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5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Good evening.

6 AUDIENCE: Good evening.

7 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Welcome to the Board of
8 Police Commissioners monthly community meeting. My
9 name is Lisa Carter, Chair of the commission, and I
10 will be conducting this evening's meeting.

11 On behalf of the board for those of you in
12 attendance, thank you for coming to our meeting. For
13 those of us viewing the meeting on your government
14 cable channel, thank you for joining our meeting as
15 well.

16 Tonight we are in the Ninth Precinct.
17 Commissioner Willie E. Bell represents this district.
18 I will ask Commissioner Bell at this time to provide
19 welcoming remarks.

20 COMMISSIONER BELL: Good evening.

21 AUDIENCE: Good evening.

22 COMMISSIONER BELL: Come on. We can do
23 better than that. Good evening.

24 AUDIENCE: Good evening.

25 COMMISSIONER BELL: Welcome to the Ninth

1 Precinct, the home of District 4 and District 5, on a
2 warm evening in the Fifth Precinct. We will hear our
3 host a little bit later on, but this is the home of two
4 high schools, Osborn High School and Denby High School.
5 When I was in school, we had Denby. We did not have
6 Osborn High School on Seven Mile Road.

7 But I just want to acknowledge Scott Benson
8 who is District 3 leadership. In terms of council
9 person, Shirley Burch, District 3 also. She's not
10 present, but she sends her warm regards to you. As you
11 well know, she is a hard worker in the District 3 and
12 most of the Ninth Precinct in District 3. But I have
13 the opportunity to give or take -- I have the
14 opportunity to interact with the commander. He's been
15 here a couple years or longer, and we have stabilized
16 leadership. And you will hear from him and the captain
17 a little bit later on in terms of reporting out.

18 But once again, the east side of Detroit, I'm
19 glad you braved the weather to visit us. This is a
20 outstanding facility here for young people. I wish we
21 had a recreation center in District 4. I know that's
22 going to happen in the near, near future. But I thank
23 you for coming out and thank the Ninth Precinct for
24 hosting this evening. I want to say that, because
25 Gratiot and Gunston is dear to my heart. I had an

1 opportunity to work there. That was my last
2 assignment, the Ninth Precinct. So we have come a long
3 way in the Ninth Precinct in terms of combatting
4 different issues from Ceasefire and different programs.
5 They have a outstanding outreach program that the Fifth
6 Precinct -- I'm sorry, the Ninth Precinct meet in this
7 facility here. I think they're reconvening in March.
8 We might hear from their leadership team tonight. But
9 once again, we are engaging and I appreciate the fact
10 to have an opportunity to be part of the Ninth
11 Precinct. Thank you.

12 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, Commissioner
13 Bell.

14 Commissioners Brooks, Burch and Burton have
15 asked to be excused.

16 Today we have invited Chaplain Gwendolyn
17 Hudson to provide the invocation.

18 Chaplain Hudson, if you can come forward,
19 please. Thank you.

20 CHAPLAIN HUDSON: First of all, I want to
21 thank you for having me, and to all the staff that's
22 here can we bow our heads, please.

23 Father, in the name of Jesus, Lord we thank
24 you for an opportunity to come before you. We ask,
25 Father, that you allow this team of commissioners, God,

1 to pour in wisdom, knowledge and understanding, that we
2 will be edified, God, in the community. We ask, God,
3 that you will look upon their health, look upon them
4 and give them such wisdom, God, that will pour into the
5 community, that it will expound in new ways with new
6 ideas and new creativity.

7 I ask now, Father, in the name of Jesus that
8 you will look upon every person that's here, give them
9 also what they need on tonight. We bind now all chaos,
10 any animosity, any jealousy or anything that will come
11 against this meeting. Now, Father, we thank you. Even
12 as we leave this place, we ask for your traveling
13 mercy. In the name of Jesus we do pray. Amen.

14 AUDIENCE: Amen.

15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, Chaplain
16 Hudson.

17 At this time I'm going to ask that Ms.
18 Rosalind Mills from the Heilmann Community Center
19 please come forward with any remarks.

20 MS. MILLS: Hi. Good evening, everyone.
21 Good evening, staff. My name is Rosalind Mills from
22 the Heilmann Recreational Center, the center that
23 you're at now on behalf of Mr. Byron Spivey. He is at
24 home ill, but I just want to let you know that we
25 welcome you all for using our center, the Ninth

1 Precinct. We really appreciate you all for using our
2 center.

3 And we do have different programs here at
4 Heilmann Recreational Center. We do have these
5 booklets right there outside the table. It's a lot of
6 activities in here for you guys and the prices for a
7 resident and nonresident is here in as well. We have
8 different recreational centers around the city of
9 Detroit, east side, west side, southwest side,
10 northwest side.

11 We do also have a training that's outside of
12 this room. If you are interested, it's from 18 to 50
13 years old. It's through Mitsubishi Electronics, and
14 they are signing up people outside this room right here
15 where you see those two gentlemen. They're signing
16 people up for that.

17 And you can go online if you are interested
18 in a membership here at the center or at any
19 recreational centers in the city of Detroit. We do
20 have senior programs as well so -- and if anybody
21 interested -- what's wrong?

22 AUDIENCE MEMBER: You looked over there.

23 COMMISSIONER HOLT: You said 18 to 50.

24 MS. MILLS: I'm sorry. Charge it to the
25 heart, not the mind, okay. All right. So if anybody

1 interested the number here is (313) 224-9334. Again,
2 224-9334. And the person that's over the senior
3 program is Mr. Winston. You can give him a call if you
4 need to ask any questions or anything.

5 But I want to take this opportunity to thank
6 you once again everyone. Have a blessed and safe and
7 -- hope the message reaches everyone here. Thank you.

8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank, you ma'am.

9 (Applause.)

10 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: At this time we will
11 have introduction of commissioners beginning to my far
12 left with Commissioner Brown.

13 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Darryl Brown, District
14 1.

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: Willie Bell, District 4.

16 VICE CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Eva
17 Garza-Dewaelsche, At-Large and Vice Chair.

18 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: William Davis, District
19 7.

20 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Annie Holt, At-Large.

21 MS. WHITE: Madam Chairperson, you do have a
22 quorum.

23 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, ma'am.

24 At this time, commissioners, you have before
25 you the agenda for February 13, 2020.

1 COMMISSIONER BELL: So moved.

2 VICE CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Support.

3 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and
4 supported that we approve the agenda for February 13,
5 2020. Is there any discussion?

6 Those in favor?

7 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed?

9 The motion carries.

10 Commissioners, you have before you the
11 minutes from February 6, 2020. Are there any
12 corrections to the minutes?

13 Hearing none, is there a motion for approval
14 of the minutes?

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: So moved.

16 VICE CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Support.

17 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and
18 supported that we approve the minutes from February 6,
19 2020. Is there any discussion?

20 Those in favor?

21 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

22 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed?

23 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Nay.

24 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: The motion carries.

25 At this time, commissioners --

1 Okay. Ms. White, would you please introduce
2 the BOPC staff.

3 MS. WHITE: Thank you, Madam Chairperson.
4 Just before moving to the Board of Police Commissioner
5 staff introductions, Sergeant Allen Quinn is taping our
6 meeting this evening, Media Services is conducting the
7 audio and visual services and Ms. Sheila Rice is our
8 court reporter this evening.

9 And starting to my immediate right I will ask
10 the Board of Police Commissioners entire staff to stand
11 and introduce themselves.

12 MR. BROWN: Robert Brown, board staff.

13 MS. BLOSSOM: Teresa Blossom, Community
14 Relations.

15 MS. RICHARDS: Elaine Richards, board staff
16 legal assistant.

17 MR. WYRICK: Jermaine Wyrick, board attorney.

18 DR. ANDERSON: Dr. Anderson, Director of
19 Personnel.

20 MS. WHITE: Thank you Madam Chairperson.

21 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. At this time
22 I'd like to introduce Deputy Chief Bryant. I'm sorry.

23 D.C. BRYANT: Good evening, Madam Chair. I'm
24 Deputy Chief Elaine Bryant. I'm in charge of
25 Neighborhood Policing Bureau East. And with me we have

1 -- we'll start with Commander Decker.

2 COMMANDER DECKER: Commander Decker, Ninth
3 Precinct.

4 CAPTAIN RUSSELL: Captain Russell, Ninth
5 Precinct.

6 CAPTAIN WILLIAMS: Captain Williams, Tenth
7 Precinct.

8 LT. COLES: Lieutenant Coles, recruiting.

9 CAPTAIN HOPE: Captain Hope, Chief
10 Neighborhood Liaison.

11 COMMANDER GIAQUINTO: Nick Giaquinto,
12 commander of the Seventh Precinct.

13 CAPTAIN WALTON: Steve Walton, captain of the
14 Eleventh Precinct.

15 LT. GARDNER: Lieutenant Gardner, Homicide.

16 D.C. BRYANT: That's it.

17 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. At this time
18 if there are any elected officials or representatives
19 of elected officials or civic leaders please stand and
20 give your name for the record, please.

21 MR. KIMPSON: Frazier Kimpson here
22 representing State Representative Wendell Byrd.

23 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, sir.

24 Any others?

25 Thank you all for attending the meeting this

1 evening. At this time I'm going to move on to my
2 report.

3 During February and every day we celebrate
4 Black history, because Black history is American
5 history, as Dr. King has notably said. Despite the
6 obstacles we face and the challenges we've met and the
7 systematic oppression we have overcome, we have
8 significantly contributed to the advancement, growth
9 and development of this nation, but more importantly
10 Detroit's evolution.

11 Today we are home to a vibrant, rich cultural
12 phenomenon that birth and shaped American culture
13 today. Paradise Valley and Black Bottom, to name a few
14 key historical sites, were an essential part of
15 Detroit's evolution. These important sites serve as
16 Detroit's epicenter of flourishing business districts
17 and popular entertainment districts where the most
18 famous musicians, artists and supporters would travel
19 to perform, attend and socialize.

20 Although these thriving neighborhoods were
21 later demolished in the early 1960s and redeveloped
22 into freeways, African-Americans were the reason for
23 over 350 African-American owned businesses, including
24 jazz clubs, restaurants, a movie theater and the Gotham
25 Hotel, termed as the most popular Black hotel. One can

1 easily hear Ella Fitzgerald, Billie Holiday or Duke
2 Ellington, American jazz greats, perform on any given
3 night.

4 As we reflect on significant achievements in
5 Black history, we are reminded of Detroit's rich
6 history in places like Paradise Valley and Black Bottom
7 where everyone in the community knew each other. They
8 supported one another and helped each other succeed.
9 My hope today is that one day we will get back to that.
10 We're on our way. We're moving towards that, but my
11 hope is that one day we get back to that kind of
12 community.

13 We urge you to take time during Black History
14 Month and every day to reflect on those persons who
15 have made a significant impact in your life. We urge
16 you to attend any of the events in the community
17 recognizing and highlighting our story.

18 In any community effort, there are various
19 partnerships that are critically important to the
20 community's advancement, and police community relations
21 organizations are extremely important. Tonight I would
22 like to recognize Ms. Sandra Hardy, Ninth Precinct
23 Community Relations president.

24 Is Ms. Hardy here?

25 Not here, okay. So we'll move on to the rest

1 of my report. As we do every week, I want to express
2 the board's concern and support for fallen and injured
3 officers and their families. Our officers' safety and
4 citizens protection are ranked as two of the most
5 important priorities of the board. Our board receives
6 a weekly report from the department listing injured
7 officers, and I ask that the deputy chief please
8 provide us with any updates during your report.

9 The Board of Police Commissioners meets every
10 week except for Thanksgiving and Christmas holiday
11 periods. We meet at Police Headquarters every Thursday
12 at 3 p.m. except for the second Thursday of the month
13 when we meet in the community at 6:30 p.m.

14 Under the Detroit City Charter, Article 7,
15 Chapter 8, the Board of Police Commissioners is
16 empowered to provide civilian oversight and supervisory
17 control of the police department. Our board
18 investigates noncriminal citizens' complaints, monitors
19 the department operations and works with the Mayor and
20 the Chief of Police to establish police policies, rules
21 and regulations.

22 As an oversight agency, the board has brought
23 responsibility to protect the citizens, protect the
24 City of Detroit from frivolous lawsuits and create
25 policies to enforce strict adherence to department

1 policies. Additionally, the board works to eliminate
2 police misconduct, discriminatory police practices and
3 unnecessary use of force by police. The board also
4 believes in transparency, community input and
5 accountability. As a civilian oversight agency we
6 protect the rights of citizens. Our objective is to
7 increase the quality of life for residents and visitors
8 to the city of Detroit.

9 Commissioners, you have on your -- you have
10 several items, I'm sorry, for your consideration and
11 information in your board packet E-mailed to you on
12 Tuesday and also in your packet that you received
13 today.

14 Tonight we have one resolution honoring the
15 contribution of Mr. Justin Kimpson, a strong community
16 advocate here in the Ninth Precinct. At the
17 appropriate time I will ask Mr. Kimpson to come forward
18 and receive his resolution.

19 We also have two formal presentations to the
20 board on the agenda. The first is from our monthly
21 Human Resources report from Dr. Marcella Anderson,
22 Director of Police Personnel. Her report will cover
23 the recruitment processing and hiring procedures for
24 both sworn and civilian employees of the Detroit Police
25 Department. A copy of the report is in your packet.

1 Additionally, I've asked Dr. Anderson and her
2 team to provide information on the department's
3 recruitment campaign and recruitment efforts recently
4 initiated.

5 The second presentation is from Commander
6 Eric Decker and Captain Sonia Russell of the Ninth
7 Precinct who will discuss crime fighting strategies in
8 the Ninth Precinct as well as partnerships that they
9 use to deliver services within the precinct.

10 From the Chief's office I am requesting
11 updates on the citywide crime statistics and any other
12 critical issues facing the police department. I'm also
13 requesting an update on the internal investigation into
14 the Major Violators Unit and the department arresting
15 66 persons during the week of drug sales enforcement
16 measures.

17 Additionally, I'm requesting an update on the
18 recent crime incident involving the death of a
19 55-year-old woman whose body was found in her home in
20 the 15000 block of Manning Street on this past Saturday
21 and whether there are any investigative leads into this
22 matter.

23 I'm also requesting information on the former
24 officer who was recently convicted of conspiracy to
25 distribute controlled substances and whether there are

1 any additional updates the board should know in
2 connection with that initial investigation.

3 And lastly, I am requesting an update on the
4 racial incident where a Caucasian male officer used
5 racial slurs and epithets during the FaceTime call with
6 a Black male officer.

7 Today our interim board secretary will
8 provide us with various updates regarding incoming
9 correspondence. Under unfinished business, we have the
10 charter revision commission that's seeking our
11 recommendations for the upcoming revised charter.

12 Additionally, we must vote on the job
13 specifications for the positions of the secretary to
14 the board and the executive manager fiscal. I will
15 request a vote on both items at the appropriate time.

