
### What is the Cody Rouge & Warrendale Youth-Centric Neighborhood Framework?





Between January 2019 and March 2020, the Cody Rouge & Warrendale Neighborhood Framework will bring together city government, neighborhood organizations, residents, and more to create a youth-centric neighborhood plan. - 7. Supporting Resident Organizations

### **Project Area**

The project area for the Cody Rouge & Warrendale Neighborhood Framework centers around Joy Road and Warren Avenue between Greenfield Road and Rouge Park, and includes all land within a half-mile of these main shopping streets, north to West Chicago and south to the city line with Dearborn. While the study focuses on the area within these boundaries, it aims to include and benefit all nearby residents in neighborhoods including Franklin Park, Joy Community, Warrendale, and Warren Avenue.

# What is the Cody Rouge & Warrendale Youth-Centric Neighborhood Framework? Project phases & activities

### PHASE 1. Build partnerships, gather information, begin public conversation

**School Rep Workshops & Convenings** Planning staff work with School Reps from eight area schools to discuss & document the neighborhood

**Organizational Steering Committee** brings together city government, neighborhood organizations, and young people to steer the project

**Kick-off Neighborhood Framework Investigation** into who makes decisions about designing & planning the neighborhood by young people

**Public Kick-off** where sponsors, steering committee, and young people begin the public conversation

## PHASE 2. Hands-on neighborhood projects by young people & all residents

**Resident planner program** for residents of all ages interested in neighborhood planning and working to engage their neighbors

**Spring quick action projects** suggested by neighborhood organizations to do real things with young people and residents

Summer youth-led plan-design-build projects to get hands dirty planning, designing, and building neighborhood improvements

**Youth urbanism summit** to bring together young people from across the neighborhood & the city to discuss what youth-centric urbanism is all about.

### **PHASE 3. Draft conclusions**

**Public discussions** hosted by neighborhood groups to bring together small groups of residents to discuss neighborhood framework possibilities


**Neighborhood convening** bringing together residents from across the neighborhood to share thoughts & build agreements

PHASE 4. Build agreement & final production

**Neighborhood convening** bringing together residents from across the neighborhood to share thoughts & build agreements

Public meetings on draft plan & final choices to discuss & decide final aspects of neighborhood framework

**Final report** for use implementing, advocating, and educating
