5 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Good evening.

6 ATTENDEES: Good evening.

7 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Welcome to the Board of
8 Police Commissioners monthly board meeting. My name is
9 Lisa Carter. I represent District Six, and I will be
10 conducting our meeting tonight. On behalf of our board,
11 for those of you in attendance, thank you for joining us
12 this evening. And for those of you joining us on your
13 government cable channel, thank you for viewing our
14 meeting. Commissioner Shirley Burch has asked to be
15 excused from tonight's meeting.

16 Tonight we have invited Chaplain Commander Ron
17 Franklin to provide the in vocation.

18 (At 6:34 p.m., in vocation given)

19 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, sir. At this
20 time we'll begin with introductions beginning to my far
21 left with Commissioner Brown.

22 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Commissioner Daryl Brown,
23 District One.

24 HOLLEY: Jim Holley, At-Large. Appointed.

25 COMMISSIONER BELL: Willie Bell, District Four.

1 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCH: Eva Garza Dewaelsche,
2 Vice-Chair and At-Large.

3 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Elizabeth Brooks At-Large.

4 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: William Davis, District
5 Seven.

6 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Annie Holt, At-Large.
7 Appointed.

8 MS. WHITE: Madam Chairperson, you have a quorum
9 this evening.

10 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, Madam.

11 Commissioners, you have before you the agenda
12 for December 12, 2019. Is there a motion for approval of
13 the agenda?

14 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCH: So moved.

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: Second.

16 COMMISSIONER CARTER: It's been moved and
17 supported that we approve the agenda for December 12, 2019.
18 Is there any discussion? Those in favor?

19 THE BOARD: Aye.

20 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Those opposed? The motion
21 carries.

22 Commissioners, you have before you the minutes
23 from December 5, 2019. Are there any corrections?

24 Is there a motion for approval?

25 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: So moved.

1 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: So moved.

2 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Support.

3 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you. It's been moved
4 supported that we approve the minutes from December 5,
5 2019. Those in favor? Is there any discussion? I'm
6 sorry. Those in favor?

7 THE BOARD: Aye.

8 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Those opposed? Motion
9 carried.

10 At this time I'm going to ask that our interim
11 board secretary please introduce the staff.

12 MS. WHITE: Thank you, Madam Chairperson. Just
13 before we go to the Board of Police Commissioners' staff
14 introduction I'd like to acknowledge Sergeant Quinn who is
15 taping our meeting this evening; Media Services, who is
16 completing the audio and visual, and Ms. Donna Williams who
17 is our court reporter.

18 And I will start from my right with the Board of
19 Police Commissioner's staff. And I'll have both the Board
20 of Police Commissioners and Office of the Chief
21 Investigator's staff stand and introduce themselves.

22 MR. WYRICK: Jermaine Wyrick, Board attorney.

23 MS. BLOSSOM: Theresa Blossom, Police
24 Community Relations.

25 (Self-Introduction of Board staff)

1 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you. At this time
2 I'd like to the introduce Deputy Chief Bettison sitting in
3 for Chief Craig. Good afternoon, sir.

4 DC BETTISON: Good afternoon.

5 COMMISSIONER CARTER: I mean, good evening.

6 DC BETTISON: Good evening, ma'am. At this time
7 I would like to have our executive team and our staff stand
8 up and introduce themselves. But before they do that, just
9 to let the community know that we have the leadership of
10 the eastside and also our specialized commands here. And
11 they're here present to be able to answer any concerns that
12 the citizens may have. So they're here to serve the
13 citizens, the community. So that being said, I'll start
14 with the front with Commander Hayes, and then we'll go from
15 there.

16 COMMANDER HAYES: Good evening, Honorable
17 Board. Franklin Hayes, Commander of the Third Precinct.

18 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Okay, so that's why I'm
19 getting confused, the two Commander Hayes -- I mean, Ron
20 Franklin. Okay, the Franklin confused me. Thank you.

21 (Self-introduction of Chief's Staff Continued).

22 DC BETTISON: And we'll have our Neighborhood
23 Police Officers introduce themselves too. They're sitting
24 in the back, so might as well.

25 (Self-introduction of Neighborhood Police

1 Officers)

2 DC BETTISON: Thank you.

3 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you.

4 MS. WHITE: Excuse me, Madam Chairperson. We
5 also have our legal assistant present with us tonight,
6 Ms. Delane Richard.

7 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Okay, thank you. Thanks
8 for joining us.

9 At this time if there are any elected officials
10 or representatives, please stand and give your name for the
11 record, please, loudly.

12 CITIZEN: Good evening. Paul Bradford for the
13 Councilman -- Inaudible --

14 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you.

15 MS. MARIE: Good evening. Marie -- Inaudible --
16 administrative assistant to State Representative Tyrone
17 Carter.

18 MS. GRIER: Good evening. Yolanda Grier;
19 precinct delegate 2924.

20 -- Inaudible Introduction --

21 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you. Thank you all
22 for attending this evening's meeting.

23 Tonight we are in the Third Precinct. Both
24 Commissioner Willie Burton and I represent this precinct.
25 Commissioner Burton is not here at this time to provide a

1 welcome to the residents of the Third Precinct, but I
2 extend my warmest welcome to you all and thank you for
3 attending this evening's meeting.

4 We're delighted to meet at the Historic Little
5 Rock Baptist Church where our very own Commissioner
6 Reverend Dr. Jim Holley is senior pastor. We thank
7 Commissioner Holley for hosting the last board meeting of
8 the year, and we invite him to welcome us to his church
9 and share some history about the church.

10 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Thank you very much, madam
11 chairperson and assistant chief, and to the board members
12 and also to our guest. We welcome you to the North End.
13 I'm in my fourteenth year as pastor of the Historic Little
14 Rock Baptist Church and so --

15 (Applause)

16 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: So I just want you to know
17 how grateful we are and thankful we are. We've been
18 looking for this opportunity to host. They didn't just
19 pick us out, we invited you. We wanted you here. We love
20 to entertain here at the Historic Little Rock Baptist
21 Church. And we want you to know that indeed we're very
22 happy to have you here. We hope you enjoy yourself.

23 This church is about 110 years old. We moved
24 here about 41 years ago from the east side in ninety -- on
25 the east side to this particular location. This church

1 here has four floors to it. You're in the lower level.

2 And then we have three levels above this level; and also we
3 have a gym that's attached to this particular level.

4 We also have a family life center that basically
5 we have a 30 year lease with the city of Detroit. One of
6 the few, if not the only one -- but one of the few churches
7 to have a relationship with a lease relationship,
8 partnership with the City of Detroit. It's the family life
9 center next door. It's basically called a considine. It's
10 now Considine Little Rock Family Life Center.

11 In that particular location, we want you to know
12 that we have a business school that we brought down from
13 Terry, Michigan [sic]; 130-year-old business school which
14 you can get your master's as well as your MBA. Also we
15 have an online high school there; ITT -- an ITT learning
16 center for about 600 students that we have about three --
17 2,000 that's in the pipeline; but 600 now. We basically
18 have a -- on the first floor we're just starting. And then
19 in January will be a special needs activity center for the
20 first floor. And we have an olympic swimming pool that
21 basically we'll be opening up sometime in February.

22 Also we want you to know that indeed we're very
23 happy to let you know that we have a couple of pictures
24 we want you to look at. We basically are remodeling the
25 gym in January. And then, of course, at the top picture,

1 you'll be the first to know that tomorrow -- on next week
2 with the mayor we will be announcing that we will have a
3 groundbreaking ceremony of the 60 unit senior citizen
4 building. And it's fully funded by the federal
5 government.

6 On the lower level it will be commercial. We
7 will be given the opportunity to give the name Aretha
8 Franklin -- Aretha's Place Restaurant and a pharmacy here
9 in the North End. And so we want you to know --

10 (Applause)

11 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: And so just thank you so
12 much. You can see I'm very proud, and just want you to
13 know that indeed we're happy to have you here and the work
14 that we've been doing here at the North End. There's so
15 many good people here at the North End. Understand that
16 around the corner from Woodward and Clairmount will be what
17 they call the Ruth Ellis Center. It is basically a --
18 breaking ground also next year on this corner will be Ruth
19 Ellis.

20 This is an opportunity for young ladies who
21 basically have a lifestyle that somehow enters the system
22 perhaps with their family, And so they basically will be
23 housed there. It's not something that we have -- we're
24 just a joint venture in turning the corner. But we're very
25 happy, because it's going to really build up the North End

1 area with residents.

2 But behind the church here, we're having a new
3 apartment -- another apartment building low to moderate
4 income and a parking structure that will service the North
5 End Northern High School, that basically will end up being
6 the -- will be the headquarters for the Detroit Public
7 School System. They're moving about 300 people over here.
8 And we're all going to basically work together to basically
9 use this particular parking structure and also apartment
10 building that will be placed back there as well.

11 So you can see I'm very excited. Sorry about
12 the cold and sinus, but Madam Chairperson and to the
13 Board, I'm very happy to have it here and to show off
14 what we're doing here at the Historic Little Rock Baptist
15 Church. Thank you very much.

16 (Applause)

17 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, Commissioner
18 Holley, for all that you do and for providing the services
19 that you do for this area, which is much needed, and
20 providing an access to the different community needs.

21 I'd like to acknowledge Commissioner Willie
22 Burton who just came in. Good afternoon, sir. Good
23 evening, sir.

24 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Good afternoon. How
25 everybody feeling over here in District Five? Everybody

1 feel pretty good out there?

2 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, sir. And I'm
3 going to move on with my -- the rest of my report. In any
4 community effort there are various partnerships in
5 policing. The works of the Police Community Relations Team
6 are critically important. I would like to acknowledge Mr.
7 Earnest Little, community relations president of the Third
8 Precinct Community Relations Organization. Good afternoon.

9 (Applause)

10 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you for the work that
11 you do with Community Relations.

12 On behalf of the Board, I want to express our
13 concern and support for fallen and injured officers and
14 their families. Again, we are reminded by the recent
15 death of Corporal Bryant Lavant and Corporal Rasheen
16 McClain. We are truly thankful for their service. Our
17 concerns for officer safety and citizen protection are
18 ranked as two of the most important priorities of the
19 Board.

20 Our Board receives a weekly report from the
21 Department listing injured officers. I would ask that
22 Deputy Chief Bettison, during your remarks please provide
23 us with any additional information related to the injured
24 and fallen officers.

25 I want to again express the Board's deepest

1 condolences to the Department and family of Corporal
2 Rasheen McClain, Badge Number 3520. Many of us attended
3 a beautiful homegoing service for Corporal McClain, and
4 we thank him for his selfless service and heroism. He is
5 an American hero. And I want to also wish Officer
6 Phillippe Batoum Bisse, Badge 118, a speedy recovery from
7 his gunshot wound. Our prayers and thoughts continue to
8 be with both families in the Detroit's rank and file as
9 we collectively work through this difficult time.

10 The Board of Police Commissioners meets every
11 week except for the Thanksgiving and Christmas holiday
12 periods. We meet at Police Headquarters three weeks in
13 the month and on Thursdays at 3:00 p.m. We also meet in
14 the community every second Thursday of the month at 6:30
15 p.m.

16 Under the Detroit City Charter, Article 7,
17 Chapter 8, the Board of Police Commissioners is empowered
18 to provide civilian oversight and supervisory control of
19 the police department. Our board investigates noncriminal
20 citizen's complaints, monitor the Department's operations,
21 and work with the mayor and chief of police to establish
22 police policies, rules, and regulations.

23 As an oversight agency, the Board has the broad
24 responsibility to protect the citizens, protect the city
25 of Detroit from unwarranted lawsuits, and to create

1 policies to enforce strict adherence to department
2 policy.

3 Additionally, the Board works to eliminate
4 misconduct, discriminatory police practices, and
5 unnecessary use of force by police. The Board also
6 believes in transparency, community input, and
7 accountability. As a civilian oversight agency, we protect
8 the rights of citizens. Our objective is to increase the
9 quality of life for residents and visitors to Detroit.

10 I want to point to several items for your
11 consideration and information. Today is the last scheduled
12 board meeting scheduled for the board to meet this calendar
13 year. We're scheduled to return to our normal business on
14 Thursday, January 9, 2020. The Board of Police
15 Commissioners will not meet on December 19, December 26,
16 nor January 2, 2020 because of our observance of Christmas
17 and New Years Holiday.

18 On this past Monday, December 9th, from 6:00 do
19 9:00 p.m., the Board received extensive training on the
20 Open Meetings Act and Parliamentary Procedures from the
21 Michigan Municipal League. The presenters were Mr. William
22 Matthison, Municipal Control, and Ms. Eleanor
23 --Unintelligible-- Seward professional register
24 parliamentarians.

25 This training focused on the basic

1 parliamentary information and procedures for effective
2 meetings utilizing correct parliamentary procedures and
3 Open Meetings Act requirements. This was a very important
4 and informative training and confirmed many of our
5 practices are within the meaning and spirit of the Open
6 Meetings Act. Every public servant should be familiarized
7 with the Open Meetings Act and parliamentary procedures.
8 If you were unable to attend, commissioners, copies of the
9 material are included in your weekly packet. Please review
10 all materials to stay informed.

11 Tonight we have one resolution to honor the
12 contributions of Mr. Daniel Washington, a strong
13 community advocate. At the appropriate time I will ask
14 Mr. Washington to come forward and receive his
15 resolution.

16 Also on tonight's agenda, we have two formal
17 presentations to the Board. The first is monthly personnel
18 report from Dr. Marcellus Anderson, director of Police
19 Personnel. The report will cover the recruitment
20 processing and hiring procedures for both sworn and
21 civilian employees of the police department. You have a
22 copy, commissioners, of the Human Resources report in your
23 packet.

