4 CHAIRMAN BELL: Welcome to the weekly meeting  
5 of the Board of Police Commission, our community  
6 meeting. I am your Chair, Willie Bell, from District  
7 4. It's good to see all of you here this evening on  
8 Holy Thursday as we convene the Board of Police  
9 Commission. Do we have anyone from New Greater Zion  
10 Hill Church here? Minister, pastor or a deacon or  
11 someone representing the church? We now have someone  
12 from New Greater Zion Hill Church. We are pleased to  
13 be here. If you would introduce yourself and we would  
14 appreciate it if you can give us an opening prayer,  
15 invocation to open the meeting, and after that, any  
16 other remarks you want to make in terms of welcoming us  
17 to your church and your community and your precinct and  
18 all above.

19 PASTOR PATTERSON: Thank you. My name is  
20 Pastor Eddie J. Patterson, I'm the Pastor at New  
21 Greater Zion Missionary Baptist Church and I'm really  
22 grateful that and thankful to God for you sharing today  
23 and coming out. One reason is because I believe that  
24 the church and the community must work together. And  
25 the Police Department, when I look at the job when I

1 consider the responsibility that the Police Department  
2 have, I have great respect for you, and I'm not just  
3 saying this to tickle your fancy. I mean I believe  
4 this. I got great respect for you. It's a great job.  
5 It's a demanding job and I am -- anything that New  
6 Greater Zion Hill can do to make it even better, please  
7 feel free to contact me. The doors are always open and  
8 I welcome you here and such as we've had we lend unto  
9 you.

10 CHAIRMAN BELL: We appreciate that  
11 invocation.

12 PASTOR PATTERSON: Invocation?

13 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, sir.

14 (Invocation given)

15 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you, pastor, for  
16 prayer. Thank you for your warm hospitality and we can  
17 definitely appreciate being housed in this lovely,  
18 lovely sanctuary. And I know you do some good  
19 community work in the 11th precinct and this  
20 neighborhood, so we are really pleased on Holy Thursday  
21 to be here. I know in terms of the season how you have  
22 to be engaging as we celebrate. I want to say on  
23 behalf of the Board of Police Commission, thank you  
24 again.

25 I'm going to ask Commissioner Crawford to

1 have some remarks too. This is his district.

2 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes. Thank you.

3 Thank you for inviting us into the House of the Lord.

4 And I'd just like to say my name is Reggie Crawford and

5 I'm the Commissioner of District 3. That's this

6 particular district that encompasses the 11th precinct.

7 Also District 3 is part of the 9th precinct too. So I

8 want to welcome everyone here from the district, all of

9 the guests and all of those who work for the district,

10 Detroit Police Department and welcome the Chief to

11 District 3.

12 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you, Commissioner

13 Crawford. Thank you, again, Pastor.

14 PASTOR PATTERSON: Thank you.

15 CHAIRMAN BELL: I just want to ask the

16 commissioners starting to my left to introduce

17 themselves.

18 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Commissioner Richard

19 Shelby, District 1.

20 CHAIRMAN BELL: Reintroduce yourself,

21 Commissioner.

22 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Commissioner Reggie

23 Crawford, District 3.

24 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commissioner Lisa

25 Carter, District 6.

1 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHÉ: Commissioner Eva  
2 Garza Dewaelsche at large.

3 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you, Commission. As  
4 you can see, we are not fully staffed at this time. So  
5 we have excused absence for Commissioner Elizabeth  
6 Brooks. Excused absence from Conrad Mallett,  
7 Commissioner Conrad Mallett. Excused absence from  
8 Commissioner Ricardo Moore. And finally, excused  
9 absence of Bishop Edgar Vann is excused. So you can  
10 see that we might have a quorum shortly. I hope that  
11 materializes. So we cannot take care of any business,  
12 but we can go through some formalities until such a  
13 time that we can call the meeting to order and probably  
14 I'm going to move right on to if Mr. Hicks would  
15 introduce the staff, please.

16 SECRETARY HICKS: Thank you, Mr. Chair.  
17 Start with indicating that, of course, Robert Brown is  
18 seated right next to me and here in the front row we  
19 have Supervisor Investigator representing the Offices  
20 of Chief Investigator, Lawrence Akbar. Next to Mr.  
21 Akbar is Ms. Faye Johnson who's on charge of our fiscal  
22 area and then, of course, right behind her is new  
23 addition to our staff which is Theresa Voss. Theresa  
24 was hired in as the outreach coordinator, community  
25 outreach and media coordinator. Theresa has a wealth

1 of experience in community and media relations and so  
2 we wanted to welcome her to this staff today. She  
3 started this week. I also want to indicate that the  
4 night's taping is done by Media Services. Mindy Womack  
5 is the court reporter and Sergeant Quinn is doing the  
6 taping for the Department.

7 And, Mr. Chair, if I could make a suggestion  
8 in the agenda, at least on the question of the  
9 memorials, the resolutions and the memorials so we can  
10 take those and then we can come back after the  
11 presentation and vote the necessary items once we  
12 achieve the quorum.

13 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, we can entertain that.  
14 Representing Chief Craig at this time at the table is  
15 Assistant Chief James White.

16 A.C. WHITE: Good evening, Board.

17 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you.

18 A.C. WHITE: Chief will be returning  
19 momentarily.

20 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, I understand that. We  
21 appreciate that. If you want, you care to introduce  
22 any other DPD staff at this time, we would appreciate  
23 it.

24 A.C. WHITE: Absolute. I'd be honored. As I  
25 indicated to you, James Craig had to step away for a

1 moment. He will be returning. First Assistant Chief  
2 Stair is here. We have Deputy Chief Celia Washington.  
3 Deputy Chief Charles Fitzgerald and my contacts or  
4 glasses aren't working today, so I'll let everyone  
5 introduce themselves.

6 LIEUTENANT JOHNSON: Lieutenant Johnson.

7 COMMANDER SIMS: Deshaune Sims Commander of  
8 Professional Standards Bureau.

9 A.C. WHITE: All right. Thank you.

10 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you, Assistant Chief  
11 White. Joining us is Commissioner Willie Burton. If  
12 you want to introduce yourself, please.

13 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you, Mr.  
14 Chairman. I'm Commissioner Willie Burton representing  
15 District 5. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

16 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you, commissioner  
17 Burton. Your attendance is timely. Mr. Hicks, do we  
18 have a quorum?

