COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT (CDBG)

CDBG Program – is a federal program operated by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). It Provides entitlement grants to local entities for community development activities (24 CFR part 570).

- The program objective is the development of viable communities by providing decent housing, a suitable living environment, and expanded economic opportunities, principally for low-and-moderateincome persons
- The grant amount is determined by formula and varies from year to year according to the amount appropriated nationally by the U.S. Congress.

HOME INVESTMENT PARTNERSHIPS (HOME)

HOME INVESTMENT PARTNERSHIPS (HOME) PROGRAM

(24 CFR part 92)

- The Home Investment Partnerships (HOME) program is a Federal program operated by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.
- This program provides grants to cities and others to increase the supply of safe and affordable rental and ownership housing for low-income families.
- The grant amount is determined by formula and varies from year to year according to the amount appropriated nationally by the U.S. Congress.
- Grant funds may be used to acquire, rehabilitate or construct affordable housing and to provide tenant based rental assistance.

EMERGENCY SOLUTIONS GRANT (ESG)

EMERGENCY SOLUTIONS GRANTS (ESG) PROGRAM

(24 CFR part 576)

The Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) program is a Federal program operated by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. The <u>Homeless Emergency Assistance and</u> <u>Rapid Transition to Housing Act of 2009 (HEARTH Act)</u> amended the Emergency Shelter Grants Program (McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act). The HEARTH Act revised the Emergency Shelter Grants Program in significant ways and renamed it the Emergency Solutions Grants (ESG) program. The ESG Interim Rule took effect on January 4, 2012.

ESG funds may be used for five program components:

- street outreach
- emergency shelter
- homelessness prevention
- rapid re-housing assistance
- Homeless Management Information Systems (HMIS)
- administrative activities (up to 7.5% of a recipient's allocation can be used for administrative activities).

The grant amount is determined by formula and varies from year to year according to the amount appropriated nationally by the U.S. Congress.

HOUSING OPPORTUNITIES FOR PERSONS WITH AIDS (HOPWA) PROGRAM (24 CFR part 574)


- The Housing Opportunities For Persons With AIDS (HOPWA) program is a Federal program operated by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.
- This program provides grants to large cities with over 1500 AIDS cases. Program funds are designed to meet housing and related service needs of people with HIV/AIDS and their families.
- The program covers Wayne County (including Detroit).
- The grant amount is determined by formula and varies from year to year according to the amount appropriated nationally by the U.S. Congress.

2021 HOPWA allocation for City of Detroit \$3,053,453 2022 HOPWA allocation for City of Detroit \$3,239,696