24 The second presentation is from Commander
25 Franklin Hayes and Captain Rodney Cox who will discuss

1 crime fighting strategies in the precincts, as well as
2 partnerships that they use to deliver services within the
3 precinct. I'm also requesting an update this evening on
4 our citywide crime statistics and any critical issues
5 facing the police department.

6 Also I am requesting an update on the
7 Department's investigation and probe into it's Narcotics
8 Unit and measures the department has taken to eliminate
9 police criminal misconduct.

10 Lastly, I am requesting an update on the
11 investigation involving the Caucasian officer who allegedly
12 used an inappropriate and derogatory racial slur repeatedly
13 while speaking with an African American officer.

14 We have several items that require a vote.
15 First, the chief's promotional request for four
16 lieutenants, sixteen sergeants stemming from the DPOA
17 Grievance 19-044 and 19-064. The Board has previously
18 received several communications on this item. Please see
19 the list of items included in your package entitled
20 unfinished business that includes support material on
21 assignment, including but not limited to the recent
22 arbitration award associated with the DPOA Grievance 19-044
23 and Grievance 19-064.

24 The arbitration award promotions of fifteen DPOA
25 members to the rank of sergeant under the order of the

1 Arbiter George Rommel. I will ask for a vote on each
2 promotional request.

3 Lastly, under unfinished business, the Board
4 received a proposed amendment to bylaws over thirty days
5 ago. Today I will request a vote on the bylaws
6 amendment. Attorney Jermaine Wyrick, attorney to the
7 Board, will provide the Board with a presentation on the
8 proposed amendment.

9 Under new business we must vote on the Board's
10 proposed 2020 calendar. I will ask for a vote on this
11 item as well.

12 Additionally, I would like to introduce to
13 everyone the interim secretary to the board, Melanie White,
14 who will hold the position until we permanently appoint a
15 secretary to the Board. In the new year, at a future
16 meeting, we will provide detailed procedures on how we will
17 proceed for a search for hiring a secretary to the Board.
18 We will also conduct the same process within our fiscal
19 section.

20 In your packets noted under the report from the
21 interim board secretary are copies of the four manual
22 directives transmitted from the Detroit Police
23 Department. They include the following: Manual Directive
24 101.6: Human Resources; Manual Directive 102.10: Brady
25 and Giglio Disclosure Requirements; Manual Directive

1 203.12: Polygraph Examination, and Manual Directive

2 307.4: Criminal Justice Information System.

3 And I believe that these have also been posted
4 on the website; is that correct?

5 MS. WHITE: Yes, Madam Chair.

6 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you. For the
7 public's view.

8 Also in your packet is the department's Facial
9 Recognition Report, Report Number Six, dated December 10,
10 2019 from the chief of police. There is also a Freedom
11 of Information Act request from the ACLU seeking facial
12 recognition technology information.

13 In your packet today -- at the end of -- I'm
14 sorry. At the end of the meeting we'll have public
15 comments from the audience. Please make sure you print
16 your name on the speaker's card. Cards are located in
17 the back on the table. Or in the front, you can obtain
18 one from seeing Ms. Theresa Blossom who's seated here in
19 the front. She will need your card before the end of the
20 chief of police report. We'll hold each speaker to the
21 allotted two minutes. I ask everyone to place your cell
22 phone and other electronic devices on vibrate to make
23 sure you are not interrupting the meeting.

24 As a final matter, I would like to encourage
25 cooperation and order at our meetings. We have discussed

1 this in the past. Please treat each other with respect,
2 and control your behavior within the limits of
3 professionalism. Commissioners do not have the floor and
4 should not speak until they are recognized by the chair.
5 I'm asking commissioners to address their comments to
6 issues that are relevant to the agenda and to be brief so
7 that we have ample time for public comments.

8 For the attending audience, please note that
9 there is a time on the agenda for citizens input and
10 feedback. My objective this evening is to run an orderly
11 meeting, including public comment, and have us out within a
12 reasonable time. Thank you for your attention and your
13 cooperation.

14 At this time I'm going to acknowledge
15 Commissioner Evette Griffie who just walked in and seated
16 now. And I'm going to turn the floor over to Deputy Chief
17 Bettison.

18 DC BETTISON: Thank you, Chairperson.

19 COMMISSIONER CARTER: I'm sorry. I'm not going
20 to turn it over to you yet. At this time we're going to do
21 a resolution. And I'm asking that Commissioner Brooks
22 please read the resolution.

23 And Mr. Daniel Washington, if you could please
24 come forward, please.

25 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: It's an honor to read this

1 resolution honoring Daniel A. Washington.

2 WHEREAS Daniel A. Washington grew up in Northwest
3 Goldberg, where we purchased his own home at the
4 age of 18. He attended Wayne State University
5 earning a Bachelor of Arts in Broadcast
6 Journalism; and

7 WHEREAS Neighborhood revitalization has always been on
8 Mr. Washington's heart and mind. In an effort to
9 make a difference, he founded Northwest Goldberg
10 Cares as a way to formalize the work he had been
11 doing as a child to revitalize Detroit's NW
12 Goldberg neighborhood. He has worked tirelessly
13 to remove blight and stabilize the neighborhood
14 in creative and intentional ways. As president
15 and founder, he has worked on three main
16 projects: Creating a neighborhood garden,
17 building the Holland Maze in conjunction with the
18 Detroit Future City's Working with Lots programs,
19 and building and art park; and

20 WHEREAS He has worked with residents and outside
21 volunteers alike to build a neighborhood garden
22 that provides free, fresh produce to NW Goldberg
23 families. In the summer of 2018, the first year
24 of the garden, over 20 households received free
25 produce. In 2019, the households participating

1 had increased; and

2 WHEREAS Mr. Washington has also led the charge to bring
3 the first Holland Maze lot design to the city of
4 Detroit and operate it as a literacy park for
5 Detroit students in grades K-5. He helped secure
6 over \$13,000 to bring this design to life. He
7 also helped develop and implement the Read in the
8 Holland Maze Program, which will help activate
9 the lot for neighborhood kids to have a safe
10 place to read and play; and

11 WHEREAS The third project, and the one closest to his
12 heart, is the 6102. ART PARK. It includes a
13 pathway, a sculpture created by a neighborhood
14 artist, and greenery. It will be a safe space
15 where residents can gather, kids can play, and
16 neighbors can meet neighbors. Mr. Washington
17 spent more than 100 hours of physical labor to
18 make the park a reality at the corner of 16th and
19 Marquette Streets; and

20 WHEREAS In all of these projects, he has not just focused
21 individually on these lots, but has ensured that
22 when volunteers are available, that brush and
23 blights are removed from surrounding areas to
24 help create a safer and more walkable
25 neighborhood. He has built a partnership with

1 the Detroit Police Academy, located right across
2 the street from the Neighborhood Garden, to
3 ensure that cadets are present at all volunteer
4 clean-up days; and

5 WHEREAS Mr. Washington has made his intentions to helping
6 revitalize the neighborhood by creating the Dough
7 That Makes A Difference Fund in partnership with
8 the company he co-founded, Detroit Dough.
9 Through the fund, Detroit Dough pledges 5% of all
10 sales to go directly back to NW Goldberg, the
11 neighborhood the company is founded in. He is
12 working diligently to create jobs in the
13 neighborhood through Detroit Dough as well.

14 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT

15 RESOLVED That the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners,
16 speaking for the citizens of the City of Detroit
17 and the Detroit Police Department, acknowledge
18 the loyal support of Mr. Daniel Washington. His
19 commitment to years of dedication to supporting
20 the community of the Third Precinct and the
21 citizens throughout the city of Detroit merit our
22 highest regard.

23 We thank and congratulate you, Daniel A.
24 Washington. Board of Police Commissioners. We signed it,
25 and we adopt this.

1 And I make a motion that to support this.

2 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Support.

3 COMMISSIONER CARTER: It's been moved and
4 supported that we adopt the resolution honoring Mr. Daniel
5 Washington. Is there any discussion?

6 Those in favor?

7 THE BOARD: Aye.

8 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Those opposed? Motion
9 carries.

10 (Applause)

11 DC BETTISON: Congratulations. I have another
12 one as well. So young man, congratulations. It took me
13 twenty-five years to get this award that you're about to
14 get, and I just recently got it last month. So it's the
15 Spirit of Detroit signed by all nine City Council members.

16 To Mr. Daniel A. Washington, in recognition of
17 exceptional achievement, outstanding leadership, and
18 dedication to improving the quality of life. By the City
19 Council of Detroit Michigan, like I said, signed by all,
20 we give you the Spirit of Detroit Award.

21 (Applause)

22 DC BETTISON: Also, there's one more before you
23 close. The Detroit Police Department will not be outdone,
24 so we have an award for you as well.

25 The Detroit Police Department's Certificate of

1 Recognition to Mr. Daniel A. Washington, resident of the
2 City of Detroit. In recognition for the following
3 outstanding service and cooperation of your involvement
4 in the community and service to the city of Detroit
5 demonstrates a spirit of commitment that is worthy of
6 recognition. Signed by your chief of police, Chief James
7 E. Craig. Thank you, sir.

8 (Applause)

9 UNKNOWN SPEAKER: So I know you thought you were
10 done. So Mr. Washington, on behalf of the men and women of
11 the Detroit Police Department's Third Precinct -- first we
12 started with the Board, got to city-wide, now we're down to
13 the precinct -- we'd like to present to you, Commander
14 Hayes and myself, this Certificate of Appreciation. In
15 recognition of your outstanding work and diligence in
16 neighborhood revitalization through blight removal and
17 creating safe places, thereby, positively impacting the
18 quality of life for the residents in the community and
19 contributing to the resurgence of the City of Detroit.
20 Signed by my commander, Franklin Hayes, and myself.
21 Congratulations on a job well done, sir.

22 MR. WASHINGTON: Thank you, sir.

23 (Applause)

24 MR. WASHINGTON: Wow, this means a lot. Thank
25 you so much you all. Appreciate it. I want to

1 particularly give a shout out to both of my parents,
2 Theodore Washington and Claudia Washington. They're in
3 attendance tonight.

4 (Applause)

5 MR. WASHINGTON: I'm very grateful as a young
6 African American male to have both parents in my household,
7 and to not only have the support system that I have but to
8 have a community neighborhood like Northwest Goldberg.
9 That was a continuous inspiration to me to see all the
10 legacy in our neighborhood. We're home to for the Motown
11 Museum, for those of you who don't know, home to James H.
12 Cole Funeral Home; establishments that have been in our
13 neighborhood, that has been a focal point of our
14 neighborhood in the city of Detroit. So I'm just grateful
15 and overwhelmed with not only the love and support of this
16 room but the love and support of our hardworking public
17 servants, such as the police officers. So thank you to the
18 Police Academy. Thank you for the Police District Precinct
19 Number Three, and to the public servants up here for
20 recognizing me. So thank you so much.

21 (Applause)

22 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

23 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commissioner Burton.

24 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You know, it brings me some
25 great concerns here. You know, I am actually the host

1 commissioner here in District Five. And apparently the
2 resolution should have been read by me and not by
3 Commissioner Elizabeth Brooks.

4 Secondly, I have submitted some names of two
5 individuals, two great individuals, that I'd like to
6 acknowledge today, and I don't see the certificate of
7 appreciation for outstanding service they've been doing in
8 the community. And one of them happens to be here this
9 evening. And that person happens to be multimedia Greg
10 Domore from Postbeat Media. He's on his way to California
11 to vote in the Grammy, which is very prestige here in our
12 community. But more importantly he's a community activist,
13 well known for art, culture, and entertainment here in the
14 Detroit area.

15 The other person, I would like to acknowledge
16 today -- and I don't see their certificate of appreciation
17 either. And this is totally in disrespect for a sitting
18 commissioner that represents the mighty Fifth District,
19 speaking for the families of a hundred thousand families
20 that live in the district. As the host commissioner, I
21 haven't had a resolution to read to these individuals, nor
22 do I have certificates of appreciation for the people that
23 I wanted to acknowledge, along with Maurice Thornton.

24 Everybody knows how active she is in the
25 community. Former Board of Education member with the

1 school board. Where is my certificate of appreciation,
2 Madam Chair.

3 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Madam Chair --

4 COMMISSIONER BURTON: And why are --

5 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commissioner Griffe.

6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: -- my constituents are not
7 being recognized this evening?

8 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: I call for the order of
9 the day.

10 COMMISSIONER CARTER: The order of the day is
11 that we -- the order of the day?

12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madam Chair, this is a
13 public meeting. This is the last meeting --

14 COMMISSIONER CARTER: You're not being recognized
15 sir. You don't have the floor.

16 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Well, Madam Chair, I was
17 recognized. And this is a conversation here that needs to
18 be addressed.

19 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Point of order.

20 COMMISSIONER BURTON: In District Five we have
21 the Seventh Precinct, the Fifth Precinct, and the Third
22 Precinct. All year long I have not been known to give
23 resolutions to those outstanding men and women that serve
24 in here in the Fifth District.

25 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: I'd like to call for the

1 order of the day, which is to get back to the agenda.

2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: This is abuse of power and
3 authority, Madam Chair.

4 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Point is taken.

5 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You shall be removed.

6 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Your point is taken,
7 Commissioner Burton. We're going to get back to the
8 agenda.

9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You're -- Unintelligible --
10 here from this body --

11 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commissioner Burton, if you
12 had been here on time, I did offer an opportunity for you
13 to speak to the public, but you were not here on time.

14 As far as your resolution -- your certificates
15 that you put on the staff today at whatever time, they did
16 not have enough time to do whatever you needed them to do
17 in order for your certificates to be here this evening.

18 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madam Chair, there is a
19 pattern. What happened with the Seventh Precinct? The
20 Third Precinct? The Tenth Precinct? The Tenth Precinct?
21 Downtown Services? This is all in the fifth district.
22 This is abuse of power and authority coming from you, Madam
23 Chair.

24 COMMISSIONER CARTER: We're going to move to the
25 next agenda item which is --

1 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You uneventfully just share
2 a report of this body.

3 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you.

4 DC BETTISON: Thank you, madam Chair. I'm Deputy
5 Chief Bettison, for the record. I'll first start off by
6 thanking the members of this Board for just the support
7 with last week as we buried two of our officers that you
8 referenced earlier, Corporal Brian Levant and also Sergeant
9 McClain and, you know, just appreciate that support; and
10 recognize the Board members and the audience. So that was
11 much appreciated. And to the community as well. Just
12 those words of condolences to whatever officer you said the
13 words to really did matter. I know that oftentimes we feel
14 like it's just words, but it does matter. We're all one
15 family.

16 With that being said, Police Officer Phillippe
17 Batoum-Bisse is at home recuperating from his gunshot
18 wound. He's the partner of Officer McClain. He took a
19 gunshot to the leg. And then also Sergeant Kevin Jackson,
20 assigned to the Tenth Precinct, was struck by a vehicle
21 while he was on duty. The female driver fled the location.
22 He's at home recovering as well and has a followup
23 appointment with the Medical Section on the 20th of this
24 month.

25 In regard to crime city-wide, our criminal

1 homicides; right now we're up 7% compared to the same
2 time last year. In regards to sexual assaults, we're
3 down 1%. Aggravated assaults, we're down 5%. Nonfatal
4 shootings, we're up 4%. Robberies up 1%. Carjackings
5 down 22% for a total reduction in Violent Part I crimes
6 down 4%.

7 Property crimes: Burglaries, we're down 9%;
8 larceny's, 3%. Motor vehicle theft, we have a slight
9 uptick of 5%. And total property crimes, we're sitting on
10 a 2% reduction.

11 In regards to your request for an update in
12 regards to the investigation into corruption at the
13 Narcotics Unit, earlier this afternoon Chief Craig held a
14 press conference at 1:00 p.m. to update the public about
15 the investigation being conducted into the Department's
16 Major Violence Unit, also commonly referred to as the
17 Narcotics Unit.

18 I want to emphasize that this investigation was
19 initiated by Chief Craig. This is a Detroit Police
20 Department led investigation. After former Detroit Police
21 Officer Michael Mosley was indicted in federal court on
22 charges related to allegations that he took a bribe from a
23 drug dealer, Chief Craig became concerned that this was not
24 the first time that Mosley had committed criminal
25 misconduct. Therefore, Chief Craig launch an investigation

1 into the Major Violator Section (Narcotics Unit) to
2 determine if there may be a pattern and practice of
3 criminal misconduct.

4 The initial investigation started with a small
5 team of investigators from our own Special Standards and
6 Accountability Division. Now the team has been expanded to
7 seventeen investigators. Chief Craig stated at the press
8 conference earlier today that more investigators will be
9 likely required.

10 On August 22nd, the DPD led team of investigators
11 seized 50 computers and the narcotics files from the
12 Narcotics base. The files lead back ten years. Thus far,
13 the investigators have reviewed and analyzed about a year
14 and a half of files. Results thus far have revealed
15 alleged corruption, such as narcotics officers planting
16 evidence, embezzling funds using the voucher system, lying
17 to prosecutors to secure warrants, stealing money and other
18 property from drug traffickers. After review of these
19 files and other evidence from the seizure, it has become
20 evident that the scope of corruption in terms of magnitude
21 can grow.

22 The chief expressed at the press conference today
23 that this department under this current administration is
24 transparent. We're not going to cover anything up. We're
25 not going to hide. Our team of investigators led by

1 retired U.S. Prosecutor Chris Graveline, now the
2 Department's director of Professional Standards Bureau, is
3 leading the way.

4 Hotline. The chief directed that a hotline be
5 set up to allow persons to call, and invite tips regarding
6 possible criminal misconduct by narcotics officers The
7 hotline number is (313) 596-3190. (313) 596-3190. That
8 number is active now.

9 During the press conference, the question of what
10 is the department going to do about the corruption at the
11 Narcotics Section was raised. Answer: Chief Craig
12 initiated this investigation. Chief Craig ordered the 50
13 computers seized and all files. Chief Craig has
14 transferred all officers with over five years from the
15 Narcotics Unit. This is a national best practice.

16 The chief has pledged to keep the community, the
17 Board of Police Commissioner, and the department in general
18 updated about the developments of this investigation. Also
19 we have Director Chris Graveline here. And at this point I
20 would just ask that Director Graveline come to the
21 microphone to be able to answer any additional questions
22 that he can without compromising the investigation.

23 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you. Commissioners,
24 you have any questions.

25 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes.

1 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commissioner Davis.

2 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Question: Is there any
3 other outside agency assisting in this, like the FBI, State
4 Police?

5 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: Yes. So it's a DPD led
6 investigation. However, at the initiation of the
7 investigation Chief Craig coordinated with the FBI. They
8 have been assigning agents, analysts, and task force
9 officers from their Public Corruption Task Force. And so
10 we have members of the Michigan State Police and the FBI
11 assisting in this investigation.

12 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Can you give your name for
13 the record, please?

14 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: I'm sorry. Chris Graveline,
15 director of Professional Standards and Constitution of
16 Police, Detroit.

17 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you.

18 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Also --

19 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commissioner Davis.

20 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Also, do you know if anybody
21 that's in jail now that's for false information that might
22 be associated with this?

23 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: That's what we're taking a
24 look at right now. In terms of -- one of the patterns that
25 we've been seeing and one of the problematic areas that

1 we're investigating is, we've seen where the Narcotics
2 Bureau have obtained search warrants, have done search
3 warrant raids, have seized drugs and firearms, but then
4 have not arrested anyone either. And so in terms of a
5 false affidavit, that might allow them to get into the
6 house, but no arrest has been made. And so -- but we are
7 actively looking to ensure that no one is currently
8 incarcerated based upon a false affidavit.

9 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Any other questions?
10 Commissioner Bell.

11 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes. Madam Chair, I'm going
12 to use the words of Chief Craig. It's troubling, and I'm
13 concerned. I think this board should be concerned. I
14 think it's time now that this should not be led by DPD. If
15 this is so corrupted, it reflects on the 2,000 some
16 officers.

17 We keep hearing these statements, allegations, et
18 cetera, et cetera. I know we have hardworking officers out
19 here day-to-day just functioning in a high capacity. But
20 if the chief is panting this picture, then this
21 investigation should be turned over to the FBI. Then we
22 can perhaps have more confidence that this is not a DPD led
23 investigation with all these allegations, but we have
24 somebody on an outside agency looking in. I think the
25 Board should weigh in on that and consider that, and make

1 that type of request, and put the rest in reference to all
2 the allegations but one officer being indicted. It's just
3 troubling to me when I hear this statement over and over
4 again by the chief that we have this issue and we are
5 leading the charge. We should ask for outside agency like
6 the FBI. That's what they do best.

7 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: In terms of the activity or
8 the involvement of the FBI: So we reached out to the FBI.
9 We have been coordinating with their public corruption
10 unit. In this case, I am in contact on a daily basis with
11 the head of the Public Corruption Unit and the FBI.
12 They've assigned four agents and one task force officer to
13 work specifically on this task force. They've given us
14 three other analyst to analyze data. So they're actively
15 involved with us right now.

16 So the FBI has an active role and is --
17 essentially, in terms of our investigators, what we've done
18 is we've developed five investigative team. One DPD
19 officer, one FBI agent and/or task force officer. They're
20 working these. So when we find a troubling case, they work
21 it together. So that's how we developed our model. And so
22 we are continually sharing information with them. We have
23 coordinated and have briefed the Wayne County prosecutor as
24 well as the U.S. Attorney about this information. And so
25 we've been keeping everyone abreast of what's going on with

1 this investigation since we began this in August.

2 DC BETTISON: And I want to chime in also. We
3 definitely have sunlight shining on that unit. And what I
4 said in my earlier remarks was that with Officer Mosley,
5 who was indicted by the FBI, it was the chief who said that
6 I believe it's more. If it had not been for the chief, the
7 50 computers and the other things with the ten year
8 lookback would not have occurred. So we're being 100%
9 transparent. The chief is the one who believed it was a
10 pattern of practice and initiated that investigation with
11 our folks. And based off of what we found, we said that we
12 need help, and we've invited the FBI and others in so that
13 we're doing it jointly.

14 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, my request is
15 simple.

16 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Point of order.
17 Commissioner Bell, point of order.

18 -- Unintelligible - Multiple Speakers --

19 COMMISSIONER BELL: I just want to indicate that
20 I feel as though and this Board should look at in terms of
21 how we can have an impact and have an impartial
22 investigation by the FBI. Not in a casual role, but the
23 focal point of this investigation. I think that would be
24 the right steps to have someone of that stature with that
25 type of guidelines investigating having another city.

1 Because it seems as though this is widespread with you
2 painting that picture. That's all I have to say.

3 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Madam Chair.

4 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commissioner Brown.

5 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Director Graveline, do we
6 know how far back -- we started looking at peeling back
7 this onion -- how far back these files go, these computers?
8 Because some of these people that are probably in those
9 units right now are being tossed around associated with
10 this unit, and they may just be totally innocent and may
11 have nothing to do with a lot of the information that's on
12 those computers that could have been there over 20 to 25
13 years; even when Commissioner Bell was on the department.

14 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: Well I would say this,
15 Commissioner; that what we've been doing in the initiation
16 is, first of all, ensuring we know exactly who is in this
17 unit during what time period. They do share computers, but
18 that's one of the first things you take a look at as you
19 image the computer is how far back does it go. Some of the
20 computers in the unit were switched out in 2017, for
21 example. So they only go back to 2017 where others go back
22 further. And so we've been trying to be very meticulous.

23 I think it's very important to underline there
24 are very good officers within the Narcotics Unit and who
25 are doing a good job. One of the things that Chief has

1 taken a very strong active step in in the last several
2 months is to ensure that anyone there who has been there
3 over five years has been transferred out. That's not to
4 say anyone who has been there for five years was corrupt or
5 doing anything wrong. It's just as a best practice because
6 of the type of work that's being done there.

7 So we want to make sure and we want to be very
8 careful not paint with too broad of a brush. That's why
9 it's very important to do the investigation and do the
10 investigation thoroughly before coming out with any types
11 of charges or accusations about particular people and
12 particular incidents.

13 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Through the Chair.

14 DC BETTISON: And also I just wanted --

15 COMMISSIONER CARTER: You haven't been
16 acknowledged.

17 DC BETTISON: Sorry. During the chief's hour
18 press conference today -- and I encourage everyone to watch
19 it. But during the hour long press conference, he
20 repeatedly said that he's not painting the broad brush and
21 that these are allegations. And he even went so far as to
22 say that with Officer Mosley, it appeared that some of the
23 individuals with that crew, some of the things that are
24 coming back is focused more onto that crew.

25 But, you know, as we continue to peel back the

1 layers -- we've only been through a year and a half of
2 those files thus far, but we're doing a ten year lookback,
3 and we will definitely keep the community updated.

4 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commissioner Griffie.

5 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: My question is, what kind
6 of monitoring takes place? So, for example, is there any
7 monitoring emails or files that's random or employed?
8 Usually there's a third party or -- not a third party, but
9 some kind of a watch that -- you know, a large organization
10 that can spot activity that may be unusual? And it may be
11 at random, but it seems like with this department we
12 usually investigate if there's only cause. And so I'm
13 wondering if there are processes that we've thought about
14 taking that might look for these types of inaccuracies or
15 issues and find them in a more practical manner?

16 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: I think we have. And so I
17 think one of the patterns that we're seeing is it's really
18 been since bankruptcy that -- for example, a lot of our
19 files have been moved from paper files into the computers.
20 And so in terms of being able to, as you put it, do that
21 type of monitoring from the computer system, I think that's
22 a recent development within the Detroit Police Department.
23 When I say recent, from 2013 going forward.

24 One of the things that we have definitely noticed
25 is there a lack of supervision. For example -- and what do

1 I mean by that? When you go and do a report within the
2 computer system you're supposed to put your case notes in
3 right next to your report so people know what the progress
4 is on that case consistently. What we've been finding in
5 some of our -- when we take a look at 2017 and 2018 is a
6 lack of case notes next to those reports.

7 So that's one thing that we point to, lack of
8 supervision. Or we need to do a better job in our
9 supervisory roles, whether it's at the sergeant level, the
10 lieutenant level, the captain level. And so one of the
11 things that we've been working on very diligently -- in
12 conjunction with this investigation is Deputy Chief Marlon
13 Wilson, who's in charge of Organized Crime now has been
14 going through, and they are establishing a very thorough
15 new SOP for the entire Organized Crime Unit, but
16 specifically the major violators, to address -- identify
17 and then address the systematic failures that we're seeing.
18 And so we're in the process of writing a new SOP, and those
19 deficiencies are being rectified even now, you know, prior
20 to being done with this investigation.

21 DC BETTISON: And I do have one thing to add as
22 well. That this has been an ongoing problem dating back to
23 the 70s. In George Hunter's article, it even lists that,
24 you know, when you go back to 1973, 22 Detroit cops from
25 the Tenth Precinct were indicted on charges involving

1 heroin trafficking. Nine officers convicted in various
2 crimes, '91.

3 I've been on the job 25 years. It was issues in
4 the 90s with dope coming up missing in the property room.
5 Chief Craig is -- we have information that we went out and
6 identified drug traffickers and got them to talk and let us
7 know exactly what's going on. Because one of the issues is
8 -- and I know that Director Graveline can expound on it, is
9 the fact that some of the practices were the narcotic
10 officers would confiscate drugs, do a raid; however, if
11 you're the drug trafficker and they cut a deal with you --
12 I'm talking about on a police officer's level -- you can
13 work it off. We're not going to prosecute. All you got to
14 do is give us information.

15 Those individuals in the city of Detroit drug
16 trafficking, they weren't coming forward to make complaints
17 on narcotic officers. They weren't. But what we've done,
18 and I will let Director Graveline expound on it, we
19 actually went based off of this deep dive and found them
20 and got information. And they finally talked to us. So
21 Director.

22 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: Exactly the deputy chief's
23 point. It's not as if -- so the initial case against
24 Officer Mosley that ended up in federal court. We actually
25 did have a drug dealer go to the FBI and identify this

1 officer as attempting to bribe him; essentially saying --
2 the officer told him, if you pay me \$10,000 I'll have your
3 case go away. I mean, that's the basis of Officer Mosley's
4 federal case.

5 But it's not as if we have a number of drug
6 dealers who came forward and said that this is a recurring
7 thing. It was Chief Craig who said, no, after coming off
8 of the 2014 federal prosecution of Hansberry and Watson and
9 Lavell and now another one, he said, wait a minute, do we
10 have a pattern of practice here? Let's get our own
11 records; let's take a look at our own records; let's
12 identify. It's through that record review that we have
13 personally identified over thirty cases that we found to be
14 suspicious and that we've begun -- in just 2018 and 2019
15 and we've begun to investigate ourselves. And so that's
16 how we developed this case and this investigation. We're
17 just in 2018 and 2019. We haven't hit 2017, 2016, 2015
18 yet.

19 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commissioners, any other
20 questions?

21 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

22 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commissioner Burton.

23 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You know, since I've been
24 on the police commission since January of 2014, I have --
25 you know, I want to acknowledge two commissioners in

1 particular that called for an audit on the BOPC. And those
2 commissioners happen to be Commissioner Ricardo Moore and
3 also Commissioner Reggie Crawford called for an audit when
4 we first took office into the BOPC.

5 Question for Deputy Chief Bettison. Has the
6 department looked into taking -- conducting any audits
7 based off of this unit, Major Violators, to see how far
8 this goes back? Since I've been here I've only seen two
9 commissioners that's really been for audits. You know, we
10 want to see where our strengths, our weaknesses, where
11 things really are and how bad things are, and that's -- the
12 only way we're going to be able to get that is through raw
13 data. And that would be also part of good transparency.

14 DC BETTISON: Through the Chair. Commissioner
15 Burton, absolutely. Chief Craig developed the
16 environmental audit. And when we have reason to believe or
17 there are things going on in certain units -- we audit all
18 the time. But the environmental audit is particularly when
19 it's of a concern. So we did an environmental audit over
20 at the Sixth Precinct and made radical changes based off of
21 that. We've done environmental audit over at Communication
22 and corrected issues and deficiencies that were found
23 there.

24 And what we're doing at Narcotics right now is --
25 started out basically as an audit. Except we knew that we

1 had to do it in a strategic way so that things couldn't --
2 that we can get everything that we needed at one time.
3 That's the reason for the seizure of over 50 computers
4 along with all the files. And we took files dating back
5 ten years so that we could do a thorough look back. We've
6 dedicated staff, and we'll increase the staff so that the
7 audit will be thorough, precise and everything will be
8 analyzed.

9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You know, Deputy Chief
10 Bettison, I appreciate you saying that the department is
11 moving and going -- you know, are going transparent when it
12 comes to this. Thanks for providing that. Because all the
13 times we don't hear about different audits. We don't get
14 those reports, you know, to the Board of Police
15 Commissioners in our emails or anything. Or even we get
16 something like this Human Resources Report, but we don't --
17 you know, we don't get anything based off of the findings
18 in these audits. I'm sure that you all can provide that
19 with a -- you know, I know this is going to be an ongoing
20 situation when you all get to the root of it, but I'm sure
21 you all will update us, right?

22 DC BETTISON: We're going to keep the Board
23 thoroughly updated.

24 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: Oh, I'm sorry. To your
25 point, Commissioner Burton, I know it's the Chief's goal to

1 -- we're going to be doing real structural change to how
2 major violators is constructed, how we do our business. He
3 is dedicated to really changing the way this happens. We
4 can't just say, well it'll happen every five or ten years.
5 We are going to do structural change that will ensure that
6 we have transparency, that will ensure that we have
7 accountability.

8 And then in terms of accountability, I know Chief
9 is also very adamant that at the end of this entire
10 audit/investigation a report will be done that will outline
11 everything that we have found, everything that we intend to
12 do with the major violators so that the entire community
13 can have confidence in going forward we will police legally
14 and soundly when it comes to narcotic enforcement.

15 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, Mr. Brown.

16 DC BETTISON: Director, right before you leave,
17 if you could give the Chair an update on the racial
18 incident at the Ninth Precinct.

19 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: Yes.

20 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you.

21 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: So for a little bit of
22 background, we had a complaint lodged at Internal Affairs
23 by an African American officer stating that he had been
24 party to -- I don't want to say overheard, because he had
25 been party to. He was in a scout car with his partner who

1 is a white officer who was on a FaceTime phone call. And
2 that the officer on the other side of the phone
3 conversation, that FaceTime phone call conversation, had
4 used a racial epithet multiple times. And that racial
5 epithet being the N word. And so he filed that report with
6 IA, I believe it was on November 18th of this year. The
7 actual phone call occurred on the evening of November 13th
8 going into the 14th. They were working the midnight shift
9 that night.

10 We have interviewed all three of those
11 individuals. We have taken a look at the social media of
12 the officer from the Ninth Precinct. We have interviewed
13 people who have worked with those individuals, and we
14 identified three other individuals this past week that we
15 wanted to interview. Those interviews were completed.
16 They in turn identified two other people we want to
17 interview. And we're looking for some body camera
18 footage that's been identified that we think might shed
19 some light on that as well. So we have been moving
20 quickly in this investigation. We want to move quickly
21 in this investigation. And we're hoping to have it
22 wrapped up by the end of next week.

23 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, sir.

24 At this time we will have our presentation from
25 Human Resources, Dr. Marcella Anderson.

1 DR. ANDERSON: Good evening, honorable Board.

2 THE BOARD: Good evening.

3 DR. ANDERSON: I'm hear to give the monthly
4 report for HR, and it's actually a summary of activities
5 that have taken place during the month of November 2019.

6 For employment for the City of Detroit, if
7 anyone's interested, you can go to our website which is
8 DetroitMI.gov. That's DetroitMI.gov.

9 Our staffing for sworn officers, we have filled
10 2,502 positions. We currently have 169 vacancies, for a
11 total budgeted position of 2,671. We currently have
12 filled 619 civilian positions, 48 vacant positions, for a
13 total of 667 budgeted positions.

14 Our sworn recruiting numbers from July 1st to
15 November 30th is we've had 2,247 applicants. Forty-two
16 are in process. We've hired 73. We have 146 listed as
17 lack of interest; 1,125 as temporary disqualified; 290 as
18 permanently disqualified, and 573 waiting for MCOLES
19 examination.

20 For our MCOLES testing for written, we had
21 seventy-two scheduled for the month of November.
22 Fifty-nine appeared. Forty-seven passed. Twelve failed.
23 For our agility we had 203 scheduled. A hundred fourteen
24 appeared. Fifty-five passed. Fifty-nine failed.

25 We're seeing a 70%, I guess, loss in numbers

1 for people not passing the physical agility test. For
2 that reason, the mayor of the City of Detroit and the
3 chief of police have agreed to a cadet program which will
4 serve as an initiative to mentor and prepare those who
5 cannot pass the agility test to get to that point. So
6 we're going to start this program up in January. I'll
7 have more information, but I did want to share that
8 initiative with you.

9 We had 19 cadets graduate from the police
10 academy. Our hires -- we didn't hire any police officers
11 for the month of November. We hired forty civilians, two
12 police assistants, for a total of forty-two.

13 Employees with Detroit residency: We have 563
14 sworn officers; 334 civilians; 30 police assistants, for a
15 total of 939 employees that live in the city of Detroit.

16 For our attrition, we lost 27 employees for the
17 month of November: Eighteen sworn; nine civilian.

18 Towards the bottom of the page, we have our
19 leave of absence, restricted duty. Eight sworn on
20 continuous FMLA; sixty-three on intermittent FMLA; one on
21 family medical leave; three on military leave; a hundred
22 twenty-one on restricted duty; sixty-one disabled;
23 eighteen sick. And currently our leave of absence
24 reports and files are being audited by a company by the
25 name of NorthStar.

1 Our sworn personnel suspension. We currently
2 have eleven officers off suspended: Seven police
3 officers, one detective, two sergeants, and one
4 lieutenant. Please keep in mind these numbers are for
5 November.

6 We have -- for monthly separation, we lost 18
7 officers, and we have 573 officers that are in the Drop
8 Program.

9 If you flip past page four, I have a document
10 there. Last month Commissioner Burton asked for some
11 numbers on population and staffing, so I provided a few
12 city stare that shows city population that mirrors our
13 population here in the city of Detroit and also includes
14 the number of police officers on their staff.

15 Additionally, in your package I've added the
16 job description for the board staff. I know that we were
17 talking about that in last meeting, so I added all of
18 those for your review.

19 I was asked to provide some information on the
20 promotional exam. The list was distributed on this
21 Monday, December 9th. So our new list is out. It's
22 effective.

23 There's some discrepancy on the interpretation of
24 how we move forward with promoting police officers and if
25 the Board has a right to vote or if the Board does not. My

1 research has revealed that Section 7814 of the charter
2 states, all promotions shall be approved by the Board.

3 Second, Deputy Chief Ha has a different
4 interpretation of that explanation or that answer.
5 LaKita Crespo, she is an attorney for the City Law
6 Department, she also has a different interpretation. She
7 feels that the charter prevails because the collective
8 bargaining agreement does not speak to the promotions.

9 So I recommend maybe a meeting with second DC Ha
10 and the Law Department downstairs just so that we're all on
11 the same page. And that's my report.

12 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, Madam, for that
13 information.

14 Commissioners, you have questions for Dr.
15 Anderson.

16 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Through the Chair.

17 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commissioner Holt.

18 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Thank you, Dr. Anderson.
19 Because I do not recall what the total applicants number
20 looks like in your past report, my question is the 2,247,
21 is that an average number of applicants or the aggressive
22 parting that went on in conjunction with the Fiat? Did
23 that contribute or no?

24 DR. ANDERSON: So actually that did contribute to
25 the number. But that number that you see there,

1 Commissioner Holt, is the total number of people who have
2 applied to be police officers from July 1st till today.

3 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Okay.

4 DR. ANDERSON: And some of those Fiat applicants
5 are also counted in that number.

6 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Okay. Thank you.

7 DR. ANDERSON: Yes, ma'am.

8 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Any other questions?

9 Commissioner Bell.

10 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, Madam Chair. I just
11 want to re-emphasize the point, when you look at this type
12 of report, it's consistent over the years, even before Dr.
13 Anderson arrived, in terms of we have approximately
14 throughout the last several years 170 openings for the
15 police department. Is that correct? Roughly 150, 170
16 openings.

17 DR. ANDERSON: Openings? Yes, sir.

18 COMMISSIONER BELL: Job openings. When we look
19 at the number of officers who are not on active duty,
20 that's another number, whatever reason. So when we talk
21 about the manpower, when you hear about the 9-1-1
22 Investigative Report about how we're responding, we talked
23 about how many on each shift, we all know that's a glaring
24 issue. That's why I sort of emphasize that we spend a
25 whole lot of manpower, but our basic mission is by service.

1 And service is primarily through patrols and responding to
2 police runs. And those are your ranks of police officers
3 primarily; not sergeant, not lieutenant. They are the
4 ranks of police officers. They provide that service, and
5 that's where we fall short in reference to 9-1-1 calls.
6 And as you know, that's been a glaring issue for the last
7 year.

8 So I just want to emphasize that the issues that
9 we're dealing with internally/externally we fall short in
10 terms of personnel. So we need to look at that in terms of
11 how we concentrate our manpower to try to provide services
12 to the city of Detroit when we call 9-1-1 or want police
13 officers visible to respond in a timely manner. And those
14 are glaring issues. Because we all live in the community,
15 we know -- each community, we hear those issues about. And
16 Channel 7 spent a lot of time, and Assistant Chief White
17 emphasized, we lack manpower. So the manpower that we have
18 should be dividing police service. I just want to make
19 that point.

20 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Through the Chair.

21 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commissioner Griffie.

22 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: I would also like to see
23 an adjustment to the first page. So there's a population
24 size page. Working on this page, we're comparing Detroit
25 to cities like Portland, Oregon. Which I don't know if

1 anybody else on this commission has been to Portland,
2 Oregon, but it's starkly different than the city of
3 Detroit. So the number of officers in that city of
4 Portland require make sense that it would be less than --
5 more -- less than half of what we currently have in the
6 city of Detroit. So I would ask that we take another look
7 at this list and maybe -- I just don't want anyone to get
8 the wrong impression that we are oversized, because that is
9 not the case.

10 I think we should be careful about who we compare
11 ourselves to; cities like Las Vegas, Nashville, Tennessee.
12 I'm just looking at the list. We talk about, you know, the
13 rate of poverty in the city. There's a lot of contributors
14 to why we need the number of officers that we need, crime
15 rate. And so I would ask that we just take a look at this
16 and see how we can make sure the best stands out so that
17 anyone can make an accurate comparison.

18 DR. ANDERSON: Yes, ma'am.

19 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Any other questions,
20 comments, commissioners?

21 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Yes. I have a comment for
22 Lieutenant Kohls. How are we doing? I didn't see a
23 recruiting table out here tonight?

24 LT. KOHLS: Good evening. Through the Chair.
25 Lieutenant James Kohls, Police Recruiting. We were -- our

1 recruiting members were assigned out to a different unit
2 this evening by the -- Unintelligible -- so they are
3 actually active. But they had some place else they had to
4 be for --

5 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Thank you very much.

6 LT. KOHLS: Yes, ma'am.

7 COMMISSIONER CARTER: If there's nothing else,
8 thank you Dr. Anderson and Lieutenant Kohls.

9 At this time we'll have our Third Precinct
10 report.

11 COMMANDER HAYES: Good evening, Honorable Board.

12 THE BOARD: Good evening.

13 COMMANDER HAYES: And member of the community.
14 My name is Franklin Hayes, and I stand before you both
15 humble and appreciative for being granted the privilege of
16 serving as the commander of the Third Precinct.

17 Tonight you'll be presented with some highlights
18 of the great work going on and being done in the Third
19 Precinct. And as you'll soon see, this great work is being
20 done not only by the members of the DPD, but by community
21 members and stakeholders within the Third Precinct who are
22 committed to making their community the model community
23 here in the city of Detroit.

24 I'd like to first introduce you to a few of the
25 team members here at the Third Precinct who are getting

1 this great work done. Captain Rodney Cox. Neighborhood
2 Police Officer Tamara Harris-Hardy (Phonetic),
3 Neighborhood Police Officer Brad Hawkins, and
4 Neighborhood Police Officer Dale Dorsey.

5 The Third Precinct is a little unique. We
6 actually have two parks. It's bordered by Tennyson or
7 Highland Park to the north, Detroit River to the south,
8 Grand River to the west, and I-75 to the east. There is a
9 separation, which is I-75 at Woodward, that separates the
10 north and the south. The south end of the Third Precinct
11 is managed by Captain Jevon Johnson of Downtown Services.
12 That area is known across the department, and he manages
13 that and does a great job. He'll be before you to present,
14 I believe, in April of 2020 to talk about the great work
15 that's going on there.

16 All of the entities, both the north and the
17 south in the Number Three, are organizations that fall
18 under Chief's Neighborhood Liaison under the direction of
19 Deputy Chief Todd Bettison, who is a part of tonight's
20 dais.

21 When we talk about what's going on in the Third
22 Precinct, highlight a few areas of success as well as an
23 area of opportunity. The success is crime. --
24 Unintelligible --

25 Crime within the Third Precinct. As far as

1 violent crimes, we've had eight homicides in 2019
2 year-to-date versus seven in 2018. Nonfatal shootings in
3 2019, we've had twenty-one. And we had twenty-five this
4 same time year-to-date in 2018. At eight and twenty-one,
5 which are the lowest of many of the twelve precincts in the
6 city, our 2020 vision is to still drive these numbers down
7 even lower.

8 Continuing on with violent crimes; aggravated
9 assaults, burglaries, as well as robberies, we have double
10 digits reductions here in the Third Precinct. The strategy
11 to address this and drive this crime down is through highly
12 visible and directed patrols. We leverage technology as
13 well as partnerships. Whether it be the fifty green lights
14 or our amazing partnership with Chief Toni Hope of the
15 Wayne State Police Department, we're able to get this done.

16 **A few of the partnerships are the Michigan**
17 **Department of Corrections where we have agents that are**
18 **embedded and work with us so that we can monitor members**
19 **who are under the jurisdiction of the court who may be in**
20 **our hot spot areas when we're seeing trends and uptick of**
21 **crime.**

22 An example of leveraging the technology is the
23 brazen act of Mr. Ramon Wilson who robbed the McDonalds
24 next to the Third Precinct. From that, the Green Light
25 footage video, we partnered up in reference with our

1 relationship with the media. We put that picture out; put
2 a little pressure on those highly visible and directed
3 patrols in that area, and about two days later he came
4 walking into the precinct and turned himself in. So they
5 certainly work.

6 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: He does have nerve, doesn't
7 he?

8 COMMANDER HAYES: Yes, sir, he did.

9 When we talk about the areas of opportunity, we
10 have an uptick of 16% in vehicle theft year-to-date.
11 What we've found and the data has reflected that this is
12 through -- this is an event base based on the abundance
13 of opportunity by many of the venues that are in the
14 Third Precinct. Little Caesars Arena, for example,
15 host -- can seat 25,000 people, and they host over 300
16 events a year. Ford Field can seat over 65,000, and they
17 host over 20 events a year. And Comerica Park which
18 holds 30,000 plus has over 150 events. In addition,
19 there are over 165 licensed clubs and bars which include
20 the only three 24-hour establishments within the city of
21 Detroit here within the Third Precinct. As you heard me
22 say, the 2020 vision to drive these numbers down is a
23 multilayer process. Dual tract, both due to enforcement
24 as well as education.

25 The strategy that we're going to play when we

1 talk about the enforcement side is crime suppression.
2 Again, with that high visibility, high engagement,
3 leveraging technology, the dialogue with stakeholders and
4 event hosts to ensure that we have adequate staff and
5 presence.

6 An example of that, again, where that has been
7 successful is this past weekend at Noel Night. There have
8 been times where we didn't have that presence, and we
9 certainly had some unfortunate incidents of violence there.
10 But, again, with that dialogue and leveraging those
11 relationships we've had our successful second one in a row.

12 Educating members of the community whenever
13 possible, our community council, our partnership with
14 AmeriCorp where we give courtesy tickets. If there's an
15 area where we are present and someone leaves a valuable on
16 the seat, we'll put a courtesy ticket. We're there to
17 ensure that no one comes in or breaks in their car, but
18 just to education them; don't leave your valuables out to
19 become a potential target.

20 Parking lot regulations; ensuring that they are
21 in compliance with the fencing, the lighting, the security
22 personnel, and the credentials that are there. Because
23 that's a big problem as well. We partner with the Vice
24 Unit as one of our strategies to combat this.

25 Sergeant M. Roberson ran an operation at one of

1 the Lions games where those that were preyed on the patrons
2 that were coming, taking a piece of unactivated land or an
3 ally and charging people to park there. Through the work
4 of the Vice Unit and this one operation, we made nine
5 arrest and confiscated just under \$1,000 in ill-gotten
6 proceeds from individuals posing as parking attendants.

7 These are just a few examples of what's going on
8 in the Third Precinct. And I'd like to now invite Captain
9 Rodney Cox to highlight some of the great works that's
10 being done through our community engagement here in the
11 precinct.

12 CAPTAIN COX: Thank you, Commander. Good evening
13 to this honorable Board.

14 THE BOARD: Good evening.

15 CAPTAIN COX: Again, my name is Captain Rodney
16 Cox, and I too have the distinct honor and privilege of
17 being part of this great team. I'd like to call your
18 attention to the first program. But before I do, I'd like
19 to just mention that the commander touched on leveraging
20 partnerships. I think that is very critical. In fact, I'd
21 like to acknowledge the people who are in the room today
22 who are a part of that team.

23 To my right we have Ms. Consuela Barbara Lopez.
24 She is heavily involved in the Human Trafficking Coalition
25 community. I also have to my rear Shelia Cockrell, who's

1 part of Corktown, former Detroit City Council. And to her
2 right one of our community leader in Corktown, Ms. Deborah
3 Walker. And, of course, it was mentioned earlier that Mr.
4 -- the president of the Third Precinct Community Relations,
5 Mr. Earnest Little, is here with us today. And we also
6 have Ms. Monika Biddle. Reverend Biddle is also here with
7 us. Good to see you.

8 And so, of course, there's other partners that's
9 not here with us today that's really part of our
10 partnership. That's Chief Anthony Holt from Wayne State,
11 Nicole Ward from Woodward Estates, Nikki Brown from Transit
12 Police, and a host of other people that we partner with.
13 We realize how important it is to make sure that we have
14 the right people in place to partner with to drive this
15 crime down.

16 So I'd like to call your attention to the
17 Father's First flier I passed out some earlier. So
18 there's several programs that we implemented within the
19 Third Precinct. Fathers First program started in May of
20 this year. We host it every third Monday of the month.
21 And basically it's designed to mentor and speak into the
22 lives of our men, especially fathers. We have guest
23 speakers come into the precinct who possess certain areas
24 of expertise, and they provide information about local
25 resources that are available. It's also designed to

1 build community around our fathers and expand and support
2 the network. And I have additional information and
3 fliers as to what the purpose is behind that.

4 We have Workshop Wednesdays, which is another
5 flier that we should have for you. So Workshop Wednesday
6 started in April of this year. And every Thursday
7 Wednesday of the month we have a ninety minute workshop.
8 It's on safety and other topics that enrich the quality
9 of life in the community. Much like Fathers First, we
10 have guest speakers who possess an expertise regarding
11 certain matters, such as active shooter situations,
12 dementia, opioid overdose, depression, or suicide
13 prevention and a host of other topics. And they come out
14 and provide information to educate and bring awareness to
15 these issues.

16 We just completed our Stuff a Cop Car, which
17 the gifts that were donated will be provided to some
18 families we adopted in the Third Precinct. They'll be
19 distributed this Saturday to ten families that we
20 adopted. I'd like to add it was very successful. We
21 were able to share what we were doing with Channel 2, and
22 so it was featured on Channel 2, Channel 7, and I
23 understand it was on Instagram. So this is something
24 that we do every year. And, again, it's designed for us
25 to be able to give and provide for those who are less

1 fortunate. So we adopted ten parents from the Third
2 Precinct.

3 The NPO also do what's called security surveys
4 for homes and business; particularly those that have been
5 victims of burglaries. The Neighborhood Police Officers
6 conduct personal safety programs. We provide gun locks
7 that we obtain from Project Child Safe. And this is an
8 organization that focuses on the safety of children.

9 Again, as part of our community engagement,
10 we've done conflict resolution which involves
11 antibullying and cyber bullying. This is typically done
12 in the form of a PowerPoint presentation, and it involves
13 talking to students about recognizing what conflict is
14 and how to deal with it in a positive way, and how to
15 look for alternatives rather than violence. This is
16 something that we continue to do every year. And we
17 define what bullying is also; the consequences, the
18 symptoms and how you can prevent being bullied.

19 We also do training for junior police cadets
20 and fire cadets, workshops for Police Athletic League.
21 We also participated in several car seat check events.
22 We've given away approximately 20 to 25 car seats, and we
23 did installs for parents as well.

24 We're still conducting what's called
25 restorative practice. Restorative justice events. The

1 way this works is, with the parent's permission we go
2 into the schools to discuss the problems with particular
3 students and whoever they offended and conduct a
4 restorative circle of resolution as an alternative to
5 being suspended. The police are a part of this, and this
6 builds relationships with the police officers. This is
7 something we want to continue to do. And, again, I
8 shared this with the Board last year, and this is
9 something we're going to continue do for as long as we
10 can.

11 We have a few drug prevention workshops. We
12 bring booklets and provide a list of resources that can
13 assist anyone who may need it. We give it to the teacher
14 who gives it to the parents.

15 Out of all of these programs that I've mentioned
16 before you, I'd like to mention some of the schools that
17 have been affected by this. Ben Carson High School, Cass
18 Tech High School, George Crockett Academy, Detroit School
19 of Arts, Westside Academy, Northern High School, Most Holy
20 Trinity Middle School, Detroit International Academy. And
21 then there are a few daycare centers as well that's been
22 positively impacted by this.

23 For our upcoming events within the Third
24 Precinct; again, as I mentioned this Saturday we will be
25 giving away and distributing the gifts that we were given

1 at the Stuff a Cop Car. Every year during this time we
2 partner with sponsors who donate gifts for the families
3 which include food, clothing, toys for children, and
4 electronics.

5 We have the event in a location where our
6 sponsors and recipients break bread together. And the
7 commander and I can recognize the sponsor, give them an
8 opportunity to speak, and then we distribute the gifts. We
9 also allow the families to speak if they choose to. Again,
10 this is an opportunity to build that relationship with the
11 community, because I believe that's what community
12 engagement is about; it's educate and promoting that
13 relationship.

14 And lastly, in closing, I'd like to call your
15 attention to the third fliers before called Badge of
16 Honor. Badge of Honor is a program that we're going
17 to -- we started earlier this year in May, and it's a
18 program which we implemented where the police can
19 recognize the academic achievement and citizenship of
20 students K-8. So in this case we have not done that
21 since then, because we've waited after the summer. And
22 what we wanted to do was wait for the first report card
23 marking to give the teachers an opportunity to assess the
24 student's performance before we determine which students
25 are going to be honored. Again, this is designed to

1 build a relationship with our youth and allow them to see
2 another side of the police, which is the one that cares
3 about their growth and development and not just what they
4 see on social media. And this concludes our
5 presentation. Thank you.

6 (Applause)

7 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commissioner Brooks.

8 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Yes. Just want to
9 compliment all of you all, what you're doing in this
10 community. I've steadily watched this community grow.
11 Motown is expanding. The new Henry Ford Cancer Hospital
12 will be ready to be open soon, and you've got a new
13 apartment building that just opened. So this community is
14 growing. And to know that the police department is
15 growing, Precinct Three is growing with them, to me means a
16 lot. You do a lot of community work, and if there's
17 anything I can do as a police commissioner or as a person,
18 I'll be happy to help you. You're not my precinct, but it
19 doesn't matter.

20 CAPTAIN COX: Thank you.

21 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commissioner Holt.

22 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Thank you, Chair. Did I
23 understand you to say earlier that you work in the schools
24 to help keep young folks from being suspended from school?

25 CAPTAIN COX: Yes. Yes, ma'am. Through the

1 Chair. That is exactly correct. We do what's called
2 restorative justice events.

3 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Okay.

4 CAPTAIN COX: So we find a situation where
5 students have become offended by other students, and
6 they're getting in trouble, we have what's called a
7 restorative justice where we sit down and we have a
8 conversation, and it's in a circle; and we talk about what
9 are some of the alternatives to being suspended. You
10 recognize what you did was wrong. This is a different
11 perspective. This is a different way you can handle it.
12 So in the future, if you should encounter something like
13 this from another student this would be the proper way you
14 can respond.

15 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Thank you. Through the
16 Chair. At one time we had what was called Conflict
17 Resolution, and we didn't have the support of the police
18 officers. In fact, I guess the program had to be
19 dismantled because it required funding. Now you also
20 mentioned that you're going to try to do this as long as
21 you can. Is Dr. Vitti part of your discussion presently?
22 Is he aware of your program, in other words?
23 Superintendent meeting of Detroit Public School Community
24 District.

25 DC BETTISON: Through the Chair. Through the

1 Chair. I can answer that question.

2 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Thank you.

3 DC BETTISON: So, yes, we have -- Unintelligible
4 -- with understanding with Dr. Vitti, and through our
5 Detroit Violence Prevention Initiative, and with all the
6 community outreach which falls under myself, and so does
7 the Third Precinct as well. All of our Neighborhood Police
8 Officers have been trained in restorative justice. And the
9 new ones that have recently come on board, we have training
10 for them as well. So we work throughout the schools.

11 We have the brotherhood, sisterhood program which
12 is sanctioned by Detroit Public Schools Dr. Vitti. We also
13 have City Camp which is over on the westside, Sixth
14 Precinct, at Henderson Elementary School. So DPD is deeply
15 involved with our youth. So we have an enforcement side,
16 but we also have that side as far as education, awareness,
17 and just trying to build those bridges to make sure that
18 instead of locking kids up we unlock potential.

19 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Thank you so much. I'm most
20 impressed with that particular presentation, because it
21 needs -- it cannot be said too many times that when
22 students are at home they are not learning. So your
23 Restorative Justice Program is definitely supporting the
24 enhancement of reading and writing and any academics the
25 students tend to miss out, because they're not in class.

1 Thank you so much.

2 CAPTAIN COX: Thank you.

3 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commissioner Dewaelsche.

4 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCH: Madam Chair, I was so
5 pleased to hear -- thank you -- so pleased to hear that you
6 have such really dynamite people supporting you and helping
7 you from the community. I know for a fact that
8 Councilwoman Shelia Cockrell was always when she was on the
9 council concerned and interested in police and community
10 relations, and so her experience and knowledge has got to
11 be valuable. And so really take advantage of that, because
12 that's just exceptional. And thank you, Ms. Cockrell, for
13 being so involved. Thank you.

14 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you. Any other
15 questions, comments, commissioners?

16 Thank you, gentlemen.

17 CAPTAIN COX: Thank you.

18 DC BETTISON: Through the Chair, if I could take
19 one moment real quick to say that that leadership team
20 makes my job easy. I mean, phenomenal. I mean, they're
21 there. You will see them, I mean, the command officers
22 standing alongside their officers out there doing the work.
23 The work that they did downtown this summer and just -- I
24 can't speak enough about it. Most folks don't even know
25 that I oversee downtown, because I got competent people who

1 oversee it for me. So I just want to publicly acknowledge
2 and thank them.

3 (Applause)

4 COMMISSIONER BROWN: -- Unintelligible -- not
5 getting my shirt.

6 CAPTAIN COX: You'll have it soon.

7 COMMISSIONER CARTER: At this time we will have
8 the report from the interim board secretary.

9 Madam Secretary, if you don't mind, if there's
10 anything in addition to what we already -- what I already
11 said in my opening, please reference that so we can move
12 on.

13 MS. WHITE: Yes, Madam Chair.

14 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you.

15 MS. WHITE: Good evening, Honorable Board. Just
16 to highlight the written directives, again, they are posted
17 online for the public's feedback and input. Most of those
18 directives are directives where the Board has already
19 provided recommendations to the department. We are
20 currently working on those systems with you.

21 And the only other item that the Honorable Board
22 did not hear during the chairperson's remarks was the media
23 FOIA request from ACLU on facial recognition. And that
24 request was requesting department policies on facial
25 recognition, the contract and other items related to facial

1 recognition. And that concludes my report.

2 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, Madam Secretary.

3 Under unfinished business, we have a
4 promotional request for four lieutenants and fifteen
5 sergeants.

6 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCH: Madam Chair, I'd like to
7 make a motion. I move that the Board of Police
8 Commissioners approve Chief of Police James E. Craig's
9 promotional request for four sergeants to the rank of
10 lieutenant as per the umpires arbitration opinion and
11 award. And those four sergeants are Sergeant Tyrine
12 Wheatley, Sergeant Derrick D. Griffin, Sergeant Charles L.
13 Gregory, and Sergeant Gregory A. Tomassini. And I move
14 that we approve these.

15 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Support.

16 COMMISSIONER CARTER: It's been moved and
17 supported that we approve the promotion for the four
18 sergeants to lieutenants. Is there any discussion?

19 Those in favor?

20 THE BOARD: Aye.

21 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Those opposed?

22 The motion carries.

23 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCH: Madam Chair, I have a
24 second motion. I move that the Board of Police
25 Commissioners approve Chief of Police James E. Craig's

1 promotional request for fifteen police officers to the rank
2 of sergeant as per the umpire's arbitration opinion and
3 award on DPOA Grievance 19064. And the name of those
4 officers are Detective Shameka M. Page, Investigator
5 Terrance M. Washington, Corporal Tony W. Goins, Police
6 Officer Javaris A. Reed, Police Officer Chad D. Smith,
7 Police Officer Norman J. Miskelley, Police Officer Sarah K.
8 Johnson, Police Officer Adeela A. Green, Police Officer
9 Louis G. Mueller, Police Officer Tamar J. Banks, Police
10 Officer Delvecchio L. Thompson, Police Officer Deitrich M.
11 Spidell, Police Officer Kenneth L. Dale, Police Officer
12 Charles L. Barnes, and Police Officer Brandon L. Pierce.
13 And I so move.

14 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Support.

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: It's been moved and supported
16 that we approve the promotions of the fifteen sergeants
17 stemming from the DPOA Grievance 19-044. Is there any
18 discussion?

19 Those in favor?

20 THE BOARD: Aye.

21 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Those opposed?

22 Motion carries.

23 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCH: Thank you. Madam Chair,
24 I have you a third motion. I move that the Board of Police
25 Commissioners approve Chief of Police James E. Craig's

1 promotional request for Police Officer Ronaldo Turner to
2 the rank of sergeant; and I so move.

3 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Support.

4 COMMISSIONER CARTER: It's been moved and
5 supported that we approve the promotional request for
6 officer Renaldo Turner to the rank of sergeant. Those in
7 favor?

8 THE BOARD: Aye.

9 COMMISSIONER CARTER: I'm sorry. Is there any
10 discussion? Is there any discussion?

11 Those in favor.

12 THE BOARD: Aye.

13 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Those opposed?

14 Motion carried.

15 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCH: Thank you, Madam Chair.
16 Congratulations.

17 (Applause)

18 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: At this time we have the
19 amendments to the Board of Police Commissioners bylaws.
20 Attorney Jermaine Wyrick is going to speak on this.

21 MR. WYRICK: Good evening. Through the Chair.

22 For the record, my name is Jermaine Wyrick; I'm the Board
23 attorney. In your packet, honorable commission, you should
24 have a blue and white sheet that's called Bylaw Amendments.
25 Just for the sake of brevity, the page numbers actually

1 start on the cover page with page one. These amendments
2 essentially ask summarily are to eliminate the
3 subcommittees and more or less on each page give like a
4 before or after analysis to show that the language of
5 committee is eliminated on the respective articles.

6 I go on to page two, Article 3, Section 7
7 applies to meetings. The before equation requires that
8 board members attend all meetings and committee meetings.
9 The after equation just requires that each board member
10 shall attend all board meetings. So there's no longer
11 any committee meetings.

12 Going to page three, pertains to officers, the
13 duties of officers, especially the Chair, was to appoint
14 two committees. Afterwards you'll see that it's
15 basically blank on the right-hand side, because that's
16 going to be eliminated.

17 On page four, Article 4, Section 6(B) applied
18 to the vice-chairperson and the duties of the
19 vice-chairperson to sit on a committee. Afterwards it's
20 blank, because that's going to be eliminated.

21 Going to page five, Article 5, Section 2:
22 Committee of the Whole. On the before section, it
23 basically listed all the committees that we used to have
24 or currently have prior to you all's vote on this, I
25 should say. Afterwards it basically just lists the

1 committee as a whole shall address all issues which may
2 become before the Board, because there will no longer be
3 committees.

4 The other committees -- I'm on page six now --
5 Article 5, Sections 3, 4, and 5. The magic verb to use
6 there is that you actually repeal that, which basically
7 means you eliminate it before you take it away.

8 Article 6 on meetings, Section 1 -- I'm on page
9 seven now -- applies to the Open Meetings Act. It
10 basically says the Open Meetings Act not only applies to
11 the full board meeting but committee meets as well. But
12 afterwards that committee is being eliminated, so then
13 it's just the Open Meetings Act applies to the full board
14 meetings.

15 Page eight applies to a quorum. It varies
16 specifically. Applies to a quorum as it relates only to
17 committee meetings, not for the full board meeting. That
18 language has been eliminated. So on the right-hand side
19 you'll see that it's blank.

20 Going to page nine, conduct of meetings, this
21 actually applies to a situation where two or more members
22 request the floor at the same time. The presiding officer,
23 of course, makes that decision. Toward the bottom you'll
24 see -- actually the second line from the bottom, there was
25 a reference there to committees. That's being taken out.

1 So if you look -- and this is on page nine. Afterwards the
2 language of "committee" will no longer be there.

3 Page 10, Article 10 the significance in that
4 applies to any future or revision to the bylaws. The way
5 the current structure is, is that the -- and this is on the
6 left-hand side, the before side -- the Policy Committee
7 would more or less be responsible for the preparation of
8 bylaw minutes. That's actually being eliminated. And it's
9 -- Unintelligible -- under this by virtue of the fact that
10 there were actually two notice requirements that more or
11 less conflicted with one another.

12 There was one requirement that required a two
13 week notice before the full board. There was another
14 notice of requirement that required a 30 day notice. And
15 this is on the left-hand side of page ten. Now, to be
16 consistent with that, the language is being changed whereby
17 it will be a 30 day notice, and at the discretion of the
18 Chair an ad hoc committee can be appointed. But that's the
19 only language in any of the amendments where there's any
20 reference whatsoever to any committee.

21 Going to page 12, there was an Article 11 which
22 actually referred to electronic meetings. I don't think
23 that this is something that was ever really used. But
24 there was a discretionary choice whereby you could do
25 teleconferencing for committee meetings.

1 Article 12 here is actually significant, because
2 it requires an addition. So it's actually different from
3 the actual committee language. It pertains to conduct at
4 the meetings Section A, B, C, and D. If you look on the
5 left-hand side -- and I'm on page twelve at this point --
6 contrary to many of the previous pages, the left-hand side
7 is blank, because currently in the bylaws there's no
8 language that applies to this. If you approve this, the
9 after from the right-hand side, page 12, and as of Section
10 E it will read, "Once the chairperson declares a breach of
11 order, a penalty may be imposed by a majority vote to
12 require the noncompliant board member to leave
13 for the remainder of the meeting."
14 That's on the right-hand side of page 12.

15 The last page, page 13, is basically the
16 language used for the respective motions to more or less
17 eliminate the language entirely. It would be a motion to
18 repeal, to revise, which pertains to the member. To take
19 out the policy committee in Article 10, it would just be
20 the motion to revise.

21 And then the last page -- the previous page that
22 I referenced as it relates to the conduct, you will just
23 make a motion to add, because you're actually adding a
24 Subsection E that currently doesn't exist.

25 And that's my presentation. I'm open to

1 questions.

2 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Through the Chair.

3 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commissioner Griffie.

4 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: I move that we amend --

5 I'm sorry, I move that we repeal --

6 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Support the amendment?

7 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Huh? I move that we amend
8 Article 3, Section 7. I don't know if I can go on. I'm
9 trying to go in a little order. I recommend that we amend
10 Article 3, Section 7 as noted; Article 4, Section 6;
11 Article 4, Section 6(B); Article 5, Section 2; Article 5,
12 Section 3, 4, 5, and 6; Article 6, Section 1; Article 6 --
13 Article 7 -- pardon me -- and Article 10.

14 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCH: Support.

15 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madam Chair, I call that we
16 table this with the City Law Department.

17 COMMISSIONER CARTER: There's a motion on the
18 floor. Is there -- it's been moved and supported that we
19 amend the bylaws as presented by Commissioner Griffie.

20 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Support.

21 COMMISSIONER CARTER: It's been moved and
22 supported.

23 UNKNOWN SPEAKER: Can we have discussion first?

24 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Is there any discussion?

25 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Madam Chair, I move to table

1 this motion. And I'll speak on it.

2 COMMISSIONER CARTER: There is a motion.

3 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Second. I'll second it for
4 Commissioner Brown.

5 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Okay, the motion is to
6 table for discussion.

7 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: To table the motion?

8 COMMISSIONER CARTER: The motion. It's been
9 moved and supported. Is there any discussion? Those in
10 favor? On tabling -- on tabling --

11 COMMISSIONER BROWN: There is some discussion,
12 Madam Chair. I would like to speak on it so you understand
13 why I'm asking this. For two reasons. One, we just voted
14 to go to the corporate council two weeks ago to get help
15 with drafting our bylaws or being able to go out -- it was
16 your motion that you had put out there -- to be able to go
17 out and get someone to help us with this. To eliminate our
18 committees based on what the training we just had, that we
19 were told that our staff cannot do the work of the Board,
20 who's going to do the work of the Board with putting all
21 this stuff together and coming forth to talk?

22 So eliminating committees is not -- to me it
23 seems like we're trying to usurp the Open Meetings Act when
24 it's just simple that we should just have these committee
25 meetings, schedule them, and if the public wants to come,

1 let them come.

2 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Through the Chair.

3 COMMISSIONER CARTER: This is the table.

4 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Yes. So the reason I
5 don't agree with tabling this motion -- so, one, I did
6 make -- you're correct, I did make a motion, but I think
7 you're misinformed by what my motion was last meeting. My
8 motion had nothing to do with the bylaws and had everything
9 to do with our employee policy. That was what I requested,
10 and it was voted on by this board to go before the city
11 attorney for feedback.

12 And then, second, I think -- I don't think we
13 have voted to table. We voted a few weeks ago that we no
14 longer have committees. I mean, this is just making that
15 administrative process in our bylaws. And I don't believe
16 that by dismantling the committees that we're no longer
17 following the Open Meetings Act.

18 In fact, I think what that means is instead of
19 having committees, all subject matters and issues will come
20 before this body. So instead of you or whoever else that
21 chaired a former committee, instead of talking about that
22 amongst the committee, we'll just talk about the issues in
23 the full board; which I think is actually even more
24 transparent than it was before. So I don't believe -- I
25 don't agree with your reasoning.

1 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Madam Chair.

2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

3 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commissioner Dewaelsche.

4 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCH: Madam Chair, we did
5 speak with the attorney corporate counsel on this, and he
6 agreed that we could do this. And my reasoning for
7 supporting this is that we meet every week. We already
8 have a commitment every week for a meeting. To have
9 subcommittee meetings, we could not get people to attend a
10 second meeting regularly. And, we were told by corporation
11 counsel that we could not make decisions, we could not talk
12 about issues that even appear to make decisions. So my
13 feeling is that the committees were not effective, because
14 we could not -- anything that we would present or discuss
15 at the committee could be interpreted by the Open Meetings
16 Act as we were making decisions. So what we decided -- and
17 I know, because I chaired several of the committees, I've
18 just been presenting our business in front of the entire
19 public. And that way you have a hundred percent
20 transparency.

21 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commissioner Burton.

22 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair. You
23 know this Board is has not in operating compliance since
24 I've -- you know, since quite some time. And, you know, we
25 didn't do our fiduciary responsibility by sending this to

1 the city corporation counsel, asking them for opinion.
2 Because we don't want to violate the charter or the Open
3 Meetings Act or Robert's Rules of Order. This Board has
4 not been in compliance, once again, on several occasions.

5 And going forward, you know, we want to be able
6 to serve majority of Detroit. We have people -- citizens
7 have come out time and time again said they want
8 transparency. We never knew when these subcommittee
9 meetings were meeting. They were never posted. We as
10 board members didn't even know when committee meetings were
11 -- you know, we didn't know the dates, times, or locations
12 of these meetings, nor did the public. I think we need to
13 have more transparency, and it needs to start right here.
14 So a good start is to table this with the city corporation
15 counsel, City of Detroit's Law Department. And that's a
16 Board that's moving in the right direction.

17 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCH: Madam Chair, approving
18 this change will result in 100% transparency for the
19 public. I request that we call for the -- is there still a
20 motion?

21 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Not when you have these --

22 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Point of order. Point of
23 order.

24 COMMISSIONER BURTON: -- Unintelligible -- with
25 the chair, the vice-chair.

1 -- Unintelligible - Multiple Speakers --

2 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCH: We have already
3 discussed this with the City of Detroit Corporation
4 Counsel, and we have gotten approval that this will meet
5 the Open Meetings Act.

6 MR. BROWN: Who is we?

7 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, Commissioner
8 Dewaelsche has spoken clearly to the issue. We have met
9 with the corporation counsel, not once but on several --

10 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Point of order. You didn't
11 have permission from the Chair Commissioner Bell. This is
12 the second time in this session you did not have permission
13 to speak.

14 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Actually you don't; he did.
15 I said Commissioner Bell.

16 COMMISSIONER BELL: And Commissioner Burton just
17 made the case for voting to abolish the language of the
18 amendment; you know, bylaws. You know, he's made the case
19 already. He's not aware of that, but he made the case. He
20 did not attend the meeting last night that even the expert
21 in the Robert's Rules of Order and the Open Meetings Act,
22 that we went over extensively, recommends the committee is
23 not in our best interest. And the committee as a whole, as
24 we did before and now for the last several months now, it's
25 the best way to go.

1 COMMISSIONER BURTON: For the record, I was at
2 the Mayor's Town Hall meeting in District Five.

3 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Point of order. Madam
4 Chair, I called a question.

5 COMMISSIONER CARTER: The question is to table
6 the decision to amend the bylaws. Those in favor.

7 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Aye.

8 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Aye.

9 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Aye.

10 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Those opposed?

11 REMAINING BOARD: Nay.

12 COMMISSIONER CARTER: The nays have it.

13 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madam Chair, let's call for
14 a record rollcall vote --

15 COMMISSIONER CARTER: The --

16 COMMISSIONER BURTON: -- because we can't
17 determine who said aye or nay.

18 COMMISSIONER CARTER: You said nay; Commissioner
19 Brown said nay, and Commissioner Davis said nay. Everybody
20 else said --

21 COMMISSIONER BELL: Aye.

22 COMMISSIONER CARTER: -- aye. So we're going to
23 move to the original motion, which was to amend the bylaws.

24 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCH: Call for the question?

25 COMMISSIONER CARTER: The question is to amend

1 the bylaws --

2 UNKNOWN ATTENDEE: It's been almost two hours.

3 COMMISSIONER CARTER: -- and to oppose it or --

4 UNKNOWN ATTENDEE: It's ridiculous. And the
5 public still has not spoken.

6 COMMISSIONER CARTER: -- as proposed by
7 Commissioner Griffie. Those in favor?

8 THE BOARD: Aye.

9 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Those opposed?

10 COMMISSIONER BROWN: No.

11 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Nay.

12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: No. Let's call for a
13 record rollcall vote Madam Chair.

14 COMMISSIONER CARTER: The motion carries.

15 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madam Chair, can we have a
16 rollcall vote.

17 COMMISSIONER CARTER: At this time --

18 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Madam Chair, I have just
19 one more motion.

20 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commissioner Griffie.

21 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: I move to add Article 10,
22 which is on Section A, B, C and D around -- at this point
23 there's a -- Unintelligible -- declare a breach of order.

24 COMMISSIONER BELL: Second.

25 COMMISSIONER CARTER: It's been moved and

1 supported that we approve -- Amendment D?

2 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Ten.

3 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Amendment 10.

4 ATTENDEE: Can you explain what you're talking
5 about? What you're adding?

6 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Amendment 10.

7 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Article 7.

8 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Article 7.

9 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Sections A, B, C and D.

10 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Sections A, B, C and D. Is
11 there any discussion?

12 Those in favor.

13 THE BOARD: Aye.

14 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Those opposed?

15 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: No.

16 COMMISSIONER BROWN: No.

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madam Chair, question. Who
18 put together these bylaws?

19 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Point of order.

20 COMMISSIONER CARTER: The motion carries.

21 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madam Chair, there's a good
22 question here. For point of information, who put together
23 these bylaws?

24 (No response)

25 COMMISSIONER BURTON: When were they put

1 together?

2 (No response)

3 COMMISSIONER BURTON: We as a full board --

4 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Point of order.

5 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I called for a point of
6 information first.

7 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Under new business our
8 proposed calendar for 2020.

9 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, I move that we
10 move the calendar for 2020.

11 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Support.

12 COMMISSIONER CARTER: It's been moved and
13 supported that we approve the calendar for 2020. Is there
14 any discussion?

15 Those in favor?

16 THE BOARD: Aye.

17 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Those opposed? The motion
18 carries.

19 At this time under announcements.

20 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes, Madam Chair.

21 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Yes.

22 COMMISSIONER BROWN: There's a point of question
23 under new business. It's for Dr. McAllister. Through Dr.
24 McAllister, what is the firearms policy for investigators
25 in the Office of Chief Investigator?

1 DR. MCALLISTER: For the record, Dr. Polly
2 McAllister. We are not authorized to carry weapons
3 currently.

4 COMMISSIONER BROWN: So is that former sworn
5 members or anyone, period, whether or not they have CPL
6 status or restricted status or anything like that?

7 DR. MCALLISTER: Well, because we work inside a
8 city-owned building, there's an ordinance that permits
9 that. We're not allowed to carry.

10 COMMISSIONER BROWN: So only sworn officers are
11 allowed -- police officers are allowed to carry weapons on
12 duty?

13 DR. MCALLISTER: Just actual sworn members of
14 DPD. None of our investigators, or supervisors, or myself
15 carry weapons.

16 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Thank you.

17 DR. MCALLISTER: Is there a concern you want to
18 tell me about?

19 COMMISSIONER BROWN: No, ma'am. I just want to
20 be clear on that policy.

21 DR. MCALLISTER: Okay.

22 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Under announcements our
23 next meeting will be Thursday January 9, 2020 at 6:30 p.m.
24 at the Arab American Chaldean Youth Center, located at 62
25 West Seven Mile Road in Detroit, Michigan.

1 Our next community meeting will be Thursday,
2 February 13, 2020 at 6:30 p.m., and the location is
3 forthcoming.

4 At this time we'll have oral communications from
5 the audience. Please limit your comments to two minutes
6 and give your name for the record.

7 Ms. Blossom.

8 MS. BLOSSOM: Madam Chair, currently you have
9 ten cards. I'll call three at a time. Yolanda Greer,
10 Consuela Lopez, and Ernest Little will be your first
11 three speakers.

12 MS. GREER: Good afternoon to the commissioners.
13 To our community, I don't know if you're disturbed. I saw
14 the community receive a lot of awards tonight, and that's
15 good; and I commend all the community people in Detroit and
16 the suburban areas that are still fighting for Detroit.

17 We had the honor of having a mayor, Coleman
18 Alexander Young. And I remember there was a war on drugs
19 then at that time. Since that time we have lost more
20 children in the city of Detroit. And I don't hear anybody
21 standing up fighting for our children, not even in our
22 schools. I heard the officers say that they've been
23 commissioned to go into the schools. What teachers are
24 getting spit at, cussed at, injured in our schools and
25 there's no police, there's no support? I don't know

1 exactly what's going on in the city of Detroit, but I do
2 know that when I turn on the news or I go out into the
3 communities and I see children on the eastside that come
4 out of their homes and dial 9-1-1 and say three people are
5 dead inside of my home that disturbs me, whether they're on
6 the east side, the west side, the north side, or the south
7 side! So we can't sit here and eat chicken all day long
8 and argue back and forth amongst each other on this board!
9 We can't do that! We no longer tolerate that here in the
10 city of Detroit! We must respect each other, and we must
11 look after each other!

12 I don't ever want to come to another board
13 meeting here in the city of Detroit and have people
14 disrespect each other. There are people late here in this
15 audience all the time. There's people late here on this
16 board all the time, and I don't hear their names called
17 out. We want transparency when it comes to these board
18 members. Respect each other. Respect each other. I asked
19 that the last time I was here at this meeting, and yet
20 there's still carryover anyhow.

21 When one doesn't know something, make sure that
22 they know. No longer will I come here and accept this type
23 of behavior from any Detroit board police commissioner
24 meeting person, whether you're at-large or no large!

25 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you for your

1 comments, ma'am.

2 MS. GREER: Thank you.

3 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you.

4 MS. LOPEZ: Hello. My name is Consuela Lopez,
5 and I am the co-chair of Advocates & Leaders, Advocates in
6 Law Enforcement and the Partnership for Community Trust
7 along with Ferndale Police Sergeant Barron Brown.

8 Tomorrow morning at 9:30, at Detroit DPD Public
9 Safety Headquarters, I have the honor to be working with DC
10 Bettison. And our Commissioner Davis tomorrow will be
11 speaking on community policing in policing the communities,
12 and they will be presenting. And I'm welcoming an invite
13 for everyone, not also on the Board but in the community to
14 join us tomorrow at 9:30. And thank you so much.

15 MS. BLOSSOM: Before Mr. Little speaks, the
16 next three speakers will be Ralph Simpson, Alfonso
17 Raymos, Elena Herrada.

18 MR. LITTLE: Hello. My name is Ernest Little.
19 I'm a proud resident of Arden Park and the North End. I'm
20 also the president of the Third Precinct police Community
21 Relations. And I work with Reverend Holley with
22 Mrs. Bennett's, and we've been on other projects than just
23 this. Also I'm a member of the Hamtramck Drug Free
24 Community Coalition where the police chief and the fire
25 department chairperson there actually comes to the meeting.

1 I'm also getting more and more interested in
2 Highland Park also, because I realize that diversity is all
3 over the place. And contrary to popular belief, this is
4 not just about being poor. I know I'm not wealthy, but
5 there's that two thang; it's the middle class. And I think
6 that what's actually happening in Detroit is that a lot of
7 the middle class has moved out. And now what's going to
8 happen is is this; the mayor wants to tear down all these
9 houses, but we got to start building up some people too.

10 But I want to keep the town down. Because when I
11 talk about the Hamtramck Drug Free Coalition, the first
12 thing came to my mind was drugs been out here since I can
13 remember. People just on an individual level have to start
14 making a decision not to use and pick up.

