4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Good evening, everyone.  
5 My name is Lisa Carter, Chair of the Detroit Police  
6 Commission. At this time, I'd like to welcome you all  
7 to our eighth Community Meeting of the year. At this  
8 time I'm going to ask, are there any chaplains in the  
9 audience? Any pastors? Pastors? Would you mind doing  
10 the invocation, please? Okay. Thank you.

11 (Invocation given).

12 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: And, ma'am, could you  
13 give your name for the record, please? Thank you.  
14 Sorry.

15 PASTOR WILKINS: That's okay. Pastor  
16 Stephanie Wilkins.

17 (Invocation Given)

18 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, ma'am.

19 At this time, I'm going to ask that the  
20 Commissioners introduce themselves beginning to my far  
21 left with Commissioner Vann.

22 COMMISSIONER VANN: Yes. Commissioner Edgar  
23 Vann, District 2 Northwest Detroit.

24 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Commissioner Reginald  
25 Crawford, District 3, east side of Detroit.

1 COMMISSIONER BELL: Commission Willie Bell,  
2 District 4, east side of Detroit.

3 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner  
4 vice-chair Eva Garza Dewaelsche At-Large.

5 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Commissioner Elizabeth  
6 Brooks At-Large. That means I'll be in your  
7 neighborhood recruiting. So watch for me.

8 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Commissioner Derrick  
9 Sanders At-Large.

10 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you,  
11 Commissioners. At this time Mr. Secretary, would you  
12 please introduce the staff?

13 SECRETARY HICKS: Yes. Madam Chair, with the  
14 Commissioners registering in, you do have a quorum for  
15 this evening. And just in terms of the staff, just  
16 prior to going to the staff, I do want to indicate that  
17 Sergeant Quinn is taping the meeting, Media Services is  
18 providing the audiovisual work for this evening and  
19 then Mindy Womack is the court reporter for the  
20 evening. And, of course, in terms of our staff, if we  
21 go immediately to my right is Theresa Blossom, who's  
22 our director of Media Services coordinator and she is  
23 sitting in tonight for Robert Brown who is away from  
24 the office. And then we go to the first row. Here we  
25 have our attorney, Mr. Wyrick, the Interim Chief

1 Investigator, Mr. Akbar, our fiscal person, Ms. Johnson  
2 and then, of course, on the second row there is Ms.  
3 White and traditionally, all we do is go to the Chief  
4 Investigator, in this case, the interim Chief  
5 Investigator to introduce other members of the OCI  
6 staff who are here.

7 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

8 MR. AKBAR: Good evening, Board. I'm Interim  
9 Chief Investigator, Lawrence Akbar. I have here my  
10 talented staff, Supervising Investigator, Ainsley  
11 Cromwell. If you could stand. Senior Investigator,  
12 Abdullah Rivera. Investigator, Rosalyn Banks and, last  
13 but not least, Investigator Antonio Jones.

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, sir.

15 SECRETARY HICKS: Madam Chair?

16 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes.

17 SECRETARY HICKS: Also one other party is  
18 here and just wanted to note that sound that you'll  
19 hear from the fireplace, there are birds that  
20 apparently are nest in fireplace, so they do chirp  
21 every now and then. It's not someone trying to make  
22 public comment but they'll be with us all night.

23 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. And, at this  
24 time, Commissioners, you have before you the agenda for  
25 August 10th. What is your pleasure?

1 COMMISSIONER: Move the adoption, Madam  
2 Chair.

3 COMMISSIONER: Second.

4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and  
5 supported that we adopt the agenda for August 10th. Is  
6 there any discussion? Those in favor?

7 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed? The  
9 motion carries.

10 At this time, I'd like to acknowledge the  
11 presence of Commissioner Willie Burton. Thank you for  
12 joining us, sir.

13 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you, Madam Chair.

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: At this time,  
15 Commissioners, you have before you the minutes from  
16 August 3rd, 2017. What is your pleasure?

17 COMMISSIONER: I move that we adopt these  
18 minutes.

19 COMMISSIONER: Second.

20 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and  
21 supported that we adopt the minutes from August 3rd,  
22 2017. Is there any discussion? Those in favor?

23 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

24 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed? The  
25 motion carries.

1                   At this time I'm going to introduce, I  
2 believe that's AC, Assistant Chief Williams at the end  
3 of the row.

4                   AC WILLIAMS: Through the Chair.

5                   CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay.

6                   AC WILLIAMS: Thank you, ma'am. I'm going to  
7 start off by saying Assistant Chief Craig is on a well-  
8 deserved vacation at this time so I have the pleasure  
9 of sitting in for him to represent the Department for  
10 Board, and I'll start off with introductions of who we  
11 have here. To my left, and your right, we'll start off  
12 with Deputy Chief Todd Bettison and we'll go around the  
13 room. Please raise your hand or stand up and announce  
14 yourself.

15                  STEWART: Stewart, Ninth Precinct.

16                  COMMANDER MAHONE: Commander Mahone Number 7.

17                  CAPTAIN GARDNER: Captain Gardner, the Fifth  
18 Precinct.

19                  CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Is that everyone? The  
20 NPO's over there busy at work. I know, putting you all  
21 on the spot.

22                  CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. Assistant  
23 Chief Williams, is that it, sir?

24                  AC WILLIAMS: I believe that is it.

25                  CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay. Thank you, sir.

1 At this time, are there any elected officials or  
2 representative of elected officials in the audience?  
3 Okay. If not, we will move on.

4 So I'm going to keep it moving. We are  
5 committed to meet in every -- like I said, this is 8th  
6 Community Meeting for the year, this year for the Board  
7 of Police Commissioners, and we are committed to meet  
8 in every section of the city at a time that is most  
9 favorable to citizens, partners and other stakeholders.  
10 This meeting is held in the Fifth Precinct today.  
11 Commissioner Willie Bell is the host Commissioner. Mr.  
12 Bell, Commissioner Bell, would you like to welcome the  
13 audience, please.

14 COMMISSIONER BELL: And I also acknowledge  
15 the Fifth Precinct covers 10% of the Seventh Precinct,  
16 is that correct?

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Correct.

18 COMMISSIONER BELL: Something of that nature.  
19 And we are actually in the Seventh Precinct.

20 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: No.

21 COMMISSIONER BELL: No?

22 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Fifth Precinct. This is  
23 the Fifth Precinct.

24 COMMISSIONER BELL: 5? Okay. 5. I want to  
25 make sure I give recognition to Commissioner Burton.

1 You said it correctly, Madam Chair. I just want to  
2 give you a warm welcome to the Fifth Precinct and  
3 District 4 which is made up of District 4 and part of  
4 District 5. And this is a good turnout. And I just  
5 want to say I appreciate all the work and endeavors of  
6 the Fifth Precinct officers. We have worked closely  
7 together since 2014. I know all of the players and we  
8 are so pleased that Commander Ewing is still there and  
9 we have a new captain you're going to meet shortly,  
10 Captain Gardner. We are well familiar with her. She  
11 was extensively in the last three years recruiting, so  
12 she's been on board for the last three months. She's  
13 been making her rounds and we haven't missed a beat.  
14 Commander Bliss, which served this Fifth Precinct for  
15 quite some time and his endeavors and we miss him  
16 surely, but we have moved on and we're looking forward  
17 to more things happening the Fifth Precinct. I'm  
18 pleased that this is a turnout on a nice, cool evening  
19 here on the water. This is my first exposure to this  
20 marina here. I'm looking forward to buying a boat next  
21 year and maybe I can join Commissioner Shelby, but I  
22 just really appreciate the hospitality of this marina  
23 here and I get to cheer and acknowledge that of someone  
24 else. I just want to thank you for coming out and  
25 looking forward to that type of dialogue and



1 interaction with you.

2 And there's so many individuals, part of the  
3 Fifth Precinct police community relation, I'm just  
4 going to ask you to stand and introduce yourself and I  
5 won't get in trouble by missing someone starting with  
6 MorningSide. Just introduce yourself, please.

7 PASTOR REED: Pastor Darell Reed, president  
8 of MorningSide.

9 MR. HENDERSON: Jay Henderson, President  
10 Community Association and also the Fifth Precinct  
11 Police Relation Council.