19 SECRETARY HICKS: Yes, Mr. Chair, we now have  
20 a quorum.

21 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you. As we move  
22 forward, I would like the Board to entertain to approve  
23 the agenda for this evening's meeting, April 13.

24 COMMISSIONER: So moved.

25 COMMISSIONER: Support.

1 CHAIRMAN BELL: Properly moved and supported.  
2 Discussion? Those in favor, aye.

3 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

4 CHAIRMAN BELL: Those opposed? Motion  
5 carries.

6 The next item of business would be approval  
7 of the minutes of April 6, 2017.

8 COMMISSIONER: So moved.

9 COMMISSIONER: Support.

10 CHAIRMAN BELL: Been properly moved and  
11 supported. Discussion? In favor aye.

12 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

13 CHAIRMAN BELL: Opposed? Motion carries.

14 We have communication from the Chief of  
15 Police in reference to a personnel matter, therefore,  
16 it requires a closed door meeting and I'm going to ask  
17 Commissioner Crawford.

18 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the Chair, I  
19 put a motion on the floor as we move into closed  
20 session for discussion. It's a personnel matter.

21 CHAIRMAN BELL: It's been properly moved.  
22 Discussion? Those in favor aye.

23 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

24 CHAIRMAN BELL: Those opposed? Motion  
25 carries.



1 Ladies and gentlemen, we will not be no  
2 longer than about 25 minutes at the most. We would  
3 convene timely, but this is something that we must act  
4 on and we cannot do it an open forum. It's a personnel  
5 matter, so the Charter dictates and the process  
6 dictates that we go into closed session. So please be  
7 patient. In that timeframe we should return. Thank  
8 you.

9 (CLOSED SESSION).

10 CHAIRMAN BELL: The Chair what entertain a  
11 motion to reconvene our meeting.

12 COMMISSIONER: So moved.

13 COMMISSIONER: Support.

14 CHAIRMAN BELL: Been properly moved and  
15 supported. Those in favor aye.

16 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

17 CHAIRMAN BELL: Those opposed? Motion  
18 carries.

19 The next item would be the Chair would  
20 entertain a motion to entertain recommendation of Chief  
21 of Police Chief Craig to suspend this officer without  
22 pay. And the Chair would entertain a motion to that  
23 effect.

24 COMMISSIONER: Second.

25 COMMISSIONER: Support.

1 CHAIRMAN BELL: It's been properly moved and  
2 supported. Discussion?

3 MR. BURTON: Mr. Chair?

4 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you.

5 MR. BURTON: You know, when I look at the  
6 material in my package here regarding this incident,  
7 you know, I believe, I believe the board we should set  
8 aside this until after the 18th until the officer has  
9 his day in court as far as due process. I think, you  
10 know, suspending an officer without pay is nothing that  
11 I'm very favorable of, number one. I think of officers  
12 having families and things of that nature. But looking  
13 at the merit of the circumstances, I'd like to see if  
14 we can as a Board set this aside until the 18th and see  
15 what the outcome is. If we can hold off until the  
16 18th, I just think that -- I think that would be the  
17 best thing for this body.

18 CHAIRMAN BELL: If there's no other  
19 discussion, reference to the officer involved is  
20 Officer Kwame Powell, and that is communication that we  
21 had discussion in terms of closed session.

22 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chair, if I could  
23 ask one last thing?

24 COMMISSIONER BURTON: The reason I would like  
25 for us to set it aside until after the 18th until the

1 officer has his day in court is because there's always  
2 a presumption of innocence. That would conclude my  
3 discussion, Mr. Chair.

4 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you, sir.

5 Mr. Hicks, would you conduct our profile  
6 starting to my left?

7 SECRETARY HICKS: Yes, sir, Mr. Chair.  
8 Commissioner Dewaelsche?

9 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Concur.

10 SECRETARY HICKS: Commissioner Carter?

11 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Concur.

12 SECRETARY HICKS: Commissioner Bell?

13 COMMISSIONER BELL: Concur.

14 SECRETARY HICKS: Commissioner Burton?

15 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'm, I'm, I'm, I'm  
16 voting not to suspend Officer Powell. I don't believe  
17 in suspending the officer.

18 SECRETARY HICKS: Commissioner Crawford:

19 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Concur.

20 SECRETARY HICKS: Commissioner Shelby?

21 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Concur.

22 SECRETARY HICKS: Commissioners with six  
23 members five voting to concur. Under the ruling of two  
24 thirds necessary, the members present, the motion  
25 passes.

1 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you, motion is passed.  
2 So the officer is suspended without pay and as we go  
3 forward.

4 The next point of business would be, I'd like  
5 to -- do we have any elected officials or anybody  
6 representing elected officials at this time?

7 MR. BURTON: Through the Chair.

8 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, sir. Go ahead.

9 MR. BURTON: For forcing as far as my vote  
10 I'm voting present. Thank you.

11 CHAIRMAN BELL: Okay.

12 Dr. Divers, do I see you standing  
13 representing.

14 DR. DIVERS: Dr. Divers representing  
15 Representative Cushingberry.

16 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you. Any others. At  
17 this time I'm sorry yes. Thank you for your presence.  
18 Any others?

19 The next item of business would be Chief  
20 Craig. Good to see you this afternoon.

21 CHIEF CRAIG: Good seeing you as well.  
22 Absolutely.

23 CHAIRMAN BELL: I have of a brief report. I  
24 just want to say that we are pleased to be here, once  
25 again, in the 11th precinct. I don't have an extensive

1 report so I'm going to reserve some remarks shortly to  
2 speak at some point in time. Basically I want to move  
3 on to the next item of business would be the third  
4 round of promotion from the Chief of Police. The Chair  
5 would entertain a motion to approve the motion as  
6 listed by the Chief of Police.

7 COMMISSIONER: So moved.

8 COMMISSIONER: Support.

9 CHAIRMAN BELL: It's been properly moved and  
10 supported. Discussion?

11 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Yes, sir.

12 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, sir.

13 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Through the Chair.  
14 Yes, sir. Is it possible we go in close session?

15 CHAIRMAN BELL: At this time?

16 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Yes, sir.

17 CHAIRMAN BELL: You make a motion.

18 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: I make a motion.

19 CHAIRMAN BELL: You need a second to that  
20 effect.

21 COMMISSIONER: Support.

22 CHAIRMAN BELL: Support. We are convening in  
23 enclosed session for five minutes. Thank you.

24 (CLOSED SESSION)

25 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you for being so

1 patient. I know that's because we're in church.  
2 That's a blessing. That's a blessing. I'd like to  
3 introduce Mark Young, president of LSA. Would you  
4 stand, Mark. Thank you for your attendance.

