7	police commissioner for District 6, Chairperson
8	for the Board of Police Commissioners.
9	On behalf of the Board of Police
10	Commissioners I'd like to thank you all for
11	attending this evening's meeting.
12	I'd like to thank the principal of the
13	Cody Academy of Public Leadership and the school
14	principal Mr. Matthews and, Mr. Matthews, at this
15	time if you would like to step up to the podium
16	and welcome any remarks that you'd like to
17	say.
18	MR. MATTHEWS: On behalf of the
19	students, the staff and the community of Cody
20	Rouge we welcome you to the Cody campus.
21	For anyone that doesn't know the
22	background of Cody and where it stands today, I'm
23	Jonathan Matthews, principal of Cody Academy of
24	Public Leadership. This is my 10th year on this
25	campus.

1	I came into the school as the principal
2	of all of Cody and we broke it up into three
3	small schools that you see today. On this campus
4	there is the Academy of Public Leadership which I
5	am principal of, Medicine and Community Health,
6	Principal Parker is the principal of that

8	Technology run by Principal King.
9	There's approximately 800 students on
10	this campus. We are one of the largest
11	comprehensive high schools the largest one on
12	then west side of Detroit.

16	I first came here I remember the summer of the
17	first year I came seven young people were shot
18	broad daylight on Warren and Southfield, and to

Those in 4 5 favor? 6 COMMISSIONERS: Aye. 7 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Motion carries. 8 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: I wanted to say 9 something about Mr. Edge. I met him about maybe 10 I think 13 years ago and my son has just gotten 11 into the operating engineers and the first 12 company that he went to work for was a company 13 that he helped get him there in the operating 14 engineers and he really stood up because I was 15 having problems of my son as a teenager, you 16 know, those kids, but he was very patient and we 17 got through it and I really appreciate him. 18 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you. 19 (APPLAUSE.) 20 COMMISSIONER CARTER: At this time, 21 Deputy Chief Fitzgerald, I'm going to turn the 22 mic over to you for your report and following 23 that we'll have the presentation from the 6th 2.4 Precinct.



DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: Yes, ma'am,

Page 17 and I'll keep my remarks short. I just want to 1 2 continue to kind of beat the drum for our men and women of the Detroit Police Department because 3 they're working very very hard to get rid of a 4 lot of this crime we see. 5 And I know one homicide is way too 6 7 many, but as of this morning we were down 28 homicides over the same time ast year which was, 8 9 once again, a decrease over the year before. So as it right now, as of this morning 10 11 we're sitting at 238 homicides, way too many I 12 know, but last year we were sitting at 266, 13 that's an 11 percent decrease. 14 Our non-fatal shootings are down as of this morning 102 over last year. We're at 731 15 non-fatal shootings as of this morning, we were 16 at 833 last year which is a 12 percent decrease. 17 18 Two of the continuing trends that keep 19 going down and that Green Light helps, it really 20 really does, is our robbery and carjacking 21 categories. 22 Our carjackings this year are down 37 over the same time last year, we're sitting at 23 262 as of this morning, which again is a 12 24



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percent decrease, and I really don't want to

Page 18 steal their thunder, but the 6th Precinct is down 1 2 30 percent in homicides -- and 25 non-fatal shootings, so the team that is assembled here in 3 the 6th Precinct is really really getting it 4 done. 5 So that's about all I have. 6 Response 7 time yesterday was 11 minutes which is below the 8 average that we set as our standard. Typically 9 we're right around 13 or 14 minutes, and that's from the time the call comes in until the time it 10 gets dispatched to someone, so that is a good 11 12 number in our estimation, and other than that I 13 think No. 6 will be ready to do their presentation. Commander. 14 15 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Before we do 16 that, Commissioners, do you have any questions 17 for Deputy Chief Fitzgerald? No. All right 18 thank you. 19 COMMISSIONER VANN: Madam Chair, very 20 happy to hear those statistics. I wanted to ask 21 about, you know, we've been reminded here every 22 week and the Chief's Office is reminding us of 23 the Officer Johnson who was very critically wounded and his status through these months has 24 been pretty projected and has not made great 25



