPTAIN SOLANO: If the bodies at the DDC have
3 instructed the supervisors to bond that person out, here
4 is the problem. Ten percent bonding. We -- a couple
5 supervisors have actually tried to ten percent bond
6 somebody out after arraignment. 36th District wasn't
7 taking the money because the paperwork wasn't right.
8 So, we are -- I'm trying to correct that so that we can
9 attempt to take those ten percent bonds.

10 But yes, that was an issue. I think the
11 deputy chief, Raphael Washington, I spoke to him about
12 that. Our people -- my supervisors have been instructed
13 do not send anybody away. We are -- we will try to bond
14 them out if we can.

15 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Okay. Like I said,
16 it's just that I wanted -- the number one complaint is
17 they just can't get any information. And there's just
18 -- they call and call and call, and just there's no one
19 picking up that phone. And I do understand if there's
20 one person, and there are phones in there or different
21 phone lines --

22 CAPTAIN SOLANO: It's possible -- I have
23 instructed that two people to be back there when it's
24 possible. Sometimes it is, most of the time not.

25 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: All right, sir. Thank

1 you.

2 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: May I follow up on a
3 couple things that just came up? Thank you for your
4 report. I am surprised, however, to learn that we are
5 not effectively using restricted duty people. One of
6 the reasons that we send them to the DDC was to answer
7 the phones. So --

8 CAPTAIN SOLANO: That's what they are doing.

9 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: One of them per shift?

10 CAPTAIN SOLANO: Yes.

11 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: How many restricted
12 duties do you have, can you find out? We don't have to
13 do it for this meeting. But the sole purpose of them
14 being there is to provide that administrative support.
15 So, if you could find that out and report back to my
16 office today as to how many you have and how you're
17 using them?

18 CAPTAIN SOLANO: Yes, sir.

19 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: The other issue is --
20 and I'm not clear, is the issue with the bond that they
21 are not able to bond at the DDC or are we not bonding at
22 the DDC?

23 CAPTAIN SOLANO: We are bonding. We do bond.

24 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: The Commissioner's
25 question had to do with people being sent to Wayne

1 County because they are not allowed to bond.

2 CAPTAIN SOLANO: No. What happens is they get
3 arraigned, and they are sent to County and/or if they
4 have traffic warrants and they can't pay the bond, we
5 try to bond those people out all the time. If they
6 cannot bond, if they don't have money, then they are
7 sent to Wayne County. I don't know what could -- maybe
8 you can tell me what happens to those individuals that
9 can't pay that traffic warrant when they get to you and
10 they still can't pay, I'm not sure what happens.

11 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Excuse me. Through
12 the Chair. Well, they are going to stay in the Wayne
13 County Jail until someone comes up with the money or
14 they go to court and that gets resolved. But the issue
15 is, their relatives who have bond money, they go to the
16 DDC, they can't bond them or there's just lost
17 information as to -- not lost information. It's
18 information that they are in transit to the Wayne County
19 Jail. It takes approximately maybe a couple hours from
20 the time they walk into the door until they are booked
21 in, until they actually come up on line on the computer
22 where we can see just what the bond is and what the
23 charges are.

24 And I do understand that factor in terms of
25 being in transit, not being on line at the time these

1 individuals call and all that. But it's just that the
2 lost -- or the individual spends their time traveling to
3 the DDC because often times they can't even get anybody
4 on the phone. And then when they get there, you know,
5 then the person is not there or if they are there, they
6 aren't able to bond them; and they will end up coming
7 down to the Wayne County Jail, which is -- you know, I'm
8 not speaking for the administration of the jail. But,
9 you know, they bond people out 24 hours at the Wayne
10 County Jail. And that's not an issue. They are bonding
11 at the Wayne County Jail. But it's just that the
12 citizens -- and that's, you know, I have resolved or
13 mediated a number of complaints over the phone. I mean,
14 just telling, you know, more or less apologetic for what
15 has occurred at the DDC I don't work for.

16 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: If I may by way of
17 follow up, through the Chair -- and I appreciate your
18 eloquent response, Commissioner. But that's
19 unacceptable to me, the issues that were brought up here
20 today. So, we are going to have a single-purpose
21 meeting to discuss the issues that you brought up as
22 well as this notion that we can't answer a telephone.
23 And then I'd like to report back to this Board in one
24 week what we have done about that.