16 Also, I want to announce a few reminders.
17 For your convenience, the Office of the Chief
18 Investigator, Chief Investigator Dr. Polly McCalister,
19 will have a citizen complaint table at every meeting to
20 take citizens' complaints from those persons interested
21 in filing a citizen's complaint regarding alleged
22 police misconduct. You may visit the table and speak
23 to one of our -- one of the OCI staff members for more
24 information.

25 Lastly, please review your packets for the

1 updated 2020 board meeting calendar for further updates
2 regarding the board's 2020 board meeting community
3 meeting locations. You may also find these updates on
4 the board's website for your convenience.

5 At the end of the meeting we will have public
6 comments from the audience. The time for accepting
7 speakers' cards will be until 7:30 p.m. Please make
8 sure you print your card -- your name on a speaker's
9 card located on the back table for Mr. Robert Brown.
10 He will need your card before 7:30. We will hold each
11 speaker to the allotted two minutes.

12 At this time please place your cell phones or
13 other electronic devices on vibrate so as not to
14 interrupt our meeting.

15 And finally, in the spirit of effective
16 communication, please treat each other respectfully and
17 professional. Commissioners, please be reminded not to
18 speak until you are recognized by the Chairperson and
19 address your comments to the issues that are relevant
20 to the agenda and to be brief to ensure that we have
21 ample time for public comments.

22 For the attending audience, please note that
23 there is time on the agenda for citizen input and
24 feedback. My objective to -- this evening is to run an
25 orderly meeting, including public comments and to

1 adjourn at a reasonable time. Thank you.

2 At this time I would like to acknowledge
3 Commissioner Evette Griffie who came in a short while
4 ago.

5 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Thank you.

6 COMMISSIONER BELL: Ms. Hardy is here.

7 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay. Ms. Hardy is
8 here.

9 Ms. Hardy.

10 MS. WHITE: Excuse me, Madam Chairperson.
11 It's Ms. Handy.

12 COMMISSIONER BELL: Ms. Handy. Ms. Handy.

13 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay. I'm sorry. Ms.
14 Handy.

15 MS. HANDY: Good evening, everyone. I would
16 like to welcome the Board of Police Commissioners to
17 our very beautiful and vibrant Ninth Precinct. I want
18 to tell you that we have -- and I'm going to say this
19 every time -- the best NPOs in the whole city right
20 here and now. So if you ever want to see some good
21 relationship building come to the Ninth Precinct.
22 Welcome, guys.

23 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, Ms. Handy.

24 At this time we will go into the resolution
25 honoring Mr. Justin Kimpson.

1 Mr. Kimpson, if you could step forward,
2 please.

3 MR. KIMPSON: Good evening, everyone.

4 COMMISSIONERS: Good evening.

5 COMMISSIONER BELL: It is my honor and
6 pleasure on behalf of the board to present this
7 resolution to Mr. Justin Kimpson.

8 "Whereas Mr. Justin Kimpson, is a native
9 Detroiter passionate about making significant impacts
10 through leadership, mentorship and philanthropy. He
11 earned a Bachelor of Arts degree from Morehouse College
12 and a Master's of Education from Marygrove College.
13 The son of Frazier and Mary Kimpson, Justin is married
14 to Candace and has one daughter, Zara.

15 "And whereas Mr. Kimpson is a senior director
16 of the Ford Resource and Engagement Center, known as
17 FREC, F-R-E-C. His tenure has boosted FREC's
18 partnership activities with people and organizations
19 throughout the Ninth Precinct, with food distribution,
20 mentorship, job training, and other vital programs. He
21 collaborates with Gleaners Community Food Bank and
22 hosts expungement fairs and community movie nights.

23 "And whereas Mr. Kimpson has many volunteer
24 and mentorship roles dedicated to developing city youth
25 and the next generation of leaders. Mr. Kimpson

1 co-hosted a Brotherhood event with Chief James E.
2 Craig, Councilman Andre Spivey and Bishop Edgar Vann.
3 He also brought the Detroit Lions for a special
4 Brotherhood meeting about health and wellness. He has
5 served as an executive board member to Detroit Young
6 Professionals. Currently, he serves as a board member
7 for Black Family Development and as the National
8 Program positive narratives of Black men through
9 grassroots initiatives in communities throughout the
10 United States.

11 "DBusiness Magazine, the Michigan Chronicle,
12 Detroit Young Professionals and others have honored Mr.
13 Kimpson as a leader and star in his generation and for
14 the City of Detroit and metro region.

15 "Now, therefore, be it resolved the Detroit
16 Board of Police Commissioners, speaking on behalf of
17 the citizens of the great city of Detroit, acknowledge
18 the dedication, leadership and diligence of Mr. Justin
19 Kimpson. His service and years of committed community
20 partnership supporting the Ninth Precinct and the
21 citizens throughout the city of Detroit merit our
22 highest regards. We thank you and congratulate you,
23 Mr. Justin Kimpson, on behalf of the Board of Police
24 Commissioners.

25 Can we give him a little acknowledgement

1 there?

2 (Applause.)

3 COMMISSIONER BELL: I can't say enough.

4 I just want to say Mr. Kimpson is a natural
5 process because of your dad. He's been what we call a
6 legendary figure in the city of Detroit for -- since
7 I've been a boy. But really the 13th district and so
8 many involved. If you didn't know Frazier Kimpson,
9 then you was not involved in politics in the city of
10 Detroit. So his legacy speaks for itself. And I'm
11 just so proud that you continue on that legacy in your
12 own footsteps making your own mark on the community and
13 the city of Detroit.

14 So I just want to thank you for your service.
15 It's just been outstanding to have -- and we might have
16 to call you up, too, to get a picture, too, also and I
17 know that deputy chief's coming forward, too.

18 (Applause.)

19 D.C. BRYANT: I've got a couple things for
20 you as well. I'm going to let Captain Russell.

21 CAPTAIN RUSSELL: "A Spirit of Detroit Award
22 is presented herein as an expression of the gratitude
23 and esteem of the citizens of Detroit. Mr. Justin
24 Kimpson, in recognition of your exceptional
25 achievement, outstanding leadership and dedication to.

1 Improving the quality of life, by the City
2 Council of Detroit, Michigan." Thank you, Justin.

3 (Applause.)

4 CAPTAIN RUSSELL: It's signed by everyone on
5 City Council.

6 "The Detroit Police Department Certificate of
7 Recognition to Mr. Justin Kimpson, resident of city of
8 Detroit, in recognition for the following outstanding
9 service and cooperation. Your involvement in community
10 and services to the city of Detroit demonstrate a
11 spirit and commitment that is worthy of recognition.
12 Chief James E. Craig."

13 (Applause.)

14 CAPTAIN RUSSELL: So, Justin -- I've had an
15 opportunity to work with Justin. Justin has been very
16 influential in the Ninth Precinct. There's a lot of
17 times that we're in a crunch and he saves the day. And
18 so I appreciate you as a partner and I appreciate your
19 leadership.

20 MR. KIMPSON: Thank you.

21 (Applause.)

22 MR. KIMPSON: First of all, I'd like to say
23 thank you to this esteemed body of the Board of Police
24 Commissioners for this esteemed honor. I would like to
25 thank my parents, my lovely wife, Candace, and my

1 one-year-old daughter, Zara. I'm probably going to
2 have to take her out of here soon and get her some
3 dinner because she's all over the place.

4 But tonight, you know, I humbly accept this
5 award, but without this community, you know, I wouldn't
6 be standing here. We started this journey almost four
7 years ago at the outside of Fisher Magnet Upper
8 Academy. And, you know, it's funny I was working out
9 of the classroom and I was calling everybody and nobody
10 would call me back. And so as time went on and we
11 opened the center now everybody is coming through the
12 door. I can't keep people out of the center. And it's
13 been a true process, a testament to the community
14 members such as Sandra Turner Handy, president of the
15 Regional Park Neighborhood Association Mr. DeShawn Hurt
16 he's in the building, Captain Russell, Sergeant
17 Thirkill, the Ceasefire crew. The officers meet every
18 Thursday for almost two years in the Ford Resource
19 Engagement Center. We gave them access to the
20 gymnasium for the 70 plus high school boys that they
21 mentor every week.

22 And through that process, I was like, well,
23 what ways can I support. Immediately, you know, I
24 became best friend with the neighborhood police
25 officers. And so every year we sponsor the Police

1 Officers Night Out right here in this field. We've
2 also participated in providing free haircuts to the
3 young men who participate in the program, the Talk It
4 Up Thursdays initiative every three weeks throughout
5 the year, and we've done that for the last two years as
6 well.

7 We've also as of last year made a
8 contribution to the Detroit Public Safety Foundation to
9 support the work of that particular program. And so
10 the young men this year participated in etiquette and
11 dining training. We took the young men to Joe Muer's
12 and sat in a private dining room and showed them how to
13 tie a tie and how to handle yourself in public and all
14 of those particulars.

15 And through that work all of that is as a
16 result of the partnership with Ford Motor Company Fund,
17 which sponsors the Ford Resource Engagement Center here
18 on the east side of Detroit as well as in southwest
19 Detroit at 2826 Bagley.

20 We are very lucky in Detroit, because these
21 are the only two centers in the United States. There
22 are three internationally, in Bangkok, Romania and in
23 South Africa. But here in the United States we're
24 lucky to have the only two in America, and these
25 centers focus on creating social mobility.

1 And so we provide free food every week, legal
2 services, job search, free taxes, utility assistance.
3 The list goes on and on, in addition to providing free
4 space to our block clubs and our community members, and
5 they take advantage of it.

6 And so, you know, this award I dedicate to
7 the community members here, because without them I
8 would not be standing here today. And so lastly I
9 would say for you guys who are not aware of what we do
10 you can go to our social media at FREC. You can see
11 all of the wonderful things that we have going on. You
12 can go to our website, which is
13 www.FordFund.org/FRECEast, and you can see all the
14 information about all of the FRECs.

15 And then also the work with the Brotherhood
16 has spawned as a result of my national role as the
17 program manager for Ford Men of Courage, which is the
18 national initiative focusing on changing the narrative
19 regarding African-American men. And so this year we
20 currently have a national barbershop challenge, a
21 leadership series that's traveling the country. And
22 the Ford Motor Company Fund has also sponsored a
23 traveling exhibition about African-American men called
24 Men of Change that is traveling the country as well
25 with these other grassroot initiatives.

1 And so we've been to Cincinnati and Tacoma,
2 Washington, we're off to loss Los Angeles next. And
3 then at some point within the next year or two it's
4 coming to Detroit. So you guys get ready, because we
5 want to make sure that everybody comes out to support
6 this initiative because it's important. Thank you.

7 (Applause.)

8 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair.

9 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes, sir.

10 COMMISSIONER BELL: I move that we accept the
11 resolution of Brother Kimpson.

12 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Support.

13 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and
14 supported that we adopt the resolution honoring Mr.
15 Justin Kimpson. Is there any discussion?

16 Those in fair?

17 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

18 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed?

19 Motion carries.

20 Thank you, Mr. Kimpson, for your inspiration.
21 I aspire to do half the things that you do. And I sit
22 here and I feel like I'm a proud mother. Although,
23 I've never met you, I don't know you, I know your
24 father. But I feel so proud about the things that
25 you're doing for our community. So thank you so much.

1 (Applause.)

2 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: At this time we will
3 have the Chief of Police report from Deputy Chief
4 Bryant.

5 D.C. BRYANT: Thank you, Madam Chair. I'd
6 like to start with the --

7 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Oh, I'm sorry. I'm
8 sorry. Before -- I'm sorry for interrupting you. I
9 just want to acknowledge Commissioner Holley who came
10 in during the presentation. Thank you, sir, for
11 joining us.

12 (Applause.)

13 D.C. BRYANT: All right. I'd like to start
14 with the critically injured officers update. Officer
15 Waldis Johnson, he's still currently at Special Tree,
16 which is a rehab center. As you know, he was shot. It
17 was several years ago, and he's still at that facility.

18 Police Officer Christopher Therssen who was
19 assigned to the Third Precinct was involved in a motor
20 vehicle accident. He's still off recovering from his
21 injury. He had surgery a few months back. He's at
22 home recovering.

23 Police Officer Lemuel Sims assigned to the
24 Eighth Precinct was injured during a foot pursuit.
25 He's also off at this time recovering at home.

1 Police Officer Dattahn Wade was involved in a
2 vehicle accident when he was T-boned by a suspect.
3 He's also recovering at home.

4 Police Officer Phillippe Batoum-Bisse who is
5 assigned to the Twelfth Precinct who was injured, he
6 was shot and he was also -- that was when Officer
7 McClain was fatally injured. He's recovering at home
8 from his injuries as well, and he's had multiple
9 surgeries. He's currently off and we wish him well.

10 Police Officer Mark Robbins assigned to
11 traffic enforcement, he was injured when he was
12 rear-ended by a female driver. He's currently off at
13 home recovering from his injuries as well.

14 I'll get into the crime report. Our criminal
15 homicides are up from last year this time. We are
16 currently -- we have a 12 -- we're up 12, which is a
17 57-percent increase. Our sexual assaults are down.
18 We're down by ten, which is a 10-percent decrease.
19 Aggravated assaults are slightly up by eight percent.
20 Nonfatal shootings are up by 17 percent. We have an
21 increase of 10. Robberies are up 20 percent. We have
22 a increase of 45. And our carjackings are up. Last
23 year this time we were at 11 and now we're at 22.

24 So I would like to say that last year this
25 time -- well, last year January was extremely cold, a

1 cold month for us, and we experienced much lower
2 numbers. But with that being said we are very, very
3 persistent about making sure that we drive our crime
4 down. We have a effort in place right now.

5 And as you know our marijuana enforcement
6 effort that we have been working on it's been in effect
7 for about three weeks. I know you spoke specifically
8 to the 66 people that were arrested in regard to this
9 effort. I actually have our statistics for the three
10 weeks if you'd like me to report out on them.

11 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes, please.

12 D.C. BRYANT: So in the past three weeks
13 totally combined west side and east side we have
14 arrested a total of 123 people for felony arrests.
15 We've also confiscated 54 guns total. We've
16 confiscated 2,693 grams of marijuana, 10.6 grams of
17 heroin, 81.1 grams of cocaine, six grams of
18 methamphetamine, 275 pills.

19 So we are continuously working on this
20 effort, and we have actually seen as a result of this a
21 decrease in several areas of our crime. So we're very
22 hopeful that this is going to be something that is
23 going to help us in our effort to reduce our crime.

24 Also, I'd like to talk about a couple of the
25 other things that you wanted me to address in regards

1 to the -- in regards to the 15300 Manning, the
2 55-year-old woman that was found fatally injured in her
3 home. That case is -- it was ruled a homicide. It is
4 being investigated, and there are some very active
5 leads in that case. They do have a person of interest
6 at this time. We don't really want to speak on it, but
7 there is a person of interest and we're very hopeful
8 that that case will be closed soon.

9 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

10 D.C. BRYANT: Also, in regards to Christopher
11 Staton in regards to the investigation of Major
12 Violators and also in regards to the officer from the
13 from the ninth -- the officer from the social media
14 incident that made the racial comments, I'm going to
15 ask that Director Graveline come forward and he'll give
16 you the update regarding that.

17 MR. GRAVELINE: Good evening, honorable
18 board, through the Chair.

19 COMMISSIONERS: Good evening.

20 MR. GRAVELINE: I'll start with the Major
21 Violators --

22 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Your name for the
23 record.

24 MR. GRAVELINE: Oh, I'm sorry. Chris
25 Graveline, Director of Professional Standards.

1 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

2 MR. GRAVELINE: I'll start with the Major
3 Violators investigation so far. So we're about month
4 six of this investigation, and where we're at right now
5 we have identified approximately just in the last two
6 years 40 problematic cases. And what do I mean by a
7 problematic case? Where a search warrant was done, but
8 no one was arrested. And so it begs the question --

9 We just had an officer today plead guilty in
10 Federal Court, Michael Mosley. That's what actually
11 kicked off this entire investigation. He pled guilty
12 to bribery. And so if no one's going to jail does that
13 mean that we have other officers either taking money,
14 you know, from those search warrant operations.

15 And so what we have is a collaboration
16 between ourselves and the FBI. We've been going out.
17 We've been doing interviews on those. We've conducted
18 over 40 interviews to date on those situations. What
19 we've identified is some potentially problematic search
20 warrants. So we could have situations where we have
21 false search warrant affidavits. That takes some time
22 to run down.

23 So that's what we've been doing over the last
24 two or three months, interviews, taking a look at
25 search warrants, some of which begs -- for example, we

1 might go and get cell phone records for both the
2 suspect at the time as well as our officers at the time
3 and then take a look at if we can map out their cell
4 location data. And so that's been our investigation
5 right now.

6 Right now I would say we are still in the
7 process of identifying and investigating those cases.
8 We are only into 2018. We seized ten years' worth of
9 documents.

10 And so that's our challenge right now. We
11 have approximately 17 people working on it. I will say
12 this. Our federal partners probably work about three
13 out of five days a week with us. So they come and go.
14 But on a consistent basis we have at least seven to
15 eight DPD members working every day eight hours a day
16 on this project. So that's where we're at right now
17 with our Major Violators investigation.

18 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: All right.

19 MR. GRAVELINE: We have a Detroit police
20 officer who was sentenced to eight -- well, a former
21 Detroit police officer who was sentenced to 18 years in
22 federal prison yesterday. His name is Christopher
23 Staton. He was not a member of the narcotics section.
24 At the time that he was eventually charged by the FBI
25 and the U.S. Attorney's Office he was actually a member

1 of the Commercial Auto Theft Task Force, or CATTF.
2 However, he had fallen in with certain drug dealers,
3 and he was actually helping them shift and transport
4 narcotics. That's why he got such a stiff sentence.
5 But he was actively helping them. But that is not part
6 of our narcotics investigation that's ongoing
7 currently.

8 I believe the other case you asked about was
9 the officer who used some racially disparaging
10 comments. And this was -- just to remind everyone,
11 this happened approximately the week before
12 Thanksgiving. And we had reported out that we had
13 talked to the subject officers and a couple additional
14 officers who had some information. The investigation
15 actually took a little bit of a turn, because what one
16 of the officers reported was that this -- some of these
17 statements have been made during the context of a story
18 about arresting a carjacking suspect. And we actually
19 found that incident. Actually -- the arrest actually
20 happened over in Grosse Pointe, I believe it was Grosse
21 Pointe Parke. We've had to coordinate with the Grosse
22 Pointe Park Police Department, obtain video from there.
23 So that's why it's taken a little bit long. We had to
24 do a little bit more investigation. So it took a
25 little bit of a turn on us. I believe we have about

1 one more witness to interview, but that should be
2 wrapping up in the next couple of weeks.

3 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, sir.

4 Is that the end of your report?

5 D.C. BRYANT: Yes.

6 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioners, do you
7 have questions?

8 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: I do. So I think we
9 all share a concern about the increase in criminal
10 homicide numbers so early in the year. I guess the
11 question that I have is around root -- like do we
12 understand -- I know at some point we talked about a
13 lot of the criminal homicides are actually domestic in
14 nature. Are we seeing a shift in I want to say root
15 cause, but what they're related to, drug offenses, are
16 they domestic incidents, are they, you know ...

17 D.C. BRYANT: So what we're finding is a lot
18 of our homicides are argument based when you're talking
19 about domestic or even just relationship based, not
20 necessarily domestic, neighbor, you know, acquaintance.
21 So we are finding a lot of our homicides are either
22 argument based. But what we're not finding is we're
23 not -- we don't have a lot of gang-related homicides as
24 of right now. We're finding argument based and some
25 narcotics.

1 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Okay.

2 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Griffie,
3 are you --

4 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Yes, I'm done.

5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Davis and
6 then Commissioner Brown.

7 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Question as relates to
8 this horrible number on the carjackings. Do you have
9 general locations? Are some of these at Green Light
10 locations or is there any special effort to try to get
11 this knocked down as quickly as possible?

12 D.C. BRYANT: So again, of course, our focus
13 is to make sure that we bring this number down as
14 quickly as possible. I don't have the specifics in
15 front of me in regards to where they are, but when you
16 look at it, again fighting last year's number, it was
17 extremely cold back then, the numbers. When you look
18 at 2018 or 2017, the numbers -- of course, saying a
19 hundred percent it increases it sounds so like, oh, my
20 God, it's a hundred percent increase. So we have to
21 look at actually the numbers in regards to maybe 2018
22 and 2017.

23 So we are fighting to make sure that we bring
24 these numbers down. I can't tell you exactly where
25 they are, but I don't think anybody's here from -- is

1 anybody here from Organized Crime?

2 Anybody here from Major Crimes? Major
3 Crimes?

4 I'm sorry, but I can't tell you specifically
5 where they are right now.

6 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Can you get that
7 information and get it to the interim secretary so that
8 she can distribute it to all of us. Thank you.

9 Commissioner Davis, are you done?

10 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I'm done.

11 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay. Commissioner --

12 VICE CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: If I could just
13 add, we do have it broken down by precinct.

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: I'm looking at it.

15 COMMISSIONER BROWN: It is broken down by
16 precinct.

17 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Green Light location. I
18 got it.

19 D.C. BRYANT: Through the Chair.

20 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes.

21 D.C. BRYANT: So, I'm sorry, I'm looking at
22 the number right here. It's actually number 9 -- I'm
23 sorry. Number 4 is leading right now the city. Number
24 4 and number 8. So that would be west side. They have
25 the majority of the carjackings.

1 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

2 Commissioner Brown.

3 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Deputy Chief, I just
4 first want to thank Commander Decker and the men and
5 women of the Ninth Precinct for the handling of the
6 situation, that I had to review about a hour of video
7 on YouTube the other day. I just want to commend you
8 for your professionalism and your patience with
9 handling that situation.

10 However, it was only one point that I think
11 the gentleman involved may have had a valid point, and
12 I'm going to ask -- and I know you guys got to be on
13 top of it is that do we need to post signs around all
14 of the precincts and have gated parking? Because what
15 I saw in the video I believe this gentleman was
16 actually getting footage and taking pictures of license
17 plates at the precinct. I saw that a lot in that
18 video. And I just want to make sure that those areas
19 where officers' cars are being parked are secure. And
20 maybe we need to have some signs placed up or maybe
21 gated parking for all of the precincts that has, you
22 know, authorized personnel only and things like that.

23 D.C. BRYANT: So we are looking into that.
24 We have a legal adviser, D.C. Grant Ha. He's actually
25 in the process of not only looking at that, but

1 creating policy in regards to how to deal with these
2 situations.

3 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Okay. And also I saw
4 signs posted, paper signs, signage, I don't know if
5 it's in every precinct, about cell phone usage in the
6 precinct. I'd like to maybe see if we can get those
7 signs made up and placed in the precincts as well so
8 people know that -- I mean, there's a lot of sensitive
9 things going on in the precincts. People are in there
10 making complaints, reports, things that are going on of
11 that nature. And everyone must understand that there
12 is no videotaping inside of the precinct. If we have
13 the signs that are posted, that would probably really
14 help out a lot.

15 D.C. BRYANT: Yeah.

16 COMMISSIONER BROWN: But thank you for your
17 handling in that.

18 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other questions,
19 comments, commissioners?

20 Thank you, ma'am.

21 At this time we'll have our Human Resources
22 report by Dr. Marcella Anderson.

23 DR. ANDERSON: Good evening, honorable board.

24 COMMISSIONERS: Good evening.

25 DR. ANDERSON: I'm here to give our monthly

1 HR report. At the end of my report I'm going to ask
2 that field recruiting would give the presentation on
3 the new media recruiting campaign.

4 So for the month of January we have 2,521
5 sworn filled positions and 150 vacant positions. We
6 have 631 filled civilian positions and only 36
7 vacancies. So we're kind of chomping down at the
8 vacancies in our civilian numbers, and also our
9 vacancies for police officers are pretty low. The
10 police officers' numbers are -- actually, I think we're
11 down like maybe 41 police officers. And when I say
12 police officers I'm not counting the sergeants, the
13 lieutenants, et cetera.

14 Our stats for sworn recruiting fiscal year
15 starting fiscal year July 1, 2019 to January 31, 2020
16 we've had 3,483 people apply, 52 in process, 108 hired,
17 186 lack of interest, 1,655 temporary disqualified.
18 These people are not permanently qualified, meaning
19 that they can reapply. And then we have 461 that are
20 permanently disqualified. We have 1,021 awaiting
21 MCOLES.

22 I spoke a little bit about our new cadet
23 program, and right now we have 18 people in our cadet
24 program.

25 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Was there 19 at one

1 time? One person went through the academy already I
2 mean, started the academy?

3 DR. ANDERSON: So we had -- yes, ma'am. We
4 had 18 that originally started. One passed the
5 physical agility in the first week of the program,
6 started the program on the 21st, and he passed the
7 agility and we put him in the police academy on the
8 27th.

9 (Applause.)

10 DR. ANDERSON: So our numbers for testing,
11 for written MCOLES testing we had 114 scheduled, 63
12 appeared, 45 passed, 18 failed. For physical agility
13 we have 59 scheduled, 46 appeared, 22 passed and 24
14 failed. That 24 that failed would be offered the cadet
15 program.

16 The cadet program, just to give a summary of
17 it, is \$15 an hour. Unfortunately there's no benefits,
18 but we will pay them \$15 an hour and the position is
19 for 89 days. They will work in the precincts for a
20 half day, and the other half of the day they go to the
21 police academy and we work with them on yoga, nutrition
22 and also building strengths where they're weak at as it
23 relates to the MCOLES testing. The information about
24 the cadet program is also on our website.

25 We had 28 people graduate from the police

1 academy in January. Tomorrow we have 24 graduating
2 from the police academy. Our new hires for the month
3 of January, 28 sworn, 34 civilian, one police assistant
4 for a total of 63 hires. Detroit residency, sworn
5 members we have 570 that live in the city of Detroit.
6 For civilians we have 345 that live in the city of
7 Detroit and 32 police assistants. Attrition we lost 35
8 employees total, 29 sworn, six civilian.

9 Our FMLA and continuous intermittent numbers
10 are listed. We are also finalizing our FMLA and
11 restricted duty audit. I hope to have some information
12 to add to the pamphlet for next month.

13 Suspension. Our suspension numbers have went
14 down. We had quite a few that were suspended, that
15 retired. So we have a total of eight officers. Our
16 monthly separation, 29, and we have 563 officers that
17 are in our DROP program.

18 Now I'm going to turn it over to Officer
19 Payne and Officer Stanzy (ph) and they're going to show
20 you their recruiting campaign -- no. I'm going to turn
21 it over to the Chair.

22 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: I just want to get the
23 questions out of the way before we --

24 DR. ANDERSON: Okay.

25 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioners, do you

1 have any questions for Dr. Anderson?

2 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: I just have one
3 comment that I wanted to make. I am actually really
4 happy this month, because every month I look at this
5 report and I see the number that are attritted versus
6 the number that we brought in to see at least if we're
7 keeping up with -- we are not losing more than we're
8 getting in. This month we're one officer short based
9 on this report of, at least staying stable in terms of
10 our recruiting. When I say that, our attrition versus
11 the new officers brought in. I think that's something
12 that we should celebrate, because I have not seen that
13 happen over the last year. So I think that that's --
14 and the fact that we don't have that many vacancies.
15 Forty-one is not as much -- I've seen this number go
16 really high.

17 So I think we're making some progress in this
18 area, and I would hope that the increased officer
19 presence is going to at some point next couple months
20 positively impact some of the crime numbers that we've
21 been seeing, which are not good right now.

22 But I think this is awesome work and I'm
23 excited. I actually saw a billboard on my way here,
24 and I was pleasantly surprised, so that's great.

25 DR. ANDERSON: Through the Chair. Since the

1 recruiting campaign has been initiated we've seen an
2 uptick in applications. Some days -- we will typically
3 receive 15 applications per day. Some days we're
4 seeing 30.

5 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: And they're in Detroit
6 -- I'm sorry, Chair. They're in Detroit neighborhoods,
7 which is awesome, because I was driving right through
8 my neighborhood, I was driving on the way here, and I
9 saw some. So that's awesome.

10 DR. ANDERSON: We have the digital billboards
11 and we also have what's also called posters. So if you
12 look at some of the walls throughout the city you'll
13 see the posters, and they will change throughout the
14 year. The campaign goes into the end of the year. And
15 so for a certain period of time I think the shift will
16 take place the end of this month, and then you're going
17 to see them in your neighborhood and then we'll lose
18 them in ours. And they will just continue to rotate
19 for the remaining of the year. You'll hear them on the
20 radios and different things like that.

21 Yes, sir.

22 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

23 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, is it
24 possible, Dr. Anderson, at some point in time in the
25 school year to roll these young people out to perhaps

1 speak to the senior class or the junior class? I think
2 that interaction -- I think we had that at Western High
3 School. We went to Western High School. There was a
4 DPD officer who happened to be Hispanic graduated from
5 Western High School.

6 So when you see these faces I think would be
7 great if we can roll them out and, you know, once at
8 East English Prep or Denby High School or Osborn High
9 School I think that would help the recruiting process.
10 And I'm glad that now we have the faces of officers, a
11 not high profile person, but we have the faces of
12 people who actually they can relate to. I think that
13 was really germane to what we're trying to do here.
14 Thank you.

15 DR. ANDERSON: Yes.

16 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Dewaelsche.

17 VICE CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Madam Chair,
18 yes. Thank you.

19 Dr. Anderson, when you say posters, are you
20 talking about certain size posters?

21 DR. ANDERSON: Yes.

22 VICE CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: And are they
23 posted in the one-stop stop centers or the Detroit At
24 Work Centers?

25 DR. ANDERSON: The posters that I'm

1 referencing are actually on buildings.

2 VICE CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Oh, okay. So
3 they're big?

4 DR. ANDERSON: Yes.

5 VICE CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: But you don't
6 have anything that could be put on walls in various
7 centers?

8 DR. ANDERSON: We're actually working on
9 those now, yes. And once the officers go through the
10 presentation they're going to show the new logo, and
11 that's what we're going to put throughout the city as
12 much as we can.

13 VICE CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

15 Any other questions, commissioners?

16 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Madam Chairperson.

17 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Holley.

18 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I have two recruits,
19 and I'm going to try to bring two every month. But
20 these two, one we got him -- I got him in the --
21 already registered. I want to make sure that I'm the
22 daddy. So if there's any problem I need you to --
23 granddaddy. But will you take these for me?

24 DR. ANDERSON: Yes, sir.

25 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: If they don't show up,

1 I'll go and get them. If they don't pass the agility,
2 I will --

3 COMMISSIONER BELL: Work with them.

4 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: -- work with them. But
5 I want you to know I really want them -- I work hard
6 with these guys. They're good guys. I want to mentor
7 them, and I want -- I'm going to hold you accountable
8 to me, make me accountable to you that I do everything
9 I can to make sure they make it through this, okay.

10 DR. ANDERSON: Absolutely. I will list you
11 as the mentor, and I will make sure I that I keep these
12 within arm's reach so that you'll be updated.

13 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Thank you.

14 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, I think we
15 should applaud Commissioner Holley for first of all --
16 (Applause.)

17 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. We're really
18 for the presentation.

19 DR. ANDERSON: All right. At this time I
20 want to introduce to you -- and I do not want to take
21 Sergeant Gonzalez's thunder. These are her employees.
22 These are her team members. She's away today
23 traveling, and she prepared them. And so that we have
24 Officer Payne and Officer Stanzy. They're going to
25 give you their presentation. Thank you.

1 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

2 (Applause.)

3 OFFICER STANZY: Buenas noches. Como estas.
4 Officer Stanzy. Officer Payne is going to do the
5 presentation.

6 OFFICER PAYNE: Good evening.

7 COMMISSIONERS: Good evening.

8 OFFICER PAYNE: Board and, of course, our
9 number 9. That's where I grew up, born and raised.
10 (Applause.)

11 OFFICER PAYNE: So actually while my
12 partner's getting this set up just a little bit about
13 by myself. I've been with the department for six
14 years. I'm 26. I came on at 19. So pretty much
15 straight out of high school.

16 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: You 26?

17 OFFICER PAYNE: Yes. And actually I attended
18 Detroit Academy Arts and Science, which Commissioner
19 Jim Holley was on the board of our school. So it's
20 great to see.

21 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: So it looks like you're
22 the face of the brochure.

23 OFFICER PAYNE: I don't know who had anything
24 to do with that.

25 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Oh, you don't.

1 OFFICER PAYNE: So actually this campaign in
2 addition to what we're already doing, as I'm sure we
3 talked about before, we're out street recruiting out on
4 the streets, east side, west side every single day.
5 We're also going into every Detroit high school. So we
6 go there, we talk to our seniors, our juniors. And
7 they constantly keep in contact with myself and my
8 other partners on our team until they're able to
9 graduate to come on and join the Detroit Police.

10 So basically here with our recruiting
11 campaign, as you have seen and talked a little bit
12 about the billboards, we're constantly trying to grow
13 the department with new recruits. And right now what
14 we're doing we have billboards throughout the city,
15 digital, and I guess you would call those still
16 posters, too, still billboards throughout the city. So
17 we have the large posters, which is in each district.
18 And those are on the buildings and those are almost the
19 size of I mean just regular billboards. They're very
20 large posters.

21 Social media, of course that's one of our
22 biggest things, and now we all know that's just our
23 generation. So we're touching everything from
24 Facebook, Instagram, Snapchat, internet. I mean, it's
25 so many avenues throughout for our social media, our

1 job boards, our college boards. We're going to our
2 police academies. It's just tons of things coming in
3 with that social media.

4 And also we have the internet broadcasting.
5 So I don't know if you all -- well, maybe a lot of
6 people in here watched the Superbowl. We had actually
7 a commercial played for the Detroit Police.

8 AUDIENCE MEMBER: Really?

9 OFFICER PAYNE: Yes. So that's pretty cool.
10 CNN, that was on there. Also just Sling, if you're
11 watching Sling and, hey, Detroit Police, you might see
12 this guy come across the screen and tell you, hey, join
13 Detroit Police. So it's pretty cool to see that. I
14 know since I've been here three years that's kind of
15 the first time I saw something, you know, like that.
16 So it's really cool to see how much we're changing and
17 advancing.

18 Our news stations, pretty much what we've
19 been doing there, trying to get on the news, spread our
20 word to the community, our local channels, of course.
21 I actually just a couple of days I did FOX 2, and it
22 came on like channel -- not channel -- FOX 2, but at
23 ten o'clock and then the next couple of days they
24 replayed it. So it's pretty cool to, you know, get it
25 out on our news.

1 And also radio stations. I believe the
2 upcoming weeks we're going to be doing some radio
3 stations. I know we have been talking lot about that.
4 So that way they have like podcasts and just little
5 talk shows and other things that we'll be able to
6 spread the word to our community through the ears if
7 they're not watching TV.

8 So this here I'm sure we should see this a
9 lot on like the Green Light locations. This is our
10 logo. This is our branding here. So as you all know
11 for the last, you know, recent years we have not had
12 any constant logo that you just see and be like, hey,
13 you know what, that's Detroit Police or that's just
14 recruiting. So this here is going to be here and it's
15 here to say. I think it's pretty cool. I like it.
16 Spirit of Detroit and with the Detroit Police badge.
17 So I think that's a real great logo here for us. So
18 we're going to be using that, and you're going to
19 continue to see it, so ...

20 These here are just some of the locations for
21 the billboards, the posters throughout the city, east
22 side, west side, over freeways, in the community. I
23 mean, I know you can -- it's one that's off of like Van
24 Dyke and Hillsdale, which happens to be me, but it's
25 right in the middle of the city. So, you know, it's

1 really cool to see I get all my friends call me like,
2 "Hey, I see you on the billboard." So it's really
3 great to see. And we're going to keep pushing them and
4 they're going to change throughout the year for the
5 different locations.

6 This is just some of the more locations.
7 These are the billboards. So Ninth Precinct we have
8 Officer D. Wade, mine's, J. Payne, Eighth Precinct,
9 Officer Shaw, Officer Sampson from the Sixth Precinct.
10 So they will -- like I said, these are throughout the
11 city, throughout the community. And, of course, all
12 the pictures were taken in the community, so ...

13 These are our updated brochures. So pretty
14 much we changed them up. We've got a couple different
15 officers in them. A lot of good information, our
16 contact information, all the requirements, the fitness
17 requirements. Everything is in these brochures. So
18 what we've been doing when we go out in the street
19 recruiting or, you know, sometime on the way home when
20 you stop in the gas station, set some in there. And we
21 get a lot of calls and response from our social media
22 and our phone calls through these brochures.

23 This here is one of our commercials that we
24 are playing, trying to get some volume in here.

25 (Commercial played.)

1 OFFICER PAYNE: So actually this is just one
2 of the commercials. I must say, I think that's like
3 the best one, right.

4 (Applause.)

5 OFFICER PAYNE: But actually it's three more,
6 three more, one that's like a 15-second clip that
7 you'll see going through the social media and about two
8 more 45-second ones just like this, just with different
9 officers doing different things. So we're constantly
10 going to see different videos being sponsored
11 throughout the internet reaching thousands of people.

12 And here this is our new website, our new
13 link that's going to just one click and it sends you
14 straight to our application online. Like I tell
15 everybody, it takes five minutes. You stay at home
16 chillin'. You decide you want to do a job application,
17 you click that link, type it in, boom, the application
18 is right in front of you. You can do everything from
19 your phone. So that's pretty cool.

20 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

21 OFFICER PAYNE: No problem. Thank you.

22 (Applause.)

23 OFFICER PAYNE: Any questions for me?

24 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: No question, but I
25 just want to commend you on this amazing work. I think

1 this is exactly where we need to go. I'm so excited to
2 just post it on my own social media and see what people
3 think about it. I think it's going to help us to
4 recruit younger police officers as well.

5 COMMISSIONER BELL: You've got social media.
6 Them young people --

7 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Of course I have
8 social media.

9 And I just think that your presentation was
10 awesome. I love seeing young, African-American men in
11 the police force. They say that young men your age in
12 particular are some of the toughest on the street, but
13 you prove that's not always the case.

14 OFFICER PAYNE: Yes, ma'am.

15 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: So thank you for your
16 service.

17 OFFICER PAYNE: Thank you. Thank you.

18 (Applause.)

19 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Holley and
20 then Commissioner Bell.

21 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Madam Chairperson, I
22 want to make sure -- I don't want to sound -- other
23 than I want to help. But I have a billboard,
24 electronic billboard at Davison and the Lodge. I'll
25 donate that to you for one month, okay. And then the

1 other thing ...

2 (Applause.)

3 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: And then we have our
4 own network on Comcast. If you give me the commercial,
5 I will be able to -- I will play that, you know,
6 forever.

7 OFFICER PAYNE: Yes, sir. Thanks.

8 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I really want --

9 (Applause.)

10 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I want to make sure on
11 behalf of the board, not me, but all 11 of us, we want
12 to make sure you know we're doing everything we can to
13 help. So if you give this information to me I can get
14 it up for you for March, for the whole month of March.
15 It's on Woodward and the Davison, and it's the top of
16 the line.

17 OFFICER PAYNE: We appreciate it. Thank you.

18 (Applause.)

19 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair.

20 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes.

21 COMMISSIONER BELL: I just want to say we
22 finally got it right in terms of marketing, but I want
23 the community to take one more step. This is a budget
24 year for the City of Detroit. We all saw that \$40,000
25 a year. As you well know, the council is the final

1 authority in reference to the budget, because they can
2 override the Mayor's budget. We need to bombard the
3 council people and let them know that these officers
4 need more money. Can we do that?

5 (Applause.)

6 COMMISSIONER BELL: Can you call your council
7 people and let them know they need a salary boost, find
8 the money. I hear that one year ago that campaign
9 we're going to "fix the damn roads." They haven't
10 fixed the darn roads yet. I say fix these officers by
11 giving them a pay raise that's worthy of their time.

12 (Applause.)

13 COMMISSIONER BELL: If we can do that because
14 they're doing their part, and they need a boost in
15 salary. I know the Mayor went all out, but this is a
16 budget year. They need to hear from you. This is your
17 community. If you think DPD is important, then let's
18 boost their salary through the right people. Contact
19 them.

20 But I want to say one more issue that's dear
21 to my heart. Reverend Holley, Commissioner Griffie and
22 Dewaelsche and Holt, they are appointed to this board
23 and it's been an issue trying to divide us by elected
24 and appointees. But I say to you they bring resources
25 to this board that perhaps we don't get through the

1 electoral process. I want to commend them in reference
2 to their commitment to this board and to the city of
3 Detroit, because that is an extraordinary step that we
4 have that type of diversity on this board.

5 So don't buy into the hype. Let's support
6 our commissioners, elected or appointed, because
7 Commissioner Holley just made a major step, social
8 media. Come on. This is what it's all about, working
9 together, right, working together.

10 (Applause.)

11 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, Madam Chair.

12 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, Commissioner.

13 Any other questions, comments?

14 Commissioner Dewaelsche.

15 VICE CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Madam Chair, I
16 just want to make sure that whenever you do get those
17 poster signs that are office type that you can place on
18 walls and brochures you should have them sent to the
19 Detroit At Work Centers. We have eight across the
20 city. So people are coming in for employment all the
21 time. Thank you.

22 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

23 Thank you very much. Job well done. Thank
24 you.

25 OFFICER PAYNE: Thank you.

1 (Applause.)

2 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: At this time we'll have
3 the Ninth Precinct report by Commander Decker and
4 Captain Russell.

5 COMMANDER DECKER: Good evening, through the
6 Chair. Eric Decker, Commander of the Ninth Precinct.

7 COMMISSIONERS: Good evening.

8 COMMANDER DECKER: Good evening, Chair.

9 First, I'd like to extend -- unfortunately,
10 he's not here, Mr. Byron Spivey. I've got to throw a
11 great big thanks out to him. He's not only been --
12 he's the director here at Heilmann. He's been a part
13 of number 9 for as long back as I can remember. I'm
14 pushing 20 years back and forth from number 9. But,
15 you know, this is a great place, not only for the kids.
16 They've got a swimming pool out there. It's an
17 incredible place, the gym, safe place for the kids to
18 come, and it's also part of our home of number 9. A
19 lot of our community events are held here. We do our
20 National Night Out here, Easter Egg Drop. Ms. Mills
21 who's representing, but Mr. Spivey has just been a huge
22 partner. So I just want to say thank you.

23 (Applause.)

24 COMMANDER DECKER: So looking at crime say
25 the Ninth Precinct definitely has been heading in the

1 right direction the last few years. Last year we
2 experienced some of the lowest numbers in violent crime
3 in the last several probably decades, especially as it
4 relates to shootings. We had 103 nonfatal shootings.
5 It's a huge number, but that number is down from a 144
6 nonfatals a year before. If you go back to 2015,
7 there's 201 nonfatal shootings in this precinct alone.
8 Last year down again in homicides, 36 compared to 40,
9 and going back to '15 it was almost 50.

10 So our numbers continue to go down,
11 especially the violent -- the gun-related crime.
12 Robberies have been down. Carjackings last year about
13 50 percent down. A lot of that is attributed to Green
14 Lights.

15 We're doing pretty good this year as far as
16 overall numbers, but we have seen some upward numbers
17 in our shootings. Unfortunately, fatals and nonfatals.
18 We hope that levels out and continues in the trend. We
19 want to break that hundred mark in there.

20 Where does that -- or why is that coming
21 there? I think we're at the precinct here very gun
22 focused. It's our biggest thing here. Our crime
23 reduction is removing illegal guns from the street and
24 violent offenders that use those guns. Done that
25 through strong partnerships with many entities.

1 Internally we work very well with Homicide, Gang
2 Intelligence, Major Violators, those type of entities.
3 We have some great external partners.

4 We have a Ninth Precinct shooting team here
5 that works hand in hand in Wayne County prosecutors on
6 a daily basis. So in the last couple years we've seen
7 our closure rate go up by 12 to 15 percent, which means
8 we're taking more people that actually use a gun and
9 shoot people off the streets.

10 A great working relationship with the
11 Michigan Department of Corrections. We have an
12 embedded agent at the Ninth Precinct. Sometimes I
13 forget he works for them and not me. I kind of kid
14 with his boss every day when I see her. Just a great
15 guy who goes out for us. Great teamwork in there.

16 Another great partnership that we have is
17 with the Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms, ATF. Number 9
18 last year received a grant for the Project Safe
19 Neighborhood. It allows us to work with the ATF on a
20 daily basis. It also brings in the federal resources
21 and the federal prosecution in there. Again, to remove
22 guns and violent offenders from the precinct.

23 This year we're really focused -- continuing
24 to focus on guns. We're especially looking at our
25 investigative units. I think in the past we've fallen

1 down on that side of it. So we're putting everything
2 we can. If you go out and use a gun in this precinct
3 or in this city alone, we're going to do everything we
4 can to identify you and remove you from the streets.

5 A lot of that gun removal comes from
6 aggressive patrol out there, but a lot of it comes from
7 technology. It's kind of funny that Officer Payne's up
8 here talking about Sling and all sorts of stuff that I
9 haven't even heard of.

10 So a couple years ago at a Mayors meeting the
11 Mayor's like, "Hey, how can we help you?" I said, you
12 know what, give me some college kid or something, some
13 youngster like Payne over there to go out and look at
14 all the social media minded. The Mayor didn't go out
15 and get college kids. He went out and got some of the
16 smartest people I've ever seen. We're talking people
17 with masters, double masters, Ph.D.s. And I was
18 fortunate enough to get one of the best, who's actually
19 sitting out here tonight, Mr. Zack Benton, my Ninth
20 Precinct Crime Analysis.

21 I don't want to get deep into everything he
22 does. I mean, I think we're all aware from the
23 youngster over here talking about everything that's on
24 social media. But he's not only minding social media,
25 he's looking into our crime reports. So it went from

1 this little dream of getting a college kid to look at
2 computers so my officers don't do it to somebody as
3 smart as Zack that -- every Tuesday we have a crime
4 briefing that he's giving us just tons of information,
5 but it's not just us. I'm sitting there with my
6 partners, the ATF, the federal prosecutors, Wayne
7 County prosecutors. So I want to throw a shout-out to
8 Zack who's sitting out here. Just incredible
9 information.

10 (Applause.)

11 COMMANDER DECKER: And along with that
12 technology, NIBIN, National Integrated Ballistic
13 Information Network, basically shell casings and guns,
14 matching those up. Our NIBIN unit's taken off in the
15 last couple years. Number 9 was a pilot for that. And
16 we're just getting case matching every day, giving us a
17 direction to go in following up on those guns.

18 Some other technology coming, just this week
19 it's kind of a mess at number 9, but they broke ground
20 for the in-precinct based realtime crime center. That
21 will be up in a couple months. Installation of the
22 camera corridors coming along Seven Mile and Gratiot
23 corridor. It's going to be awesome also.

24 Gunshot detection devices technology is
25 coming back to number 9. We hope to have that up in

1 probably the fall-ish or so. We're using a lot of
2 license plate readers. Green Light partners, can't say
3 enough about them. We're up to 70 in the precinct.

4 And just -- those are a couple of the tools.
5 We'll take them all. We're take our officers out
6 there. We'll take whatever technology we get, because
7 it's all about removing guns. Every shooting that I've
8 seen has a gun involved. Unfortunately, most of them
9 have an illegal gun involved. It's taking that illegal
10 gun out before the shooting happens.

11 But, you know, that's the unfortunate side of
12 the house. Our law enforcement partnerships it doesn't
13 work without engaging the community. One of the best
14 communities out here, the Ninth Precinct in the city.

15 Here to talk about some of the highlights
16 with our community partners, my partner, Captain Sonia
17 Russell.

18 (Applause.)

19 CAPTAIN RUSSELL: Good afternoon, board. I'm
20 Captain Sonia Russell. First thing I want to do is I
21 want to acknowledge the NPOs. Can the NPOs please
22 stand. I know you're here. Don't be shy.

23 (Applause.)

24 CAPTAIN RUSSELL: The Ninth Precinct NPOs do
25 an amazing job, I mean just city-wide, period. NPOs

1 are great and they do a fantastic job. And I couldn't
2 get any of these things done without their commitment
3 to duty. So thank you for what you guys do.

4 First and foremost, we continue to have a
5 social worker and domestic violence advocate on staff
6 at our precinct. I also want to thank Captain Keith
7 Williams. He served as the captain before me at the
8 Ninth Precinct. And we had a couple of citizens who
9 couldn't afford to get PPOs served, and he came out of
10 his own pocket and paid for it. And so because he did
11 that, got the right people and I got a thousand dollars
12 for some citizens who may need PPOs served. So now we
13 have an account for that and we're drawing funding for
14 that. The Ninth Precinct has a large domestic violence
15 community and Scout 97. So thank you, Captain
16 Williams, for your contribution.

17 (Applause.)

18 CAPTAIN RUSSELL: We continue with our
19 mentoring and supporting our SCOREs (ph) program by
20 providing education and training on life issues. Of
21 course, some of the things our NPOs have done this
22 year, gun safety from Bringard headstart (ph), zoo
23 trips with our seniors, East Outer Drive clean-up with
24 Camp Restored, of course Trunk Or Treat, National Night
25 Out, Police Week, math fair for headstart programs and,

1 of course, reading to children at Brilliant Detroit
2 Youth Literacy.

3 Some of the current things that we're doing
4 and that we're currently doing is a book drive that we
5 had early this year. We issued out a department
6 teletype and reached out to the community. We were
7 told that Detroit Public Schools had a shortage on
8 elementary school children books. So we had 1,156
9 donated.

10 (Applause.)

11 CAPTAIN RUSSELL: One of the other things we
12 did this year is we had our first domestic violence
13 luncheon for survivors. I talked about how Scout 97
14 has the largest area. So we wanted to give them some
15 support and kind of build on that partnership as well,
16 especially with having an advocate and a social worker
17 working hand in hand with us at the Ninth Precinct.

18 Some of our current initiatives that we're
19 working on, on February 22nd we're having a active
20 shooter training at Greater Mount Zion Missionary
21 Baptist Church. That's going to be from 1:00 to 3:30.
22 And I wanted to focus on that, because of course with a
23 lot of the church shootings we have a lot of churches
24 throughout the city and within the Ninth Precinct. And
25 we think it's very important to make sure that our

1 citizens that attend church are safe. So with that
2 being said, we're going to offer active shooter
3 training at that location on February 22nd.

4 We're also going to be having a police and
5 pancakes breakfast. It's March 6. And, of course,
6 everybody on the board is welcome to come. But it's on
7 March 6 and that is for a community collaboration
8 that's going to be headed up by Sergeant Marcus
9 Thirkill who is in charge of the Brotherhood and
10 Ceasefire.

11 Additionally, once again partner up with
12 Commander Eric Ewing and Captain Keith Williams. We're
13 going to partner up with them and do our first Senior
14 Citizen Ball on March 27th. And that's going to be at
15 the Salvation Army on 3000 Conner, and that's going to
16 be on March 27th from 5:00 to 9:00.

17 So I want to talk a little bit about this
18 current strategy that we're working. It's called
19 Spring Forward For Advancement. And what it is -- when
20 I first got to the Ninth Precinct I wanted to do a
21 overview of the demographic makeup of the Ninth
22 Precinct community. And so I reached out to Wayne
23 State to get some information. This information
24 revealed that 11.3 percent of the population have a
25 ninth to twelfth grade and/or no diploma education. It

1 also told me that 2.2 percent of the population have
2 less than a ninth grade education within this precinct.
3 This concerned me. And so I reached out to Detroit
4 Public Schools district adult education to find out was
5 there a connection with illiteracy and, of course, it
6 was.

7 With that being said, serving in a leadership
8 role at the Ninth Precinct, one of the most violent
9 precincts in the city, I believe that a lack of
10 education and reading ability contribute to an increase
11 in crime. Therefore, we looking to partner and serve
12 this community by providing a socioeconomical
13 perspective to improve the quality of life and decrease
14 crime in our community.

15 So this event is focused on recruitment of
16 adult learners who want to learn how to read. This
17 fair will be -- have testimonial speakers. And what do
18 we mean by testimonial speakers? People who have been
19 in their shoes, because, of course, we can't ask people
20 who don't know how to read to come in because they
21 might feel ashamed or embarrassed. So to have people
22 who have graduated from the GED program or people who
23 can't read to show up in support that's what we plan on
24 doing to make it a easier transition.

25 They will have the free same day reading

1 testing. So you can come in, test for reading, you'll
2 get your scores the same day. So whether you read at
3 third grade level, the fourth grade level, you'll know
4 right then and there.

5 We'll have tables on-site, programs such as
6 Reading Works, Dominican Literally and, of course,
7 adult education. We'll have a lunch. We'll have GED
8 testing available and dyslexia testing.

9 And so these resources are for us at the
10 police department to help citizens transform. The days
11 of just making arrests and locking people up, that's
12 over now. You know, it's 20 years later and it's time
13 for us to look at what the community needs and how can
14 we help the community rehabilitate back into the
15 community.

16 (Applause.)

17 CAPTAIN RUSSELL: So I believe that this
18 program is just a steppingstone. I've been meeting
19 with the superintendent, and I definitely want to give
20 credit to her. The deputy superintendent, Ms. Alycia
21 Meriweather, and Ms. Brenda Belcher who's assistant
22 superintendant and Leonard Samborski who runs our Adult
23 Ed East right here on Lappin and Seven Mile. They have
24 been instrumental in helping me set up this board,
25 because, you know, I'm from law enforcement. I don't

1 know nothing about education, and if I don't know I'll
2 get the right people in the room so I can know.

3 So we've had some conversations. They've
4 been very supportive, and we've been meeting every
5 month to push this program out. And I'm happy to say
6 that this is our first steppingstone. We're go to put
7 out some media. We're going to try to get on the radio
8 and really promote this program to get some adult
9 readers out, because of course what we want to do is
10 make 48205 better.

11 (Applause.)

12 CAPTAIN RUSSELL: And so lastly, but not
13 least, we continue with our Brotherhood efforts. As
14 you know, Mr. Kimpson talked about it. We continue
15 with the East Side Talkative Thursday, which is
16 basically mentoring males 14 to 18 at the Ford Rec
17 Center. That started in 2018. Last year Sergeant
18 Thirkill was here. He gave you a report, if you
19 remember. But, if not, we started with 10 to 15 young
20 males in the Ninth Precinct. The end of 2019 we had 50
21 to 60 young males.

22 Some of our mentors have been Garlin
23 Gilchrist, Pastor Winans, Bishop Edgar Vann, Councilman
24 Andre Spivey, Judge Kenneth King and Detroit Lions
25 football players.

1 So at this time I want to invite the
2 Ceasefire team, I have some certificates for them, up
3 to thank them, because they partner with us on the
4 Brotherhood, and without them we couldn't get this
5 done.

6 Chaplain Mark Clark.

7 (Applause.)

8 CAPTAIN RUSSELL: Pastor Jacqueline Wilson.

9 (Applause.)

10 CAPTAIN RUSSELL: Chaplain Samuel Wilson.

11 (Applause.)

12 CAPTAIN RUSSELL: Chaplain Richard Small.

13 (Applause.)

14 CAPTAIN RUSSELL: Rayshon Edmond (ph),
15 Ceasefire.

16 (Applause.)

17 CAPTAIN RUSSELL: And one of the best coaches
18 in the world, George Ward, Ceasefire.

19 (Applause.)

20 CAPTAIN RUSSELL: Sheryl Jones who's director
21 of Detroit Youth and Violence Prevention Initiative.

22 (Applause.)

23 CAPTAIN RUSSELL: Bishop Daryl Harris, faith
24 outreach director.

25 (Applause.)

1 CAPTAIN RUSSELL: Quincy Smith, Ceasefire
2 outreach director.

3 (Applause.)

4 CAPTAIN RUSSELL: Sincere Attasi (ph),
5 Ceasefire.

6 (Applause.)

7 CAPTAIN RUSSELL: Shayla Zimmerman,
8 Ceasefire.

9 (Applause.)

10 CAPTAIN RUSSELL: And Lawan Thompson (ph),
11 Ceasefire.

12 (Applause.)

13 COMMISSIONER BELL: Can we formulate a
14 picture, Madam Chair? Ms. Blossom is going to take the
15 photo. I think the photographer --

16 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Can you all come up here
17 so we can take a picture, a group picture of you all,
18 please. Thank you.

19 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.

20 MS. BLOSSOM: Everyone ready? Thank you.

21 (Applause.)

22 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Captain Russell, are you
23 all set?

24 CAPTAIN RUSSELL: Yes.

25 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: All right. Thank you.

1 Thank you all for the work that you do.

2 At this time we'll have questions.

3 Commissioner Holt.

4 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Okay. Thank you.

5 Commander Decker, you indicated earlier that you
6 received a grant, a grant. Now, that money came
7 directly to the Ninth and from where did it come,
8 through council or ...

9 COMMANDER DECKER: That's the DOJ, bureau of
10 the DOJ. It's a grant shared by Wayne County, federal
11 prosecutors, ATF, Ninth Precinct, Michigan State
12 University as the educational grant we applied to
13 through the bureau of justice and received.

14 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Again, so the Ninth
15 applied for the grant?

16 COMMANDER DECKER: I would say that the
17 department.

18 VICE CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Is it the Weed
19 and Seed Program? No?

20 COMMANDER DECKER: No, not anymore. That was
21 close at one time. This is through the bureau --
22 Department of Justice.

23 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Oh, okay.

24 COMMANDER DECKER: Project Safe
25 Neighborhoods.

1 COMMISSIONER HOLT: And that's --

2 COMMANDER DECKER: In the Eighth Precinct
3 prior, several years prior, ATF, us, Wayne County,
4 federal prosecutors, Michigan State.

5 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Okay. Thank you for
6 sharing.

7 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Bell.

8 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, I just want
9 to say this is real criminal justice reform. What you
10 just witnessed tonight is unique of everyday people
11 doing extraordinary things to fight crime. And that is
12 reality when you're talking about the reading program
13 and all that. That's uplifting the community and
14 driving crime down. I just want to thank you for what
15 we have witnessed tonight. We --

16 (Applause.)

17 COMMISSIONER HOLT: One other comment,
18 please.

19 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Holt.

20 COMMISSIONER HOLT: And, Captain Russell,
21 when you were explaining the various strategies you're
22 using to help with domestic violence, the use of guns,
23 and you said that you needed to try to rehab and stop
24 locking up people, that's powerful. That's a very
25 powerful statement, and thank you for sharing.

1 CAPTAIN RUSSELL: Thank you, ma'am.

2 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other questions?

3 Thank you very much. Thank you.

4 (Applause.)

5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: At this time we'll have
6 the secretary's report from the interim board
7 secretary.

8 MS. WHITE: Thank you, Madam Chairperson.

9 Honorable board, good evening.

10 COMMISSIONERS: Good evening.

11 MS. WHITE: Please refer to Section 7 of your
12 packet for the following incoming correspondence. The
13 Board of Police Commissioners received a letter from
14 the Chief of Police, Chief Craig, regarding the request
15 for a change of duty status to administrative leave
16 without pay, but with medical benefits for Police
17 Officer Joseph Walker, badge 257, assigned to the
18 Eighth Precinct. And notifications have been made to
19 the DPOA and we are awaiting a response from them
20 regarding the proposed hearing date.

21 And the second and last item is the DPD's
22 facial recognition report. The board received report
23 number 15 for this week.

24 And that concludes my report at this time.

25 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

1 Questions for interim board secretary,
2 commissioners?

3 Thank you. At this time we will move to
4 unfinished business. And, commissioners, we have
5 several recommendations to the Detroit Charter Revision
6 Committee. At this time -- I think there's some
7 language for me somewhere.

8 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Yes.

9 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair.

10 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner.

11 COMMISSIONER BELL: I think that attorney to
12 the board, Wyrick, would conduct this process then we
13 can move these items right along.

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. Sounds good
15 to me.

16 COMMISSIONER BELL: Okay. Thank you.

17 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

18 ATTORNEY WYRICK: Good evening, through the
19 Chair. May it please this honorable body, my name is
20 Jermaine Wyrick. I'm the board attorney. As has been
21 previously discussed at a few BOPC meetings at this
22 point, this year the board will be making
23 recommendations to the Detroit Charter Commission in
24 terms of specific charter provisions that are
25 applicable to the Detroit Board of Police Commission.

1 If you turn to the very first suggestion, and
2 as it was just stated, I just facilitate this. The
3 board makes the proper motions. The first idea is
4 whether or not the Board of Police Commission should
5 recommend to the City of Detroit Charter Commission
6 that the BOPC must approve all appointments and
7 promotions by the Chief of Police of the Detroit Police
8 Department.

9 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Is there a motion?

10 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: I think we should
11 just --

12 COMMISSIONER BELL: Well, we have to do them
13 item by item.

14 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Oh, oh.

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: I so move, Madam Chair,
16 that we --

17 VICE CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Support.

18 COMMISSIONER BELL: I'm sorry.

19 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and
20 supported that we ...

21 VICE CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: I don't think
22 you have to repeat it, just --

23 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and
24 supported that we support the recommendation to -- hold
25 on.

1 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Approve all
2 appointments.

3 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: All appointments and
4 promotions -- thank you -- by the Chief of Police of
5 the Detroit Police Department.

6 Those in favor -- is there any discussion?

7 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yeah, Madam Chair.

8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Brown.

9 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Just a quick question
10 about, you know, the promotions. Police officers being
11 promoted to the rank of sergeant or lieutenant is
12 awarded to them through their contract in the testing
13 procedure. So I don't think -- I mean, I think the
14 language here needs to really change. I understand
15 about the ones for corporal and different things like
16 that, but I think these are specific to the officers
17 that have tested and earned that right for their names
18 to go on those lists.

19 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: We still approve those
20 promotions.

21 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yeah. And, Madam Chair,
22 the charter speaks to the exam for sergeant and
23 lieutenant, but as we well know we are addressing the
24 issue above that and all the areas, the descriptions
25 being promotion and appointment. So we're clarifying

1 that it covers both areas, as you well know.

2 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes. Any other
3 discussion?

4 Those in favor?

5 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

6 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed?

7 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Nay.

8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Motion carries.
9 Mr. Wyrick.

10 ATTORNEY WYRICK: Idea number 2 right below
11 this is the recommendation that the term limits of an
12 appointed commissioner be reduced to four years.
13 Currently it's five years.

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Is there a motion to
15 approve?

16 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: So moved.

17 COMMISSIONER BELL: Support.

18 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and
19 supported that we adopt the recommendation to the
20 Detroit Charter Commission for term limits of appointed
21 commissioners be reduced to four years. Is there any
22 discussion?

23 Those in favor?

24 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

25 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed?

1 Motion carries.

2 ATTORNEY WYRICK: Number 3 relates to the
3 meetings. Currently the meetings are weekly. This
4 would actually reduce the meetings to being biweekly,
5 unless a special meeting is called by the Chair.

6 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: So moved.

7 COMMISSIONER BELL: Second.

8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and
9 supported that the BOP meetings -- the recommendation
10 to the Detroit Charter Commission will be that the BOPC
11 meetings be biweekly unless a special meeting is called
12 by the Chair. Is there any discussion?

13 Those in favor?

14 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Madam Chairperson.

15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Discussion.

16 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I really need to know.

17 In other words, my experience here, I mean things
18 happen in the police department so quick. And two
19 weeks out it could be -- and I don't know -- you say
20 you can call the special meetings. And then we talk
21 about in the budget that they're going to try to give a
22 little compensation. I just feel like -- I know
23 everybody's busy. I just feel like we ought to be -- I
24 think we ought to be here every week, because I feel
25 like it's too much going on in this city. And to have

1 this every -- twice a month we might miss something or
2 will not be --

3 So that's my feeling. That's my unreadiness,
4 that's all, but if you want to --

5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

6 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, I would be
7 support of the motion that day-to-day operation is by
8 the Chief of Police. And this board is not even a
9 part-time board. It is a board that deals specific
10 duties and responsibility of the charter. So those
11 issues we can address. If there's a need for us to
12 convene, the Chair has that flexibility to call the
13 meeting.

14 But no other board meets weekly in the city
15 of Detroit or probably the state of Michigan like we
16 meet. And we are not a even part-time board in terms
17 of commitment. And all other commitments that we
18 engage the department, we have more than enough on our
19 plate as it is versus coming together as a board. And
20 that's -- we have a staff who will keep us informed.

21 But I want to say once again, the Chief is
22 day-to-day, and I can't think of any emergencies that
23 the Chief of Police cannot handle and that we will not
24 have an impact on. We deal with policy, budget,
25 administration process. We don't deal with emergency

1 situations at all.

2 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Madam Chairperson, I
3 don't want to be argumentative, because I know
4 Mr. Brown -- Bell has seniority and has experience. I
5 just say I feel like that -- not just with the drug
6 thing. I mean, it's just so much going on. And this
7 is the most important job. We're more important than
8 the City Council when we overview the police
9 department.

10 And I think that we owe it to the community
11 to do the dealings of the work. And I hear Mr. Bell
12 and I respect him, but I do feel like that the city --
13 I feel like we're more important than the City Council
14 based upon the fact that we're over 3,000 employees and
15 represent 800,000 people in this city. And I feel like
16 we ought to be here and make sure oversight is done
17 properly and efficiently. That's my thought, but we
18 can move on.

19 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other discussion?
20 Those in favor?

21 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

22 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed?

23 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Opposed.

24 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Opposed.

25 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Opposed.

1 COMMISSIONER BROWN: No.

2 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Did you record all the
3 names?

4 MS. WHITE: Yes. I have Commissioner Holt,
5 Commissioner Davis, Commissioner Holley and
6 Commissioner Brown in opposition.

7 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: So there's a tie. The
8 motion fails.

9 ATTORNEY WYRICK: Idea number 4 relates to a
10 recess currently under the charter of the Board of
11 Police Commission recesses for Christmas and
12 Thanksgiving breaks. This was actually added, a summer
13 vacation recess during the month of August.

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those in favor?
15 I'm sorry. Commissioner Griffie.

16 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: So moved.

17 COMMISSIONER BELL: Support.

18 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and
19 supported that we recommend to the Detroit Charter
20 Commission the BOPC meetings will take place -- take a
21 summer vacation recess in August. Is there any
22 discussion?

23 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yeah, Madam Chair.

24 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Brown.

25 COMMISSIONER BROWN: I can't recall the

1 dates, but do we typically go to --

2 COMMISSIONER HOLT: September.

3 COMMISSIONER BROWN: For what? The NACOLE
4 conference?

5 COMMISSIONER HOLT: September.

6 COMMISSIONER BROWN: All right. Because I
7 couldn't remember the date. Okay.

8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other discussion?

9 Those in favor?

10 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

11 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed?

12 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Opposed.

13 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Opposed.

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Motion carries.

15 ATTORNEY WYRICK: Idea number 5 relates to
16 the current composition whether or not we should --
17 whether or not the BOPC should maintain four appointed
18 and seven elected commissioners.

19 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: So moved.

20 VICE CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Support.

21 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and
22 supported that we recommend to the Detroit Charter
23 Commission that the BOPC maintain four appointed, seven
24 elected commissioners.

25 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: What is it now, Madam

1 Chairperson?

2 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: The same.

3 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Is there any discussion?

4 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yeah, Madam Chair.

5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Brown.

6 COMMISSIONER BROWN: So with this item here
7 and item number 15 there's a conflict here where here
8 you're asking for a motion to have four appointed and
9 seven elected, and then we go down here and it's asking
10 to be reduced to nine with two at-large and seven by
11 district.

12 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: I think that they put
13 all the recommendations, whether it was in conflict or
14 not.

15 ATTORNEY WYRICK: That's correct. We tried
16 to encompass everyone's ideas.

17 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Madam Chair.

18 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner.

19 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: As an appointed
20 member, I do want to echo statements that -- I'm
21 appreciative of the statement that Commissioner Bell
22 made earlier just to say that I have -- in my time on
23 this board I have watched and respected both the
24 elected and appointed commissioners and believe that
25 everybody brings a very diverse skill set. And there

1 may be I think -- I think I know that there's value in
2 having people who may not have had the opportunity to
3 run for this office be present on this board, because I
4 think it helps the community. And it is, like I said,
5 a volunteer job so it's not paid. And then in that
6 vein I just really believe that there's a lot of breath
7 and it's better for the community if we have appointed
8 -- as a citizen of the city, I would want to have the
9 best representation possible and I think that this
10 gives us that.

11 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

12 Any other discussion?

13 Those in favor?

14 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed?

16 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Opposed.

17 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Motion carries.

18 ATTORNEY WYRICK: Idea number 6 on the next
19 page, which is the top of Page 2, recommends that the
20 BOPC change their annual election from July when it's
21 currently held to January.

22 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Support.

23 COMMISSIONER BELL: Second.

24 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and
25 supported that we recommend to the Detroit Charter

1 Commission that the BOPC change the annual election
2 from July to January. Is there any discussion?

3 Those in favor?

4 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed?

6 Motion carries.

7 ATTORNEY WYRICK: Idea number 7 is to
8 recommend that the BOPC receive a per diem meeting
9 stipend. Currently none is received. It's just a
10 reimbursement process under Section 2-109.

11 COMMISSIONER BELL: So moved.

12 VICE CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHE: Support.

13 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and
14 supported that we recommend to the Detroit Charter
15 Commission that the BOPC receive a per diem meeting
16 stipend. Is there any discussion?

17 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Madam Chairperson.

18 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes, sir.

19 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Help me with the --
20 what was sent to the budget, the budget to the City
21 Council. Is that the stipend we talked -- that's the
22 per diem we're talking about or is --

23 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: The budget that was sent
24 to the City Council for the next fiscal year does not
25 include per diem meeting stipends. However, the agency

1 CFO said that he would work with the BOPC to find
2 funding to support a per diem meeting stipend.

3 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: So are we talking about
4 the same thing?

5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: We're talking about --
6 yeah.

7 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: All right. Thank you,
8 Madam Chairperson. Thank you for your patience.

9 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other discussion?
10 Those in favor?

11 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

12 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed?

13 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Opposed.

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Motion carries.

15 ATTORNEY WYRICK: Idea number 8 is that the
16 board secretary should also be the executive director
17 of the Board of Police Commission.

18 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Support.

19 COMMISSIONER BELL: Second.

20 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: The word is "also" or
21 "should be"?

22 COMMISSIONER BELL: Should be.

23 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Should be changed.

24 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: "Also" means you've got
25 two.

1 ATTORNEY WYRICK: No, not two positions, but
2 it should be two titles, not position, so ...

3 COMMISSIONER BELL: One title.

4 ATTORNEY WYRICK: It's the same position,
5 right.

6 COMMISSIONER BELL: One title, clarify that.

7 ATTORNEY WYRICK: Right.

8 COMMISSIONER BELL: From board secretary to
9 executive director.

10 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Exactly.

11 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and
12 supported that we recommend to the Detroit Charter
13 Commission that the BOP board secretary should be ...

14 VICE CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Executive
15 director.

16 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Executive director.

17 Those in -- any discussion?

18 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yeah, Madam Chair, just
19 one thing I'd like to just point out. Are we going to
20 also recommend that the language in the charter defines
21 the duties and roles and responsibilities of this
22 executive director position?

23 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes.

24 VICE CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Madam Chair, it
25 would be the same as the board secretary.

1 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yeah, the same language
2 would be -- Madam Chair, the same language would be
3 there. And the board will define the duties and
4 responsibilities of any staff. So, therefore, we don't
5 need to be specific by the charter, but give you
6 overview.

7 Is that correct?

8 ATTORNEY WYRICK: Yes.

9 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: And, through the
10 Chair, I just want to clarify that the reason that I'm
11 a supporter of this is because I think it's going to
12 help us with recruiting should we ever need to find a
13 new executive director or we'd be in a position where
14 we have a vacancy. I think the term "executive
15 director" aligns better with what we're asking this
16 person to do, and that they manage a substantial staff
17 in addition to supporting the board.

18 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Madam Chairperson.

19 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes, Commissioner.

20 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I concur with
21 Commissioner Griffie, but I think we need to make sure
22 that the language still be -- should be just a little
23 bit more than being a secretary, being an executive
24 director. So it could be stipulated, but I think we
25 need to look at it and make sure it does what we feel

1 like it needs to be done.

2 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Right. She'll serve as
3 the executive director role.

4 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: So I agree.

5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other discussion?
6 Those in favor?

7 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed?

9 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Opposed.

10 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Motion carries.

11 ATTORNEY WYRICK: Recommendation number 9 is
12 that if there's a vacancy of an elected commissioner
13 the BOPC shall appoint the successor by a majority
14 vote.

15 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: So moved.

16 COMMISSIONER BELL: Second.

17 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and
18 supported that the -- that we recommend to the Detroit
19 Charter Commission if there's a vacancy of an elected
20 commissioner the BOPC shall appoint the successor by
21 the majority vote. Is there any discussion?

22 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Madam Chairperson, does
23 that mean that the appointees of the -- whoever
24 appointed me will not --

25 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: No.

1 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: That means that if
2 someone is elected and they vacate a seat then the
3 board shall --

4 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I was distracted by --

5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: -- name the successor,
6 not the Mayor.

7 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I apologize. You're
8 right. I was distracted by Brother Brown.

9 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other discussion?
10 Those in favor?

11 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

12 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed?
13 The motion carries.

14 ATTORNEY WYRICK: Idea number 10 is that the
15 Board of Police Commissioners shall appoint any
16 vacancies of commissioners, which goes broader than
17 number 9.

18 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Correct.

19 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Through the Chair.

20 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner.

21 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: I'd like to make a
22 motion in opposition of this, because I'd like to move
23 that we do not recommend to the Detroit Charter
24 Commission that the BOPC appoint any vacancies of the
25 commissioners.

1 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: So if we don't have a
2 motion we don't have to do anything.

3 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Okay.

4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: So if there's no motion.
5 Okay. So Mr. -- there's no motion.

6 ATTORNEY WYRICK: Okay. Going to idea number
7 11 then, number 11 says if there's a vacancy of an
8 appointed commissioner the Mayor shall appoint the
9 successor by approval with the majority vote of the
10 BOPC.

11 COMMISSIONER HOLT: So moved.

12 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: No motion.

13 COMMISSIONER HOLT: So moved.

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: You so moved?

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: You need a second.

16 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Madam Chairperson, you
17 all talking about me now. So let me ask you this. I
18 just want to understand it. I don't have -- so if the
19 appointed and I've become vacant then somebody -- the
20 Mayor does another appointment you guys have to approve
21 it?

22 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Approve the Mayor's
23 appointment.

24 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: So the Mayor does not
25 have automatically --

1 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: That's what the
2 recommendation --

3 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Right.

4 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Okay.

5 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: I did not hear a
6 second.

7 COMMISSIONER BELL: Let's move on.

8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay. No second. We're
9 going to move to --

10 ATTORNEY WYRICK: No motion.

11 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: No motion. Motion
12 failed.

13 ATTORNEY WYRICK: Page 3 then is idea number
14 12. It recommends that the BOPC shall influence how
15 arbitrators are appointed for Detroit Police Department
16 hearings.

17 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: So moved.

18 COMMISSIONER BELL: Second.

19 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and
20 supported that we recommend to the Detroit Charter
21 Commission that the BOPC shall influence how
22 arbitrators are appointed for DPD hearings. Is there
23 any discussion?

24 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Madam Chair, this is
25 kind of confusing. I mean, what do you mean how they

1 are appointed? I mean, we're trying to weigh in on who
2 gets this position or how these roles are defined? I
3 mean, I think this is going in a far reaching realm for
4 the board, because I mean these men or women that are
5 appointed to these arbitrator positions have a vast
6 majority of experience in interest-based bargaining,
7 collective bargaining and different things like that.

8 I think the language here needs to kind of
9 change to -- I know there's some issues that
10 Commissioner Bell had that we brought up in one of our
11 meetings that we were concerned about the length of
12 time. Is that what we're targeting specifically or
13 we're targeting the people that are being selected?

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Bell.

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, Commissioner
16 Brown is correct. It might not have any, true, but we
17 want to make a statement that we want to try to
18 influence, impact in any way that we can. And we might
19 not be successful. At least we're going on record to
20 see can we have some flavor or impact on the issue.
21 He's correct. It's a cumbersome process with the City
22 of Detroit and the union, but we want to try to weigh
23 in on it.

24 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: So, Madam Chairperson,
25 just to help me with the understanding, Madam

1 Chairperson, so how are the arbitrators appointed now?

2 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: They are mutually agreed
3 upon.

4 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: By who?

5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: By the Chief's office
6 and the union.

7 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: So we're not involved
8 at all?

9 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: No.

10 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: We should have some --

11 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Say.

12 VICE CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: That's what the
13 motion is.

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other discussion?

15 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Call to question.

16 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those in favor?

17 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

18 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed?

19 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Opposed.

20 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: The motion carries.

21 ATTORNEY WYRICK: Idea number 13 is that the
22 BOPC recommend that a Detroit police member's
23 disciplinary history should affect a promotion.

24 COMMISSIONER HOLT: So moved.

25 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: So moved.

1 VICE CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Support.

2 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and
3 supported the BOPC recommend to the Detroit Charter
4 Commission that a DPD officer's disciplinary history
5 should affect the promotion.

6 Any discussion?

7 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes.

8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Brown.

9 COMMISSIONER BROWN: I think we need -- we're
10 in another slippery slope here. I mean, if -- there's
11 been some promotions where the officer may have done
12 something early on in his career and was given that
13 second chance to make those corrections and become some
14 of the best leaders that we have right now in these
15 commander and lieutenant and deputy chief roles right
16 now.

17 So I mean are we going to look at the entire
18 scope or spectrum of this person's career or are we
19 going to go back five years or something that they've
20 done, or is this something that you're just going to
21 say, well, if you did this you're just not going --
22 you're going to get passed over?

23 And I think that if we get a stance on this
24 and get involved with that to get this language changed
25 for us we're going to be inundated with a lot of

1 grievances.

2 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Through the Chair.

3 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes.

4 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: I think what we're
5 trying to -- the commissioners that are in support of
6 similar or this amendment or this motion or a similar
7 motion are trying to prevent what's happened over the
8 last couple months, which is a list of promotions that
9 have been negotiated in a back office somewhere between
10 the union and the Chief and -- which is the process,
11 not to say that anybody is trying to -- there's no
12 malfeasance. It's just how things have worked up until
13 now. And so we're trying to prevent those back office
14 negotiations of we know that this person has something
15 in their record that's not favorable, but we'll take
16 him in lieu of another, you know, issue that we don't
17 want to discuss. It's been used as a negotiating
18 tactic. And so I think that what we're trying to
19 prevent here is officers falling through the crack who
20 are being used in the middle of negotiation between the
21 union and the Chief.

22 I'm not sure if this -- is there language
23 that does that better, then I'm open to entertaining
24 that, but I don't -- I think -- to Commissioner Bell's
25 point, we're trying to make a statement to the charter

1 revision commission that --

2 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other discussion?

3 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Through the Chair, and I
4 understand Commissioner Griffie's comments as well as
5 Commissioner Brown, and I'm thinking given -- if the
6 Chief is in the charter, we still have the discretion
7 as to how severe that person has to have behaved before
8 we would grant that promotion. But, as it is now,
9 we -- my experience is we've not had any control over
10 the behaviors of police officers and whether or not
11 they should receive a promotion. I'm thinking we
12 should agree to this, this proposal.

13 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Call to question.

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those in favor?

15 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

16 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed?

17 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Opposed.

18 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Motion carries.

19 ATTORNEY WYRICK: Idea number 14 recommends
20 that the arbitrator should only make a recommendation
21 that the BOPC should be the final authority on
22 discipline.

23 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: So moved.

24 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Support.

25 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and

1 supported that we recommend to the Detroit Charter
2 Commission that the arbitrator should only make
3 recommendations and that the Board of Police
4 Commissioners should be the final authority on
5 discipline. Is there any discussion?

6 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yeah. Madam Chair, this
7 is -- and maybe our attorney can give us some advice on
8 this, but these are legally binding decisions that are
9 being made right now, and how do we act as a final
10 authority on it? I mean, I'm confused about this.

11 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: I think that the charter
12 already says that --

13 COMMISSIONER BELL: It speaks to the -- Madam
14 Chair, the charter already speaks to that. It was just
15 cited just recently by the subcommittee of the board.
16 You already have that language. But, as we all know,
17 we are not the final authority. So I think it's
18 appropriate that we take the proper steps at this time.

19 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other discussion?
20 Those in favor?

21 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

22 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed?

23 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Opposed.

24 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Motion carries.

25 ATTORNEY WYRICK: Idea number 15 is to

1 recommend that the number of commissioners be reduced
2 to nine elected only commissioners with two at-large
3 elected and seven by district.

4 COMMISSIONER BROWN: So moved.

5 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Support.

6 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and
7 supported that the Charter Commission -- that we
8 recommend to the Charter Commission that the number of
9 commissioners be reduced to nine elected only
10 commissioners with two at-large, seven by district. Is
11 there any discussion?

12 VICE CHAIRPERSON DEWAELESCHE: Madam Chair, we
13 approved a motion to maintain the four appointed and
14 seven elected, and there was a lot of discussions to
15 the reasons behind that. And so I ask that we maintain
16 that structure.

17 AUDIENCE MEMBER: Well, that's not what
18 you're talking about.

19 COMMISSIONER BROWN: That's not -- Madam
20 Chair, that's not -- right. That's not what we're
21 talking about. When I spoke on it earlier, we said we
22 were going to go down the line and vote on these
23 independently because they were different topics.
24 That's what I was alluding to and I was asking about it
25 earlier.

1 VICE CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Madam Chair,
2 that's just my recommendation.

3 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Yeah. Through the
4 Chair, I think -- I mean so I think what Commissioner
5 Dewaelsche is saying that she's just reiterating the
6 fact that she's supporting this because she also
7 supported the previous motion.

8 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair --

9 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: No.

10 ATTORNEY WYRICK: Not supporting.

11 VICE CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: I'm not
12 supporting this one.

13 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: That's what I mean.
14 I'm sorry.

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: I just want to go on
16 record I'm in opposition to this particular motion.

17 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: It's in conflict with
18 what we already --

19 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes. We just have to
20 vote it up or down.

21 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: We just vote it up or
22 down.

23 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yeah. So I didn't
24 expect to get us -- but since we did, is there any
25 further discussion?

1 Those in favor?

2 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Aye.

3 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed?

4 COMMISSIONERS: Nay.

5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: The motion fails.

6 ATTORNEY WYRICK: They're also
7 recommendations for the Office of Chief Investigator.
8 That's actually a separate attachment. The
9 recommendation number 1 would recommend that the -- to
10 the Detroit Charter Commission that the Office of the
11 Chief Investigator must have a policy on cooperation in
12 investigations. It shall be the duty of every officer,
13 employee, department and agency of the city to
14 cooperate with the office in any investigation
15 undertaken pursuant to this chapter. Any employee or
16 appointed officer of the city who violates any
17 provision of this chapter shall be subject to
18 discipline, including but not limited to discharge in
19 addition to any other penalty provided in this chapter.

20 VICE CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: So moved.

21 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Support.

22 COMMISSIONER BELL: What page are you on,
23 sir?

24 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yeah.

25 ATTORNEY WYRICK: This is a separate -- this

1 is the charter recommendations for OCI.

2 MS. WHITE: It's also in Section 8. Section
3 8 of your packet.

4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Right.

5 There was a motion. Is there support?

6 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Support.

7 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and
8 supported that we adopt the -- I mean that we recommend
9 to the charter -- Detroit City Charter the OCI must
10 have a policy on cooperation in investigations. Is
11 there any discussion?

12 Those in favor?

13 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed?

15 Motion carries.

16 ATTORNEY WYRICK: Idea number 2 on the same
17 page is recommended to the Detroit Charter that OCI
18 must have a policy on retaliation, obstruction or
19 interference, which is prohibited very specifically
20 under provision A, no person shall retaliate against,
21 punish, intimidate, discourage, threaten or penalize
22 any other person for reporting misconduct, making a
23 misconduct complaint, conducting an investigation,
24 complaining to officials, providing information,
25 testimony or documents in an investigation or

1 cooperating with or assisting the office in the
2 performance of its powers and duties.

3 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Support.

4 COMMISSIONER BELL: So moved.

5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and
6 supported that we recommend to the Detroit Charter
7 Commission that OCI must have a policy on retaliation,
8 obstruction or interference prohibited penalty -- with
9 penalty. Is there any discussion?

10 Those in favor?

11 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

12 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed?

13 Motion carries.

14 ATTORNEY WYRICK: The last recommendation
15 pertains to OCI, that OCI must have public policy to
16 make certain that complaints concerning police
17 misconduct and abuse are resolved fairly and timely.
18 All collective bargaining agreements must be in
19 accordance with this policy.

20 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: So moved.

21 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Support.

22 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and
23 supported that we recommend to the Detroit Charter
24 Commission that OCI must have a public policy to make
25 certain that complaints concerning police misconduct

1 and abuse are resolved fairly and timely and that all
2 collective bargaining agreements must be in accord with
3 this policy. Is there any discussion?

4 Those in favor?

5 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

6 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed?

7 Motion carries.

8 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Madam Chairperson.

9 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes.

10 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Who's going to be in
11 charge of making sure this is done?

12 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Mr. Wyrick.

13 ATTORNEY WYRICK: I will.

14 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Thank you.

15 ATTORNEY WYRICK: And that concludes the
16 recommendations.

17 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

18 VICE CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you.

19 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: At this time,
20 commissioners, on the agenda we have job descriptions
21 for secretary to the board and executive manager fiscal
22 to be approved for posting.

23 VICE CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Madam Chair, I
24 have a question.

25 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner.

1 VICE CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: The executive
2 manager job description we have in our packet says
3 executive manager police. Should it not have "finance"
4 or something in the title?

5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes, it should.

6 VICE CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Because it says
7 "police."

8 AUDIENCE MEMBER: It's nine o'clock.

9 VICE CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: We have to
10 finish our business.

11 MS. WHITE: Madam Chairperson, we can --
12 although we did not receive that revision before today,
13 we can ensure that it does not include the word
14 "police." That was part of the Inspector General's
15 investigation that did not include the word "police" in
16 the title.

17 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay.

18 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: So we change the
19 secretary of the board to executive --

20 VICE CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: In addition,
21 Madam Chair, since we -- I think that the title for
22 secretary to the Board of Police Commission would be
23 spelled out instead of abbreviated or acronyms.

24 COMMISSIONER BELL: Right.

25 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay. Anything else,

1 commissioners? Any other corrections?

2 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Like the lady said,
3 it's nine o'clock.

4 COMMISSIONER BELL: Would it be appropriate
5 to have a finished document before we vote on it?

6 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes, I agree.

7 VICE CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: So we can table
8 this until next week?

9 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes.

10 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Move to table until next
11 week, Madam Chair?

12 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes.

13 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Can I ask one question
14 about it's mandated that this person be a CPA. I'm
15 just curious as to why that's necessary.

16 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: This is I believe --
17 well, I don't know why.

18 COMMISSIONER BELL: Why don't we do the
19 research and come back.

20 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: So I'd like to ask
21 that the staff -- whoever's making this recommendation
22 provide a rationale as to why this person needs to be a
23 certified public accountant. That just seems --

24 VICE CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Madam Chair, if
25 I could just add, the reason for that is because the

1 department has that requirement. I think we followed
2 the department requirements, but, you know, we can have
3 our own, I believe.

4 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Okay. In that case I
5 support the motion to table.

6 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and
7 supported that we table the job descriptions until --
8 for one week? Is there any discussion?

9 Those in favor?

10 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

11 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed?

12]Motion carries. Thank you, commissioners.

13 At this time, new business. Is there any new
14 business?

15 Announcement. Our next meeting will be
16 Thursday -- okay, okay. Our next meeting will be
17 February 20, 2020 at 6:30 p.m. at the Detroit -- that
18 doesn't sound right. February 20th at three o'clock
19 p.m. at the Detroit Public Safety Headquarters. Our
20 next community meeting will be Thursday, March 12, 2020
21 at 6:30 p.m. at the Wayne County Community College
22 District, Curtis L. Ivery Downtown Campus in the Frank
23 Hayden Community Room located at 1001 Fort Street.

24 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Through the Chair.

25 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes.

1 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: I would just point of
2 personal privilege. I would be remiss, I don't know if
3 you've addressed this, but there's a nice write-up on
4 Reverend Dr. Holley in the Michigan Chronicle about his
5 upcoming retirement.

6 VICE CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Right.

7 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: So I just want to
8 acknowledge him for the amazing work that he's done on
9 this board and in his job.

10 COMMISSIONER HOLT: And his plan is to be
11 able to senior --

12 COMMISSIONER BELL: He is a senior.

13 COMMISSIONER HOLT: -- residency right across
14 from the church. So I'm just trying to figure out
15 where that is so I can get in on the bids.

16 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Me and you both will be
17 in there.

18 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: At this time,
19 commissioners -- thank you for that, Commissioner
20 Griffie. We'll have oral communications.

21 How many cards do you have?

22 MR. BROWN: Madam Chair, I currently have
23 eight cards. I'll call four at a time.

24 Ms. Sharon Lesnau, Christal Bonner, Russ
25 Bellant and Ishmail Terry.

1 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: I've just been informed
2 that the building closes at 9:30.

3 VICE CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: No, no. 9:00.

4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Nine o'clock. It has to
5 be cleared by 9:30. So this building closes at nine
6 o'clock. So at this time I'm going to ask that your
7 comments be limited to one minute.

8 AUDIENCE MEMBER: After y'all done talked for
9 three hours.

10 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: With the board's
11 approval.

12 AUDIENCE MEMBER: Unh-unh. Violation of the
13 Public Act.

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: With the board's
15 approval.

16 Is there a motion?

17 VICE CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: So moved.

18 COMMISSIONER BELL: So moved.

19 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Second.

20 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and
21 supported that we limit public comments today to one
22 minute.

23 AUDIENCE MEMBER: After y'all done talked for
24 three hours.

25 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Is there any discussion?

1 Those in favor?

2 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

3 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed?

4 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Opposed.

5 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Opposed.

6 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: The motion carries.

7 Ma'am, please give your name for the record,
8 please.

9 MS. LESNAU: Sharon Ann Lesnau. I live in
10 the Ninth Precinct on Lappin. I'm concerned about a
11 house that's selling drugs in my neighborhood.

12 Thank you, Ninth Precinct. You're fantastic.
13 They're doing what they can. The house has been raided
14 four times. It's still going strong. And this can't
15 be closed down. I came here today and there's four
16 cars going into the house, electric's been cut off.
17 They have their own way of heating the house. And cars
18 are going in and out, bikes are coming in, bikes are --
19 walkers are walking, cars are dropping people off. The
20 house is on a corner, and it's kitty-corner from my
21 house, and I'm tired of looking at it.

22 For 70 years I've lived in this neighborhood
23 and I'm not about to move out because of the crack
24 house over there that the police cannot shut down
25 because their hands are tied.

1 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commander Decker.

2 MR. BROWN: Ms. Butler.

3 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commander Decker is
4 going to talk to you. You're going to talk to --

5 COMMANDER DECKER: Yes, ma'am.

6 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay. Thank you.

7 MS. BONNER: Yes, hi. Christal Bonner.

8 Limited to one minute. Oh, my gosh. You've got to be
9 kidding.

10 Well, I really enjoyed the Ninth Precinct
11 report. I think all the precincts should follow that
12 example. Since I'm limited to 60 seconds, I can't say
13 everything I want to say.

14 You need to hire more police, and I'm glad
15 that you're doing some kind of effort to do that, and
16 increase the pay. Since you guys have a lot of clout
17 or maybe bargaining chips, why don't you go talk to the
18 Mayor and get the -- I mean the salary to increase. I
19 believe that the majority of the police officers are
20 good people, and they're just trying to do their best.
21 And they're putting their lives on the line. So the
22 minimum salary should be about 58,000 with the top at
23 98,000 that can increase. And they should get regular
24 wage increases. You know, we want good cops out there.
25 We want them to be protected and have enough money to

1 provide for their families. So this is just an
2 injustice, you know, for them to have such low pay.

3 And then also you should have regular psych
4 evaluations. Even though the majority of the police
5 officers are good people, I really believe that. I
6 worked with some before.

7 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Ma'am, your time.

8 MS. BONNER: I'm not done yet.

9 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Your time --

10 MS. BONNER: They should have regular psych
11 evaluations, and they should continue to benefits of
12 getting not only reduced houses, but free houses in the
13 city of Detroit. The Detroit Land Bank have all these
14 empty houses. Give it to the police officers for free.

15 MR. BROWN: Mr. Bellant, Mr. Blount.

16 MR. BELLANT: I answer to all variations on
17 my last name, okay.

18 I'm here to speak and request the involvement
19 of the police commission to return now Sergeant Ronaldo
20 Turner as an NPO in the Ninth Precinct. I serve as
21 treasurer of the Ninth Precinct Community Relations
22 Council, and Ernie over here is vice president who's
23 backing me. Commissioner Shirley Burch who obviously
24 is not here tonight also agrees and asked me to invoke
25 her name in this.

1 Our NPOs, as Captain Russell said, are
2 outstanding folks. It takes a long time to cultivate
3 relationships. It's not like a traffic ticket giver.
4 You know, you develop community relationships over a
5 long period of time. And to transfer somebody where
6 they want to be and where the community wants them is
7 not sound policy. And we would like you to step in to
8 try to influence a return of Commander Turner to the
9 precinct.

10 And I'll just conclude by saying that our
11 council got a grant and raised its own money to help
12 fund some of the programs that are going on in the
13 precinct. We're very engaged. The sergeants program
14 run by Sergeant Thirkill we've got a grant for that,
15 okay. So we're trying to get cooperation. We're
16 trying to put -- we're putting our horsepower into it.
17 We'd like to see some of yours in, too, on that matter.

18 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, sir.

19 MR. BELLANT: And I appreciate your time.

20 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

21 MR. BROWN: Madam Chair, before Mr. Terry
22 speaks I want Ms. Sandra --

23 MR. BELLANT: I just want to give a thumbs up
24 to Commander Decker. We all believe that the
25 leadership in this precinct is really doing a great

1 job. And I want to say that for all of them.

2 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Ms. Sandra Handy, Ms.
3 Taira Stevenson, Mr. Eric Johnson and Mr. Leo Irving.

4 MR. TERRY: Good evening.

5 COMMISSIONERS: Good evening.

6 MR. TERRY: For some of you I already know
7 half of you all up here. Thanks to Commissioner
8 William Davis for reaching out to our office up here in
9 the State of Michigan. For those who don't know, my
10 name is Ishmail Terry and I am the new, new legislative
11 policy director for State Representative Karen
12 Whitsett, representative in the 9th district.

13 So I was asked to come down here from the
14 State Capital Building, and I'm talking about going
15 from the budget to now coming to the police commission
16 to show our support to the police commissioner and
17 Annie Holt, Willie Bell, Lisa Carter and everyone else.

18 COMMISSIONER HOLT: So does that mean you're
19 going to get us money for our police officers?

20 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: He only has a minute.

21 MR. TERRY: Thank you.

22 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Come on.

23 MR. TERRY: I'm coming. So, yes, I'm just
24 here to show support and saying thank you for having
25 me. Thank you.

1 COMMISSIONERS: Thank you.

2 MR. BROWN: Ms. Handy.

3 MS. HANDY: Good evening, our honorable
4 commissioners. I'm Sandy Turner Handy. I am the
5 president of the Ninth Precinct Community Relations
6 Council. And I am in support of what Russ Bellant, our
7 current treasurer, has said. It takes a long time to
8 cultivate the relationships that we have cultivated
9 with our NPOs. And when we do that and then our NPOs
10 are taken away from us, you know, that creates a
11 hardship on community, because then we have to start
12 that trust process all over again with new people. And
13 it takes a long time.

14 As you guys know, trust in our police
15 department has not been good. Now it is, because we're
16 building those relationships. Our NPOs have helped us
17 to set up over 15 different block clubs and
18 associations in our community in an effort to organize
19 the people so that they are supporting our police
20 department. And then when you take our good officers,
21 our NPOs that we have built relationships with and send
22 them to other police precincts, we're really hurt that
23 you're taking them away from us. And this has been a
24 continuous process.

25 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, ma'am.

1 MR. BROWN: Ms. Stevenson.

2 MS. STEVENSON: Hello, everyone. Yes, I have
3 a concern. It's not dealing with the district 9.

4 VICE CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Can you
5 speak --

6 MS. STEVENSON: Yes. I have a concern. It's
7 not dealing with district 9. It's actually dealing
8 with the Third Precinct.

9 I stand before you to express deep troubling
10 concerns within the Detroit Police Department. I
11 understand that officers can become victims of serious
12 complaints, but I'm here to speak on behalf of my minor
13 child. When she as a minor and her rights were
14 violated by two or three Detroit police officers who I
15 will be speaking about in my statement if I have enough
16 time to do so.

17 On December the 9, 2018 my daughter and I
18 made a police report at the Fifth Precinct based upon
19 allegations that a male teacher at her school touched
20 her inappropriately before the school year ended in
21 June. Not only my daughter made that complaint, but
22 other children made those complaints.

23 On December the 14th, 2018 at 4:07 p.m. I
24 received an E-mail from Mark Ornstein, the CEO of
25 University Prep School District, stating he received a

1 copy of my child's police report and wants to have a
2 meeting with me. After reading the E-mail, I became
3 very angry since I didn't know who the detective was on
4 my daughter's case that I was assigned -- that was
5 assigned to my daughter's case, and yet he was
6 communicating with the CEO of the school about my
7 child.

8 I never -- he never contacted me regarding my
9 daughter's case. I've called the precinct to get his
10 name and left Detective Billings three separate
11 messages on December 17, 18, 19 of 2018 and he never
12 returned my calls.

13 On December 20th during a meeting with the
14 CEO of the school the CEO handed me a copy of the
15 incident report, which was unredacted. And he had all
16 the statement that my daughter gave and the
17 perpetrator's name. A five-page incident investigative
18 report that says only "authorized personnel only," and
19 I believe that's what compromised my child's case.

20 After the meeting I went to the Third
21 Precinct to talk to Detective Billings about his
22 behavior and how he handled my daughter's case. I was
23 met with hostility from Detective Billings and
24 dismissive behavior when I confronted him about my
25 daughter's case. He told me my daughter didn't have a

1 case and that's what it was.

2 Detective Billings closed my daughter's case
3 on December the 14th after speaking with Mark Ornstein
4 after getting a statement from the Dean of Culture,
5 Jeffrey Williams, where these alleged incidents took
6 place at University Prep Science and Math Middle School
7 and never talked to the detective.

8 This is the second time this incident have
9 happened at that Third Precinct. The first time it was
10 Detective Knight when she told me her loyalty was to
11 Mark Ornstein and did I know him, that they were
12 friends. I said do you know that I know Jesus Christ,
13 first and foremost. I don't care who you know. You
14 have a obligation by your oath to stand by.

15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay, ma'am. I'm going
16 to ask that you talk to OCI.

17 Who's here from the OCI?

18 MS. BLOSSOM: I am.

19 MS. STEVENSON: I've been to Internal
20 Affairs.

21 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay. OCI, that's our
22 investigator.

23 MS. STEVENSON: Okay.

24 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: And then I want you to
25 talk to Deputy Chief --

1 D.C. BRYANT: Through the Chair. Is Director
2 Graveline still here?

3 MS. STEVENSON: Also Sex Crimes --

4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Director Graveline, can
5 you please talk to --

6 MR. BROWN: Mr. Johnson.

7 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, ma'am.

8 MR. BROWN: Mr. Eric Johnson.

9 MR. JOHNSON: I decline to speak.

10 MR. BROWN: Okay. Mr. Leo Irving.

11 Madam Chair, that will be your last speaker.

12 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

13 MR. IRVING: Good evening, board.

14 COMMISSIONERS: Good evening.

15 MR. IRVING: My name is Leo Irving -- Leo
16 Nathan Irving. I'm here on behalf of my son.

17 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Leo Garrett. So on
18 the night of the 30th, January 30th, there was a fire
19 on Neveux Street (ph) and he was killed in the fire.

20 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Sorry for your loss.

21 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Shortly after the
22 house was tore down. Hours after they pulled his body
23 out. Very, very soon they tore the house down. No one
24 knows who did it, who has authorization to tear down a
25 house when it was the scene of a crime. They don't

1 know how the fire started. It went from it being a
2 electrical fire to it's some sort of chemical fire. We
3 don't know how it happened, but all of a sudden they
4 are able to just tear the house down. And no one
5 informed us at all. No one told us, you know, how this
6 is able to even happen.

7 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay. So you're trying
8 to find out who authorized the tearing down of the
9 house?

10 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Yes. How is this even
11 able to happen? You guys are aware that someone can
12 literally be murdered or someone can literally be in a
13 fire in a household and then the house just torn down
14 right after. Someone -- who authorizes it? How is
15 this able to happen?

16 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Department Chief, who do
17 we refer that out to?

18 D.C. BRYANT: Well, I'm going to have
19 Lieutenant Gardner get her information. That's
20 actually something we're probably going to have to
21 refer over to the fire side of the house. We'll get
22 her information and make sure that it's --

23 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: All right. Thank you.

24 Lieutenant Gardner is going to take your
25 information. Lieutenant Gardner is standing right

1 there. And I'm told it's going to be --

2 D.C. BRYANT: Yeah. We're going to refer it
3 to the correct entity.

4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay. And if you don't
5 hear anything please come back to let us know.

6 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: And we brought
7 everyone up here. We waited here all day. And this
8 some everybody know we have a lot of support here.
9 They all came out to support my brother died in a fire,
10 you know.

11 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Can we have them reach
12 out to the board so they have to come back to a
13 meeting?

14 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yeah. They can just
15 contact our board secretary.

16 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Thank you.

17 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. If there's
18 no other business before this board--

19 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I'm going to make this
20 really short. I want to give my time to Ernest.

21 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Sir, you have two
22 seconds.

23 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I'm here -- I really
24 like presidency of the Ninth Precinct that we really
25 want Officer Turner --

1 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay. Thank you. We
2 hear you.

3 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: And, Reverend Holley,
4 Pastor Grant is retired. I guess you going, too.

5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

6 Commissioners --

7 COMMISSIONER BELL: Call for adjournment.
8 Second.

9 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and
10 supported that we adjourn. Is there any discussion?
11 Those in favor?

12 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

13 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed?

14 Motion carries. Thank you all for coming out
15 this evening, and have a wonderful week.

16 (The meeting was adjourned at 8:53 p.m.)

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