1	improvement.
2	I was just wondering what kind and
3	I've been seeing on the news where they've been
4	having spaghetti dinners for him, bowling things
5	for him to try to raise some money for him.
6	I'm just wondering what provisions does
7	the department make for officers who are injured
8	in that way?
9	DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: I'm going to
10	have Comm. Mounsey come up because it is his
11	commanding officer and he can give you he's
12	been involved in every step of the way, so I
13	think he'll be able to help you answer that.
14	(COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE ARRIVES).
15	COM M. MOUNSEY: Good evening, Board.
16	My name is Brian Mounsey, I'm the Commander of
17	the 2nd Precinct, where Officer Wallace Johnson
18	is assigned.
19	This incident did happen on April 30,
20	it's been just over six months. He remains in
21	stable condition. However, he's been determined
22	to be in a permanent vegetative state. Basically
23	where he's at now, it doesn't appear as though he
24	has much, if any, awareness as to what is going
25	on around him.



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The family has decided at this time

that they would like to continue to see if he

will improve despite the fact that there's been

two medical professional opinions that say that

basically what you see is what you get and that's

basically what's been about the same for the past

three months at least.

He is being cared for by Specialty

He is being cared for by Specialty
Rehabilitation Center. To my knowledge this
police department is paying all of his medical
bills. I don't believe there's any issue with
finances with that. He is being carried in a
disabled status s which means that he still
receives a paycheck which is turned over to his
legal guardian.

Without going into a whole lot of detail, there has been a court-appointed guardian that's been set up for him and a trust fund.

Some of these fund-raisers that you're hearing about, Commissioner Vann, are not sponsored through the Detroit Police Department.

Not to say that we don't want to show support, but the one recently with the bowling was actually put on by his daughter's soccer team, so exactly what they're doing with those

Page 21 funds we're not getting involved in. 1 2 But any funds that are raised for him through the department or any donations that come 3 in are being directly sent to his legal guardian 4 and but into that trust fund, so --5 6 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, sir. 7 Any other questions? 8 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Through the 9 Chair, could you inform the Board the next time 10 you have a fund-raiser so that we may participate 11 also? 12 COMM. MOUNSEY: I certainly will, sir. 13 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you. I'd 14 like to at this time acknowledge the Vice-Chair 15 Commissioner Eva Dewaelsche who came in about five minutes ago. 16 17 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: I apologize 18 for my lateness. COMMISSIONER CARTER: Glad you're here. 19 20 At this time 6th Precinct, Comm. Stewart. 21 COMM. STEWART: Hello, everybody. My name is Tiffany Stewart and I'm the Commander of 22 the 6th Precinct located at 11450 Warwick Street 23 24 which is the northwest side of the city. I would



like to welcome everyone here tonight,

Page 22 Commissioners and the community as well as thank 1 2 Cody Leadership Academy for hosting tonight's meeting. 3 I would also like to thank former 4 Commissioner Ricardo Moore and Tijuana Mexican 5 Kitchen for providing the food for tonight. 6 I'm going to introduce my fellow 7 8 officers at the precinct. Capt. Kenneth 9 Balinski, please stand and our wonderful and dedicated neighborhood police officing staff, 10 11 Sgt. Elaine Williams, Neighborhood Police Officer 12 Michael Gordon, Neighborhood Police Officer Cary 13 Livingston, Victoria Etching, Heather Ivy and 14 Charles Staples. There's a couple of them I see outside in the hallway. 15 16 (APPLAUSE). 17 COMM. STEWART: They are indeed the 18 best and we cannot do what we do without them, we 19 love them to death. Now, on the crime stats, it's been a good year for 6th Precinct and we're 20 hoping to end the year just as strongly. We've 21 22 trended down the ast few months in violent 23 offenses and property offenses. 24 We're currently down 8 percent in total



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Part 1 crime from this time last year. That's