25 So, I'd like to bring the good captain back

1 with some answers next week after we have our
2 single-purpose meeting to discuss those issues.

3 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, sir. Thank you.

4 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Through the Chair, a
5 separate issue, can you bring back communications as
6 well, Assistant Chief? Thank you.

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Any other questions,
8 comments from the Commissioners?

9 COMMISSIONER CARTER: I have a question. Do
10 you have bilingual officers at the Detention Center?

11 CAPTAIN SOLANO: No.

12 DEPUTY WARDEN TELLEZ: Yes, ma'am, we do. On
13 the back in Building 500, we do have bilingual staff.
14 One speaks --

15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I'm sorry. Would you
16 identify yourself?

17 DEPUTY WARDEN TELLEZ: Yes, sir. Deputy
18 Warden Terry Tellez, DDC. Both speak Spanish and Farsi
19 quite fluently. So, they can read it, write it or speak
20 it.

21 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you.

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Captain, I want to thank
23 you for your report. And I really appreciate the
24 Assistant Chief weighing in on this and taking the
25 initiative to report back afterwards. So, we are

1 looking forward to more response next week because when
2 you talk about impact, I look at the humane treatment of
3 people who are innocent until proven guilty and that
4 their loved ones have an opportunity to bond them out.

5 We just know in our own experience the volume
6 of calls you get just from our past experience that you
7 get at a desk mainly inquiring about how can I get that
8 person out of jail. So, I think that's something that
9 we really are concerned about. And thank you, sir, I
10 understand. Hopefully we get to the bottom of it.

11 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: One moment. Through the
12 Chair, after your presentation, quite a presentation.
13 What you guys are doing now compared to what it used to
14 be in the old days, a hundred percent improvement. I
15 thank you for your work. I used to be the doorman
16 there. I'm telling you, you guys are doing a fantastic
17 job.

18 CAPTAIN SOLANO: Thank you.

19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Nothing like a doorman who
20 take care of business in the cell block. I never had
21 that job and didn't want that job. So, thank you, sir.
22 Appreciate it.

23 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Thank you, sir.

24 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: I echo the sentiments
25 of Commissioner Shelby, my old boss. So, we're doing a

1 phenomenal job, but we have to do better. Citizens who
2 are not getting services are not going to stand up and
3 say good work. People who are calling about their loved
4 ones who they haven't seen in three days are not going
5 to say good work. We certainly know and in house that's
6 good work.

7 So, you know, Captain, phenomenal, he helped
8 build the place. And it's no indictment of his
9 commitment to getting things right. But we have to do
10 better. And if we are getting phone calls and we are
11 not answering them, that's an unacceptable status to be
12 in.

13 I also wanted to add that we have ten
14 sergeants at the DDC, and that's in comparison to 30
15 sergeants that it used to take to run the individual
16 facilities around the city. We also have 23 or 26
17 police officers, 25 police officers at the DDC compared
18 to 45 police officers it took to run it city-wide. So,
19 we've realized some savings with officers putting
20 officers back on the street. And that concludes my
21 report.

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, sir. Appreciate
23 it. The next item would be Item Number 10, committee
24 reports. Any committee reports at this time. Yes, sir?

25 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Through the Chair, the

1 personnel committee will be interviewing a couple of
2 candidates today for the position of staff attorney.
3 Any commissioners that would like to come, you're more
4 than invited.

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, sir. Any other
6 reports? Moving to the next item would be new business.
7 We have a resignation letter from our attorney to the
8 Board, Aliyah Sabree, in terms of her resigning from her
9 duties and responsibilities with the Board. And with
10 reluctance, we are going to accept that resignation.
11 And the Chair would entertain a motion because if we
12 don't accept it, she can't leave. However -- that's a
13 joke.

14 But the Chair would entertain -- the Board has
15 received that resignation letter. So, the Chair would
16 entertain a motion to accept her resignation letter with
17 regret. And I also have some comments afterwards. I
18 appreciate that. So, what is your pleasure,
19 Commissioners? Do I hear a motion?

20 COMMISSIONER BYRD: So moved.

21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Do I hear a second?

22 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Second.

23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. It's been properly
24 moved and second to receive Aliyah Sabree's resignation
25 of duties and responsibilities as attorney to the Board.

