4 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Let the record
5 show that the meeting was called to order at
6 6:40, Thursday, February 13, 2014.

7 I'm Commissioner Jessica Taylor, I'm
8 the Chair of the Board of Police Commissioners
9 and at this time I'd like to ask our board
10 attorney Ms. Aliyah Sabree to do the roll call.

11 ATTORNEY SABREE: Good evening. For
12 the record, Aliyah Sabree, attorney to the Board.
13 At this time I'd like to do roll call.

14 Commissioner Jessica Taylor?

15 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: I'm here.

16 ATTORNEY SABREE: Commissioner Donnell
17 White? Commissioner Richard Shelby?

18 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Present.

19 ATTORNEY SABREE: Commissioner Wendell
20 Byrd?

21 COMMISSIONER BYRD: Present.

22 ATTORNEY SABREE: Commissioner Reginald
23 Crawford?

24 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Present.

25 ATTORNEY SABREE: Commissioner Willie

1 Bell? Commissioner Willie Burton? Commissioner
2 Lisa Carter?

3 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Present.

4 ATTORNEY SABREE: Commissioner Ricardo
5 Moore?

6 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Present.

7 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: And from the
8 Chief's office we have Chief Craig -- Chief James
9 Craig is here.

10 CHIEF CRAIG: How you doing? Thank
11 you.

12 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: And I'm going to
13 ask Ms. Sabree if she would introduce the rest of
14 the staff.

15 ATTORNEY SABREE: I'm standing in today
16 for Mr. George Anthony, the Secretary to the
17 Board, and today we have with us Mr. Robert
18 Brown, our office manager. We have our recorder
19 Sgt. Alan Quinn and we also have our court
20 reporter Dale Rose.

21 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Okay. At this
22 time I'm going to ask Councilman Spivey if he
23 would do the invocation for us, please.

24 COUNCILMAN SPIVEY: Good evening to the
25 Board, to all who are here. Let us pray.

1 (INVOCATION WAS GIVEN.)

2 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: At this time I'd
3 like to thank Ms. Carol Shancook who is the
4 facilities director here at the Samaritan Center
5 and thank her for letting us use this facility
6 for our board meeting. Is Ms. Shancook here, is
7 she present?

8 MR. OWENS: She's not here, but I'm
9 Mark Owens, executive director of the Samaritan
10 Center and we welcome you.

11 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Thank you, sir.
12 At this time if the commissioners don't mind I'm
13 going to move -- change the agenda just a little
14 here. I'm going to have the -- well, first I'm
15 going to have you read -- Commissioner Crawford,
16 I'm going to have you read the duties and
17 responsibilities of the Board.

18 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Created by the
19 City Charter July 1, 1974.

20 Composition: The Board of Police
21 Commissioners is composed of 11 members, seven of
22 whom shall be elected from each non-at large
23 district, four members appointed by the Mayor
24 subject to the approval of the City Council.

25 Appointed commissioners serve five-year

1 terms and may not serve more than five years
2 consecutively. The Board of Police Commissioners
3 meets once a week and may recess during
4 Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year holidays.
5 All meetings are open to the public.

6 Responsibilities: The Board of Police
7 Commissioners has supervisory control and
8 oversight of the police department as set in the
9 2012 City Charter adopted by a vote of the people
10 on November 8, 2011.

11 Duties: Establish policy, rules and
12 regulations in consultation with the Chief and
13 the approval of the Mayor, review and approve the
14 department budget, review and approve department
15 promotions, receive and resolve complaints
16 concerning the operations of the police
17 department, act as final authority in imposing or
18 reviewing discipline of employees of the
19 department, prepares an annual report to the
20 Mayor, the City Council and the public of the
21 department's activities during the previous year.

22 Staff: The Board appoints a Board
23 Secretary who attends all Board meetings, Chief
24 Investigator and additional investigators, other
25 staff as necessary to provide support to the

1 Board.

2 The Police Commission considers itself
3 a liaison between the citizens of the city of
4 Detroit and the Detroit Police Department.

5 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Thank you, sir.
6 At this time, Board, I'm going to move the Chief
7 up because he has another appointment and he was
8 double-booked so I'm going to move him up to do
9 his presentation at this time.

10 CHIEF CRAIG: Good afternoon -- or good
11 evening, honorable board members, and certainly I
12 want to acknowledge my team, the Detroit Police
13 Department, one of the finest police officers in
14 this country. Can we just give them a round of
15 applause.

16 (APPLAUSE.)

17 CHIEF CRAIG: Some great news this
18 week. Certainly what we left off on last year in
19 terms of crime reductions has continued. In
20 fact, you probably heard some of the news reports
21 that during the month of January we ended the
22 month with 13 homicides and that was the lowest
23 number of homicides of any month going back to
24 2001. And I know some might think well, you
25 know, Chief, we had a snowy cold month and

1 certainly people don't like to commit crime when
2 it's cold outside. I will tell you our research
3 said something a little different and what it
4 showed is we had in some instances during very
5 cold months more crime, so I would say that the
6 strategies that we're using are working,
7 Operation Restore, CompStat just to name a few,
8 and so we're excited.

9 So by way of example year to date we're
10 sitting right now on a 31 percent reduction in
11 homicide year to date which translates into 24
12 homicides compared to 35 this time last year.

13 Our non-fatal shooting, we're sitting
14 at a 17 percent reduction which is significant
15 compared to last year. Overall our violent
16 crimes are down 25 percent and overall crime
17 which includes both property and violent crime is
18 down 32 percent.

19 As you know, for 2014 we set a -- what
20 I'm calling kind of a stretch goal of a 10
21 percent reduction in overall crime for the year
22 and that's above and beyond the 7 percent
23 reduction we realized in 2013.