1	includes a 2 percent reduction in violent crime
2	and a 10 percent reduction in property crime.
3	We have continuously had reductions
4	with the precinct for homicide, robbery and
5	on-fatal shootings and, as DC Fitzgerald told you
6	earlier, we're down 30 percent in homicides from
7	this time last year, 22 percent of robberies and
8	25 percent in non-fatal shootings.
9	With those great numbers we also have
10	a 26 percent increase in criminal sexual conduct
11	and a 3 percent increase in aggravated assaults
12	and the vast majority of those reports in both of
13	those crime categories, the suspects are actually
14	known through the victim through an acquaintance,
15	a close acquaintance for familial relationship.
16	We have reductions in all of our
17	property crimes across the board, burglaries at 9
18	percent, larcenies at 7 percent and motor vehicle
19	thefts at 16 percent.
20	Some of our significant statistical
21	information here today, we've arrested over 1,600
22	adults at the 6th Precinct, we've seized over 140
23	guns. Year-to-date calls, we've had over 8,500,
24	over 5,500 of those as Priority 1 and over 3,000
25	as Priority Other.

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In order to continue these downward 1 2 trends in our crime categories Capt. Balinski will tell you about a few of our crime 3 initiatives and community initiatives that we 4 employ at the precinct. 5 CAPT. BALINSKI: Good evening. For the 6 7 record, Capt. Ken Balinski, 6th Precinct. 8 of our crime strategies we employ Cease Fire 9 which is an initiative that targets group or gangs and we've been doing very well on it and 10 11 it's a special focus on those groups that usually 12 cause the violent crime. 13 We are in Gun State, it's a new 14 program, Gun Stat scores a person that's been 15 caught with a gun and if they get a score of 11 or more, then we take special attention to it, go 16 17 to the court, pled bonds, try to get remand if 18 it's a shooting or if we have any other issues 19 that we want to address with the Court to try to 20 get a higher bond for the person to stay in. far, pretty successful. 21 22 Right now ongoing as we're talking here 23 we have a restore order going on. We have to do those weekly where we go and round up individuals 24

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with warrants and take them into custody.

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I know as I left I can tell you I know 1 2 they did take two guns off the streets already today, so those work very well. 3 Our NPOs do wraparounds for property 4 crimes and also our major felonies so that they 5 can go to the community and see if they can help 6 out, if the community can help out, is there 7 8 anything we can do for the community based on the 9 crimes that are committed around there. We have an Eyes and Ears Program with 10 citizens and we have six CB patrols in the 6th 11 12 Precinct that patrol and help us out also. 13 We have a domestic violence advocate 14 that helps us on domestic violence cases to get PPOs and just recently we received a licensed 15 social worker that's going to be working at the 16 precinct to help the citizens with issues they 17 18 might have. We have 22 Green Lights that we patrol 19 on a regular basis. We have partnerships working 20 with state, federal agencies. Our traffic cars 21 22 are still doing school routes and we also have 23 license plate readers in the precinct. I won't

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tell you where they're at, but we also have

dumping cameras in our precinct, so that helps us

1	with a lot of blight and sometimes with hits.
2	I know the other day I heard on the
3	radio that one of the license plate reader
4	locations actually read the license plate and
5	found a stolen car moving in a different
6	direction and they ended up catching up with that
7	car.
8	As far at community, for our youth we
9	have a gun safety program where we teach them K
10	through 3rd grade to help identify dangers of
11	weapons.
12	Cookies with a Cop, I was just talking
13	to the NPOs today and they did have with an 8th
14	grade group today where they have cookies and
15	talk with the youngsters at schools.
16	We have a health fair just before
17	school where we give children school supplies,
18	sometimes supply them with a haircut and there is
19	a mobile dentist that comes and give them care
20	free of charge.
21	We have a youth fair, a youth safety
22	fair for ages up to 16 years old to teach them
23	about safety. Career Days for high school
24	students who do not want to go to college that we
25	might be able to try to help them find jobs with