1 Are you ready for the question? Those in favor, aye.

2 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those opposed? Motion
4 carried and approved. You're free. But we have one
5 more day to work, right?

6 ATTORNEY SABREE: Yes.

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: 4:00 tomorrow. And so, how
8 much can we get out of her? But on a serious note, I
9 would like to -- I'm going to pause for a minute on that
10 note. Okay. Any old business? No old business.

11 Announcements. Our next -- our community meeting is
12 scheduled for Thursday, November 13, at the Boys & Girls
13 Club, 16500 Tireman, would take place at 6:30 p.m. We
14 have a special guest presenting, that's Prosecutor Kim
15 Worthy. We are looking forward to that at 6:30 p.m.

16 So, share that with others. That's dealing
17 with -- Commissioner Crawford, do you want to respond to
18 that forum?

19 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: The presentation by
20 Wayne County Prosecutor Kim Worthy is the status update
21 on the rape kits, in terms of the processing of the rape
22 kits and where we are to date on that issue, the
23 backlog.

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, sir, for making
25 that contact and the follow up with Attorney Sabree in

1 terms of making that happen. Our next meeting would be
2 next week, November 6, at 3:00 p.m., right here at
3 Public Safety Headquarters.

4 So, we are now moving to oral communication
5 from the audience. And you have two minutes to speak.
6 And you speak to the Chair. I would ask that you be
7 respectful and we are respectful towards you in terms of
8 coming forward. I'd like to introduce and give the
9 first person to speak the Mens Who Dare Corporation, the
10 president, Larry Johnson.

11 MR. JOHNSON: Thank you, Mr. Chairman,
12 commissioners, Assistant Chief. My name is Larry
13 Johnson. I'm the president of the Men Who Dare, offices
14 directly across the street in the Legal Aid Defenders
15 building. We've been around for 55 years. I joined
16 them about five years ago. Lot of folks may know us
17 from throwing a lot of parties in the day.

18 That doesn't happen any more. What we're
19 doing now is working with the community. We have helped
20 over 550 kids go to college. We have raised almost
21 \$650,000, and we are going to start our new ACT training
22 process, skill testing so kids can go to ACT testing
23 prior to taking the test. So, it eliminates text
24 anxiety. We are going to teach them how important it is
25 and how really key it is for their success in going to

1 college.

2 The first quarter of 2015, we are going to
3 start our Men Who Dare mentoring program with a couple
4 of other groups. I wanted to come in and say hello.
5 And I'll shoot e-mails to each and every one of you.
6 I'll have an opportunity hopefully to meet you before
7 the year is out.

8 I did want to let you know that our 55th
9 anniversary is November 15th. Our key note speaker is
10 Chief Craig. Gentlemen, ma'am, thank you.

11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Any questions or comments
12 in reference to the Men Who Dare?

13 MR. JOHNSON: Thank you, sir. Appreciate it.
14 Looking forward to the interaction.

15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Any others? Please come
16 forward.

17 MR. WELBORN: Good people, Board, Assistant
18 Chief White, Bill Welborn, City Wide. I've been asked
19 by a couple of the 12th Precinct folks about
20 Commissioner Byrd. It seems like 99.9 percent is he is
21 going to be leaving. And they want to know, have you
22 all thought about any kind of recommendation as to how
23 you're going to replace him?

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It's not within the Board's
25 authority to make that recommendation. But the Mayor is

1 working it up, and those names are before the council at
2 this particular time. And so, that's basically all I
3 can say at this time. But this is strictly -- you can
4 contact the Mayor's Office or the council. They're
5 formulating that process once that seat is vacant. So,
6 yes.

7 MR. WELBORN: If they ask me, I'll say I will
8 find out.

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I'm pretty sure you can
10 contact the council, Brenda Jones, president. She can
11 probably respond to that inquiry.

12 MR. WELBORN: I called them. I will get some
13 information. Thank you very much.

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Any other
15 comments?

16 MR. COLLINS: My name is Jerome Collins. I'd
17 like to give you all a copy. I made these copies for
18 the Board. My name is Jerome Collins. Thank you,
19 Board, Assistant Chief White. I have a Complaint/
20 Request for Investigation to the Board of Police
21 Commissioners, failure to provide Garrity of Sergeant
22 Mattie Lewis during disciplinary proceedings in File No.
23 12-0137.