12 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you. And any other  
13 individuals? You don't have to be part of leadership  
14 but you are a part of the Fifth Precinct family in  
15 terms of police relations. Beverly Brown and others,  
16 would you please stand up and identify yourself,  
17 please?

18 MS. BROWN: Beverly Brown I'm with Radio  
19 Patrol and I'm also the with Chief Advisory Board for  
20 the Radio Patrol.

21 COMMISSIONER BELL: Any others part of the  
22 Fifth Precinct Police Community Relations live in the  
23 Fifth Precinct? If not, thank you for coming. Yes,  
24 ma'am.

25 MS. LESTER: Minnie Lester, president of

1 Southeast Waterfront Neighborhood Association.

2 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you. Thank you.

3 Any others?

4 MS. GIVENS: Donna Givens, president of the  
5 Eastside Community Network.

6 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you. And I turn  
7 the mic over to Madam Chair.

8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, sir.

9 Additionally, I'd like to thank Kean's Marina  
10 for allowing us to use the use of this facility.

11 Commissioner Shelby, as Commissioner Bell mentioned, is  
12 a member of the Marina. And I'd also like to invite  
13 Carrie LaFever, the banquet manager. Not here? Okay.

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madam Chair, I just  
15 want to welcome everyone as well since the Fifth  
16 Precinct does have two Commissioners, which is  
17 Commissioner Bell and myself. You know, I just wanted  
18 to say, and we're also in Seventh Precinct boundaries,  
19 which is also -- I mean we're in District 5 right now  
20 officially, but the Fifth Precinct does have two  
21 Commissioners. So I just want to say welcome as well,  
22 and I look forward to serving you guys four more long  
23 years along with Commissioner Bell as well.

24 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Burton, my  
25 apologies. I'm glad you spoke up, so please forgive me

1 and thank you for your remarks.

2 Later we will be hearing from Commander Eric  
3 Ewing and Captain Melissa Gardner of the Fifth  
4 Precinct. I would also like to note that under the  
5 agenda on resolutions, we have a number people that we  
6 would like to recognize for their contributions to law  
7 enforcement. Please refer to your agenda for the names  
8 of the citizens who helped put the word community in  
9 Community for Neighborhood Policing.

10 I would also like to note today there is a  
11 news article posted online regarding towing, police  
12 toying. The board is in the prosper of reviewing  
13 several opinions and documents about towing, and we  
14 will take up these items at I later date; however, I've  
15 asked the Department of Police and Law to have  
16 representatives knowledgeable on the subject here  
17 tonight at tonight's meeting in case we have questions.

18 And finally, I would like to educate our  
19 continued support for our injured and fallen officers  
20 and personnel. In our minutes from last week, we  
21 recorded several of their officers of officers. I  
22 understand that the situation and severity of injuries  
23 remain the same. Again, I ask for your support for  
24 these individuals and their families. And with that, I  
25 am going to ask that Commissioner Burton, would you

1 like to read the resolution for Mr. Keith Jones?

2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Absolutely. Is he  
3 present with me?

4 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, sir.

5 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Resolution. WHEREAS  
6 Mr. Keith L. Jones is a lifelong Detroit resident and  
7 community activist who as worked tireless over the  
8 years to be a great agent of change in the Detroit  
9 community he loves. He is a graduate from Detroit  
10 Martin Luther King Jr. High School. Mr. Jones went on  
11 to pursue a Bachelor of Science degree in Merchandising  
12 and Business Management from Michigan State University  
13 in 2004. He later earned a Masters of Business  
14 Administration degree from the University of Phoenix  
15 Southfield Campus; and.

16 WHEREAS Mr. Jones understood the importance  
17 of hard work, throughout his years of earning an  
18 education, he also exemplified an earnest work effort  
19 throughout his life, from managing political campaigns  
20 to working for the City of Detroit. Mr. Jones, along  
21 with his friends have developed a system that connects  
22 low wage workers to employment opportunities through  
23 transportation; and.

24 WHEREAS Mr. Jones also has served on many  
25 board of directors for numerous organizations. He is a

1 board member for a local school district and works in  
2 the community to support grassroots efforts to  
3 transform the landscape of neighborhoods in the City of  
4 Detroit; and

5 WHEREAS Mr. Jones works as the chief of  
6 Staff for Detroit City Council member Andre L. Spivey,  
7 District 4 and is a part-time Adjunct Professor at  
8 Wayne County Community College District. Within the  
9 last two years, Mr. Jones has assisted the Fifth  
10 Precinct Neighborhood Police with painting and  
11 decorating the Halloween Float, preparing several  
12 hundred Halloween bags, and donating his own money to  
13 purchase Halloween costumes for the neighborhood less  
14 fortunate children; and

15 WHEREAS Mr. Jones has been involved in  
16 several Police Weeks, National Night Out and  
17 beautification projects at the Fifth Precinct. He was  
18 able to solicit over three hundred diapers for the  
19 Detroit Police Departments, "Diapers i the D's" project  
20 drive, and volunteered for numerous activities within  
21 the community. Mr. Jones is always eager and able to  
22 assist.

23 Now, therefore, be it resolved that the  
24 Detroit Board of Police Commissioners speaking for the  
25 citizens of the City of Detroit and the Detroit Police

1 Department, acknowledge the dedicated, hardworking,  
2 caring and committed support of Mr. Keith Jones. His  
3 public service and devotion to improving the quality of  
4 life for all citizens in his community and throughout  
5 the City of Detroit, Merits our highest regards.  
6 Detroit Board of Police Commissioners.

7 MR. JONES: Thank you for this honor, Police  
8 Commissioners. Just excited to be here. Love the City  
9 I live and work in. And, you know, just keep on  
10 working and trying to make District 4 and the rest of  
11 City of Detroit as good as we possibly can. So thank  
12 you again for this honor.

13 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you. I'd just  
14 like to add, you know, this is what makes Detroit great  
15 in the community when we got community members like  
16 Keith stepping up in a really big way and so many of  
17 you all stepping up in a big way. This is what makes  
18 the City of Detroit great. I would like to thank each  
19 and every one of you all, especially thank you, sir,  
20 for your service.

21 AC WILLIAMS: Through the Chair, the  
22 Department also has a presentations for Mr. Jones. So,  
23 Mr. Jones, first of all, I want to say thank you for  
24 being an active community member and sounding well  
25 deserving as the Resolution and the presentation you

1 have received today. So congratulations on that.  
2 Continuing along with same vein, we have two  
3 presentations, one from the City Council. This is the  
4 Spirit of Detroit Award. This is signed by all members  
5 of the council and this is for you as well.

6 Again, the Detroit Police Department on  
7 behalf of Chief James E. Craig are going to present you  
8 with a Certificate of Recognition Award as well.

9 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: At this time,  
10 Commissioner Bell, would you do the honors of  
11 presenting the Resolution for Ms. Zelda Anderson.

12 COMMISSIONER BELL: Is Ms. Anderson here?  
13 Okay. Then we'll move on for recognition of the Police  
14 Officers. NPOs.

15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay. At this time  
16 we'll have a presentation of Certificates by  
17 Commissioner Bell.

18 COMMISSIONER BELL: It is my privilege to  
19 recognize and give Certificates of Recognition for  
20 NPO's. They have been due diligent working tireless in  
21 so many projects, and you just witnessed the most  
22 recent project with National Night Out, and that was at  
23 Chandler Park pretty. Close to 3000 young people of  
24 all ages attended, and that's the third annual  
25 activities of that nature, the water park. Sometimes

1 that's the first time the young people have opportunity  
2 to visit a park, and not only free admission, they give  
3 away bikes, they give away fellowship, food and just  
4 really a wholesome afternoon with young people  
5 introducing them to the water park at Chandler Park.  
6 So I just cannot say, when we have the Halloween Task  
7 Force on Angel Night, they do an outstanding job also  
8 in terms of interacting with kids with the support of  
9 Councilman Spivey and Keith Jones. They have a float  
10 that's rather unique. So I think that these, they're  
11 well deserving and we wanted to recognize them at this  
12 meeting here.