5 MR. YOUNG: Thank you.

6 CHAIRMAN BELL: The Chair would entertain a  
7 motion to reconvene.

8 COMMISSIONER: So moved.

9 COMMISSIONER: Support.

10 CHAIRMAN BELL: It's been properly moved and  
11 supported. Discussion? Those in favor aye?

12 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

13 CHAIRMAN BELL: Opposed? Motion carries.

14 And where are we in reference to a motion  
15 that any other discussion on this particular matter can  
16 we move ahead and vote on this matter? Could we put a  
17 motion on the floor? That's what I thought so we have  
18 a discussion we have addressed those concerns. Those  
19 are in favor say aye.

20 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

21 CHAIRMAN BELL: Those opposed? Motion  
22 carries for the second round of promotion as listed by  
23 Chief of Police to this Board of Police Commissioner.  
24 I want to congratulate Mark Young and all those others  
25 on the list.

1                   COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chair, just in case  
2                   there's an issue, we should indicate this is the third  
3                   round of promotions just so there is no confusion when  
4                   we go back and check our record.

5                   CHAIRMAN BELL: Okay. Stipulate that. Thank  
6                   you. That matter's been disposed of.

7                   The next item would be Resolution & Memorial.  
8                   We have a resolution in support of the Justice  
9                   Department Role in Consent Decree and Law Enforcement  
10                  Oversight. You have that before you. You have a copy?  
11                  I would like to have our newly appointed communication  
12                  director. Do you have a copy, Ms. Voss?

13                  MS. VOSS: Yes.

14                  CHAIRMAN BELL: Would you entertain reading  
15                  it into the record, please?

16                  MS. VOSS: Whereas; in 2003, the City of  
17                  Detroit and its Police Department entered into two  
18                  consent decrees with the U.S. Justice Department to  
19                  address systemic changes needed for law enforcement,  
20                  including procedures for police training, the use of  
21                  deadly force, and the process for arrest and detention  
22                  of suspects. Today, the police department is better  
23                  organized and provides better services to the community  
24                  as a result of the reform process initiated and  
25                  completed in 2016 by the consent decrees.

1                   And whereas; President Donald Trump's  
2                   Administration through Attorney General Jeff Sessions  
3                   is signaling it no longer intends to fully support  
4                   police reform through consent decrees like the ones  
5                   that successfully lead to DPD improvements. On April  
6                   3, 2017, Mr. Sessions ordered a full Justice Department  
7                   review of all consent decrees and reiterated his  
8                   erroneous belief that federal oversight of police  
9                   departments is usually unwarranted and stems from the  
10                  "misdeeds of individual bad actors." His belief  
11                  ignores facts and evidence that consent decrees do not  
12                  target a few "bad actors" but rather departments with  
13                  systemic and often long patterns of civil rights and  
14                  other constitutional abuses or ingrained problems that  
15                  undermine the effectiveness of law enforcement, the  
16                  strength of police confidence and community relations,  
17                  and the achievement of justice.

18                  And whereas -- I'm going to skip a couple.  
19                  Whereas; Detroit's experience and outcomes show the  
20                  benefits of federal oversight. Indeed, other mayors  
21                  and civic leaders in communities with police  
22                  departments under consent decrees have spoken out  
23                  against Attorney General Sessions reducing or possibly  
24                  ending federal oversight, including Mayor Catherine  
25                  Pugh of Baltimore, who will "strongly oppose any delay



1 in moving forward" with the new decree for her city.  
2 Also, according to criminologists, many other  
3 communities have benefitted from the role of the  
4 Justice Department in reviewing law enforcement for  
5 patterns and practices of abuse and have used the  
6 federal assistance to make changes even when no consent  
7 decree was involved.

8 Now therefore be it resolved that the Detroit  
9 Board of Police Commissioners, speaking for the  
10 citizens of Detroit and the Detroit Police Department,  
11 calls upon U.S. Attorney General Jeff Sessions to heed  
12 the evidence of systemic law enforcement abuses and  
13 discrimination of many U.S. cities and towns and to  
14 maintain the use of consent decrees and other tools of  
15 the Justice Department's federal oversight for the  
16 essential protection of citizens and their civil  
17 rights. Thank you.

18 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you. Thank you. I  
19 would hope that you understand here certainly with the  
20 public, but when you look at Detroit Board of Police  
21 Commission that's been empaneled by the City Charter  
22 since 1974, our mission statement say increase public  
23 confidence in the Detroit Police Department providing  
24 accountability, competent, objective, effective  
25 civilian oversight in the following ways. We review

1 and validation and establish Police Department polices,  
2 rules and regulations. We review and approve the  
3 Police Department budget. We act as the final  
4 authority in imposing and reviewing discipline of  
5 employees of the department. We prepare an annual  
6 report of Police Department activities including  
7 handling of crime, complaints, and of future plans.  
8 Review and approve Police Department promotions. And  
9 our motto is working in partnership with the community  
10 for a better and safer Detroit.

11 And I'm happy to say I'm pleased to say on  
12 behalf of the Board that we have that in 2017 and we're  
13 looking forward to continuing that regardless of the  
14 Attorney General of the United States of America's  
15 position in terms of dealing with local police  
16 departments. And other police departments, I think  
17 namely Baltimore mayor has spoken up. Chicago has  
18 spoken up. New York has spoken up in terms of they are  
19 not going to, I would say, kowtow to this type of  
20 mentality. They understand that police reform and even  
21 Ferguson, Missouri is going to go about creating a  
22 Civilian Oversight Board notwithstanding the role of  
23 the Attorney General. And I would hope that the  
24 community understands that that we continue.

25 The last item I want to mention, talking

1 about promotion. This approval of the promotion list.  
2 My understanding that we have some officers who --

3 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Mr. Chair, before we do  
4 that, move for adoption.

5 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, ma'am. I'm speaking too  
6 fast.

7 COMMISSIONER: Second.

8 CHAIRMAN BELL: It's been properly moved and  
9 supported. Approve the resolution as mentioned. Those  
10 in favor aye.

11 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

12 CHAIRMAN BELL: Those opposed? Motion  
13 carries. Thank you.

14 Getting to promotees, any potential sergeants  
15 or lieutenants in the sanctuary this evening, would you  
16 stand. Thank you. That's outstanding.