24 Some other good news, in addition to
25 reducing homicides you know we set a goal and I

1 was very critical after being appointed middle of
2 last year of our homicide clearing rate. In
3 fact, we talked about 11 percent, we looked at
4 our processes, we went to 40 end of the year with
5 a 50 percent clearance rate in homicide, and
6 clearly that wasn't good enough.

7 So we set for 2014 a 70 percent
8 clearance rate in homicide. Now, I will tell you
9 I know it's the first quarter of the year,
10 certainly not to get overly excited, but year to
11 date we're sitting at 100 percent clearance rate
12 in homicide. Thank you.

13 (APPLAUSE.)

14 CHIEF CRAIG: I got to tell you, I got
15 a great team, certainly under the leadership of
16 Asst. Chief Jones and David Levalley and his
17 team, the homicide team, they have really hit the
18 ground running. You know, as I've often times
19 said, one homicide is one too many, but certainly
20 when you talk about instilling trust in the
21 police department, being able to put some sense
22 of closure to family members by closing these
23 cases is so critical, so we're going to continue
24 to push very hard.

25 Some other notable efforts during this

1 period, certainly Chief Levalley reported out
2 about a series of robberies that were occurring
3 across several of our precincts, a total of 17.
4 Through hard diligent work we were able to
5 identify the serial robbers, ended up making
6 arrests, five arrests, closing that case out.

7 Some of them, some of the robberies
8 occurred in some of our neighboring suburban
9 cities, so again great job by the Detroit Police
10 Department on a job well done.

11 You also heard recently yesterday we
12 had a critical stabbing incident on an MDOT bus
13 in the 10th Precinct, a tragic situation, a young
14 man is still living, came out of a dispute. We
15 reported out on it today on the news, but our
16 Gang Intelligence and Transit Unit came in right
17 following the incident, worked around the clock
18 and today probably now three or four hours ago
19 identified a suspect and that suspect is in
20 custody for that violent crime.

21 (APPLAUSE.)

22 CHIEF CRAIG: And lastly, you know, one
23 of the things I've often times been so concerned
24 about is something called human trafficking. You
25 know, a lot of times it's one of those kind of

1 crimes you don't really see. I mean, you see the
2 streetwalking prostitution that occurs in certain
3 parts of our city, so in response to that late
4 last year we started a Vice Unit and the Vice
5 Unit has done phenomenal work in its short time.

6 In fact, just by way of some
7 statistics, they've made 12 felony arrests, 27
8 misdemeanors, gone into a variety of strip clubs.
9 You know, Detroit has an inordinate number of
10 strip clubs in this city and so they're going in
11 the strip clubs, they're looking at some of our
12 party stores and they've been directly tied into
13 what I affectionately call our parties, our
14 Operation Restore efforts, and did a phenomenal
15 job.

16 As part of their investigative work
17 they came across a 15-year-old missing, a
18 15-year-old who was a sex slave. That
19 15-year-old was missing from the city of Detroit
20 since October of 2012, and through their diligent
21 efforts they were able to rescue that young lady,
22 but in addition to that they were able to make
23 several arrests and the investigation continues.

24 So great job by our Vice Unit. I wish
25 they were here tonight to thank them for the

1 efforts. And this is something we will continue
2 to push on. We know that human trafficking is
3 alive and well in the city of Detroit and we're
4 going to continue our efforts on that.

5 So that concludes my report out on
6 crime. Oh, one thing I wanted to say before
7 opening it up for any questions you might have,
8 you've heard me talk a lot about the CompStat and
9 certainly to the Honorable Board of Police
10 Commissioners we certainly invite you out to come
11 and see our CompStat every Wednesday 10 o'clock.

12 We are looking to do a community
13 CompStat. I know Councilperson Spivey expressed
14 an interest in coming to a CompStat, so we would
15 be willing if it's works with everyone's schedule
16 to maybe have an evening CompStat out in the
17 community so you can see what Detroit Police
18 Department does each and every week in
19 evaluating, addressing crime trends.

20 And so if that's something that the
21 Board would want to explore, we can make that
22 adjustment because we know it's difficult
23 sometimes to come out 10 o'clock on a weekday.

24 So with that, I'll open it up for any
25 questions or comments.

1 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Chief, are you
2 staying for the questions or is AC White --

3 (COMMISSIONERS WHITE AND BURTON ARRIVE.)

4 CHIEF CRAIG: AC White will be here to
5 take any questions. Does the Board have any
6 questions?

7 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Do you have any
8 -- go ahead, Commissioner Crawford.

9 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes ma'am,
10 through the Chair. Chief, you talked about the
11 transit system, the bus system, and I just had a
12 question here and a brief statement.

13 Is that under the authority of the
14 police department now and I think perhaps it
15 should be. I've heard something different or
16 recently about this Regional Transit and it may
17 come under the authority of the police
18 department. I think that would be a lot better
19 since we used to run the DDOT unit or Blue Bird
20 Unit years ago.

21 Also too, that particular incident you
22 talked about is really significant because if
23 what's been reported in the media is correct
24 there was this argument about the history or
25 misrepresentation of some historical fact about

1 Dr. King between the young man and the
2 perpetrator and the mere fact that it occurred on
3 the bus and this is Black History Month and Rosa
4 Parks, as we all know the history of Rosa Parks
5 and transit systems throughout, you know, what
6 occurred back in the '50s as to where we are
7 today in terms of bus riding, but I just really
8 wanted to know if that's going to come under the
9 Detroit Police Department and I certainly hope it
10 does.

11 CHIEF CRAIG: I can tell you I am not
12 certain at this point. I know there's an
13 evaluation being conducted. I know there were
14 some grants awarded in the past to the
15 department. It kind of went over to the sheriff
16 so we're not certain where it stands right now.
17 Certainly in response to late last year there was
18 some allegations by some of the drivers that
19 there was violence on their coaches. We
20 responded very quickly and developed a Gang
21 Intelligence Surveillance Transit Unit that,
22 frankly, has been very effective. In fact, the
23 arrest was made by that unit and district or
24 Precinct Special Operations Unit.