13 For those in the Fifth Precinct, you know  
14 these NPOs extremely well because you call and text  
15 them 24/7, act as though they only off after 12:00, but  
16 sometime you clock them or text them after 12:00. So I  
17 just cannot say it's been my pleasure to work for them  
18 for two and a half years. So, first of all, we're  
19 going to call up NPO Audry Curtis. Let's give a round  
20 of applause.

21 The the other Gaines here, the younger  
22 Gaines. He's out in the hall. Okay. Would you  
23 please -- is he coming this way? We have two Gaines.  
24 I'm going to say it, I'm going to say it before he get  
25 here, but I guess he's coming.



1 I'm going to ask the real Gaines to come up.  
2 Deborah Gaines. She was my first contact with the  
3 Gaines so I give her that title and she's a hard  
4 worker, but she somewhat raised the bar extremely high.  
5 She would not mess around in terms of the community.  
6 You get one warning, and after that you get what? She  
7 getting your attention.

8 How about Officer Herman King? And King is  
9 the pillar of this group here. I think he got the most  
10 experience, and I had an opportunity to work with him  
11 years ago and he's still at it. We want to prolong his  
12 career another five years. How about that? Let's give  
13 a round of applause to these NPOs.

14 MS. GAINES: Good evening, everyone. I'd  
15 like to thank each and every one of you for this  
16 wonderful award. We do the best that we can for the  
17 people who don't have, we try to educate, and we do  
18 most of the work from our heart. So somebody has to do  
19 it. I love it and I have passion for it, so I want to  
20 a thank you.

21 COMMISSIONER BELL: Give them another round  
22 applause. We also want to recognize this young lady.  
23 She's been part of the Fifth Precinct part of morning  
24 side CB patrol and we interacted. I think he was also  
25 vice-president at the time of Fifth Precinct Police

1 Community Relation back in 2014 and '15, and she just  
2 really all over the place in terms of supporting the  
3 Detroit police Department in so many endeavors. So I  
4 had the pleasure of working with her for the last three  
5 and half years and she's just a fantastic individual,  
6 and that's the one and only Ms. Beverly Brown. Would  
7 you please come up. She's part of the Tuskegee Airman  
8 Program and she's part of so many programs, but on  
9 Angel's Night she's out there. She's just really the  
10 backbone in terms of community involvement. I just  
11 cannot say enough, Ms. Brown. You get the mic.

12 MS. BROWN: I can't say anything. I just  
13 appreciate all of you and I enjoy working with  
14 everybody and you all inspire me because you work so  
15 hard, you know. And my buddy Jackrabbit, I met him  
16 back in the '70s. He's one that started me out in  
17 policing, community policing. But thank you, so much.

18 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you. Thank you.

19 MS. BROWN: I appreciate so much. Thank you.

20 COMMISSIONER BELL: One more informal  
21 acknowledgement of this young man and THE former  
22 Commander, Captain quite sometime two, three years. He  
23 led the charge of the precinct and it was at one time  
24 housed with the Ninth Precinct and he was there for the  
25 grand opening of the Fifth Precinct on Connor and Mack,

1 south of Mack. So you know and he want on to be  
2 promoted to the rank of commander we hated to lose him.  
3 I say the least in terms of we have of a great  
4 replacement. But he really took the charge and  
5 responsibility of the Fifth Precinct and people  
6 constantly ask me about him all the time about him. In  
7 fact, the Reverend Novelly at St. Matthews Church said  
8 he's praying for you and hoping you drop by. I just  
9 want to acknowledge Commander Bliss. Let's give him a  
10 round of applause. Really thank you for your  
11 endeavors.

12 SECRETARY HICKS: Excuse me. Madam Chair?

13 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes.

14 SECRETARY HICKS: If one of the Board members  
15 would be so pleased to give us a unified motion on all  
16 of the Resolutions and Certificates tonight that we  
17 could vote them up is a package.

18 COMMISSIONER MALLETT: So moved.

19 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Support.

20 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and  
21 supported. Did we adopted the Resolutions and  
22 Certifications of Appreciation as presented this  
23 evening? Is there any discussion? Those in favor?

24 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

25 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed. The

1 motion carries.

2 At this time, I'd like to acknowledge the  
3 presence of Commissioner Mallett who came in about ten  
4 minutes ago. Good evening.

5 COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Ten minutes right when  
6 Bell started talk.

7 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Fifteen twenty minutes  
8 ago. Thank you Commissioner Mallett, for joining us.  
9 At this time, Assistant Chief Williams, you have the  
10 mic.

11 AC WILLIAMS: Through the chair. I report on  
12 some of the crime data. The information I'm going to  
13 read is based on the crime reporting up to August 6th.  
14 For homicides we're down 5%, sexual assaults 16%,  
15 robbery we're down 11%, carjacking we're down 6%,  
16 aggravated assaults we're down 5%. Nonfatal shootings  
17 we're down 7%, for overall reduction of violent crime  
18 of 6% year to date. For our property offenses, for  
19 burglary we are up 2%. We're down 13% for larcenies.  
20 Down 4% for stolen vehicles, and overall for property  
21 crimes, we're down 7% year to date for all property  
22 crimes. I would like to say one thing for burglaries.  
23 Last night through a combination of efforts with the  
24 Divide Crimes Task Force from DPD, Warren PD and I  
25 think one or two federal entities, we were able to take

1 into custody two for burglary that have basically been  
2 burglarizing not only the City of Detroit, but the  
3 outlying suburbs for a number of years. We think we're  
4 going to pull a significant number of cases with the  
5 arrests that we made last night, or Warren PD actually  
6 made last night with our assistance. I just wanted to  
7 make sure that was on the record.

8 And I do want to say one more thing.  
9 Commander Giaquinto, he was key to this process. Last  
10 year we were working this case and we had Violent  
11 Crimes Tasks Force and we had a whole task force that  
12 was aimed to try and catch these burglars, but they  
13 just stopped. And we thought they just stopped but  
14 they didn't stop in Detroit, they just went to the  
15 suburbs. So that's what they did. They would rotate  
16 where they would go until the heat died down and it  
17 would start again and use the same MO. I think it was  
18 earlier sometime this year Commander Giaquinto from the  
19 Third Precinct, he reorganized that task force, got  
20 everybody up to speed, and we had some great results.  
21 Questions?

22 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Questions for Assistant  
23 Chief Williams?

24 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am. Through  
25 the Chair. Yes, sir, Assistant Chief. 8 Mile and

1 State Fair, the bus stop there, there was a homicide, I  
2 believe it was last week. Four weeks prior there was a  
3 shooting there. Are we coordinating our efforts with  
4 Chief Sidney Bogan over on the Detroit Transit Police.

5 AC WILLIAMS: So at this current time, Chief  
6 Bogan, he's with the I believe the Department of Water  
7 and Sewage. So Ricky Brown is the Chief of transit.  
8 I'm actually going to meet with him tomorrow afternoon  
9 and we'll have a discussion on that. We do work hand  
10 in hand with transit, but we do want to see what they  
11 have as far as cameras that some of these bus stops,  
12 especially downtown, the ones that are most active.  
13 That's a very active one over there.

14 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Rosa Parks didn't  
15 refuse to give up her seat so in 2017 the citizens in  
16 the City of Detroit could get shot at bus stops and not  
17 ride the transit safely.

18 Also, too, Mr. Hicks, if we can also reach  
19 out to Chief Ricky Brown and have him come before the  
20 Commission. I guess it was two years ago Chief Bogan  
21 came before the Commission and talked about the time of  
22 service that was being provided by the transit at that  
23 time to the citizens of Detroit in terms of the safe  
24 ridership. So thank you.

25 COMMISSIONER VANN: Madam Chair?

1 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Vann.

2 COMMISSIONER VANN: Also in my precinct in my  
3 district, District 2, there was a fatal shooting at a  
4 bus stop right there at State Fair and Woodward, you  
5 said Eight Mile, I'm sorry, where the victim was laid  
6 out in the middle of the street there on Woodward. And  
7 so I am hearing complaints about safety at bus options  
8 and most especially again downtown at Rosa Parks. I  
9 think it's important that we would stay on top of that  
10 and have the transit officer in charge to come and to  
11 present before us.

12 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, Commissioner  
13 Vann. Any other questions or comments, Commissioners?