17 The next item more resolution commissioner  
18 Crawford. Mr. Jackie Walton.

19 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Mr. Walton? Jackie  
20 Walton. Or someone representing Mr. Walton. This is a  
21 resolution honoring Mr. Jackie Walton. Whereas Mr.  
22 Jackie Walton was born in Holly Springs, Mississippi  
23 and has worked in the City of Detroit since 1982. Mr.  
24 Walton is married to Marva Walton, and they have two  
25 grown children, Christopher and Jacqueline; and

1                   Whereas: Mr. Walton attended and graduated  
2 form Holly High School in 1973 and moved to Flint,  
3 Michigan in 1974, while in Flint, Mr. Walton attended U  
4 of M Flint campus.; and

5                   Whereas; Mr. Walton was hired by the Kentucky  
6 Fried Chicken Corporation in 1979 and worked as a  
7 manager until 1982. He then joined the management team  
8 for Church's Chicken. From 2004 through 2008, Mr.  
9 Walton worked for Popeye's Chicken. In 2009, Mr.  
10 Walton and his partner opened their first Captain Jays  
11 Fish and Chicken in Grand Rapids, Michigan. Mr. Walton  
12 and his partners now own twenty-three stores in metro  
13 Detroit area, Flint, Michigan and Indiana. Mr. Walton  
14 serves as the Director of Public Relations for Captain  
15 Jays Fish and Chicken; and

16                   Whereas; Mr. Walton is a member of Bray  
17 Temple in Pontiac, Michigan, under the pastorate of  
18 Reverend Victoria McKenzie. Mr. Walton is a staunch  
19 worker in his church he gives assistance and works with  
20 all of the church auxiliaries; and

21                   Whereas; Mr. Walton's community involvement  
22 includes: Sponsoring the Eleventh Precinct's Reserve  
23 Officers Retirement Luncheon, Eleventh Precinct's  
24 Annual Police Week activities, National Night Out,  
25 Eleventh Precinct's Community Relations Council

1 Christmas Party, and the Eleventh Precinct's  
2 Beautification Project.

3 Now therefore be it resolved that the Detroit  
4 Board of Police Commissioners, speaking on behalf of  
5 the citizens of the great City of Detroit and the  
6 Detroit Police Department acknowledge the dedicated,  
7 humble, caring giving and longtime support of Mr.  
8 Jackie Walton. His generous spirit and commitment to  
9 improving the quality of life for all citizens in the  
10 Eleventh Precinct and throughout the City of Detroit,  
11 merits our highest regards. We thank you for your  
12 leadership and congratulate you, Mr. Jackie Walton.  
13 The Board of Police Commissioners.

14 CHAIRMAN BELL: The Chair would entertain a  
15 motion for approval of the resolution.

16 COMMISSIONER: So moved.

17 COMMISSIONER: Support.

18 CHAIRMAN BELL: It's been properly moved and  
19 supported. Discussion? Those in favor aye.

20 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

21 CHAIRMAN BELL: Those opposed? Motion  
22 carries. Thank you.

23 CHIEF CRAIG: So we have a couple of  
24 acknowledgements. One, I won't read, Spirit of Detroit  
25 Award acknowledging Mr. Jackie Walton for exceptional

1 achievement, outstanding leadership and dedication to  
2 improving the quality of life from the Detroit City  
3 Council.

4 The second award is a Certificate of  
5 Recognition from the Detroit Police Department, once  
6 again, outstanding service and cooperation signed by me  
7 on this date April 13, 2017.

8 CHAIRMAN BELL: Next item of business would  
9 be Chief, you have the floor.

10 CHIEF CRAIG: Thank you, Mr. Chair. I'm  
11 going to defer my remarks in the interest of time  
12 because I know that Commander Leach is going to be  
13 making a brief presentation about the 11th precinct so  
14 I'm going to defer, but I just would ask not going  
15 through but acknowledge the world's best Police  
16 Department. If you could stand and be acknowledged,  
17 Detroit Police Department. Thank you.

18 CAPTAIN MILES: Good evening everyone. My  
19 name is Octaveious Miles. I'm the Captain of the 11th  
20 precinct. I'd like to acknowledge my Commander, Tim  
21 Leach. Some of my NPO members, Sergeant Charles  
22 Spruce, Police Officer Eric Hill, Officer Daniel  
23 Robinson, Doug Nichols and of course our two Chaplains  
24 Wycoff and Chaplain Bailey.

25 Of course the 11th precinct 5100 East Nevada.

1 You all know where it's at. Some of our goals and  
2 initiatives. Increase community partnerships. Improve  
3 response time, calls for service. Patrol units to be  
4 more proactive. Continue to develop, implement and  
5 plans to increase police visibility. Reduce crime and  
6 address our quality of life issues.

7 Some of our upcoming community events I would  
8 like to hit on. The first Saturday of this month from  
9 11 to 1 there's a chat with the commander and captain.  
10 Our community meeting is every second Tuesday of the  
11 month from 6 to 8. My community COMSTAT is the second  
12 Friday of every month from 1:30 to 2:30. Coming up in  
13 November the 11th is our precinct Veteran's Day Parade  
14 luncheon. That will be from 11 a.m. 3 p.m. And last,  
15 certainly not least, in memory of Kevin Miller who  
16 attended passed away. We partnered with Planet Fitness  
17 and opened up a healthy heart work facility south  
18 precinct. We welcome everyone to come check it out.  
19 That's a beautiful facility. Thank you.

20 CHAIRMAN BELL: Any questions?  
21 Commissioners? Yes? I want to thank you for lifting  
22 up Kevin Miller. A long time friend of mine on terms  
23 of he's a rookie officer. I can see one of my young  
24 officers who's not so young anymore, when I worked at  
25 the 11th precinct. So it's good to hear the 11th

1 precinct is doing outstanding work, Commander Leach an  
2 all other good people. Thank you, Captain, in terms of  
3 your reporting. No questions? Chief, anything else?

4 CHIEF CRAIG: I just want to echo the 11th  
5 precinct's doing a phenomenal job. They handled a  
6 round table session with some of their new officers  
7 just to talk about a number of issues, but one of the  
8 things that was addressed was just being ethically  
9 safe. That's something that I've been pushing out  
10 pretty substantially over the last several weeks. It's  
11 important to be safe tactically, but also ethically  
12 safe. So I just want to commend the 11th precinct for  
13 doing a wonderful job, balancing the work in the  
14 community and enforcing constitutionally. So thank you  
15 for that work.