25 So in addition to that surveillance

1 unit that has been on the various bus lines the
2 patrol officers have been required to board buses
3 and just to make sure that the routes are safe
4 and a lot of that was driven by the data we
5 looked at from CompStat.

6 So in terms of this new unit, I really
7 don't have an answer for you as of yet and I
8 understand and I would agree, it is my position,
9 has been my position, that we certainly can
10 police the transit systems, especially with the
11 talk of an M-1 line. It just would be a more
12 efficient and effective way of policing that
13 entity, especially when you talk about our
14 dispatch that's already in place.

15 And even if you look at the ordinance,
16 the ordinance requires that the Detroit Police
17 Department train these officers, so it just makes
18 good sense to keep it under the purview of the
19 Detroit Police Department.

20 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Well, sir,
21 thank you and thank the department and the
22 officers for the apprehension of that individual.

23 CHIEF CRAIG: Thank you.

24 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Are there any
25 more questions? At this time let me just stop

1 and acknowledge that we've had joining us
2 Commissioner Burton as well as Commissioner
3 White.

4 Now, we can resume with the questions.
5 Any more questions, commissioners? If not, then
6 we can move to the next item then.

7 CHIEF CRAIG: Thank you very much.
8 (CHIEF CRAIG LEAVES AND ASST. CHIEF
9 JAMES WHITE NOW REPRESENTING THE
10 CHIEF'S OFFICE).

11 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: A motion is in
12 order to approve the agenda for Thursday,
13 February 13, 2014.

14 COMMISSIONER MOORE: So moved.

15 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Second.

16 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: It's been moved
17 and supported. Are there any questions? Seeing
18 none, the agenda will be accepted as written.

19 There's a motion in order for the
20 approval of the minutes for Thursday, February 6,
21 2014.

22 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: So moved.

23 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Second.

24 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: It's been moved
25 and supported. Any questions? All in favor?

1 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

2 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: All opposed?

3 Minutes will be accepted as written. The Board
4 of Police Commissioners Officers report, I don't
5 have a report tonight and I'll move to the next
6 item which is a standing committee report.

7 Are there any committee reports? No
8 committee reports? We'll move to new business.
9 We have two resolutions tonight. The first
10 resolution will be for LifeBUILDERS. I'm going
11 to ask Commissioner Carter if she would do the
12 honors.

13 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Resolution,
14 LifeBUILDERS.

15 WHEREAS, LifeBUILDERS located in
16 Detroit Regent Park neighborhood --

17 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Anyone from
18 LifeBUILDERS here? Come up, sir.

19 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Resolution,
20 LifeBUILDERS.

21 WHEREAS, LifeBUILDERS located in the
22 Detroit Regent Park neighborhood is a private
23 non-profit tax-exempt 501(c)(3) social service
24 organization offering a wide range of programs
25 devoted to fighting poverty and maintaining and

1 supporting the family unit and improving the
2 quality of life for individuals of all ages; and

3 WHEREAS, LifeBUILDERS has served the
4 Detroit community and surrounding areas for nine
5 years - it currently administers several programs
6 at 25 single homes, two eight-unit apartment
7 complexes, a community center and a resale shop
8 and

9 WHEREAS, LifeBUILDERS was started by
10 Larry Johnson, Executive Director, along with his
11 wife Marilyn Johnson, Director. It all began
12 with one modest house on Detroit's east side for
13 women looking to break free from substance abuse
14 could stay there. Two years ago the Johnsons
15 decided to take their biggest leap. They left
16 their well-to-do Grosse Pointe home and moved
17 into a 2,000 square foot home right alongside the
18 people they were helping and

19 WHEREAS, LifeBUILDERS program includes
20 non-denominational based programs for the youths,
21 adults, seniors and families. LifeBUILDERS gives
22 a hand up and not a hand out. LifeBUILDERS is
23 making a difference in Detroit and the
24 surrounding community, for example:

25 Building communtias, (a Latin word that

1 means an unstructured community where everyone is
2 equal.) to recognize that all are individually
3 loved by God and are beneficiaries of His Grace;
4 and

5 Reclaiming the neighborhood by
6 reclaiming abandoned houses and former drug dens
7 into managed housing and providing affordable
8 housing to those who need it most; and.

9 Empowering the youth by developing
10 relationships with the children and youth in the
11 community when they are hungry for more than
12 food. By introducing the youth to a God who
13 loves them, by providing education, job
14 opportunities while restoring hope and empowering
15 the youth to make a difference inside and outside
16 the community; and

17 NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the
18 Board of Police Commissioners speaking on behalf
19 of the citizens of the city of Detroit and the
20 Detroit Police Department acknowledge and applaud
21 LifeBUILDERS by performing this important and
22 valuable work in our community.

23 Through its efforts, LifeBUILDERS moves
24 individuals and families from dependence to
25 independence and helps eradicate poverty in the

1 mind, body and spirit. We thank and congratulate
2 LifeBUILDERS.

3 Detroit Board of Police Commissioners.

4 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: We'd like to have
5 you say a few words.

6 MR. JOHNSON: Well, it's no wonder
7 we're so tired, I didn't realize we did all that.
8 First of all, I'd like to thank God for the
9 opportunity he's given us to serve in this
10 community. I mean, it's amazing.

11 But I only want to say one thing and
12 maybe Marilyn would like to add this. The real
13 applause goes to you all, okay. We do a small
14 thing in the community, but our hats are off to
15 you. We applaud you for the great work that
16 you're doing in our community. You're the ones
17 who make a huge difference.

18 Without you, the work you're doing and
19 the re-commitment to our community, we have far
20 less hope than we have right now, so we thank
21 each and every one of you.

22 I say to you, way to go. We pray for
23 you, we're thankful for you, way to go, way to
24 go.

25 (APPLAUSE.)

1 MS. JOHNSON: I grew up in Detroit,
2 went to Denby and lived my entire adult life in
3 suburbs, Bloomfield Hills, Grosse Pointe and
4 Birmingham, and let me tell you, it is a thrill
5 to be a Detroiter again.

6 I am so excited to live in Detroit and
7 my friends think I'm crazy, some of my family
8 thinks I'm crazy, but I love this city, I love
9 the people of Detroit and it is an honor to live
10 here and to just to work and do what we do.

11 And I too just applaud all of you.
12 Come by, see us. We're at 20141 Kelly Road
13 between Seven and Eight Mile Road and we'll give
14 you a grand tour. You don't have to come on your
15 work time and watch out for us, just come over
16 and visit us, we would love to you; thank you.

17 (APPLAUSE.)

18 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: We have another
19 resolution for whom I would refer to as Honorary
20 Commissioner Warfield -- yes. So is Former
21 Commissioner Warfield, is he here? All right.

22 I'm going to ask Commissioner White to
23 do the honors.

24 COMMISSIONER WHITE: I'd like to make a
25 motion that we transform this in a roast instead

1 of a resolution.

2 (LAUGHTER).

3 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: So moved.

4 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Certainly it's an
5 honor. I've had an opportunity to read a number
6 of these resolutions, but this is the first time
7 I've been able to do one for a colleague I've
8 served with, but it's certainly an honor to read
9 a resolution, colleagues, honoring Detroit Police
10 Commissioner Reverend Jerome L. Warfield, Sr.

11 WHEREAS Reverend Jerome L. Warfield, Sr
12 was appointed to the Detroit Board of Police
13 Commissioners in September of 2009 and is the
14 pastor of Mt. Vernon Missionary Baptist Church
15 located in the Brightmoor community of Detroit.

16 Reverend Warfield is a devoted family
17 man who has been married to his lovely and
18 supportive wife Jacqueline for more than 22
19 years. He is also the father of three children,
20 Jessica, Jerome and Justin. Reverend Warfield is
21 highly respected among his peers and admired for
22 his sincere commitment to serving others and

23 WHEREAS Commissioner Warfield was an
24 honors graduate from Chadsey High School and
25 attended -- go green -- Michigan State University

1 where he received a bachelor's degree in
2 political science and criminal justice.

3 In recognition of his high academic
4 achievement and leadership in college
5 Commissioner Warfield was selected to deliver the
6 commencement address during graduation ceremonies
7 at Michigan State.

8 He then went on to earn a master's
9 degree in pastoral counseling from the Ashland
10 Theological Seminary and

11 WHEREAS Commissioner Warfield served
12 two terms as the Police Commissioner's chair and
13 chaired or co-chaired several board committees
14 including the Budget Committee, Personnel and
15 Training, the Citizen Complaint Committee and
16 Disciplinary Appeals and

17 WHEREAS Commissioner Warfield as Chair
18 started each board meeting with prayer because of
19 his belief in the power of prayer and led the
20 Board in accomplishing significant achievements
21 including implementing new towing rules, to
22 create fairness and equity in towing
23 opportunities, adopting a new standard of
24 operating procedures for the Office of the Chief
25 Investigator, holding public hearings on the

1 police budget and creating a procedure to
2 identify qualified candidates for the Police
3 Chief position when a vacancy occurs and

4 WHEREAS in addition to his pastoral
5 duties Commissioner Warfield serves as the
6 chairman of the Trinity Community Development
7 Corporation which is a 501(c)(3) component of the
8 Mt. Vernon Missionary Baptist Church.

9 Through this corporation Mt. Vernon
10 established a Trinity Youth Tech Leadership
11 Training Academy which is dedicated to training
12 young people in the basic leadership principals
13 and computer skills and

14 WHEREAS Commissioner Warfield also
15 served as the Chairperson of the Brightmoor
16 Alliance, a coalition of organizations dedicated
17 to improving the Brightmoor Community. The
18 alliance shares a common vision for the community
19 to pray, grow, learn, thrive and play. As a
20 result of his leadership, Brightmoor Alliance
21 nearly doubled its membership of organizations
22 and

23 WHEREAS Commissioner Warfield was
24 endowed with the 2007 Outstanding Ecumenical
25 leader Award from the N.E.X.T. Detroit

1 Neighborhood Initiative and was designated as the
2 community champion by Mayor Kwame Kilpatrick for
3 spearheading the revitalization and
4 re-development in the Brightmoor Community and

5 WHEREAS Commissioner Warfield continues
6 to serve as an advocate for Detroit, it's
7 residents and supporters and sits on several
8 advisory boards including the Detroit Commission
9 and

10 WHEREAS Commissioner Warfield was
11 recently appointed by Michigan Governor Rick
12 Snyder to serve on the State of Michigan's Parole
13 Board and

14 WHEREAS Commissioner Warfield tendered
15 his resignation from the Board effective January
16 31, 2014 after four and a half years of dedicated
17 and devoted service to our citizens, the Board
18 and police department.

19 NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the
20 Detroit Board of Police Commissioners speaking on
21 behalf of the citizens of the great city of
22 Detroit and police department honor and salute
23 Police Commissioner Jerome L. Warfield, Sr for
24 his compassion, spirit of giving, stewardship and
25 unwavering commitment.

1 His leadership has advanced the cause
2 for civilian oversight of law enforcement and has
3 established a benchmark upon which future boards
4 can build.

5 We thank and salute you, Commissioner
6 Warfield, Sr for a job well done, signed the
7 Board of Police Commissioners, adopted this day
8 February 13, 2014.

9 (APPLAUSE.)