15 And as for the police department, Franklin Hayes
16 and Captain Cox, they have instituted programs at the
17 precinct where the community can come to. And what so
18 amazed me was that people do actually come to these
19 meetings and stuff. But what I really like is when you
20 come to the meetings you get things done.

21 We had a situation on Lynn and Oakman where we
22 had this environmental problem. And I know our state rep
23 always talk about the environmental problem. Well between
24 one of our NPOs and environmental officers, they got that
25 whacked and it got pulled out. Homers came in -- don't get

1 me wrong; I don't always love all these contractors, but I
2 know somebody had to do the job, okay, so it got done.

3 And then, furthermore, I work as a volunteer
4 literally. Because, you know, I know ya'll work almost
5 literally as volunteers on this committee, because I know
6 how much money ya'll make. And I work on the QLine, and
7 I'm going to tell you something; I see some of the
8 customers right out here in the audience. And the first
9 thing come out by my mind is, all of us got to do a little
10 bit to help.

11 And when the lady talked about the crime about
12 the kids, don't get me wrong, it's maybe about at least
13 30,000 people, and I'm sick and tired of going to funerals
14 of young people, young male and female. But all we got to
15 do is make certain that the Detroit police is there for
16 them. Because when they at least they got ten minutes they
17 going to have to wait, and then hopefully they can save
18 themselves if they have to if the police can't get there.

19 MS. BLOSSOM: Mr. Simpson, followed by Mr.
20 Raymos. Please come to the mic.

21 MR. SIMPSON: Ralph Simpson, attorney at law. I
22 hate to be the one that said I told you so, but I told you
23 so that this group was in violation of the Open Meetings
24 Act by checking IDs before people were able to enter the
25 Downtown Detroit Police Headquarters to attend a board

1 meeting. I understand the steps that have been taken to
2 correct that violation. I hope that is the case.

3 I did want to try to understand something. I
4 actually read the investigator's report about the Board,
5 and I'm a little confused about the different levels of
6 responsibility. I know that Mr. Hicks was blamed for some
7 actions, but he maintained that he had been given authority
8 to take some of the steps he took.

9 I know that Mr. Bell was -- Commissioner Bell was
10 accused of certain actions and, I believe, said that he had
11 been given authority to take those actions. I think some
12 of the board members were not present when the initiative
13 to give Mr. Hicks additional authority was passed, but it
14 seems like one attorney represented everybody. And that
15 leads to the conclusion although you blame Mr. Hicks for
16 certain actions that you all disagreed with the
17 investigator's report. I think I would call on each and
18 every board member to take responsibility for whether they
19 do or do not agree with the investigator's report and
20 whether they do or do not agree that they have some
21 responsibility for the wrong actions that have been taken
22 in the past. Thank you.

23 MS. BLOSSOM: If Mr. Ramos is not here, Elena
24 --

25 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCH: I think he's coming.

1 MR. RAMOS: Hi. My name is Alfonso Ramos. I own
2 a piece of property in Southwest Detroit, and I've had a
3 lot of problems with it; you know, vandalism. And I called
4 the police department, and one officer come out there and
5 told me that I should see a psychiatrist. They're just
6 harassing me because I won't sell the property to certain
7 people. Everybody's coming out of the woodwork, they want
8 the property because it's commercial zone. You know, who
9 knows how long this has been going on with other properties
10 over there. So, you know, they need to start investigating
11 something, whatever, on the properties. When there's a
12 sale or something, you know, this is not right. I fix
13 something, they break something else. Thank you.

14 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, sir.

15 DC BETTISON: Yes, through the Chair. To be able
16 to address this concern, I'm going to have Commander Hayes
17 talk to him and be able to connect him with the commander
18 of the Fourth Precinct.

19 And, sir, where exactly are you -- I'm not going
20 to ask that on a public record, but we'll take care of you.
21 Thank you.

22 UNKNOWN SPEAKER: Thank you. I'm a witness to
23 his concerns about that, because he's called a number of
24 times. There's been a lot of vandalizing instances --
25 Unintelligible --

1 ATTENDEE: State your name.

2 UNKNOWN SPEAKER: I'm Marilyn --
3 Unintelligible --

4 I only want to say one thing here just regarding
5 what just happened with these bylaws change. And to me I
6 just want to say that it appears very unethical that you
7 passed a resolution or a bylaw that will allow the majority
8 to censor or to quash a minority opinion by removing a
9 person for disagreeing. And I think that's really headed
10 in the wrong direction. If I'm misunderstanding what it is
11 that you did, I would really like to see it clarified. But
12 to not allow a dissenting opinion on a publicly elected
13 board, I really think that that's problematic. Thank you.

14 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Through the Chair, may we
15 just clarify that, because I don't want people to think
16 that's what we just did.

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: That's exactly what ya'll
18 just did.

19 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: I want to explain that.
20 The motion that was passed was that if a member is out of
21 order. That does not mean that he has a dissenting
22 opinion. What that means is, if you are not following
23 Robert's Rules of Order, if you do not follow Robert's
24 Rules of Order then the majority vote can vote to have them
25 leave the meeting. It does not mean if he has a dissenting

1 opinion. Anybody is welcome -- as a matter of fact, I
2 enjoy when I get to learn about the different opinions of
3 my -- as long as we're all respectful. That is not what I
4 would ever moved to have done. So I just want to clarify
5 that.

6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: She's lying under the skin
7 of her teeth.

8 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCH: And this is exactly what
9 we're talking about.

10 MS. BLOSSOM: The next speaker will be Kerry
11 Wilson [sic], followed by Mark Young, followed by
12 Christal Bonner, and the final speaker will by Colby
13 Brownfield.

14 MS. WILSON: My name is Kelly Wilson.

15 Nine years ago, Detective Olson covered up my
16 brother's homicide. First, I hope we can all agree on the
17 definition of a lie. The definition of a lie is a false
18 statement made with deliberate intent to deceive.
19 Detective Olson also lacked the questioning of firsthand
20 witnesses. He refused to talk with the young man that was
21 with my brother that night. He also refused to talk to the
22 person who admitted that they kicked and stomped on my
23 brother as he choked on his own blood. But he made sure
24 that him and his team questioned all of the killer's
25 family, friends, and employees, but no one -- it was over

1 eleven people that Detective Olson could have talked to,
2 but he didn't. How many questions would you want a
3 detective to ask someone who gunned down your family
4 member? Well in my brother's case, it was an average of
5 four to six questions with no follow-up.

6 They falsified evidence. Donald Olson lied in
7 his report and stated my brother was in possession of a
8 stolen weapon and it had blood on it. There was no prints
9 on the gun. No blood. The reason the warrant for Jones
10 was denied was based heavily on those two statements.
11 These statements are lies based on the definition of lie;
12 to deliberately intent to deceive something or someone.

13 The evidence tech fabricated evidence in order to
14 perpetuate the false narrative. And he said that my
15 brother and the -- they exchanged gunfire, even though
16 there's no evidence of a gunfight or my brother having a
17 gun. When you guys were talking about the corruption in
18 the narcotics department, it's a rampant in the Homicide
19 Department.

20 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, ma'am.

21 MS. WILSON: There's no reason why. In one hand
22 it says there's no blood and no gun, but the officer wrote
23 that there was blood and gun. That's a lie.

24 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Deputy Chief Bettison, is
25 there someone who can follow up with her.

1 DC BETTISON: Absolutely. Commander McGinnis,
2 could you follow up with --

3 MS. WILSON: I spoke with you, Commander
4 Bettison. Actually Ron Scott talked to you when Detective
5 Olson was trying to destroy my brother's clothing. And Ron
6 Scott contacted you with me and my parents on the speaker
7 phone, and you said that that was ridiculous what they were
8 trying to do.

9 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Okay. Ma'am --

10 DC BETTISON: What year was this?

11 MS. WILSON: This was 2011. I've been coming
12 before this board for nine years. And no one here -- I've
13 given you evidence.

14 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you.

15 MS. WILSON: Yeah, ya'll going to ignore me
16 again.

17 DC BETTISON: I'm going to have you speak with
18 Commander McGinnis. Thank you.

19 LT. YOUNG: Good evening. I'm Lieutenant Mark
20 Young of the -- Unintelligible -- of Detroit Police
21 Lieutenants and Sergeants Association.

22 I don't condone misconduct or wrongdoing or
23 corruption. I know no one that does. In fact, throughout
24 on my 32 going on 33 years, I know people that have given
25 their all; their youth, their health and their lives. I

1 pray that this is a speedy investigation and it's over
2 quickly, because the men and the women of the Detroit
3 Police Department deserve better than that.

4 I pray for those guys that's out here. I respect
5 them. I salute them. As a president, as a lieutenant, and
6 as a person who lives in this community, I salute these men
7 and women that go out here every day in inclement weather,
8 work double shifts. They sacrifice far greater than you
9 can ever see or know. They sacrifice the time of their
10 family, and I've often watched the young guys grow older
11 before their time because of their sacrifice and some of
12 the things that they've seen.

13 I wanted to hit on one point. Over the last few
14 days, five to six officers across this nation was killed.
15 I could not count how many got shot. What does that look
16 like? What does recovery look like? While we talk about
17 police misconduct, which is rare, which is rare. And I
18 wish in my heart that there was none, it is rare. We must
19 wrap our arms around these men and women that are facing
20 unforeseen danger. I salute McClain, and I salute those
21 like him. Let's not lose focus on the men and women that
22 come when they're called.

23 MS. BONNER: Good evening. Crystal Bonner,
24 retired Detroit public school teacher and current teacher
25 for the State of Michigan.

1 It is now almost 9:00 p.m. I have asked many
2 times before, can we shorten up this conversation you guys
3 do and leave enough time for community response or
4 comments? This is ridiculous. And as you can look around,
5 a lot of people have left. I think that's a violation of
6 the Open Meetings Act, because you're pretty much driving
7 people out of here with your ying, ying, ying, ying going
8 on and on. It's ridiculous.

9 And also I want to talk about, I had to call the
10 police. I called 9-1-1 in my neighborhood. I live in --
11 what's his name? -- Commissioner Bell's district. But I
12 called the police, because there was a lot of shooting
13 going on on Old Town; and it happens too often, and the
14 police did not respond. And then I get a call that woke me
15 up about 4:00 in the morning from the police department
16 saying, hey, did you call blah, blah, blah? I said, yes, I
17 did but they're gone now whatever they were doing. You
18 know? And he said, well can I have your name and number?
19 I know that is not appropriate, is it? And I told him -- I
20 said, you didn't even come out; why would I give you my
21 name and my number?

22 And I hope that if they did show up, they
23 wouldn't have come knocking on my door. Because when we
24 call police with violations then we shouldn't have the
25 police put us on the spot and come knocking at our door so,

1 hey, our neighbor can see, hey, you're the one that called.
2 I mean that was ridiculous.

3 And then another thing about this community
4 meeting; the food is here for the community, but in October
5 Mr. Bell here told the caterer bag up everything and give
6 it to the police department. What is that all about?

7 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you for your
8 comments, ma'am.

9 MS. BONNER: Okay, but what are we going to do
10 about having these community meetings in the neighborhoods
11 and starting at certain times? I can't make the 3:00 p.m.
12 one.

13 COMMISSIONER CARTER: The meeting is actually a
14 board meeting for us, and the community is invited. So we
15 have business to discuss, and we discuss our business.

16 MS. BONNER: Okay, so you really don't need us
17 here then; is that what you're telling me?

18 COMMISSIONER CARTER: I said the community is
19 invited, and you're welcome to share your comments.

20 MS. BONNER: Okay, but just you'd rather us just
21 sit down and shut up is basically what you're saying.

22 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, ma'am.

23 MS. BLOSSOM: Your final speaker is Colby
24 Brownfield.

25 MR. BROWNFIELD: How everybody doing. I work for

1 Touch a Class Catering, and we've been doing these police
2 Board of Commissioners ever since -- you know, every
3 Thursday.

4 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: We can't hear you.

5 MR. BROWNFIELD: You can't hear me? Hear me now.
6 All right, thank you.

7 Sorry, I'm pretty nervous up here.

8 ATTENDEES: Don't be nervous.

9 MR. BROWNFIELD: So, boom. So I've been coming
10 to these meetings every Thursday and serving food. I been
11 watching, and it just amazes me how I see grown people act.
12 And it's just wild. I don't know. My father -- I been
13 raised with my grandma. My father is 61; my grandma is 98,
14 and they taught me to be the most respectful as I can be.
15 And -- I'm shaking right now -- a baby could teach you
16 something, you know, so you shouldn't down talk nobody just
17 for having an opinion or anything. I'm sorry. I really
18 can't speak.

19 ATTENDEES: They're just people. Some of them
20 liars.

21 MR. BROWNFIELD: Now I know after every board
22 meeting, I shake that man over there hand because I know he
23 has a good heart down deep inside. And -- and --

24 ATTENDEE: Honey, you're a child of God; you
25 ain't got to weep and tremble in front of these people.

1 UNKNOWN SPEAKER: Right. They have no heaven or
2 hell.

3 UNKNOWN SPEAKER: They don't have any respect for
4 us anyway. Two minutes. They give us two minutes to
5 speak. They're not God. You're brave.

6 MR. BROWNFIELD: Last thing I want to say is, I
7 really don't know how to say this, but behave better. I
8 don't --

9 (Applause)

10 MS. BLOSSOM: Madam Chair, that was your last
11 speaker.

12 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, if there's no
13 more business, I'll move for adjournment.

14 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCH: Supported.

15 ATTENDEE: So 20 minutes for the people to speak,
16 wow!

17 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Those in favor?

18 THE BOARD: Aye.

19 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Those opposed? Motion
20 carried.