16 CHAIRMAN BELL: Committee standing or ad hoc  
17 committee reports? I know commissioner Dewaelsche,  
18 Commissioner Brooks said you had -- you're going to  
19 share some remarks with us.

20 COMMISSIONER DEWAEELSCHÉ: Well, as always,  
21 we're recruiting aggressively helping the department.  
22 In fact, we established a recruitment committee on the  
23 Police Commission just so that we can be very very  
24 involved in trying to help the Department recruit. I  
25 did leave some fliers at the front and I try to take



1 those fliers everywhere I go. I go to a lot of  
2 different meetings in the communities. You know, we  
3 want our department to be representative of all the  
4 communities in the City of Detroit. A couple weeks ago  
5 we had a community meeting in Southwest Detroit and  
6 when recruiting there we had a recruitment table. And  
7 I see Lieutenant Gardener's here and I don't know if  
8 she would like to just briefly give a couple of words  
9 on some of the activities that we're doing right now.

10 LIEUTENANT GARDENER: Good evening, Board.  
11 Yes, we are aggressively recruiting. Recently had an  
12 event at Sir Metro where we had 71 applicants and 30  
13 have officially moved through the process of the  
14 testing phase and we are looking for a class for the  
15 24th roughly over 30 that should be able to start.

16 Again, we are aggressively recruiting. You  
17 can let your loved ones know or people in the community  
18 know that we have an online process so they don't have  
19 to leave the comforts of their home. They can also  
20 apply right from their cell phone so we have the  
21 ability and accessibility for them to apply at any  
22 point in time. And if they have any questions or  
23 concerns, they can definitely call our office at  
24 596-2607 and any of my staff will be more than happy to  
25 assist them with any questions that they may have about

1 the recruitment process. Thank you.

2 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you. And I  
3 just would like to add, if you want to do this in  
4 person, you may also go to the 1st precinct  
5 Headquarters 1301 Third Street and we're located on the  
6 6th floor. Yes, you can come down. We have computer  
7 modules there where you can actually apply in person  
8 online. And we also have recruitment activities at the  
9 Northwest Activities Center ongoing. These are the one  
10 steps for the Detroit Employment Solutions Corporation,  
11 DESC. And Northwest Activities Center, Samaritan  
12 Center on the east side on Connor and Michigan and  
13 Wyoming Sir Metro Office, those are all one-step  
14 centers that are having ongoing recruitment for the  
15 department. Thank you.

16 LIEUTENANT GARDENER: And I'd also like to  
17 add too, real quickly, we do have churches that have  
18 been involved in our recruitment process. Currently  
19 we've been with the Triumph Church and we will be there  
20 on this Sunday as well recruiting. So any churches or  
21 any organizations, we will come to your location to  
22 recruit. Again, you can just give us a call at  
23 596-2607. Thank you.

24 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you so much,  
25 Lieutenant. That concludes my report.

1 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you Commissioner. Thank  
2 you, Lieutenant.

3 I do want to acknowledge our 11th precinct  
4 Police Community Board. I think the president of the  
5 Board, could she come to mic. Thank you. Would you  
6 come to the mic. I know we're not having chicken but  
7 we just wants to appreciate you and acknowledge you.

8 MS. JACKSON: Thank you. Caught me off  
9 guard. But thank you. I appreciate it.

10 CHAIRMAN BELL: And how often do you meet or  
11 could you share something what you engage in?

12 MS. JACKSON: We meet every second Tuesday at  
13 6:00 at the 11th precinct which is 5100 East Nevada and  
14 our meetings usually go until about 7:30 or quarter to  
15 8.

16 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you. Could you  
17 acknowledge any other members of your team, if they  
18 would just stand.

19 MS. JACKSON: Yes. Also in the audience is  
20 the secretary and she's our -- we have her doing double  
21 duty at the moment. Doina Rosu, if you could please  
22 stands. And that's the only member that's here this  
23 evening.

24 CHAIRMAN BELL: I just want to acknowledge,  
25 appreciate labor of love with the 11th precinct and

1 with this community. It's definitely ongoing and I'm  
2 familiar with your work and I just want to say God  
3 bless you as you share your blessing each and every  
4 opportunity.

5 MS. JACKSON: Thank you. I appreciate that.

6 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, sir. Commissioner  
7 Burton?

8 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I just want to say, Ms.  
9 Jackson, you do a great job every month over at number  
10 11. I come to your all meetings. You had a packed  
11 house the other day. And what I love about all the  
12 members from the community from the 11th precinct  
13 especially how they can come and get information, and I  
14 love what you're all doing over there.

15 MS. JACKSON: Thank you. And that's our  
16 purpose. We want to get the information out because it  
17 doesn't make any sense for us to hold it and not share  
18 it. So we want to make sure that at least our  
19 community is getting what they need to know and the  
20 help they need to get.

21 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you again. Mr. Hicks?

22 SECRETARY HICKS: Thank you, Mr. Chair. I'd  
23 like to indicate that between the last meeting and the  
24 current meeting the offices received seven  
25 communications, two of them the Board has already

1 received and operated. One was the third round  
2 promotion and recommendations of the Chief of Police.  
3 The second was the suspension without pay of a police  
4 officer. In addition to those two items, which you've  
5 acted upon, we also received communications with Brenda  
6 Jones, Detroit City Council President, Brenda Jones.  
7 There's a coffee and conversation in the skilled trades  
8 task force meeting. We also received a communication  
9 from our own Commissioner Dewaelsche, and Commissioner  
10 Dewaelsche was reminding us of the great accomplishment  
11 on the part of Jessie Gonzales, who is identified as  
12 the Detroit man here by federal authorities. And one  
13 of the things we wanted to do is process a resolution  
14 and that resolution is forthcoming. Hopefully we'll  
15 also have an opportunity to present that resolution  
16 with Mr. Gonzales present.

17 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: This is Sergeant  
18 Gonzales thunder, so I wanted to add that.

19 SECRETARY HICKS: The other communications  
20 that we received was from Commissioner Crawford and  
21 Commissioner Crawford sent a communication to the Board  
22 which essentially talked about the Baltimore Police  
23 Department and its concern relative to an item which  
24 you acted upon earlier today. That's the movement of  
25 the federal government away from the work of the

1 Department of Justice.

2 In addition to that, received an update on  
3 the Greenlight locations and lastly we shared the  
4 information with the Board about a new website that had  
5 been kicked off by the City that advertises the process  
6 around medical marijuana apparently in claims and that  
7 item was, of course, communicated to each of you all in  
8 advance of this meeting.