10 COMMISSIONER WHITE: A nice shiny
11 retirement badge. I'm not going to pin it on you
12 like the Marines do, but we'll give it to you
13 there. There you go. Congratulations, sir.

14 (APPLAUSE.)

15 REV. WARFIELD: Thank you. First of
16 all, I certainly want to thank all of my
17 colleagues for the job that you all have done and
18 the job that you shall do very soon. I want to
19 thank all the men and the women from the Detroit
20 Police Department certainly and I want to thank
21 all the towers and all the citizens.

22 It's been an amazing journey. You
23 know, it's been one that we enjoyed thoroughly.
24 I mean, very passionate about being a member of
25 the Board of Police Commissioners as those of you

1 who follow us know and fought tooth and nail to
2 make sure that the officers were covered, to make
3 sure that the citizens' rights were being
4 protected, and also to make sure that the Board
5 received the just do that it needed as relates to
6 its powers under the Charter.

7 And so I would just admonish the Board
8 to continue to fight for what the citizens told
9 you to do and to continue to do a good job.

10 I've said it before and I'll say again,
11 without the staff of the Board of Police
12 Commissioners we would not have done any of this.
13 George Anthony who's not here who's away, who's
14 out of the country, to -- she now sits on the
15 Chief's staff, but certainly to Deputy Chief
16 Celia Banks Washington and to Rob who is the glue
17 that holds all this together, to Chief
18 Investigator, thank you for what you've done over
19 in the department to Supervisor Investigator
20 Akbar who has been a stalwart in the department
21 and just so many people to thank.

22 No one is an island unto themselves and
23 I want to thank all of you for all of your help,
24 for all of your support and mostly for all of
25 your prayers and I just ask that you continue to

1 support this Board, continue to pray for them and
2 continue to lift them up.

3 Thank you so very much.

4 (APPLAUSE.)

5 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Commissioner
6 Warfield, I want you to know I was at a meeting
7 yesterday and I introduced myself and they said,
8 "Oh, you the new Commissioner Warfield" so I
9 guess --

10 There's a motion in order to adopt the
11 two resolutions.

12 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Madam Chair, I
13 move that we adopt resolutions honoring
14 LifeBUILDERS and Commissioner Jerome L. Warfield,
15 Sr as presented.

16 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: It's been moved,
17 is there a second?

18 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Second.

19 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: It's been moved
20 and supported. Any questions? If not, all in
21 favor?

22 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

23 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Those opposed?
24 We will adopt the resolution for both the
25 LifeBUILDERS and Commissioner Jerome L. Warfield

1 to be put into the archives. Thank you.

2 Old business, is there any old business
3 to come before the meeting?

4 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Madam Chair, just
5 a question. At our previous meeting I believe
6 Asst. Chief Jones has sat in and Deputy Chief
7 Levalley was checking on a situation of a young
8 man who had been coming to several Commission
9 meetings and was just going to ask at this time
10 if there was an update in terms of if he has been
11 communicated with and if his issues have been
12 addressed appropriately.

13 ASST. CHIEF JONES: Through the Chair,
14 Asst. Chief Eric Jones. I believe the young man
15 was going to meet with Ms. Davis and we had the
16 young lady about the homicide issue.

17 COMMISSIONER WHITE: That's right.

18 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Do you have a
19 report on it?

20 CHIEF INV. DAVIS-DRAKE: Good evening,
21 Board. Through the Chair, Pamela Davis-Drake,
22 I'm Chief Investigator. We did have a chance to
23 speak with -- I believe his name is Mr. Hill,
24 Javon Hill, and we talked and I believe we
25 resolved the issue. He needed to know the

1 particulars of his case with OCI and I was able
2 to review the case with him and I think he was
3 satisfied with our end of the investigation.

4 I don't know if he will go further, but
5 he did say that he was satisfied with us.

6 COMMISSIONER WHITE: If I could,
7 through the Chair, Asst. Chief, I know you
8 referenced a lady and I had that note down as
9 well, but if we could have an update as to her
10 situation.

11 DEP. CHIEF LEVALLEY: Yes, sir. Deputy
12 Chief David Levalley. That was Ms. Kelly Norris
13 that was here and I had phone conversations with
14 Ms. Norris. I've gathered the file, reviewed
15 most of the file, still looking through parts of
16 it.

17 She and I spoke today and we set an
18 appointment for week after next to sit down with
19 her and her parents, go over the file, go over
20 their list of questions that they had concerning
21 the investigation and address it from that point
22 forward.

23 So it's an ongoing process and I will
24 keep the Board posted to any developments.

25 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you for

1 your follow-up, Deputy Chief and Chief.

2 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: And the 9th
3 Precinct, the presentation. You were supposed to
4 come up right after the Chief.

5 CAPT. MAHONE: Good evening, Board.
6 I'm Captain Charles Mahone from 9th Precinct and
7 this is the 9th Precinct presentation.

8 The 9th Precinct was re-established on
9 January 6, 2014 by Chief Craig and is located
10 11187 Gratiot and is one of the largest police
11 stations in the city of Detroit.

12 The 9th Precinct encompasses
13 approximately 14 square miles and is bounded on
14 the north by Eight Mile, on the south and east by
15 I-94 Expressway and on the west by Conner and
16 East Outer Drive.

17 The 9th Precinct bears the proud
18 distinction of being the only precinct within the
19 city of Detroit to contain an airport, that being
20 the Coleman A. Young International Airport which
21 itself houses the Detroit Police Department
22 Aviation Unit which is a vital crime-fighting
23 tool for us.

24 The 9th Precinct population is in
25 excess of 70,000 citizens and we currently have

1 two high schools, five middle schools and seven
2 private schools within our boundaries.