24 "I, Jerome R. Collins, am submitting this
25 formal complaint requesting that you Board of Police

1 Commissioners conduct an investigation into why the
2 Detroit Police Department failed to provide the Garrity
3 of Sergeant Mattie Lewis as part of the discovery
4 procedures during my disciplinary proceedings.

5 Circumstances involving Garrity: In December,
6 2009, Internal Affairs started an investigation into
7 allegations involving falsifying timecards. The
8 investigation consisted of obtaining various
9 work-related documentation and other forms of
10 communication. There were numerous Detroit Police
11 officers, employees and civilian interviews. I received
12 transcripts or CD's of eight witness statements. There
13 were at least 12 Garrity interviews. I received
14 transcripts, CD's of all except Sergeant Lewis.

15 On March 4th, 2010, Sergeant Lewis was
16 interviewed under investigative subpoena and a criminal
17 warrant for my arrest was signed on April 10, 2010.
18 Even through the testimony of Sergeant Lewis was
19 contradicted by the timecards and videotapes the
20 department had received on February 8, 2010.

21 On July 6, 2010, Sergeant Lewis received
22 Garrity and she admitted to ordering officers to falsify
23 activity logs. She also admitted to time fraud. On
24 January 12, 2010, I was suspended with pay. However, on
25 January 21, 2010, I was suspended without pay by the

1 Board of Police Commissioners. I was represented by
2 Attorney John Goldpaugh. Once my criminal case started,
3 I was initially represented by Attorney John Goldpaugh
4 and then by Attorney Gerald Evelyn. I was charged with
5 false pretenses, \$1,000 to \$20,000; larceny \$1,000 to
6 \$20,000; misconduct in office and could have been
7 imprisoned for ten years. Attorney Evelyn requested the
8 discovery materials and the Garrity of Sergeant Mattie
9 Lewis was not included."

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Excuse me. Are you reading
11 this entire document? Okay. Unfortunately your time
12 allotment is up. We have now received this document,
13 and we will proceed accordingly in terms of your
14 concerns and complaints. And we would thank you for
15 bringing this to our attention.

16 MR. COLLINS: Okay.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, sir. Any other
18 individuals care to speak? If not, it is closed out as
19 far as oral communications from the audience, and the
20 Chair would entertain a motion to adjourn.

21 But before we do that, I would like to have
22 our attorney to the Board, Aliya Sabree, come forth,
23 please. We have a gift for you for your service, your
24 love, your support and your awareness of your job. So,
25 we want to wish you the best. This is a token of

1 appreciation from the Commissioners and the staff. And
2 we wish you nothing but the best. Always stay in
3 contact with us.

4 ATTORNEY SABREE: Good afternoon to the Board.
5 Aliyah Sabree for the record. I just want to do it one
6 last time. I'm not going to talk much. I just want to
7 say to the Board and also to the staff, thank you for
8 the opportunity. I have had the opportunity to grow as
9 a professional and as an attorney. I'm very big on
10 serving the community, especially the City of Detroit.
11 And this has been a step in my process to continue to do
12 that.

13 So, when I move on to the Mayor's Office, I'm
14 only down the street, and I will not forget the Board
15 and everybody that I worked with. I had a great time,
16 built great relationships. And I just want to say thank
17 you for all the things you have done for me. Thanks.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Your two minutes is up.
19 Don't leave the mic yet. I just want to say this.
20 Since you are now going to be working for the Mayor,
21 just share this with the Mayor, that we love him.

22 ATTORNEY SABREE: Okay, I will. And I love
23 you all too.

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. We have coffee. We
25 don't do coffee. We have cake in the back of the room

1 and a little love for Aliyah in terms of breaking bread
2 with fellowship. And I just want to once again thank
3 you for your service. And I'm looking forward to
4 interaction with you on another level. So, please do
5 not forget about the Board of Police Commissioners
6 that's a wholesome part of the community.

7 ATTORNEY SABREE: I won't. Thank you.

8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioners, we stand for
9 adjournment. We'll entertain a motion for adjournment.

10 COMMISSIONER MOORE: So moved.

11 COMMISSIONER BYRD: Support.

12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It's been properly moved
13 and second. Those in favor?

14 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Opposed? Motion carried.
16 Thank you.