14 Okay. At this time we will have remarks from  
15 Jay Henderson, President of the Fifth Precinct  
16 Community Relations.

17 MR. HENDERSON: Good afternoon, everyone.

18 AUDIENCE: Good afternoon.

19 MR. HENDERSON: I'll speak on the way up so  
20 that I'm not here too long. My philosophy is everyone  
21 would like to see you come up, but they like to see you  
22 leave. So I want to stick to that.

23 I am the new president of the Fifth Precinct  
24 Police Relation Council. I took over the council when  
25 it was at its lowest. We had approximately ten members

1 when I took over. We have something like 89, which is  
2 an improvement. So hopefully we can continue to go  
3 into that direction.

4 I must say, I am somewhat not particularly  
5 happy with the location. We had this meeting tonight,  
6 but I am glad that you are here. I wish that you had  
7 decided to come over to MorningSide, East English  
8 Village and that particular area over there, because  
9 that's where most of the people who come to the  
10 meetings come from. So we always said we want to get  
11 community involved in the meetings so you need to go to  
12 where the community is. Now, I know some of you will  
13 say well, we're here da-da-da-da-da, but I like for my  
14 people to whenever possible come and get involved with  
15 the meetings and do it because they want to.

16 Thank you for coming out and I appreciate  
17 everything that you've done.

18 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, sir. I think  
19 that last year's meeting was somewhere in -- actually,  
20 it was in, what is it called, Cornerstone, Cornerstone  
21 Village. Jefferson and Chalmers area.

22 COMMISSIONER BELL: One of the churches  
23 there. So we do move it around.

24 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Ms. Donna Givens is next  
25 up, president and CEO of the East Side Community



1 Network.

2 MS. GIVENS: I think Jay set me up because he  
3 knows I'm longwinded, so I apologize in advance for  
4 this.

5 I want to start by saying that sometimes I  
6 want to rewrite the ending to movies and I don't know  
7 if anybody here like me went to see the movie "Detroit"  
8 and the way it ended. But I had some thoughts about  
9 that, and the way it should have ended is right here in  
10 this room right now, 50 years later. This is what the  
11 Detroit Police Department looks like. We have Detroit  
12 Police Commission that's elected. We have most diverse  
13 police force in the nation and that's progress. And I  
14 don't think we always celebrate that. I don't think we  
15 always see ourselves as different. And so the question  
16 is, how do we maintain that progress.

17 I talk to young people all of the time. We  
18 have teen centers. One of my young people actually had  
19 a conference, it was kind of crazy. So she invited me  
20 out on a Sunday a couple weeks ago to speak to some  
21 young people. And in talking to those young people,  
22 what I heard from them was their feeling, and I was  
23 talking about the difference between Detroit and other  
24 places. And they let me know that Detroit may feel  
25 different to me, but it doesn't necessarily feel

1 different to them. There are still right now young men  
2 who feel profiled, who feel violated, who feel  
3 powerless in front of our police. And so I'm here not  
4 to castigate. I appreciate the hard work of the police  
5 in our community. The Fifth and Seventh Precincts are  
6 partners at Community Development, at Eastside  
7 Community network. And so we appreciate that. But we  
8 also have to be sensitive to the fact that some of  
9 those people who aren't in this room are not in  
10 this room because the location, they're in this room  
11 because of the distance that exists. And I wonder  
12 about the transparency see when a young person, I said  
13 hey, report, any instances of abuse. Report and expect  
14 something good to happen. And I don't know that  
15 there's that confidence that good things will happen.

16 I don't know, I just saw an article in the  
17 paper not too long ago about Police Departments firing  
18 police officers for committing egregious acts and then  
19 being forced to be returned to the police department  
20 because of union contracts, and it makes me wonder who  
21 is in charge and who the police the officers work for.  
22 Do they work for the Department, and is it a private  
23 entity, or do they work for the citizens, do they work  
24 for us? And if they work for us, then somehow the  
25 accountability has got to be clear to the citizens of

1 the City of Detroit that you are accountable to us  
2 because I don't believe what happened in 1967 will  
3 happen again, but my hairdresser's son was beat at a  
4 gas station. And she one a lawsuit. He won a lawsuit  
5 over it. It was caught on tape. It's not my  
6 imagination. The proprietor, this is a few years ago,  
7 had pictures of the police precinct where this was  
8 happening. And so those stories are out there inside  
9 of the community and, again, it's just not clear what  
10 the accountability is.

11 So I believe this is one of the most  
12 accountable police forces, if not the most accountable,  
13 police force in the United States, but we can still do  
14 better because some of our citizens do not feel like  
15 they are being represented, and because I represent a  
16 community organization that represents those citizens,  
17 I'm just here today to say let's try to do a better  
18 job.

19 The other thing I want to say is there are a  
20 lot of concerns that I hear all the time about  
21 residency loss, and the fact that police officers,  
22 people believe that most police officers are coming  
23 from far out state into Detroit and have badges and  
24 control over the people who live here. And so although  
25 we have one of the most diverse police forces in the

1 nation, if not the most diverse, what does the pipeline  
2 look like. And some of that police community relations  
3 engages the pipeline. So the more that we can have  
4 police officers continuing to work not just with  
5 citizens like myself, but with citizens like those  
6 occupying the schools and those who are distant from  
7 police the force, but really good young men and women  
8 who just don't have any better understanding, I think  
9 we can do a better job, because people in the community  
10 a lot of times believe the mayor or people locally  
11 control residency laws, and that doesn't happen. It's  
12 a state law. But I think that what we could possibly  
13 look at doing is enhancing police visibility within  
14 schools, working with community organizations like mine  
15 that hire police officers, hire young people in the  
16 summer to have police officers come in and build  
17 relationships with them so that through personal  
18 relationship, the police officers move to understand  
19 the needs and values of the young people and the young  
20 people are moved to understand the needs and values of  
21 the police officers.

22 So you don't see me often at the Fifth and  
23 Seventh Precinct meetings. Those of you who don't  
24 know, Orlando Bailey is our Director of Community  
25 Relations. He does a very good job representing us.

1 But we are very engaged in supportive of the Department  
2 and we just want to see more. Thank you.

3 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, Ms. Givens.  
4 And I just want to say that this Board has been  
5 proactive with trying to build bridges or fill in the  
6 gaps with the young people in the community. We've had  
7 meetings at schools at different -- yeah -- and at  
8 different schools, and we're trying to do better. But  
9 we also needs for the young people to take advantage of  
10 what we are trying to offer. And it takes time, but  
11 we're going to get there. We're going to get there.  
12 I'm also proud of the fact that a lot of the NPOs  
13 actually do programs within the school, and there's a  
14 summer program that the chief started a couple years  
15 ago, City Camp, thank you, with young people that does  
16 a phenomenal job with young people. So we're headed in  
17 the right direction is what I can say to that. Thank  
18 you, ma'am, for your comments.

19 At this time we'll have the Fifth Precinct  
20 Commander Ewing and Captain Gardner Come forth wit  
21 their presentation.

22 CAPTAIN GARDNER: Good evening.

23 THE AUDIENCE: Good evening.

24 CAPTAIN GARDNER: And I want to thank you  
25 Board, for, again, being here. I want to thank Kean's

1 Marina for allowing us to be here as well. I am here  
2 on behalf of the Fifth Precinct. Commander Ewing was  
3 unable to make it tonight, but I will be conducting the  
4 presentation.

5 So the Fifth Precinct is located at 3500  
6 Connor which encompasses approximately 1,300 square  
7 miles. The boundaries for the Fifth Precinct are as  
8 follows: on the North Gratiot at Connor to Ford  
9 Freeway at Kingsville, East Center Kingsville border of  
10 Harper Woods at Ford Freeway to Mack from the South,  
11 Mack Avenue at Kingsville to Altar, Detroit River from  
12 center Of Altar to Marquette, and West Marquette  
13 Detroit River to East Jefferson, at East Jefferson and  
14 Cadillac to Ford Freeway and Gratiot.

15 The precinct is the borders of communities of  
16 Grosse Pointe Farms, Gross Pointe Park and Harper  
17 Woods. The Fifth Precinct is home to approximately  
18 75,000 residents which includes East English Village,  
19 Cornerstone, MorningSide, Riverside Communities as well  
20 as others.

21 The Fifth Precinct has several family parks  
22 and rec centers, the largest being Chandler Park, which  
23 is home of the greatest aquatic center in Wayne County  
24 and that is also where we held our national night out.  
25 We have an 18-hole golf course. We have the Balduck on

1 Precinct's eastern border which features a sledding  
2 hill as well as a UAW Ford Ballpark. The precinct is  
3 house of the St. Johns Hospital Medical Center on  
4 Moross Road. St. Johns Hospital is a Level 2 trauma  
5 center and is one of the largest hospital campuses in  
6 the Detroit City -- in the City of Detroit. Excuse me.

7 The Fifth Precinct is also home to the Fiat  
8 Chrysler North Assembly Plant which rests on  
9 approximately 283 acres which is located at the  
10 Precinct's southern border. The plant is responsible  
11 for the Jeep Grand Cherokee and Dodge Durango.

12 Some of the goals and initiatives of the  
13 Precinct are to increase community partnerships, green  
14 lights. I'd have to say we have our first bar that is  
15 a green light location, which is the Trolleys, so that  
16 was a big win for us. The improved response time for  
17 calls for service, patrol units to be more proactive,  
18 continued to develop and implement plans to increase  
19 police visibility, reduce crime and address quality of  
20 life in issues.

21 And some of our prime prevention initiatives  
22 is with our Neighborhood Police Officers, and what  
23 we've done at the Fifth Precinct is we have broken down  
24 our Neighborhood Police Officers to scout car areas so  
25 that they can get to know their community and address

1 the citizens in that particular area. Plus, like it  
2 was mentioned earlier, they have the direct line to  
3 call them or text them via phone.

4 We still are conducting security surveys, and  
5 one of the proud initiatives that we do is what we call  
6 restorative justice. I heard earlier that talks about  
7 how we can bridge that gap between community and  
8 police. Our restorative addresses, we have done two,  
9 and what we do we have citizens come in with our  
10 officers. We have them show up with plain clothes,  
11 interact with the citizens, and then we do a little bit  
12 of dialogue to see what we have in common, and then we  
13 try to see if the citizens can actually point out who  
14 are police officers. And then we sit down and we talk  
15 about why we do what we do. And we allow them to give  
16 feedback. And that was very phenomenal when I went to  
17 the last one that we had. And one of the interesting  
18 things that transpired was something that I probably  
19 have been guilty of is going to a run. You get there  
20 and you just automatically go right into asking  
21 questions. And one of the citizens brought out the  
22 fact that they didn't feel like they were being  
23 addressed as a citizen, but as a call, you know. And  
24 that really shed some light for me because I'm, like I  
25 said earlier, I've been guilty of doing that. So I



1 said wow, that's something that I need to pay attention  
2 to and maybe ask how are you doing, you know. How can  
3 I assist you instead of assuming what it is that they  
4 want. So the restorative justice is an excellent  
5 program. We are going to be hosting another one in  
6 September and we'll make sure that we get it out to our  
7 Fifth Precinct residents so that they are aware of that  
8 and can participate.

9 We also have our MECA patrol which is  
10 MorningSide, East English Community. And what we've  
11 done with patrol is they actually have a prep radio  
12 that sits at our Fifth Precinct desk so that we can be  
13 a direct line should we have something that needs  
14 immediate attention, they can reach us right from our  
15 desk and our supervisor on the desk can dispatch a unit  
16 to that location. So that's been an awesome addition  
17 as well.

18 And then we have what we call the Fifth  
19 Precinct Domestic Violence Advocate. So one of the  
20 things that we're also looking at is people who become  
21 victims over and over again. So what the Domestic  
22 Violence Advocate at our Precinct, which is Elaine  
23 Lewis, she will connect with the citizens and try to  
24 give them information that can help them not become a  
25 victim again, also letting them know that we can

1 provide resources to cover court costs or get them to  
2 court if those are the issues that are keeping them  
3 from pursuing the case further. So those are some of  
4 the initiatives that we are currently doing in the  
5 Fifth Precinct.

6 And lastly, some of the community events and  
7 meeting that we host, we have the Commander's Advisory  
8 Board meeting which is every fourth Tuesday of the  
9 month from 5 until 7 p.m. We have our community  
10 meeting, which is every first Wednesday of the month  
11 from 6 to 8. We have our communities COMSTAT meeting,  
12 which is every second Friday of the month from 1 to  
13 2:30 p.m. We have our Explorer's meeting, which is on  
14 the third Wednesday of the month from 5 to 7. And then  
15 some of the other initiatives that we've had is our  
16 Police Week National Night Out, our Fifth Precinct  
17 Halloween Float, our Trick or Treat and Shop with Cop.  
18 And then, too, we'll be hosting our precinct Christmas  
19 party as well on this year.

20 And, too, I'd be remiss I didn't, again,  
21 acknowledge my NPOs, which are -- well, they were in  
22 the back. They done skated on me. But they are doing  
23 a phenomenal job, and I do task them. I can be a  
24 little bit of a taskmaster sometimes. But they are  
25 taking the challenges. They are get the things done.

1 And we are hoping that we can continue to address the  
2 issues in the Fifth Precinct and be that support system  
3 in the community. And that concludes my presentation.

4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. Captain  
5 Gardner. You didn't miss a beat going from recruiting  
6 to the Fifth Precinct. So great work. I don't know if  
7 any Commissioners have any questions.

8 COMMISSIONER BELL: I just want to say that  
9 the Captain has only been with us about three months.

10 CAPTAIN GARDNER: That's correct.

11 CHAIRMAN BELL: And she just made herself at  
12 home from day one. And we welcome home and she just  
13 really stepped into some really large shoes, but you're  
14 making your own way as a track star.

15 CAPTAIN GARDNER: Thank you.

16 CHAIRMAN BELL: And I say that because that's  
17 her background. And I just want to, know you embraced  
18 all the community and interaction. So I know  
19 Commissioner Brooks was saying that you left  
20 recruiting, but we are more than pleased with your  
21 arrival here at Fifth Precinct. And as we see, we just  
22 got Jefferson Chalmers just showed up, James Jackson  
23 and Company, and also Brother Walke from the Ninth  
24 Precinct Police Community Relations. So we somewhat  
25 interact, and I just want to acknowledge your

1 endeavors. And, Madam Chair, we do have a certificate  
2 for Commander Mark Bliss. I done saved the Resolution.  
3 We didn't /TEUPLT leave you out. Would you please come  
4 up, please. On the Resolution, I just want to thank  
5 you and give you a little token of appreciation and  
6 recognition in that sense. So maybe we can get a quick  
7 picture right quick.

8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. Captain  
9 Gardner, we have a few more questions or comments.

10 CHAIRMAN BROOKS: I don't have a question, I  
11 have a comment. I do miss you with recruiting, but I  
12 feel very good about where you are. I also know that  
13 you don't walk in anybody shoes, but make your own  
14 steps in your own shoes. Thank you. And I just want  
15 to tell you that oh, I do miss you, but I'm working as  
16 hard as I can with recruiting. I don't like telling me  
17 story. This is going be a very short one. I just came  
18 back from Western Salem, North Carolina where I was  
19 born and raised. I went to a little place on the  
20 corner. I thought this can't be a police department.  
21 It was a bicycle police department group. I collected  
22 everything in that place that I could collect so that I  
23 could bring it back, and they also want me to tell them  
24 about our NPOs. We are very very known across this  
25 country Detroit Police, and I don't let anyone say

1 anything about them in front of me. If anything, we  
2 need to get ourselves together and we don't have to  
3 call the police. Thank you.

4 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Just very quick. I  
5 wanted to ask a question, Captain, about your domestic  
6 violence advocate. Is that something that we have at  
7 every precinct? It is?

8 CAPTAIN GARDNER: Yes.

9 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: And I didn't know  
10 that there were resources to cover some expenses that  
11 might come up with some of the individuals that come.

12 CAPTAIN GARDNER: Yes. They seek out grant  
13 money to help individuals. And, actually, the officers  
14 have really done an excellent job so when they go on  
15 police runs where there are domestic issues, they will  
16 give her card out to make contact. And she's right at  
17 the precinct. So she's housed right at the precinct.  
18 They can come in. And we try to get them early on  
19 because, unfortunately, as time progresses, and by the  
20 time they want to come in they've talked themselves out  
21 of coming in.

22 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Right. And you  
23 answered my other question, which was going to be how  
24 do you educate the community on these resources and you  
25 answered that.

1 CAPTAIN GARDNER: Yes. We have pamphlets.

2 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you very  
3 much.

4 CAPTAIN GARDNER: You're welcome.

5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Sanders.

6 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: I just have a comment.  
7 Captain Gardner, I did a ride-along at the Fifth  
8 Precinct and she really took care of me. I mean really  
9 took care me. I've seen some things and she was on  
10 strictly police work. And I enjoyed it and a learned a  
11 lot from her just being with her and I can't wait till  
12 I do it again.

13 CAPTAIN GARDNER: Thank you.

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other questions or  
15 comments, Commissioners? Thank you, ma'am.

16 CAPTAIN GARDNER: Thank you.

17 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: At this time,  
18 Commissioners, are there any committee reports,  
19 standing committee reports or ad hoc committee reports?

20 CHAIRMAN BELL: Madam Chair, I don't have a  
21 report, but I would like to make an announcement that  
22 we are recruiting at the African World Festival next  
23 week, Friday, Saturday and Sunday. So if you all know  
24 anyone that's interested in being a police, making the  
25 police as their career, please tell them to come to the

1 African World Festival at the Charles H. Wright Museum.  
2 Thank you.

3 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Through the Chair.  
4 One thing I need to say, downtown services, I went  
5 there this week on ride-along. They did excellent too.  
6 They got some really special people to handle an  
7 control traffic, and for a little amount of people they  
8 have on boards to do it, they do an excellent job. If  
9 you was out there you'd see how traffic moved from  
10 downtown to the suburbs and to move these people out of  
11 all these buildings, Blue Cross Building, it just blows  
12 your mind what they did. So I'd like to just send  
13 kudos out to the ones that I went out there and did a  
14 ride-along with and took me around. So downtown  
15 services, thank you very much.

16 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, Commission  
17 Sanders.

18 At this time I have our report from the Board  
19 Secretary.

20 SECRETARY HICKS: Thank you, Madam Chair. If  
21 you draw your attention to the item on the agenda, we  
22 have seven items that are listed on the agenda. Again,  
23 these are items that are not scheduled for discussion  
24 on Board action this evening, they are simply  
25 reflective of the information that is flowing into the

1 office. And, as you can see, there are a number of  
2 different things. I would note on item number five,  
3 Commissioner Vann had asked some time ago that the  
4 Department continue to send grant awards to the  
5 attention of the Commission. And, as you can see, that  
6 process has begun and that is what is recorded under  
7 number 5. In addition to that, you see other types of  
8 items, including legal memorandum from both the law  
9 department that had come in and a response from our  
10 attorney. Again, those are the seven items of which  
11 I've listed on the agenda, and there for to receive,  
12 not necessarily for action.

13 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, Mr. Hicks.

14 COMMISSIONER VANN: Madam Chair?

15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Vann?

16 COMMISSIONER VANN: I respect the fact that  
17 we're not going to have any action on these items on  
18 tonight, and I fully concur with that. I am a bit  
19 confused by what appears to be the accusation by the  
20 City Law Department that we are -- we were not in  
21 compliance in terms of the towing situation and the  
22 approval of towing companies. What's so interesting to  
23 me is that it is said that this happened last year. It  
24 would appear to me that I'm wondering what the sense of  
25 urgency has become now to point out if we were not in



1 compliance. The recommendations are brought to us by  
2 the department. So I'm extremely confused by the news  
3 article that was written, and most especially confused  
4 by the, the opinion by corporation counsel with regard  
5 to this issue. And I'm hoping that our attorney, and I  
6 know that he will as reputable as he is, I know that he  
7 will be able to express the sentiments of this Board  
8 and our chartered mandated of responsibilities clearly  
9 and distinctly so that all who have accused us will  
10 know.

11 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Bell?

12 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, as I  
13 reported to you early on that this matter, I have  
14 spoken to corporation counsel on two different  
15 occasions this afternoon, and we are in accord that  
16 this communication was somewhat improper and he  
17 reassured us that in next couple days at our leisure,  
18 or convenience, we will meet on this particular issue  
19 and resolve any issues of that nature in terms of what  
20 has transpired in the last 24 hours that we was not  
21 privilege to. And I think it was a misunderstanding.  
22 He was apologetic in terms of trying to convey to the  
23 Board that we want to work together and try to resolve  
24 this as quickly as possible.

25 And the second part it, we have quite a few

1 towers here who have responded to that communication.  
2 Rest assured that Mr. Hollowell also indicated that we  
3 would come together, the Board and DPD to have a  
4 meeting with the towers that's involved and any other  
5 tower in terms of explaining what has transpired, what  
6 policy that we might revisit. And I get the  
7 understanding that perhaps that this matter is on hold  
8 in terms of communication that you receive. Just  
9 recently that it's nothing going to change until we  
10 resolve these issues as soon as possible and we would  
11 communicate that to you. So that was the dialogue that  
12 the corporation council took liberty to call me and  
13 call me back, reassured that I need to convey this to  
14 this body here, to this Board. As Commissioner Vann  
15 indicated, we're all concerned. We want to address it.  
16 We haven't relinquished any under the Charter or by  
17 ordinance. It took us two years. Some of us get our  
18 power back is to the Board we cannot relinquish, -- we  
19 don't have that authority to advocate in terms of the  
20 Charter. It's clear in the City ordinance dealing with  
21 this issue. So I'm hoping that we can resolve and  
22 communicate out as soon as possible, and at your  
23 leisure we'll schedule a meeting on Monday and Tuesday  
24 to address the issue.

25 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: All right.

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COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Madam Chair?

CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Crawford.

COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Well, I have little bit different take on this, and it appears someone's trying to, as my hip hop brothers and sisters would say from the hip hop community trying to throw a little shade on the Commission. And I say that because I too read that article today, Bishop Vann in the Detroit news, and the last paragraph of that article talked about or mentioned attorney Washington was a former Board Commission attorney. That is not true. And, by the way, Mr. Hicks, we need to write the Detroit News and ask for a retraction. The prior Board, yes, under the emergency manager. When te emergency manager came in, she went to the Executive Team of the Detroit Police Department. She was an attorney the Detroit Police Department. Let's get that clear here. So that's part of that throwing that shade because we all know there is a criminal investigation involving two tow companies by the FBI. That should be no reflexion and none of the other tow companies or owners should be used as pawn in some sort of game. I don't know if they're trying to bring the emergency back, emergency manager back in the election year or what here, but I will state this, and, of course, we know that as I

1 always liken the emergency manager law to the new Jim  
2 Crow laws of 2017 here.

3 But I will state that in sitting on this  
4 Board when I took a seat here, my integrity is -- I  
5 brought integrity, my integrity with me, and when I  
6 leave this Board my integrity will be intact. And  
7 often I've read into the record a disclosure. I've not  
8 taken any money or campaign contributions or any  
9 gratuity from any tow company or business. I'm above  
10 reproach. As the late congresswoman from the great  
11 State of New York once stated, and that's Shirley  
12 Chisolm, I'm un-bought and un-bossed. So I say that  
13 to -- I do understand because this is somewhat textbook  
14 to me. I know how, you know, the game is played, and,  
15 you know, sometimes I understand, have an idea who' the  
16 players are. So just that article particularly where  
17 you're trying to associate something criminal  
18 investigation in my opinion with this Board by in no  
19 terms I'm saying that the article read or that it was  
20 reported that civilian Deputy Chief Washington was  
21 represented this Board as an attorney. Not this board,  
22 the prior Board, and that was under the emergency  
23 manager. So I certainly hope again that they're not  
24 trying to -- this I some kind of take power from the  
25 Board and bring back on acting any way under trying to

1 bring back some former, some emergency manager. Thank  
2 you.

3 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Mallett.

4 COMMISSIONER MALLETT: SO, Madam Chairperson,  
5 I guess I've been doing this too long because I just  
6 don't read the newspaper, so I missed the article. And  
7 but I do suggest that we -- the conversation that  
8 Commissioner Bell had with the City corporation council  
9 was important. It's important because what we ought  
10 not do is try to create a contest or who controls what.  
11 At the of day what we are trying to do collectively is  
12 to create a management system that has, as Commissioner  
13 Crawford indicated, unimpeachable integrity, and is  
14 managed in a way where there is a transparency so the  
15 public can understand exactly what we're doing and why.

16 So I do believe that within the context,  
17 Madam Chairperson, of where we are right now with  
18 litigation that I don't know anything about, therefore,  
19 can't comment and won't but, nevertheless, would advise  
20 my colleagues that less that we say about the matter,  
21 particularly about issues about which we know almost  
22 nothing and in anticipation, Madam Chairperson, that  
23 you and Commissioner Bell and I guess other persons and  
24 Commissioner Dewaelsche as vice chair will be meeting  
25 to flesh these issues out with representatives of the

1 the Department. I would suggest that we table this  
2 discussion, at least among ourselves. I know there are  
3 probably many people in the public portion of our  
4 responsibility here who are going to have comments but,  
5 nevertheless, we manage this in a way that will allow  
6 the official communication between the corporation  
7 council the department and the leadership of this  
8 commission to resolve this particular issue.

9 I would point out to all of my colleagues  
10 that there's a lot of issues with whether or not the  
11 Commission does have power and authority over the  
12 towing. Now, we can disagree, but what I'm suggesting  
13 is is that why don't we wait for the conversation that  
14 Commissioner Bell indicated is going to occur next week  
15 before we continue discussions on this.

16 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other comments?  
17 Commissioner Vann.

18 COMMISSIONER VANN: Madam Chair, I'd just  
19 like to ask whether or not the commission was informed  
20 of the 21 tow companies that were rescinded?

21 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Mr. Hicks.

22 SECRETARY HICKS: Through the Chair. The  
23 Commission has not received any information and even  
24 today we have -- we were seeking to get copies of  
25 letters that it has been told to us that has been sent

1 to tow companies. We have not been able to verify that  
2 such a letter has been sent and, obviously, we have not  
3 been notified of any suspension of such. This is  
4 something we're just in the dark on whatsoever and we  
5 hope to get more information following with Chairman  
6 Bell indicated in the future meeting will be coming up  
7 in the next few days.

8 MR. RAIMI: Can I address the Board?

9 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Who are you, sir?

10 MR. RAIMI: Charles Raimi. I'm the deputy  
11 corporation counsel.

12 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

13 MR. RAIMI: Butch Hollowell is my boss and,  
14 unfortunately, he couldn't be here tonight. We sent  
15 a -- Mr. Hicks has the exact communication that went  
16 out to the tow companies. There was only one  
17 communication, and we told Mr. Hicks that, and so I'm  
18 very surprised to here that. They have everything that  
19 was sent out, and we sent it to Mr. Hicks in draft form  
20 before it went out, and so we've been trying to  
21 cooperate. And certainly the law department is very,  
22 views it is very important to continue the cooperative  
23 efforts with this Board. Nobody is making accusations  
24 whatsoever. This board recently voted to transfer  
25 their procurement process to the City's procurement

1 department, and the opinion that we issued is fully  
2 consistent with that and is intended to make clear that  
3 the procurement should be under the procurement  
4 department, which this Board has recognized. So we as  
5 far as what is happening pending the procurement  
6 process, the tow rotation, as I understand it, will  
7 stay intact, and we're happy to meet with the Board  
8 members, we're happy to meet with members of the tow  
9 community, and certainly no disrespect was intended.  
10 We're simply trying to do what we believe is legally  
11 correct.

12 SECRETARY HICKS: Excuse me, Madam Chair. If  
13 I can just add some further clarification. What the  
14 Board received was first a draft of a letter that was  
15 sent to Chief Craig. The next day the same letter and  
16 probably 99% of its content was sent to Chief Craig as  
17 a letter to Chief Craig indicating that it was a legal  
18 opinion. We were of the opinion that if the law  
19 department opines to a department head, that that  
20 department head then has a privilege with the law  
21 department and that we are not in a position,  
22 necessarily, to do anything with such a letter except  
23 to share as it came as a copy to the Board. So we have  
24 not received -- and that's a letter that he is speaking  
25 of. That is a draft and then one letter. So there are



1 two of the same documents, if you will.

2 Since that point, it has been called to our  
3 attention and it's essentially been towers who've been  
4 calling us indicating that some communication have been  
5 sent to them. We did not assume that such a  
6 communication had been sent to towers, we have simply  
7 asked if such a communication has been sent out and  
8 would it be available to this Commission. We have not  
9 gotten a response to that. So for Mr. Raimi to suggest  
10 that they have been straightforward sharing every piece  
11 of information and so forth, what we have received is  
12 one communication and that communication was directed  
13 to the Chief of Police as a legal opinion which carries  
14 a privilege we believe between the Chief of Police and  
15 law department.

16 MR. RAIMI: I don't think there's any  
17 particular point prolonging this. I just want to make  
18 clear, the draft and letter to Chief Craig that you  
19 received in advance on the second page says carbon copy  
20 tow companies listed on Exhibit A, and attached to that  
21 was the list of all of the tow companies. So that made  
22 clear that we were going to send carbon copies of that  
23 communication to the tow companies. So that was what  
24 was done. There was nothing -- nothing was hid dep  
25 from anybody. But I don't think this I productive and

1 I thing Judge Mallett is correct that we should  
2 continue this offline.

3 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: On that note, on that  
4 note, we're going to end of the discussion until we  
5 know -- until we have the meeting with Mr. Butch  
6 Hollowell about this and then we'll continue the  
7 discussion. Thank you.

8 MR. RAIMI: If Board doesn't need me anymore  
9 I'm going to depart.

10 COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Thank you, Mr. Raimi.  
11 Appreciate it.

12 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioners, where are  
13 we? Old business?

14 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, I'd just  
15 like to -- we approved the two resolutions, but it  
16 appears that Ms. Anderson is not going to be able to  
17 attend. So I'm just going to read one Whereas just to  
18 get on the record and acknowledge her contributions and  
19 I will give her the Resolution at one of the  
20 MorningSide meetings.

21 Ms. Zelda Anderson. Ms. Zelda Anderson is a  
22 longtime Detroit resident who moved to MorningSide in  
23 2000. She took her role as good neighbor seriously,  
24 becoming active on her block and throughout the 1.5  
25 square mile eastside community. Much of her activity

1 and participation includes the Fifth Precinct. The  
2 Fifth Precinct Community Relations Council, and many  
3 precinct programs.

4 Now therefore be it resolved, that the  
5 Detroit Board of Police Commissioners, speaking on  
6 behalf of the citizens of the great city of Detroit and  
7 The Detroit Police Department acknowledge the  
8 dedicated, support of Ms. Zelda Anderson. Her generous  
9 spirit and commitment to improving the quality of life  
10 for all citizens in the Fifth Precinct and throughout  
11 the City of Detroit, merits our highest regards, and we  
12 thank you for your service and we render at later date  
13 and time. Thank you, Madam Chair.

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.  
15 Commissioners, any old business? New business?  
16 Announcements. Our next Board of Police Commissioner's  
17 meeting will be Thursday, August 17th, 2017 at 3 p.m.  
18 attorney the Detroit Public Safety headquarters located  
19 1301 Third Street. Our September Community Meeting  
20 will be Thursday, September 21st, 2017 at 6:30 p.m. in  
21 the Third Precinct at Operating Engineers Local 324  
22 located at 1550 Howard Street. At this time -- yes.

23 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'm sorry. I just want  
24 to make an announcement real quick. I'm the Fifth  
25 District Commissioner. We do a community walk in

1 District 5 on the River Walk and I had some brochures  
2 here what to do, what to see, and also inside a list of  
3 all of our walks where you can actually walk with your  
4 Commissioner and get updates on different things in the  
5 community, and I would love to see many of you all  
6 afterwards. But we meet every Saturday 8:30 on the  
7 River Walk right in River Walk Plaza Cafe. Thank you.

8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, Commissioner  
9 Burton. At this time we'll have oral communication  
10 from the audience. Please give your name and limit  
11 your comments to two minutes.

12 MS. BLOSSOM: Madam Chair, I have one card,  
13 and if someone else has a card, please bring it  
14 forward. Our first speaker is --

15 MS. RIVERA: Excuse me. I didn't mean to  
16 interrupt what you're saying, but I just have something  
17 to say. My name is Adela Rivera and I'm a former  
18 Commissioner. And the tow rules that we enacted in  
19 2010, just to put this on the record, were done -- we  
20 did exactly what the law department told us to do,  
21 issue permits and no contracts. And on the other  
22 subject in terms of our attorney at that time, Celia  
23 Washington, how dare anyone try to upset her  
24 reputation. She was investigated by the FBI. She was  
25 not a target or a focus, she merely went into answer

1 questions.

2 Now, if there's anything further you want to  
3 say about the Board back then I'd appreciate it if  
4 you'd keep it to yourself.

5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Ms. Blossom.

6 MS. BLOSSOM: Madam Chair, our first speaker  
7 is Joan Fiore.

8 MS. FIORE: Good evening everyone, Board,  
9 staff, Police Department. My name's Joan Fiore. I own  
10 Javion and Sam's Towing and also the realty company.  
11 Today I sat and listened to you give a lot of people  
12 awards. Wonderful. Most of you come don't know, I'm  
13 born and raised Detroit, DPS graduate. As a matter of  
14 fact, I was raised at 94 and Chalmers. I've spent my  
15 whole career in Detroit. I'm here really to  
16 acknowledgement the towers. That someone that's always  
17 left out. Thank you, Police Department, for doing your  
18 job. I don't know that I could do it. Towing, I can  
19 do.

20 I want everybody to realize that a towing  
21 business is a 24-hour business, seven day a week, 365  
22 days a year. Doesn't matter if it's a holiday, doesn't  
23 matter if it's raining, doesn't matter if you have a  
24 family function, and it don't matter most of time if  
25 you're sick. The gentlemen said, if you don't mind, I

1 would like to -- I took some notes. Mr. Jones received  
2 the award. He said he has hard work and one of his  
3 projects was to bring low wage employers to employees.

4 In my entire history of my career, which is  
5 41 years this year, I've never laid an employee off.  
6 I've always been located in the City of Detroit. I am  
7 also a landowner. I'm a top 100 landowner and the way  
8 I got my land, I worked for it. I reinvested. I've  
9 never received a dollar of a tax credit or any  
10 incentive to be in the City of Detroit. It gets to be  
11 very frustrating when in this room we have many small  
12 businessowners that don't receive the same recognition,  
13 credit or benefit.

14 We have one of the highest property tax rates  
15 in the nation. I paid significant property taxes  
16 today. They're due in August. We were hit with the  
17 stormwater drainage fees when the council asked for  
18 help. I don't know if you realize, the emergency  
19 manager enacted a drainage fee of \$750 an acre. How  
20 much do you think you rape land for in the City of  
21 Detroit after property taxes. Oh that's a fight.

22 I would look like to say that I stayed during  
23 every economic downturn. I would like to say that --  
24 let me see. What else? I have helped -- I am a huge  
25 philanthropic believer. I taught my family to give

1 back, and we've done significantly.

2 During the eastern seaboard power outage,  
3 most of you probably don't know, my facility is run by  
4 a natural gas generator, but your Police Department  
5 facilities were not. They were run by diesel fuel and  
6 you had no electricity to get that diesel fuel out of  
7 those tanks. How do you think you did that? Our  
8 pumps. You didn't have food. How did you get it? We  
9 went to all of gas stations to get you food and water.  
10 That's a significant amount of contribution. Now, you  
11 look at all these people, these towing people. They  
12 work hard. They work diligent and they're never  
13 recognized. Every article is negative. We deserve, we  
14 deserve for the citizens -- at citizens -- I'm almost  
15 finished. I'm almost finished. She says, Donna Givens  
16 says you work for citizens. We're businessowners as  
17 well and we're citizens and we hope that you take some  
18 consideration to appreciate the effort that this people  
19 put forth. Thank you.

20 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, ma'am.

21 SECRETARY HICKS: Excuse me, Madam Chair. In  
22 order to facilitate the time item here, we're going to  
23 give the time reminder card to someone on the front row  
24 who's a part of our staff so that the Chair will be  
25 able to see the card as well.

1 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

2 SECRETARY HICKS: And we will be timing as  
3 well.

4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Are there any other  
5 cards?

6 MS. BLOSSOM: Our next speaker is Bill  
7 Wilborn.

8 MR. WILBORN: Good afternoon. My name is  
9 bill Wilborn and I'm the membership chair for Tuskegee  
10 Airmen. I just want to announce that we have a -- this  
11 Sunday we have a Young Eagles programs at the City  
12 Airport and this is one where we give kids free rides  
13 in aircraft, kids eight to 17 and get a free ride in  
14 the aircraft at the City Airport from 9 to 2:30.

15 Also I wanted to let everybody know that next  
16 weekend at Selfridge Air Force Base is the Air Show.  
17 We advise everybody to try to get out there. This is  
18 100th Anniversary of Selfridge Air Force Base. It's a  
19 good show. The Thunderbirds are out there. If you've  
20 ever seen the Thunderbirds, you've enjoyed. Of course  
21 you'll see Miss Beverly Brown out there too. We're  
22 going to have her working out. There she's with us out  
23 there.

24 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, Mr. Wilborn.

25 MS. BLOSSOM: Madam Chair, our last speaker



1 is Beverly Brown.

2 MS. BROWN: I'm only going to be a minute. I  
3 thank you guys for coming and bringing us, get a chance  
4 to see this marina and everything, but I also wanted to  
5 acknowledge that it's a happy and sad occasion that  
6 Renee Hall is going to be the Police Chief in Dallas.  
7 We're going to miss her, and I just want everybody to  
8 know that she's going to be gone the 1st of September  
9 and we're really going to miss her. She's a great  
10 lady.

11 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, Miss Brown.  
12 At this, Commissioners, is there a motion for  
13 adjournment.

14 MR. WALTON: I apologize everyone for my  
15 attire for one, but I'm Andre Walton, the President of  
16 Ninth Precinct Human Relations Council, and I've been  
17 out in the field pretty much since 10:00 this morning.  
18 We've been dealing with some of the blight issues that  
19 we're having in the Ninth Precinct region. You know,  
20 as you all know, that we've had our share of tragedies  
21 of bodies being left in some of these homes that's been  
22 blighted and we have a series of crime in our region  
23 so. But what I wanted to say is we're experiencing  
24 some issues with our officers being able to do their  
25 jobs in light of feeling like their hands being tied.

1 Today we come across some properties that have  
2 abundance of abandoned cars and, you know, these popup,  
3 what we call popup junkyards, popping up in the  
4 neighborhood. Well, all of a sudden, there's an issue  
5 with being able to go onto private property. And so we  
6 don't know if a lot of these cars are being stolen. We  
7 know that they're being stripped, you know, and that's  
8 been part of our issue. So if we can please have  
9 somebody to get some attention to how our officers are  
10 being utilized, we value the Green Light Program, but  
11 we'd like to see some red and blue lights as well. We  
12 need more officers. Thank you.

13 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

14 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, I just  
15 wanted to acknowledge the towers, and they provide a  
16 great service to the citizens of Detroit, and it's been  
17 stated to the Detroit Police Department and we all  
18 recognize that, in fact, we could not function without  
19 their service to this community. And at some point in  
20 time. We do need to recognize that and we will plan  
21 doing that in the near future. It does not paint a  
22 brush on the towers, as we all know, working the  
23 precinct. You provide a service from downtown to  
24 uptown, from the east side to the west side. And we  
25 appreciate you coming out for this type of forum to

1 address that issue in democracy orally matter. As I  
2 indicate to the corporation council that we were  
3 displeased with that type of communication to the  
4 towers, and I want you to know we are going to address  
5 the issue and feel that's going to be a fair process  
6 that what started in 2012 from previous Board. So I  
7 just want to close to that note. Thank you.

8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you sir. Been  
9 moved and supported that we adjourn. Is there any  
10 discussion? Those in favor?

11 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

12 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: The meeting is  
13 adjourned. Thank you all for coming out.