3 On average we service approximately
4 1,000 runs, that's 9-1-1 calls, per week and
5 issue approximately 500 tickets per week. The
6 9th Precinct along with all other Detroit police
7 precincts have undertaken extensive
8 revitalization of our Community Relations Office
9 to increase its efficiency. Newly renamed as the
10 neighborhood policing officers, NPOs as we call
11 them, are provided extensive training which will
12 prepare them for their duties which include the
13 deployment of new equipment and technologies in
14 our neighborhoods.

15 This will strengthen our highly valued
16 department-citizen relationship as well as
17 decrease the number of non-emergency calls to
18 9-1-1, thus freeing uniform patrol officers to
19 respond to priority calls for service in a far
20 more efficient and effective manner.

21 Our neighborhood policing officers are
22 tasked primarily with handling nuisance
23 complaints and quality of life issues such as
24 basketball rims in the street, illegal dumping of
25 debris or other non-emergency calls for service.

1 NPOs are also tasked with contacting
2 victims of home invasions or B&Es to offer home
3 security checks or surveys and for any additional
4 follow-up to ensure that you don't become a
5 victim a second time.

6 Currently we are actively recruiting
7 high school students attending Denby and Osborn
8 High Schools to participate in the 9th Precinct
9 Youth Enforcement Explorers Program. This will
10 allow students to explore a career in law
11 enforcement through active participation.

12 On Tuesday, August 5, 2014 we along
13 with the rest of the nation will celebrate
14 National Night Out. This is an ongoing effort
15 to show the dedication and strength in the
16 relationships between the police department, our
17 citizens and the business owners united together
18 against crime.

19 The overall goal is to encourage
20 neighborhood spirit and police-community
21 partnerships and to send a message to criminals
22 informing them that neighborhoods across the
23 country are organizing and are fighting back.

24 During the month of December, 2013 the
25 9th Precinct Community Relations crew assisted

1 the Old Newsboys Goodfellow organization
2 distributing over 2,000 Goodfellow boxes within
3 our boundary. Myself, I got a Goodfellow box
4 almost every year when I was growing up and this
5 is an organization I always support, I always
6 give my money and my time freely to.

7 This concludes my presentation, I hope
8 it wasn't too long and thank you.

9 (APPLAUSE.)

10 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Any questions?
11 Don't ask too many because he was supposed to be
12 doing his presentation when the Chief gave his,
13 but somehow that got mixed up. Any questions?

14 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Captain, how many
15 explorers do you have in the 9th Precinct
16 approximately?

17 CAPT. MAHONE: Approximately we have 17
18 now.

19 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you.

20 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Any other --
21 thank you, sir. All right. We move to
22 announcements.

23 There's an announcement here for
24 community meet and greet February 21, 2014 from 1
25 to 3 with Democratic gubernatorial candidate Mark

1 Schauer and Commissioner White, you have an
2 announcement?

3 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Yes, ma'am.
4 Through the Chair, I would like to announce an
5 Affordable Care Act Education and Enrollment Fair
6 which will be held on this coming Tuesday,
7 February 18 from 6 AM to 3 PM hosted by the
8 Detroit NAACP in collaboration with a number of
9 different community organizations sponsored by
10 Blue Cross/Blue Shield.

11 You will have navigators on sight, so
12 if you're looking for information in terms of how
13 to enroll or to enroll family members, it will be
14 live on the air on the Mr. Gaddis Show from 6 to
15 10.

16 So it will be a fun environment and a
17 hosted panel discussion luncheon at noon. I do
18 have a flyer for anyone who would like more
19 information following the meeting; thank you,
20 Madam Chair.

21 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Are there any
22 other announcements? Our next meeting will be
23 Thursday, February 20, 2014 at 3 o'clock at the
24 Detroit Public Safety Headquarters.

25 Now, we'll have oral communications

1 from the audience. Please give your name and
2 limit your comments to 2 minutes.

3 Yes, ma'am.

4 LT. HOPE: Madam Chair, Lt. Hope from
5 the Chief's Neighborhood liaison and I'm going to
6 be very quick, I'm going to read right from the
7 flyer. I'm very glad to be up here today and be
8 able to announce a project very dear to the
9 Chief's heart and that's going to be for this
10 Saturday.

11 It is our city camp. Children in
12 trauma intervention and that's going to be held
13 this Saturday at 11 o'clock is our press release
14 at the Don Boscoe Hall which is located at 9321
15 West Chicago. That's going to begin at 11
16 o'clock.

17 Second announcement is Calling All
18 Seniors, Assault Conference, Seniors and Law
19 Enforcement Together hosted by Detroit Chief of
20 Police James E Craig at St. Patrick's Center, 58
21 Parsons, Detroit and that's going to be February
22 18 at 1 o'clock PM to 3 o'clock PM. We are
23 expecting 300 plus seniors at this event.

24 This conference is designed to identify
25 concerns of our senior citizens, increase and

1 improve senior crime prevention and education
2 through interactive training.

3 The next announcement is the Detroit
4 Police Department is calling all citizens of
5 Detroit to stand up and take back our streets.
6 The Chief's call to action is hosted by Detroit
7 Chief of Police James E. Craig. It is to be held
8 at Northwest Activity Center, 1810 Meyers and
9 that's going to be Saturday, February 22 from 12
10 PM until 3 o'clock PM.

11 This call to action is designed to
12 identify concerns of our citizens, increase and
13 improve police-community partnerships through
14 solution-based dialog. Information will be
15 provided on how to start block clubs and citizen
16 radio patrols.

17 Once again, that's going to be February
18 22, 12 PM until 3 PM.

19 And last, I have the Detroit Police
20 Department and Grandmont-Rosedale Community
21 presenting Carjacking Prevention and Awareness
22 Training to be held at North Rosedale Community
23 House located at 18445 Scarsdale in Detroit and
24 that's going to be Thursday, February 27, from 6
25 o'clock PM until 8 o'clock PM.

1 Thank you.

2 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Thank you.

3 MR. HUDSON: Hi, how you doing? My
4 name is Michael Hudson and I just want to thank
5 you guys for having a community meeting where we
6 can actually come without actually driving all
7 the way downtown.

8 You know, I'd also like to thank --
9 it's a pleasure to drive by the gas stations now
10 and you can actually get gas after 9 o'clock
11 without being harassed because officers are there
12 making sure that you feel protected. I'm really
13 grateful for that.

14 And I've recently just got laid off
15 from the City of Detroit after 18 years, so --
16 and I'm definitely proud to be a Detroit
17 resident. Now that I got all the good stuff out
18 of the way, in 2012 I had a break-in. I live in
19 East English Village and I had over about \$30,000
20 worth of professional TV equipment stolen.

21 And when I called that night police
22 responded very quickly and just to make it short,
23 I happened to be on eBay and I saw one of my
24 cameras on eBay. And when -- and we find out
25 that it was being sold at Al's Music which is a

1 pawn shop right there on Gratiot.

2 The detective that was handling it when
3 I went to explain that to him -- how should I say
4 this -- he made me feel afraid, like I was doing
5 something. I went there and was pleading with
6 him please can you call down there and get my
7 camera. He closed the door, I left the precinct
8 in tears.

9 What I did was I went home, I put a bid
10 on it. That automatically freezes it, so I came
11 back the next day, thank God there was another
12 detective that was there. He called me and said,
13 "You know what, I believe you." He called down
14 there and put a freeze on the camera. So I was
15 able to go down and retrieve it, pay the \$250.

16 And when I tried to talk to the
17 detective, I say, "Look, it's my
18 understanding..." because I was having some work
19 done in the house. I don't think it was a random
20 break-in. I had to be one of the contractors,
21 you know, because I was moving into the house and
22 I asked the detective, I say, "They show a
23 license, you know, in order to sell stuff, so is
24 there any way -- you don't have to tell me who
25 the person name is. Can you please just show me

1 -- the picture said do you know this person
2 because it's obvious that person had to either
3 know somebody that stole the camera" and to this
4 day I have not heard anything.

5 And to be honest with you, when I left
6 that day I had tears in my eyes because everybody
7 got respect and this detective, you know what, I
8 was afraid of him. I got the paperwork and it
9 wasn't for the other detective when I came back
10 the next day he called me in and said, "Look, you
11 know what, I'm going to take care of you" and I'm
12 not casting a shadow on any other because the
13 police department in Detroit do do a good job.
14 Even though I hate to get a ticket, I got a
15 ticket the other day and I'll be honest with you,
16 that was the nicest -- you made it a pleasure
17 getting it, but she still gave it to me.

18 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: I'm going to ask
19 -- are you going to go ahead and take care of
20 that?

21 MR. HUDSON: All right, thanks a lot.

22 MR. OWENS: Good evening, I'm Mark
23 Owens, Executive Director of Samaritan Center and
24 welcome again, we appreciate you having the
25 meeting here this evening.

1 On the first Wednesday of every month
2 the Detroit Police Department 9th-5th Precinct
3 Police-Community Relations meeting is held here
4 and it's always well attended. We get great
5 service from the police department and we are
6 very pleased with the service that we get here at
7 Samaritan Center.

8 Just a couple of quick announcements.
9 In addition to the police-community relations
10 meeting which is held here we're currently
11 working with the Detroit Fire Department to do
12 the initial testing of process for up to 90 new
13 firefighters who will soon be hired to go and
14 start at the academy. That testing is being done
15 on the course that was set up in our warehouse
16 across the street on Shoemaker Street.

17 And so we're very happy to help the
18 City in that way because we recognize the
19 importance of getting 90 new firefighters here at
20 the City.

21 On Saturday the 15th we'll be having a
22 large healthcare fair here. It's a healthcare
23 fair information and enrollment and DMC will be
24 here and there will probably be about 1,000
25 people here throughout this building because

1 we've been -- this is where we're going to have
2 it, in the entire building.

3 And, oh, when you leave this evening
4 you're going to see as you go to your cars there
5 is a house that's kind of half done on our lawn
6 over here and what it is is a solar house that
7 we're building that will be landscaped and show
8 people how you can live kind of a self-sustaining
9 lifestyle without being attached to the grid and
10 it will have a pond for fish and if it ever warms
11 up again we'll actually complete the house.

12 Thank you very much for being here.

13 (APPLAUSE.)

14 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: And I understand
15 -- you can come on up, ma'am. I understand
16 former Charter Commissioner Reggie Davis is in
17 the --

18 (APPLAUSE.)

19 MS. BROWN: Hi, my name is Beverly
20 Brown, you have to excuse my voice. I'm the
21 vice-president of the Eastern District Community
22 Relations Council and I would like to welcome you
23 guys here, thanks for coming and we've got a new
24 captain. We're really excited about working with
25 Capt. Mahone and I'm glad to see Eric, he only

1 stayed with us a short time, but he did a lot
2 while he was with us.

3 I just had a couple of announcements.
4 I received a media advisory about a candlelight
5 vigil in honor of Officers Bowens and Fettig in
6 recognition of their service. We take this time
7 to honor and remember the heroic -- can somebody
8 read this for me; I can't.

9 COMM. WILSON: Good evening, Commander
10 Charles Wilson, Detroit Police Department.

11 Yes, there is a candlelight vigil in
12 honor of Officer Bowens and Fettig. In
13 recognition of their service we take this time to
14 honor and remember their heroism of Officers
15 Matthew Bowens and Jennifer Fettig.

16 February 16, 2014 marks the 10th
17 anniversary of these fallen heroes. Members from
18 the Detroit Police Department will join with the
19 Bowens and Fettig family in a candlelight vigil
20 held at Michigan Avenue and Gilbert.

21 Individuals are asked to rendezvous at
22 the 4th precinct at 1 AM and we will be
23 caravanning down Michigan Avenue to Gilbert for a
24 moment of silence at 2 AM followed by a short
25 prayer service.

1 Again, this is going to be Sunday,
2 February 16, 1 AM. The 4th Precinct is located
3 at 4700 West Fort. Again, all are invited.

4 The second she wanted me to read,
5 Friends of Detroit City Airport are sponsoring
6 the Annual Black History Program titled Blacks in
7 Aviation featuring Tuskegee Airmen and Black
8 Pilots of America.

9 This will be held Wednesday, February
10 26, 2014, 6 PM ending at 8 PM. It's in the main
11 terminal entrance of the Coleman A. Young
12 International Airport which is Detroit City
13 Airport located at 11499 Conner here in Detroit,
14 Michigan. There will be a pictorial display,
15 free parking, light refreshments and all are
16 welcome.

17 Again, that's Wednesday, February 26,
18 6 PM to 8 PM. Thank you.

19 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Thank you.

20 MS. ESCOE: Good evening. My name is
21 Nicole Escoe and I'm with the Wayne State Center
22 for Urban Studies, an Americore program, and I'm
23 with this sector and I want to thank you for
24 coming over here in our area and I also because a
25 lot of our partners are here and some community

1 centers or organizations. I wanted to make the
2 announcement -- I'm really loud already -- that
3 the Americore program is in the process of
4 recruiting and we're looking for members in the
5 actual areas.

6 What we do in Americore is provide
7 safety mechanisms, information, community
8 outreach services. That gentleman, we could have
9 went in and did some target hardening in his home
10 to help his home be a little more safer, so it's
11 a small stipend you receive. People that are
12 laid off, it does not affect their social
13 security. They can work part time three/quarters
14 of a time full time, but we want to get people
15 that are living in the neighborhood such as
16 myself to come and join us and helping to make
17 Detroit a great place it already is. I like to
18 think positive.

19 So if you're interested, I did not
20 bring flyers, but I could leave my e-mail address
21 which is nescoe@amus@gmail.com and I'll be short
22 since I'm also going to bring some here; thank
23 you.

24 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Thank you. Are
25 there any more communications?

1 MS. SMITH: Good afternoon -- or good
2 evening. Bernice Smith, political activist. I
3 have some good news -- maybe I better give it to
4 you later. I just want to know, we had an
5 announcement that there's going to be 100 police
6 cars available. Do we have the police -- have we
7 recruited them already to service those cars,
8 that's Number 1.

9 Also since I did not have the privilege
10 -- Chief, sorry, I didn't recognize you, I'm
11 sorry.

12 ASST. CHIEF WHITE: No problem, ma'am.

13 MS. SMITH: Since I did not have the
14 privilege of taking Reverend -- oh, he's gone --
15 Warfield's place on the Board which I thought I
16 would, I would let you know I got the news today
17 that I have been appointed to the Civil Rights
18 Committee and you won't have to worry about me
19 saying anything too much about the police
20 department because you know I love you anyway,
21 but I won't be a pest and probably I'll be
22 working so I won't be coming here every Thursday,
23 but I'll miss you anyway, but anyway I'm going to
24 see if Attorney Porcia Robison will let me come
25 at least once a month to come to the meetings and

1 see what you guys are doing.

2 But seriously speaking I'm very happy
3 and proud that the Mayor considered me to be in
4 this capacity instead of sitting there on the
5 Board which I wanted to do, but again I just
6 thought I would give you that good news because I
7 was delighted when I heard it and I have been
8 waiting for two weeks to find out whether I
9 qualified or not.

10 And it just so happens that the City
11 Council okayed me this morning so -- and I didn't
12 even have to go before them, so you know that
13 must be all right.

14 Thank you very much.

15 (APPLAUSE.)

16 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Are there any
17 more comments?

18 ASST. CHIEF WHITE: Was there a
19 question in there regarding the 100 police
20 officers?

21 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Oh, I'm sorry.
22 Ms. Smith, you want your question answered.

23 ASST. CHIEF WHITE: Asst. Chief James
24 White through the Chair. First of all,
25 congratulations on your appointment.

1 MS. SMITH: Thank you, dear.

2 ASST. CHIEF WHITE: I'm happy to report
3 that we have just graduated 21 police officers
4 approximately two weeks ago. We have an
5 additional 35 that start -- hopefully will be
6 starting in the academy on the 24th of February
7 so we are working towards getting that 100 in
8 those police cars.

9 MS. SMITH: 24th, right?

10 ASST. CHIEF WHITE: Yes, ma'am.

11 MS. SMITH: All right, dear, thank you
12 so much. I can put that on the air, is that all
13 right?

14 ASST. CHIEF WHITE: As long as you say
15 we are looking to hire the 30 by the 24th, that's
16 our goal, to have them start the 24th.

17 MS. SMITH: On the 24th of February?
18 I'll wait until you give me the okay.

19 ASST. CHIEF WHITE: All right.

20 MS. SEMMA: Julie Semma on behalf of
21 Detroit Authorized Towing Association. We just
22 want to say thank you for our commissioner.
23 Unfortunately he's not here right now -- I should
24 say ex-commissioner, excuse me, for an
25 outstanding job he did on the Commissioner Board

1 and helping all the towers and achieving great
2 success in everything that you guys have worked
3 hard for for a number of years and we look
4 forward to the new commissioners working forward
5 with you guys as well and thanks for the existing
6 commissioners, we really really greatly
7 appreciate everything you guys have done for us.

8 Have a great evening.

9 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Thank you. Are
10 there any more comments? Are there any more
11 comments? Is there's no more comments, I move to
12 adjourn.

13 COMMISSIONER MOORE: So moved.

14 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Support.

15 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: It's been moved
16 and supported. Meeting is adjourned.