Page 27 1 the high school diploma that they're going to 2 achieve. And lastly an anti-bullying initiative 3 that the NPOs work with with the children to 4 teach them about not only how to identify it, but 5 6 not to be one. 7 Senior programs, we have a Senior 8 Awareness Program which is a crime prevention program to help them stay safe. We have Blight 9 Committee that helps deal with the blight within 10 the precinct. Wide have Coffee With a Cop where 11 12 we invite citizens to come in. 13 I think the last one I was there at 14 yielded about 20 to 30 citizens that came in and 15 had coffee and donuts with us. Our National Night Out with a great 16 success and our last event was Trunk or Treat 17 18 which was really a great success also. 19 Lastly we have 55 active organizations 20 in the community. Base block clubs, our CB patrols. Neighborhood police officers interact 21 22 with them regularly to address neighborhood 23 issues and that concludes our presentation. 24 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you,

19	charter-mandated role for the Board of Police
20	Commissioners as it relates to towing, however,
21	is not one that I agree with.
22	And while I respect my colleague
23	tremendously for his energy around all of the
24	processes affecting the Board of Police
25	Commissioners and the department, as I read what



was produced by the legal counsel for the Board it was very very clear to me that we don't have a role mandated by the charter.

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We might in our policy development responsibilities, but directly affecting towing is not something that I see in the charter and I think it's of significant termination, No. 1.

No. 2, as I stated many many times before and I want to state now, I do not believe that the Detroit Police Department should have a role in towing. I believe firmly as the Department of Purchasing of the City of Detroit ought to take over that entire process.

I believe that removing that administrative irritant from the department is appropriate. I don't think that it is necessary to the job done by the men and women of the Detroit Police Department and as much as there is energy to support keeping that as a part of the department's responsibility from a certain number of members of the commission, I'm speaking only for myself, but I'm opposed, so I don't want the people in the audience to think that the Board is unanimous in its desire to maintain this point of potential corruption.



1	I am adamantly opposed, well remain
2	adamantly opposed and again as I say to you,
3	Madam Chairperson, as I read the charter it's not
4	a mandated responsibility for us or for the
5	department per se.
6	COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, I'm
7	not going to debate, but I just want to clear up,
8	there's also a city ordinance that was passed by
9	Council that gives us that role and therefore
10	that's why we are pursuing this.
11	This is something that this Board did
12	not take up, it was a process of all parties
13	involved several years ago and some of you
14	perhaps are aware of that, so that's the position
15	that we stand on and I think the majority of the
16	Board understands those issues, concerns and
17	that's why we move in that particular area.
18	He can always have a minority opinion
19	on anything, but it's clear that this board here,

7	operation down, that was the one who had gotten
8	my daughter, but tonight I come here to tell you
9	I don't know what procedure that the
10	Commissioners do, but to acknowledge the
11	following officers because they helped safe my
12	daughter's life on October 20.
13	And as a result of that incident in
14	2015 she does have medical issues and she was at
15	BCA Strong Craft and I as her mother and we've
16	been on this rough journey, noticed that she was
17	being overmedicated.
18	I had a court order from Judge
19	Brackston not only as her birth mother, but as
20	her guardian. The hospital refused to leave her,
21	so I went to the 9th Precinct and they told me to
22	call a squad car, squad care came out.
23	The hospital gave them a hard time and
24	they sensed something was wrong, so they called



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their lieutenant and their lieutenant said, "Get

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1	her out of there". She was comatose, she
2	couldn't sit in a wheelchair and the officers did
3	not wait, they took her to Detroit Receiving and
4	I had them take her blood test.
5	Her normal level for Depakote, she was
6	given Haldol, Valium and Depakote, 2000
7	milligrams of Depakote. The normal level in 30,
8	her blood level was 167 near liver failure.
9	So I want to tell you please tell those
10	officers thank you because my daughter is alive.
11	(APPLAUSE).

I have not seen 14 him one time, it's been over a year. 15 And I know you're saying one minute and I apologize. 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
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
