RE: Overview of the Homeless Solutions Funding recommendations for 2022-23

This report provides an overview of the 2022-23 Homeless Solutions Funding program and recommendations.

The Housing and Revitalization Department (HRD) is the City's lead department for this program. HRD has completed its review of funding allocations and is forwarding the Administration's recommendations to the Your Honorable Body for consideration (please see the attached chart).

On Tuesday, July 19, 2022, the City Council is scheduled to hold at 1:00 PM an overview of the Homeless Solutions Funding program, at 1:15 PM a hearing on the program and recommended funding amounts, and at 1:30 PM an Appeals Hearing on the recommendations. On Friday, July 22, 2022 at 10 AM, City Council has scheduled a follow-up discussion, and on Tuesday, July 26, 2022, City Council is scheduled to vote on the 2022-23 Homeless Solutions Funding allocations. The above City Council schedule is for the Planning and Economic Development Standing Committee, expanded.

FUNDING ALLOCATION

The Homeless Solutions Funding program consists of two Department of Housing and Urban Development funding sources:

- 1) \$2,589,427 in Homeless Public Service (HPS) and
- 2) \$2,762,629 in Emergency Solutions Grants (ESG).

The total funding allocation is \$5,352,056.

TIMELINE

Similar to previous years, the Homeless Solutions Funding review and award decisions are done later than the Neighborhood Opportunity Fund (NOF) review, in order to combine the HPS with the ESG funding allocations.

HRD released a Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) with a deadline of May 9, 2022. The application, similar to the NOF review, includes an Appeals form.

PROPOSALS

Homeless Solutions Funding is divided into the following six categories:

- 1) Rapid Re-Housing (RRH)
- 2) Homelessness Prevention
- 3) Street Outreach
- 4) Emergency Shelter
- 5) Warming Center
- 6) Data Collection

In total, HRD received 41 applications from 24 agencies – several groups applied for more than one activity. For example, one group, Detroit Rescue Mission Ministries, submitted 10 requests - 5 within emergency shelter and 5 within warming center. Of the 24 agencies, there was one new organization (SER-Metro Detroit).

The table below (copied from the attached chart) summarizes the number of proposals within each category, as well as the number of proposals recommended for funding. Of the 41 applications/requests, HRD is recommending 22 activities for funding, plus the 2 activities within the non-competitive category. Of the 22 activities, the most are within the emergency shelter category.

REVIEW AND SCORING

HRD worked in cooperation with the Office of Grants Management (OGM) and the Office of Contracting and Procurement (OCP) in reviewing the submitted applications. Each proposal was scored separately ranging from 0 to 140 points. Applications scoring in the 90 to 100 percent range are recommended for the full amount requested. Applications scoring in the 80 to 89 percent range receive an increase to the prior year's allocation based on a tiered system.

The 16 groups recommended for funding are summarized below in alphabetical order:
