HAPPY WOMEN'S HISTORY MONTH!

Bessie Coleman

In honor of Women's History Month, we highlight the legacy of Pilot Bessie Coleman. Her legacy of trailblazing lives on in organizations such as Sisters of the Skies.



Coleman was an early American civil aviator. She was the first Black American woman and the first Native American to hold a pilot license. Coleman was known for performing flying tricks. Her nicknames were "Brave Bessie," "Queen Bess," and "The Only Race Aviatrix in the World." She earned her international pilot's license on June 15, 1921 from the Fédération Aéronautique Internationale in Le Crotoy, France. In 1922, she performed the first public flight by a Black American woman. She was famous for doing "loop-the-loops" and making figure eights in an airplane.

Sisters of the **Skies** organization of Black female pilots who support future Black aviators professional via mentorship, development, outreach. and scholarship. On February 26th one of #TeamCalloway's very own visited Atlanta, Georgia for the annual scholarship gala. The group pictured includes Alfreda Wilburn and her daughter Micah E. Clark.




Judge Ketanji Brown Jackson

Judge Jackson's experience has given her the unique perspective to be a judge, "...who is committed to equal justice under the law and who understands the profound impact that the Supreme Court's decisions have on the lives of the American people."



Tax Foreclosure Prevention

WHAT IS THE HOMEOWNERS PROPERTY TAX ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (HPTAP)?

The City of Detroit has a poverty property tax exemption that is underutilized. Approximately 40,000 Detroiters are eligible each year but around 5,500 applied for the exemption in 2017.


By lowering or eliminating tax bills, the HPTAP can improve housing affordability and prevent tax foreclosure among owners with low and fixed incomes.

JOIN A CITIZENS' RADIO PATROL

"Teamwork is the ability to work together toward a common vision... it is the fuel that allows common people to attain uncommon results."

Through a partnership with the Detroit Police Department (DPD), citizens form radio patrols to deter crime by observing activity in their neighborhoods and reporting any suspicious behavior to law enforcement.

What is Citizens' Radio Patrol?

It is a community-driven process that gives residents the option of taking ownership of their neighborhood's safety. Committed citizens act as patrollers, observers or base operators — all crucial to the overall operation of the program.

Who takes part?

A patrol group includes community members who dedicate their time and effort to establish a new standard of safety in their neighborhood. It is made up of residents who have an interest in crime prevention working with local law enforcement officials.

Why is the focus of Citizens' Radio Patrol?

Crime deterrence. Increasing the presence of patrollers

in a neighborhood leads to reduced crime and improved quality of life.

How does it work?

Each team consists of three people: A driver, observer (in designated uniform) and base operator. The driver and observer patrol the neighborhood in a designated vehicle and observe a specific area. They communicate with a base operator with radios or cell phones. Anytime a suspicious behavior or criminal act is observed, the observer contacts the base operator who contacts the proper authorities. If it is an emergency, the observer directly calls 9-1-1.

Drivers are reimbursed for their efforts (other approved operating expenses may be approved for reimbursement as well).