9 With those items, that represents all of the  
10 communications that were received by the Board and  
11 where appropriate those things have been -- I've  
12 deferred to the Board for action as in the case of two  
13 of them that you did take action on today. The others  
14 referred to proper authority for other information or  
15 action. With that, that concludes my report, Mr.  
16 Chair.

17 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you, Mr. Hicks. I  
18 guess we got a real strong interest in medical  
19 marijuana dispensaries in the City of Detroit and we  
20 have now just gathered the information. Perhaps that  
21 would be in our next forum in May in reference to that  
22 particular item.

23 MS. WASHINGTON: Actually, if I may. Celia  
24 Washington, legal advisor.

25 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, ma'am.

1 MS. WASHINGTON: Just very quickly.

2 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, ma'am.

3 MS. WASHINGTON: Mr. Hicks and I have  
4 scheduled a meeting with BC with the the law department  
5 and he will schedule it with the appropriate members of  
6 the commission so we can talk very specifically. I  
7 think there are about six to ten questions that Mr.  
8 Hicks formulated and we will address all of those in  
9 preparation for a formal presentation.

10 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you. So bear with us,  
11 public. We are gathering information. We want to  
12 address the issue and study it. And then we can report  
13 out with the proper authority so we can have some  
14 inside knowledge in terms of what has transpired. It's  
15 a primary issue in the City of Detroit seeing that  
16 they're not going the way they're going, but that's not  
17 always the case, but we want to fact check when we  
18 report out. Thank you, D.C. Washington. Any old  
19 business? New business? Announcements?

20 Next meeting would be on Thursday April the  
21 20th, 2017 at 3 p.m. public safety headquarters 1301  
22 Third Street. Our next community meeting would be on  
23 May 11th in the 8th precinct. The location is  
24 forthcoming. Yes, sir.

25 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, sir. Through

1 the Chair. I'm sorry. I just have an announcement.  
2 This was spoke about this issue maybe a couple meetings  
3 over the months. Last month we had Wayne County Deputy  
4 Sheriff's Union had a vote on the, one might say, a  
5 proposal that was pertaining to the stadiums, the  
6 Ilitch proposal, Ilitch Holdings, and I just want to  
7 add that that proposal was defeated. It tried to come  
8 back secondary employment with labor, of the labor  
9 agreement with Wayne county deputies and the numbers  
10 that went down there, by the way we did some old school  
11 campaigning, so to speak, union organizing. Was 479  
12 no, 34 yes. So and highest turnout was division one.  
13 It's the jail that I work work at and we're very proud  
14 of that.

15 Perhaps I don't know where the issue is going  
16 in terms of state of the Ilitch Holdings in terms of  
17 the new arena, Comerica Park, the concerts etcetera,  
18 but there's some scheduled events for some 285 days of  
19 the year and perhaps, in my opinion, it would not  
20 disrespect the Detroit Police Department or its chief  
21 or its mayor, even though I know it's a separate issue,  
22 at least consult, because they can do whatever they  
23 like in terms of a private entity trying to do a  
24 contract, but at least out of respect keeping everyone  
25 informed in the Detroit Police Department from chief



1 even up to the mayor as to what's going on. Thank you.

2 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you, Commissioner  
3 Crawford. Any other important announcements?

4 At this time, Mr. Brown, we're prepared to  
5 hear from the audience. Two minutes. Please give your  
6 name and be respectful and the first would be public  
7 safety issues. That's why we are here. The other  
8 meetings that help throughout the city for other  
9 engagement. This is a public safety body dealing with  
10 Detroit and the Board of Police Commission. So Mr.  
11 Brown, yes, sir.

12 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Mr. Chair, I'm sorry  
13 for the interruption. There was -- I believe we should  
14 reads the names of the sergeants the lieutenants that  
15 were being promoted into the record. Is that my  
16 understanding? The names?

17 CHAIRMAN BELL: We can read them into the  
18 record. Would you care to initiate. Do you have a  
19 list? Mr. Hicks, do you have the list?

20 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes. Somebody's  
21 going to help me with some of those names. Those we  
22 voted on in terms of promotion from sergeant to  
23 lieutenant. Number one, Matthew Taylor. Number two,  
24 Candace Matschikowski. Thank you. Sergeant Jeffrey  
25 Morin. Sergeant Mark Young. And these are two

1           lieutenants Sergeant Stacy Greer Travis. Sergeant  
2           Rebecca Mckay. Sergeant Lauri Carter. Sergeant Dawn  
3           Engel. Sergeant Devin Dunbeck. Sergeant Mary Baritche  
4           and Sergeant Stacy Cavin. Somebody want to keep going?  
5           Thanks for the assistance. I don't want to  
6           mispronounce people's names. And those are the ones  
7           promoted to lieutenant. I want to emphasize that.  
8           Thank you.

9                           COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHÉ: And to the rank of  
10           sergeant, Detective Tony Cotton. Detective Danny  
11           Barbee. Detective Clive Stewart. Detective Gail  
12           Bowden. Detective Allen Jacokes. Detective Nathaniel  
13           Weekley. Corporal Larry Davis. Police Officer Jasun  
14           Mcwhorter. Police officer Eugene Bomber. Police  
15           Officer Mark Sievers. Police Officer Terica Holston.  
16           Police Officer Trevis Anderson. Police Officer Justin  
17           Sampson. Police Officer Hameed Mohamed. Police  
18           Officer Jennifer Maddox. Police Officer Sean Wall.  
19           Police Officer Alexander Collrin. Police Officer John  
20           Stewart. Police Officer Mark Oliver. Police Officer  
21           James MOrgan. Police Officer Robert Douglas. Police  
22           Officer Thomas Denmark. Police Officer Kevin Drury.  
23           Police Officer Adrian Payne. Police Officer Michael  
24           Moreland. Police Officer Nicole Kirkwood. Police  
25           Officer Lawrence Addison. Police Officer Phillip

2           Officer Trey Lyons. Does that conclude the list?

3                   CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you. They'll be a  
4           class. There will be a, right Chief, graduation  
5           ceremony in the future.

6                   CHIEF CRAIG: Class starting on Monday for  
7           both sergeants and lieutenants and then there will be a  
8           graduating date to be announced and location.

9                   CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you, sir. Appreciate  
10          it. I know they're looking forward to it. Mr. Brown.

11                   MR. BROWN: Yes, Mr. Chair. The first  
12          speaker would be Ms. Kim Jackson. Followed by Donna  
13          Doina Rosu.

14                   MS. JACKSON: Kim Jackson. President of the  
15          11th Precinct Police Community Relations. And I just  
16          at this time would like to recognize our officers, so  
17          when I call you, would you please come up officer,  
18          commander and the captain. So Commander Tim Leach.  
19          Captain Miles. Thank you, sir. Appreciate you. I  
20          would also like Robinson, Sergeant Spruce. Officer  
21          Nichols. Thank you, sir. I appreciate all you do for  
22          us.

23                   And see, I just had to do this because I know  
24          I worry them to death. I know I do. So this is my way  
25          of saying thank you because I think I've done more

1           texting and more calling and more e-mailing, so this is  
2           my way of saying thank you to our officers in the  
3           community relations.

4                       CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you. And I also want  
5           to recognize our Chaplains, Chaplain Wycoff and  
6           Chaplain Bailey. Thank you guys so much. I appreciate  
7           everything that you do for us. And we have another  
8           event planned for our officers as well so I can  
9           recognize everybody. So this is just for tonight and  
10          we do have something else coming up to recognize the  
11          rest of our officers so thank you.

12                      CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you.

13                      MS. ROSU: Good evening everybody. My name  
14          is Doina Rosu, the vice president of the 11th Precinct  
15          Police Community Relations Counsel. Thank you  
16          everybody for being here.

17                      I'm only going to take a minute of your time  
18          and the reason that I want to address all of you and  
19          our esteemed Chief Craig is because through so many  
20          years of volunteering I've gone through many many  
21          commanders, many captains, etcetera. And I can  
22          honestly say that I am so blessed and so honored to  
23          work under the leadership of my commander. Yes, I call  
24          him my commander, my captain, my sarge and all our  
25          NPO's. But I would also like to express my deep

1 gratitude to all the leaders within the 11th precinct  
2 community because we truly, I believe, have bridged a  
3 humongous gap where we have police, community leaders  
4 at the community working together. And I also would  
5 like to extend a deep thank you to all of my DPD.  
6 Thank you.

7 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you.

8 MR. BROWN: Ms. Adrienne Collins followed by  
9 Ms. McCants.

10 MS. COLLINS: Hello, Honorable Board of  
11 Police Commissioners. My name is Adrienne Collins and  
12 I am a native Detroiter. And, first of all, I'd like  
13 to tell you how much it thrills me to have you  
14 physically here. I was raised hear in Detroit. I've  
15 been here living on this block. I moved back about ten  
16 years ago, but my mom's been here over 45 years. And  
17 this is actually my church so, again, welcome. And  
18 thank you, pastor, and the church as well.

19 But there are a couple of things I'd like to  
20 say in regards to the community on behalf of our nine  
21 month old association. It's actually a collaboration  
22 of residents and businesses. We'd like to have you  
23 guys to consider a project for the community in regards  
24 to Greenlight. We don't know what to do but it was a  
25 brain storm so I was asked to mention that today. We'd

1 like to be the very first, if it hasn't been something  
2 that you've considered. We'd like to have a community.  
3 Our boundaries are very small. They're within Mound  
4 Road, Mount Elliot, Nevada and 7 Mile and it  
5 encompasses three residential blocks and we're hopeful  
6 that you would at least consider and talk to us more  
7 about that project.

8 I'm also a musician and I have a publication  
9 inside of the Detroit Public Schools on behalf of local  
10 musicians. Our purpose is to change the thinking of  
11 the kids. They always think that when they hear the  
12 name, that something has to do with music, and it does  
13 but, for the most part, we're trying to get them to  
14 think positive and be aware of a lot of social  
15 accountable things that they're not aware of because of  
16 their environment, possibly the families, but not to  
17 complain about that, we're just trying to find a  
18 platform where we can change that when we write about  
19 the relationships.

20 So as a musician for the last four years,  
21 I've been privileged to be championed by the 11th  
22 precinct with a lot free major events that we help in  
23 the community. We also champion the police during  
24 Police Week and we bring in musicians at the 11th  
25 precinct for a luncheon. And thanks to Commander Leach

1 and the awesome Sergeant Spruce and his team, they have  
2 been championing our efforts and it has been so  
3 appreciative. Just couldn't imagine. So you all are  
4 invited to come and take a look at how the camaraderie  
5 within the community actually is. It is not just  
6 conversation, it is definitely the truth. So it's on  
7 May 17th. I wanted to mention that.

8 And I also wanted to mention the publication  
9 is meaning make news and it's a new concept that  
10 promotes positive news and information. So possibly  
11 you get back with me in regards to that as well. Thank  
12 you all again.

13 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you.

14 MR. BROWN: Ms. McCants followed by Mr.  
15 Enlers.

16 MS. McCANTS: Good afternoon, everyone,  
17 including the Board. My concern is I came in front of  
18 the Board. It's been a couple months ago. I was  
19 supposed to get something back about my precincts and  
20 the condition of the precincts inside. We get someone  
21 there to clean twice a week, maybe three times a week.  
22 We're running that precinct 24 hours a day. It is a  
23 health hazard to continue to put the officers and the  
24 community in an environment. What is it that the  
25 community other than going into the precincts and

1 helping to clean up can we do that they can't continue  
2 to operate with someone coming in cleaning once every  
3 two days or once every three days.

4 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the Chair.

5 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, sir.

6 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Ms. McCants, you and  
7 I have had this conversation before. Also it was  
8 conveyed to the Commander over a period of time, so if  
9 you and I, perhaps the Commander, can talk a few  
10 minutes after this meeting.

11 MS. McCANTS: I would like that very much.

12 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am. Thank  
13 you.

14 MS. McCANTS: Because that is really a  
15 concern.

16 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am.

17 MS. McCANTS: Thank you.

18 MS. ENLERS: Good evening to the panel. My  
19 name is Cherri Enlers. I drove here from Mobile,  
20 Alabama to get Justice for my son Eric Reed. He was  
21 murdered September 2014 and it's hard for me to get in  
22 touch with the detective or just get any help. I just  
23 need someone to speak with concerning this matter so I  
24 can get justice for my son.

25 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, ma'am.



1 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the Chair. Certainly  
2 want to work with you. Commander Wilson is coming in  
3 your direction. He oversees our detective unit so he'd  
4 be more than happy to work with you. Also we might  
5 want to invite her to be part of the Mothers of  
6 Murdered Children. They've been a great asset in our  
7 work and certainly. And what date? That was in 2016?

8 MS. ENLERS: '14 September 12.

9 CHIEF CRAIG: We'll get you squared away and  
10 Commander Wilson will be happy to talk to you. Sorry  
11 for your loss.

12 MS. ENLERS: Thank you so much.

13 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you. Is there no other  
14 comments from the public? Yes, sir?

15 MR. BALIS: How you doing. My name is Keno  
16 Davis. I'm the president of Cliff Rogan Carrier Block  
17 Club, Outer Drive and 7 Mile. Today be awarded  
18 Commander Leach an award and the 11th precinct  
19 diligently doing their job, keeping our neighborhood  
20 safe and clean. And I just want to take this  
21 opportunity to salute them and we gave them a plaque  
22 today. And I just want 11th precinct to continue doing  
23 their job because I've been worked over in this  
24 neighborhood in '09 and it's a great deal better than  
25 it was under his leadership.

1                   And secondly, I just wanted to announce that  
2 anyone who needs security cameras that I install them  
3 and my number is 313-779-3189. Thank you.

4                   CHAIRMAN BELL: Ma'am, we'll allow one more  
5 comment because we ask you to submit cards so please  
6 tac the mic no problem.

7                   MS. BIRCH: I'm sorry.

8                   CHAIRMAN BELL: No problem.

9                   MS. BIRCH: I appreciate your courtesy.

10                  CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, ma'am.

11                  MS. BIRCH: My name is Shirley Birch. I am  
12 with the Community United for Progress Belmont Shopping  
13 Center. First I want to commend -- the ladies are  
14 coming. I want to commend number 11, but first I must  
15 give honor to God. I have been in prayer all day with  
16 my pastor, David L. Jefferson, to pray for the city to  
17 pray for police officers, to pray for political  
18 leaders. You're in that group. So that's why I'm late  
19 so I thank you for the courtesy. But one of your  
20 members of your church mentioned the Greenlight. I  
21 know you've had that, but I bring something to the  
22 table that's going to assist everybody in this place  
23 that we have here a portfolio to show how we met with  
24 Chief Craig at the very first presentation that he  
25 taught us and we took it further than what he said,

1 sir. We went back to our neighborhood and gathered a  
2 core group that we as community leaders would go to the  
3 different gas stations, party stores, wherever we know  
4 crime was prevalent and we explained it from our level  
5 that the police may go to the business people but  
6 sometimes they get intimidated by our beautiful  
7 officers. We're not intimidated by them because we  
8 love them. We know they're out there for us, but  
9 business people are not like that.

10 Now, make a long story short. We have been  
11 to four different locations within the 11th precinct to  
12 present it from the aspects of a community leader. We  
13 explained to them that if I come to your place of  
14 business and I don't see the Greenlight, that makes me  
15 think well, why should I go here. You don't care  
16 enough about me to get the Greenlight, and I hate for  
17 them to mention money, because they have money. So  
18 when we present ourself that I'm going to shop here and  
19 recommend other people to shop here, that encourages  
20 them to want to get the Greenlight.

21 The next Greenlight and have proof over here  
22 sitting with our offices, and just to show you how  
23 great that Commander is, I was also late because I  
24 didn't know where the church was. So I called every  
25 one of them. They didn't answer. Now, guess what,

1 last one I called was Commander. He said yes Ms.  
2 Birch. He whispered. I said I don't know where the  
3 church is. So this is why I'm here.

4 My point is when you see the courage and  
5 respect he has, he didn't have to answer me. But  
6 getting back to the Greenlight, if everybody in this  
7 place took this portfolio like we have, go around to  
8 the different businesses in your particular area, share  
9 why they should get the Greenlight. Guess how many  
10 green lights will go in number 11 because the community  
11 is involved with the police and the mayor. This is  
12 what he came up with DTE Internet Comcast, okay? So  
13 that's why I wanted you, sir, that lady that belongs to  
14 this church, Adrienne, I want to meet with her because  
15 I can show her how we did it, how we're successful and  
16 thank you for the time. Do you girls have anything to  
17 say? I guess I said enough.

18 CHIEF CRAIG: Thank you. Through the Chair.

19 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, sir.

20 CHIEF CRAIG: I know you want to close out,  
21 but I just want to address it with the other lady who  
22 spoke. We are moving forward with neighborhoods down  
23 the the road and certainly a number of neighborhoods  
24 have reached out so we're encouraged, we're concerned  
25 about capacity at this point. Once we open that

1 Realtime Crime Center which Assistant Chief White  
2 assured me that June 1st is going to be the grand  
3 opening of the brand new Detroit Police Department  
4 Realtime Crime. And I would just let Chief White.  
5 And to commander Leach and his team. I've been to a  
6 number of these meetings over the last several years,  
7 but I got to tell you this, I'm just want to know is  
8 there anyone else out there, in fact, let's give  
9 Commander Leach a round of applause.

10 CHAIRMAN BELL: Well, we're definitely going  
11 to light up Greenlight in 11th precinct. I thank you  
12 for that initiative. I hope that each precinct, I know  
13 the 7t precinct's here, and 9th precinct. We can just  
14 try to encourage people and that would really make a  
15 difference. I like that initiative taking that  
16 involvement. So just keep on the good work.

17 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the Chair.  
18 Ma'am, I just want to thank you too, Ms. Birch, for  
19 your Greenlight activism, so to speak, and continue the  
20 good work. Thank you.

21 CHAIRMAN BELL: I see a young lady from  
22 council present, Brenda Jones staff. Good seeing you.  
23 If there's no other business then I just want to  
24 commend Commander Leach and his team throughout the  
25 11th precinct and the great pastor of this church for

1 hosting us. All of you know that to the meeting we  
2 appreciate you. Chief Craig, appreciate your  
3 attendance and the Board and the staff. I just hope  
4 that you have a God blessed Christmas -- Easter. So  
5 we're going to close out. We do have refreshments. So  
6 since we're in church, we're going to break bread in  
7 the church. I'm going to ask the pastor to come in and  
8 bless the food.

9 (Blessing given)

10 CHAIRMAN BELL: Board?

11 COMMISSIONER: Move for adjournment.

12 COMMISSIONER: Support.

13 CHAIRMAN BELL: Discussion? Those in favor  
14 aye?

15 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

16 CHAIRMAN BELL: Those against. Motion pass.  
17 Thank you. Enjoy the fellowship.

18 (The proceeding was adjourned at 7:45 p.m.)
