COUNCIL MEMBER'S CORNER

LEGISLATIVE/POLICY UPDATES

- Council Member Calloway has moved a Resolution to declare the current housing crisis in the
 City of Detroit as a Public Health crisis. This designation focuses on shifting resources toward
 addressing the systems and structures perpetuating housing insecurity, chronic homelessness,
 and poverty.
- Council Member Calloway is exploring the possible codification of a Tenant Bill of Rights to provide expanded protections to the 52% of Detroiters who are now tenants.
- Council Member Calloway has opposed a land sale in District 2 where she believes the Administration, Council, and respective departments can have a more robust conversation and action on land utilization throughout the city. The Council Member has proposed shifting away from heavy-industrial zoning to mixed-used zoning (or down-zoning) best to incorporate the future economic trajectory of our city.

COUNCIL MEMBER CALLOWAY ATTENDS LOG CABIN DAY



Council Member Calloway attended her first-ever Log Cabin Day on June 26 at Palmer Park. Log Cabin Day is a festival that celebrates history, music, theatre, storytelling, and art. During the festival, Council Member Calloway toured Palmer Park's historic 1800s Log Cabin overlooking Lake Frances. The People for Palmer Park and the City of Detroit have successfully raised funds to restore and preserve the historic log cabin.

COUNCIL MEMBER CALLOWAY CELEBRATES FIRST "72 DAY"



A sea of young adults in white "72 Day" tees flooded Puritan Avenue with great energy and enthusiasm on July 2nd. Led by JerJuan Howard, Ted Gloster Jr., and Cidney Calloway, the team of young people along with MotorCity Blight Busters were able to clean up over 5,500 pounds of debris and trash on Puritan Avenue. The goal of "72 Day" was to promote Puritan pride, community service, and fellowship. It was a day chock-full of events that allowed community members to showcase positive pride in their neighborhood. "72 Day" consisted of neighborhood clean-ups, little library installations, live music, local business highlights, car shows, a cookout/picnic, and an empowerment panel of community leaders.

#TEAMCALLOWAY CELEBRATES JUNETEENTH

Team Calloway participated in the Juneteenth Freedom Weekend on Saturday, June 18th, erecting the iconic green tent at the corner of Livernois and West Outer Dr. in honor of Jubilee Day. The team engaged community members, shared literature on the history of Juneteenth, and enjoyed the festivities along the Avenue of Fashion. Council Member Calloway also had an opportunity earlier that morning to join a podcast to speak about the legacy of the Black experience, its importance in its establishment of HBCUs, and our continued efforts to break glass ceilings.













WHAT IS JUNETEENTH?

On June 19, 1865. Union General Gordon Granger arrived with his troops (some of whom were members of the United States Colored troops) in Galveston. Texas to inform enslaved African Americans of their freedom. The Civil War had ended in April 1865 but enslaved peoples in Texas were the last to be freed as they were in the westernmost rebelling state. Many enslavers were aware of the Emancipation Proclamation being signed two and a half years earlier, but it was not until June 19th, 1865 that it was enforced by the Union Army. More than 250,000 enslaved African Americans in the state were set free.



HONORING JUNETEENTH

Juneteenth also known as Freedom Day, Jubilee Day, and Emancipation Day is the celebratory day acknowledging freedom from slavery. Juneteenth allows African American communities to reflect on where we've come from, what we're pursuing and striving towards, as well as taking the time to pass down history and culture. Juneteenth is about commemorating, celebrating, and remembering freedom.






CLASS OF 2022

On June 17th, Councilwoman Angela Calloway graciously agreed to be the keynote speaker for the Legacy Academy Commencement Ceremony. After delivering an endearing and supportive speech, as only a mother Councilwoman could. Calloway surprised our graduates with more than a few gifts. She started by giving each young man a Voter Registration form empowering them to engage with politics. She presented each with signed copy of "The Urban Playbook" written by Wyatt Jones, M.Ed, and a gold, City of Detroit lapel pin encouraging them to read it within 30 days.

Last and most impactful, was the introduction of Mr. William Aaron with Emerging Industries. After he briefly addressed the class of 2022, he offered each young man the opportunity to be paid while they earn certificates in the skilled trades and stated that they could start within a few days. HOW TO APPLY FOR NEIGHBORHOOD BEAUTIFICATION PROGRAM



Funded by the Neighborhood Improvement Fund

WHAT IS THE NEIGHBORHOOD BEAUTIFICATION GRANT PROGRAM?

The Neighborhood Beautification Program (NBP) grant provides funding to Detroit-based neighborhood associations, block clubs, faith-based organizations, and non-prof organizations that currently own property or purchase La Bank vacant lots (up to 4) to carry out a project in their community, Grant awards range from \$500 to \$15,000.

NBP has three eligible project areas: Clean-up Activities Community Gardens, and Public Space Activities.

Non-profit organizations and faith-based organizati need to partner with a neighborhood block club.



HOW TO APPLY FOR NBP GRANT

STEP 1 APPLICANT ELIGIBILITY

- Must be a registered block club with the Department of Neighborhoods.
- To receive funds, all applicants (even if approved by the Department of Neighborhoods) must be a NonProfit 501(c)(3) organization to receive grant funds.
- If the applicant is a 501 (c)(3) organization, move to Step 2.
- If you do not have a 501 (c)(3) designation, you may partner with one in your community.



Handlebars for the Homeless SUNDAY, AUGUST 14, 2022 Registration is OPEN

Handlebars for the Homeless (H4H) is back in-person with a new route for 2022. All funds raised from this ride will go to support individuals experiencing homelessness.

NSO's H4H guided bicycle tour will highlight some of Detroit's hidden treasures. The tour begins and ends at the NSO Bell Building located at 882 Oakman Boulevard in Detroit (former historic Michigan Bell Building) with a stop in the middle at the Clay Apartments, NSO's new 42-unit permanent supportive housing facility located near the Eastern Market District.

The 15-mile tour guides cyclists through some of Detroit's most notable neighborhoods including Boston Edison, Piety Hill, and Virginia Park. Cyclists will also travel through the historic Poletown and Milwaukee Junction communities. All participants will receive a NSO Handlebars for the Homeless high-performance T-shirt, spoke card, raffle entry, and refreshments. The ride is fully supported with seasoned bicyclists and professional mechanics cycling with the group.

Cyclists can also support the ride virtually and raise money anytime and anywhere beginning Friday, August 12 through Sunday, August 14, 2022. Cyclists can ride indoors or outdoors, atop a traditional bike or a smart bike trainer, on their favorite bike path or a virtual bicycle app.

ALL BICYCLISTS MUST WEAR A HELMET. Participants must be 14 years of age by date of the ride or older and all youth must be accompanied by a parent or guardian at all times.

The HOPE application is also the first step toward receiving financial assistance for back property taxes.
