

What's a neighborhood framework plan?


- The Neighborhood Framework Plan is a city-led initiative to build vibrant and growing neighborhoods in Detroit.
- The framework plan will guide investment to improve core assets in four (4) focus areas—parks & greenways, mixeduse and multi-family redevelopment, commercial corridors, and neighborhood stabilization.
- The investments will work hand-in-hand to build upon the existing strengths of neighborhoods, aligning all resources available to drive a significant and holistic neighborhood revitalization in each area.

- Residential & commercial blight elimination
- Land stewardship & maintenance



Mixed-use Redevelopment

- Identify opportunity sites for new shops & businesses
- Entrepreneurial support
- Preservation of cultural, historical, and artistic assets





Parks and Greenways

- Investments at Heilmann Memorial Park
- Better access to greenway trails, parks, and the Detroit Riverfront
- Improved connections between existing neighborhood parks and community assets



Streetscapes and Mobility

- Walkable, vibrant commercial corridors
- Redesign & creation of neighborhood main streets, civic hubs, and gathering spaces





Parks and Greenways

- Make facility & campus improvements at Heilmann Recreation Center & Memorial Playfield
- Encourage park stewardship, programming & maintenance
- Improve park amenities and tree canopy & health



Mixed-use Redevelopment

- Establish microdistrict at Liberal Street/Gratiot Avenue
- Stabilize microdistrict at Houston-Whittier Street/Kelly Road
- Stabilize microdistrict at McNichols/Gratiot Avenue



Streetscapes and Mobility


- Improve street design to improve mobility for all users & increase safety




Challenges

- Few intimate gathering spaces
- Poorly defined edges and gates
- Lack of feeling of enclosure
- Large spaces not well defined
- Flooding/standing water in parking lots on west side of park
- Skate park inaccessible
- Lack of spaces for activities beyond sports
- Lack of gender diverse activities

HEILMANN PARK | Recommendations

- Plant trees to define edge of park and break up the large spaces into smaller gathering areas
- Define clear gateways/entrances to park
- Install rain gardens along west side of park/convert to green parking lots to address standing water issues
- Resurface and/or paint existing courts, play areas and walking loop (include distance markers)
- Create smaller gathering places and picnic areas using topography and furniture
- Open/rehab the Skate Park
- Explore community partnerships for universal, all-age/gender programming
- Identify and integrate COVID/pandemic design considerations

- Needs: New kitchen appliances (dishwasher, refrigerator, freezer)




- Develop Low-StressNeighborhood Connectors
 - Slow traffic, improve designated pedestrian and bike routes to connect the community
 - Redmond Street
 - Mapleridge Street or Seymour Street
 - Hayes Street
- Improve Safety & Transit
 - Change street configuration
 - Gratiot Avenue

STREETSCAPES + MOBILITY | Low Stress Neighborhood Connectors



- Designate key routes for safe walking, more eyes on the street
- Slow traffic through speed cushions
- Improve sidewalks
- Improve tree canopy and beautification efforts
- Develop signage or wayfinding
- Connect schools and parks




STREETSCAPES + MOBILITY | Improving Gratiot Avenue Safety & Transit existing conditions



- High rate of crashes and injuries
- Street is too wide and cars drive too fast
- Not enough pedestrian crossings
- Unsafe pedestrian crossings and poor sidewalk condition
- Lack of adequate bus shelters, street trees, benches
- Need for improved street lighting for sidewalks
- Conflicts with cars and people at driveway entries






Existing street section

- 1 center turn lane


STREETSCAPES + MOBILITY | Improving Gratiot Avenue: Road Diet & Bike Lanes






- 2 parking lanes

STREETSCAPES + MOBILITY | Improving Gratiot Avenue: Dedicated Transit & Bike Lanes




- 4 travel lanes


